GROVETON

Striking rapidly and decisively in every quarter of play, the Indians turned the trick for the seventh consecutive time over the Diboll Lumberjacks here last Friday night. The lop-sided score was 39-7.

The Lumberjacks did score, however, and that is another 'something' which hasn't been done in the past seven meetings of the two teams. A 60 yard pass play from Royce Grimes to Ken Burnett netted the score late in the fourth quarter with the Jack trailing in the ball game, 27-0. Tackle John Hannah added the extra point from conversion. The pass traveled about 33 yards to Burnett and the latter footing it the rest of the way. He took the pass in his usual stride, though he battled two Indians all down to the goal line.

HOLLOMAN KILLS JACKS

James Holloman, a senior letterman, literally killed the Jacks with his spirited runs. Gaining more than 100 yards alone, also scoring three times. He was a constant threat as a pass receiver.

Glenn Reeves accounted for 3 Groveton TD's also. Reportedly, it was his first ball game this year.

Freddy Friday kicked three of the extra points for the victors.

JACKS LOOK DRAB

The locals were simply not themselves Friday night. That has been said of them off and on all season. Following a good game they will invariably come to a drab one. And drab they looked against the Indians.

This writer's opinion is that had it not been for quarterback Royce Grimes, Diboll would have been in the game even less than it was.

The scrappy back pitched pass after pass, most of them true, and received only one setback from the fast-charging Indian line. Three of his perfect aerials went to halfback Bill Jones, the latter dropping all three.

Having a bad night as all ball-players do, Jones will probably make a goo comeback against Trinity this week.

HARD CHARGING LINE

Both Reeves and Holloman were running behind a hard line that opened up countless holes for them. Diboll, on the other hand, showed a 'leaky' line, as seemingly held together by the peppy Robert Rector and Don Pinkerton.

NO MATCH FOR WOODVILLE

However, it is expected that the Indians still will be no match for the powerful Woodville Eagles, who are certainly destined for Regional and possibly State playoff position. If they don't beat Deer Park for State Championship this year, we'll be surprised.

In the other game, Diboll will meet Trinity in the final game for both teams. Trinity held the Eagles to a scoreless deadlock for the first half in their game, something that hasn't been done before or since this year. They own a 19-6 victory over Coaling, and a 13-13 tie with Groveton. They took their tie game on penetrations.


Trying to bring their season's mark to a 4-6 mark, the Lumberjacks will meet Trinity there this Friday night at 7:30.

ALLAN SHIVERS GOVERNOR OF TEXAS Austin, Texas

GREETINGS: Tuberculosis is a communicable disease which spreads from person to person. It can invade any home at any time.

Modern methods of treatment have steadily reduced its death toll. Nevertheless, tuberculosis claimed the lives of 910 Texans last year and newly reported cases numbered 3,704. Its economic cost remains a heavy burden to the taxpayers of our State.

The work of the Texas Tuberculosis Association and its affiliated local organizations is aimed at preventing the spread of tuberculosis, to help bring an end to the economic loss and the personal tragedy caused by this disease. Once each year the public is asked to support their efforts through the sale of Christmas Seals.

Therefore, I, as the Governor of the State of Texas, do hereby designate the period November 16-December 24, 1955, as CHRISTMAS SEAL DAYS in Texas, and urge every citizen to aid this work by buying and using Christmas Seals during the holiday season.

In official recognition whereof, I hereby affix my signature this 14th day of November, 1955. (Signed) ALLAN SHIVERS Governor of Texas.

Forest Fires Are Now At Danger Stage

The News-Bulletin again calls attention to the fact that this is the season for forest fires. Actually, it has been so dry for the past month people are beginning to wonder if sawmill towns may make it through the Fall without any major fires.

Probably they won't. If all Lumber companies could depend on everyone, especially hunters, to do all expected of them to prevent fires, possibly all timber land would be green come spring.

At least a few of us fail in our duties with fires, cigarettes, matches, and broken bottles in the woods, however. Yes, broken bottles which reflect the sun-rays, are said to cause many fire in grass and woods.

We hope you of Diboll will always bear in mind that from timber comes our livelihood. All of us in this area depend on wood to feed, cloth, and shelter us.

No one would deliberately toss his food out the door, discard all his clothes, or burn his family's home.

Yet, in effect, when timber is destroyed by fire, our jobs here are automatically graphed for fewer years than before the fire.

HUNTERS, be careful in the woods!

Other interesting plots showed: Trees sprayed with BHC chemical in 1953 to control the Ips beetle, which was severe in burned areas; and the girdling of low grade hardwoods with 254T chemical.





It's The Law

The average person has only a vague idea concerning his rights in court. When unjustly charged with an offense, even a simple traffic violation, he is prone to feel that all is lost. Our laws, however, provide a number of protections to insure against conviction of the innocent. Probably the most fundamental right of the accused is summarized in the well-known adage, "Every man is innocent until proved guilty." It is up to the prosecuting authorities to prove the person on trial is guilty—and not the obligation of the per-

son accused to prove that he is innocent. The prosecution must prove your guilt beyond a reasonable doubt, or you will be acquitted. The mere fact that you have been given a ticket or accused of a crime is not evidence of guilt.

Another important protection is the right to have a witness whose testimony you may need subpoenaed to appear in court and testify. Many people are reluctant to go to court when their own rights are involved, and unless you had a means for compelling their attendance and testimony, you often would be unable to prove the facts necessary for success in your case. It is the duty of every citizen to testify if he has information important to a law suit and is called upon to do so. The courts and do enforce attendance in court and the giving of testimony.

COWBOYS ... The World Over



World's Fastest Laboratory



This new U.S. Air Force F-100 Super Sabre Jet hits speed of over 755 mph as it tests endurance of standard wristwatches in supersonic flight. Control panel dial (upper right) shows plane traveling at over Mach 1.1, indicating that it has already crashed sonic barrier and is exceeding speed of sound by over 100 mph. Super Sabre's specially installed camera kept check on time pieces as plane went through strenuous test flight. NO COMMENT

Washington—You hear fresh concern expressed on Capitol hill these days over the effect of political activities of union bosses on the rank and file of union members.

For example, Senator Barry Goldwater, Arizona Republican, believes the political freedom of the working man and woman is in great jeopardy because of expenditure of union funds for political purposes.

"In my opinion," he says, the "usurpation of political power by some top union leaders is denying to millions of rank and file workers the right to make their own political decisions."

Part of his complaint against the union bosses is explained this way: "Objective studies by universities and other groups have shown that approximately 40 per cent of the union members in this country are Republican.

"When a union boss raises about \$10,000,000 for political purposes out of compulsory union dues, \$400,000,000 of that money must come from Republican union members.

"This means that a Republican union member who goes down to the polls to vote Republican is, at the same time, required, in order to hold his job, to contribute, through his dues check-off, to the campaign funds for the Democratic Party—the very party which he is voting against.

"Forty per cent of the union members in the United States are in this position today. If such a situation doesn't strike right at the roots of freedom in this country, then I have no idea of what freedom means."

Clean Up—Paint Up

Shivers Says Texans To Have Seal-Day

Nov. 14—Calling attention to 3,704 new cases of tuberculosis reported in the state last year, Governor Allan Shivers this week warned Texans that tuberculosis is a communicable disease which can invade any home at any time.

Modern methods of treatment, Governor Shivers said, have steadily reduced the death toll from tuberculosis. He pointed out, however, that in 1954 the disease claimed the lives of 910 persons in Texas and its economic cost remains a heavy burden to the taxpayers.

In an official memorandum dated November 14, the governor recognized the work of the Texas Tuberculosis Association and its local affiliates as helping to prevent the spread of tuberculosis.





AUSEN

Sentiment to persuade U. S. Sen. Price Daniel to run for governor next summer is growing.

Senator Daniel has been in Austin and other cities over the state the past month holding subcommittee hearings on narcotics traffic. On the side he has talked with many local political leaders.

Reports were that some spokesmen for both liberal and conservative factions hoped that by supporting Daniel they could avoid a repetition of the 1954 gubernatorial slugfest.

Daniel has said he will not announce his intentions until after Jan. 1.

MORE SUPER ROADS

A four-lane highway connecting all population centers should be Texas' aim, says Gov. Allan Shivers.

Addressing a meeting of the Texas County Judges and Commissioners Association in Austin, Shivers praised the farm-to-market highways. But, he said, "our trunk-line system has not fared too well".

At least 3,000 more miles of heavy-traffic roads are needed, Shivers stated. He added that "such construction would pay for itself with increased gasoline tax revenues. But people seem more willing to pay more expensive toll road fees than state taxes."

Construction Starts Stripping Plant

It was announced earlier this week by Elwyn Jones, vice president of Temple Associates of Diboll, that construction started on plant facilities for the T. L. Smith Company of Lufkin last Wednesday. Cost of the new plant was estimated by Mr. Jones to exceed \$200,000.
