Diboll Turned Out Many Famous Men In The Past Half Century

During the past half century Diboll has turned out many famous men in many different walks of life.

We have not had the luck at producing many college and professional football players, but we can claim two of the best high school coaches in the business today.

One of them is a former Dibollian and well known to all here in town. Mr. Elmer "Hot-Dog" Thompson, the son of Mr. and Mrs. George Thompson, moved to Diboll many years ago with his family. His father has been employed by Southern Pine Lumber Company most of his life.

COACHED THE RAMBLER
The big thing thus far in Elmer's life is the fact he coached the now famous Rusk Rambler, the fabulous Jim Swink.

In 1951, '52, and '53 Elmer had an unknown athlete — Swink — To all-district honors in basketball and football in 1952 and all state honors in football in 1953.

VERY PROUD
Jim Swink performed only 3 years at Rusk High School. He was ineligible his first year because he had played basketball at Cushing his freshman year.

Coming to Rusk to play basketball in 1950, No One knew that Jim could play football.

That year, however, Elmer Thompson and Diboll's present coach, Johnny Waldie, then assistant coach under Thompson, took Swink in tow — only to discover that this boy had something — something that three years later was to remain unidentified by Southwest Conference players, coaches, and the fans.

NO ONE KNOWS
Even now, in 1956, that — "Something" has been defined by players, coaches, and sports writers as "peripheral vision," "uncanny change of pace," or all of these things combined with the unusual team help and wonderful physical condition.

Certainly it must have been all this and more, for this past football season Jim romped far ahead of the field for national scoring honors. He lacked only about twenty yards of bettering the SWC record of yardage of scrimmage in a single season.

HONOR AFTER HONOR
Though Jim was not named on the all-state basketball team his senior year at Rusk, he was named the most valuable player in the All-Star Game, ahead of

Of course, everyone knows of Jim Swink's feats the past two years at TCU. He has been awarded several honors and was just behind Ohio State's Howard Cassady in voting for the Heisman Trophy.

Jim Swink certainly deserves all the praise that has been heaped upon him. We, as Dibollians, are proud too of the fact that Elmer Thompson and Johnny Waldie played such an important role in starting Jim on his road to football fame.

Neither claim that they were instrumental in getting Jimmy started, although it goes without saying that they did.

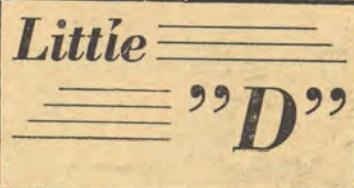
What Elmer and Johnny are most proud of, they say, is that Jim has made good and absorbed his deserved glory in his usual modest manner. They say

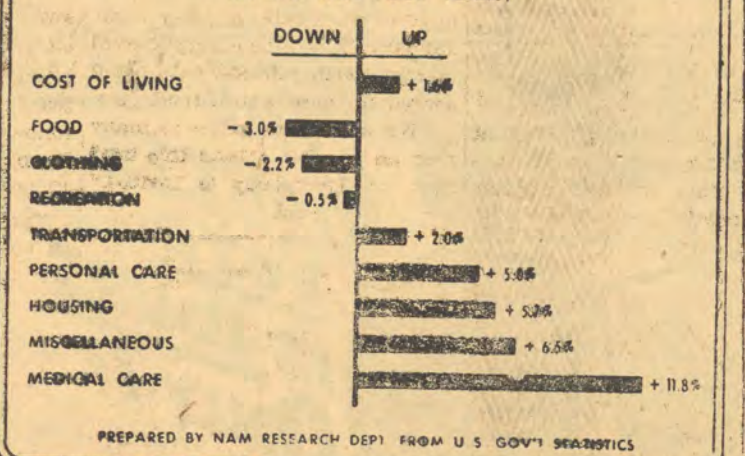

WHAT HAS HAPPENED TO CONSUMER PRICES? (IN THE LAST FOUR YEARS)



There have been many important changes since early 1952 in prices of things consumer buy. The fact that the cost of living has scarcely increased 1 1/2 percent in four years does not mean that nothing has gone up and nothing has gone down. It simply means that ups and downs have about balanced each other.

Take food, for example. Retail food prices have been in a generally declining trend since January 1952. For most families, food is the largest item of expense, and food prices are now averaging 3 percent lower than they were four years ago.

consumer, compared with January, 1952. While food went down, housing went up. Clothing prices in general declined, cost of transportation increased. Medical care now cost more — but recreation activities generally cost a bit less than in 1952.

Thus, what economists call "price stability" is the net result of balancing our many underlying price changes. In our free competitive markets, if all prices were rigid or fixed, we would soon find ourselves in an economic straight jacket. The way things are today, the buying power of the consumer's

Southern Pine Lumber Company has announced the installation of two new sawmill carriages during the recent vacation period.

According to Production Manager Joe C. Denman, the two — Fowler and Stowell carriages were installed during the 10 day vacation period by three crews that worked 'round the clock.'

Crews headed by Ben Donahue, Marshall Glover, and John Booker did the job in the short period. Installation of carriages on the 'short' and 'long' sides in a sawmill usually requires a minimum 30-day period.

BEST AVAILABLE

Mr. Denman said the carriages were the newest and the best available from Fwiler and Stowell. They are constructed of steel, whereas the old carriages were made of wood with iron to support. The old carriages were replaced for several reasons, — said Denman. They were: To reduce lost time and costly repairs, speed up production, and improve the quality of lumber.

NEW FEATURE

The most noticeable feature of the new carriages is a reflection of the block-setter's dial that is so placed that the sawyer can see at all times what the block setter is doing.

This is the first such feature on a Fwiler and Stowell carriage. Should it prove practical at Southern Pine the uplan to make it standard equipment on future models, Denman said.

MUCH FASTER

An air set motor on each of the carriages replaces the old rope-type friction drive of discarded carriages.

New type air dogs on the new equipment facilitate handling of small logs as well as large ones. Old air dogs were rather slow in handling the small logs, Mr. Denman said.

"All of these things give The Southern Pine Lumber Co. two of the fastest carriages one will find in any sawmill," Denman added. They will produce the best in quality lumber, and will increase our production output.

"Most of all, however, we are proud of the outstanding job done by our three crews in doing such a rapid and accurate installation job."

SHED BEING PREPARED

Mr. Denman also reported a new shipping shed is being revamped for use at the south of the plant area.

One of the old storage sheds, the newest of the old buildings, is getting a 'new look' in the form of a concrete floor, new siding, and construction of the loading docks.

Engineer John Booker is in charge of the project, where the three floats can be loaded simultaneously, and other loaded floats can be parked to prevent spillage.

Booker is in charge of another project whereby the Hardwood Yard is being extended an additional 1,270,000 feet. — This will enable a five to six months supply of air dried hardwood lumber to be supplied the hardwood flooring unit, thus stepping up the quality of oak flooring that Southern Pine wishes to produce," Denman elaborated.

HOW TO Keep a Sick Child Happy

A happy, relaxed atmosphere is important for the quick recovery of a sick child. A sick little girl can be amused by dressing her special sick-bed doll in a complete wardrobe prepared in advance by Mother. Make the doll a patient too, with band-aids, arm sling and other sick room equipment.

Pieces of macaroni can be strung into a variety of wonderful necklaces, chains and bracelets. They can be colored with crayons or sewed onto cardboard.

Special sick-bed cars, trucks and fire engines and a large box to "drive" them in will keep a little boy with the sniffles entertained for hours. Provide a quantity of salt to make roads. This picks up easily with a vacuum cleaner.

Don't let glaring lights make the patient uncomfortable during the day or awaken him at night when you look into see that all is well. JOINT ACHES AND PAINS

Dr. Edward Stieglitz, one of the great "old age" specialists of our time, regards tissue changes found in degenerative joint troubles as due to "injuries". They are the result of a lifetime of stress or strain, secondary infection, or just general wear and tear.

Your doctor wants to hold down further harm... so he tells you to avoid strenuous exercise, get plenty of rest, perhaps take a trip to a drier or warmer climate. He may advise more comfortable shoes or arch supports, or recommend a cane to relieve the knees and lower back.

Inactivity leads to overweight—an added burden—so your doctor is likely to put you on a reducing diet as well.

While time and your doctor may gradually check the symptoms of joint aches and pains, you are justified meanwhile in seeking relief from pain.

Doctors are generally agreed that the salicylate compounds are best for this purpose. One of the most widely used is Zarinin, which contains salicylate in two forms: potassium salicylate, which is free of sodium; and salicylamide, which diffuses very quickly through the body, indicating rapid pain relief. Another pain relieving element in the Zarinin formula is acetopheneditin, which helps some people even more than the salicylates.

Safe and rapid, Zarinin is not a cure. Only your doctor can help in that respect.

As of late Monday no rain had fallen in East Texas.

Dust, fog, and forest fires continued to plague East Texas and the communities scattered in that area, while fire department groups and the Texas Forest Service were getting more calls to put out grass and forest fire.

Burned off areas are evident all around Diboll. Many people are burning vacant lots and the fields, trying to get rid of unsightly grass and brush. Some fires have started on these lots unintentionally.

Southern Pine Lumber Company and other large timber owners in the area are keeping day and night surveillance over tree farms and timber plots.

Newspapers, radio, and TV people have increased their warnings to the public to be more cautious with fire.

A Texas newspaper summed it up thus: "It is very advisable for the public to use fires, both inside the home and out, with extreme delicacy."

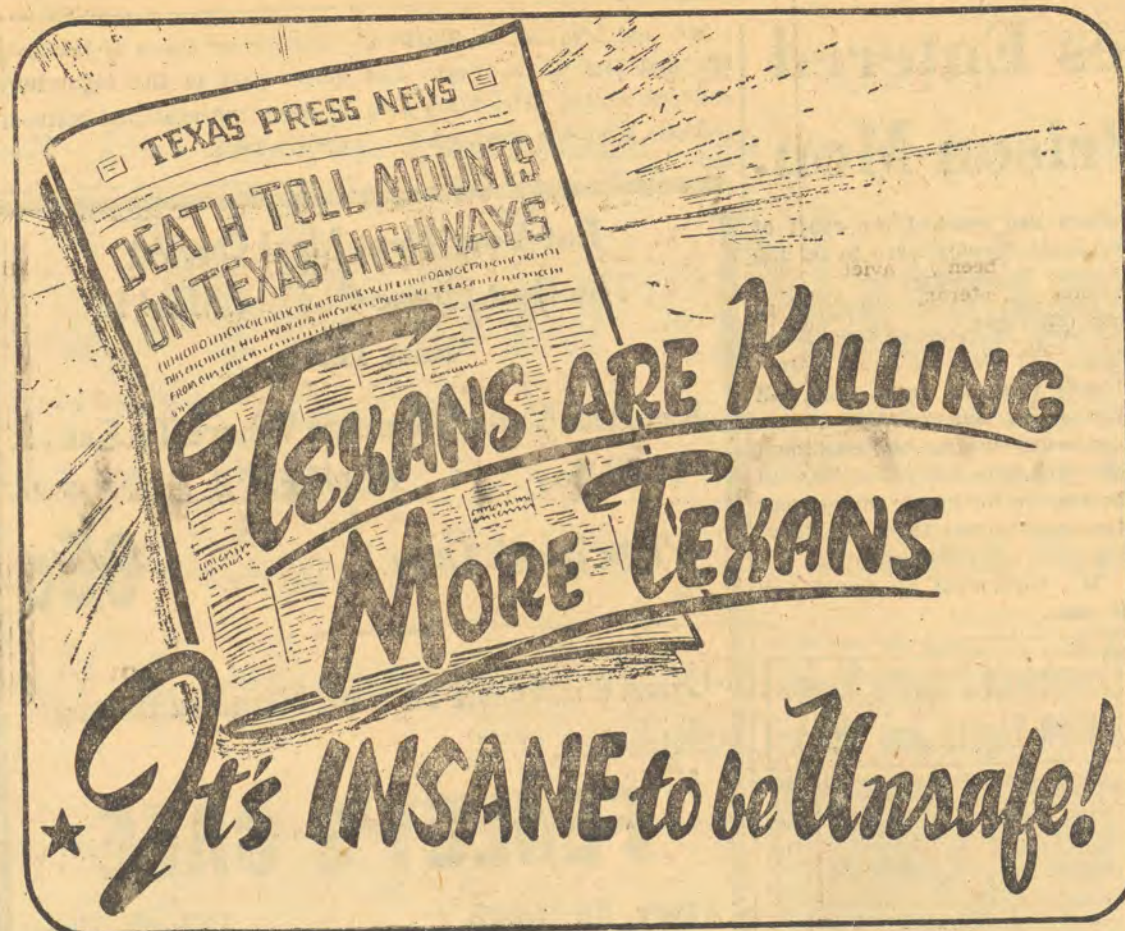

Tips on Touring

Gardenias that glow in the dark have nothing on sweaters that glimmer in a headlight. Garments that light up when a strong light strikes them are among the newest — and most exciting — contributions to pedestrian safety.

Reflectorized garments are made of cloth that looks like any other cloth until headlights shine on it. Then it glows a bright silver that can be seen for several hundred yards.

And here's why that's important. An average motorist driving his car 40 miles an hour cannot stop in less than 164 feet. He'll probably need more. That could mean trouble, especially if he suddenly came upon someone walking at night on an unlighted road.

Reflectorized cloth can multiply the margin of safety tenfold. It picks up the headlight beam and shines so the driver can see it 1600 feet away — plenty of room for safety.

The prime ingredient of the reflectorized cloth is a new type of grey yarn. It works on the same principle as that used in reflective sheeting developed some time ago for marking military supply routes and outlining life-saving gear.

Jackets for boys, girls and adults, as well as snowsuits, rainwear, capes and mittens have been made from the cloth and are now on the market.

Santa Claus has made me a real symbol of safety—he left a reflectorized rain coat.

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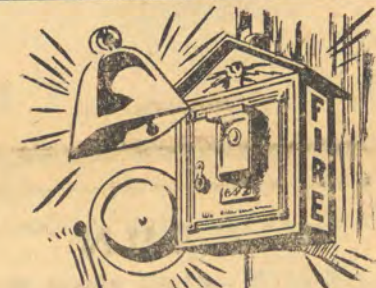
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
