Administration To Let Collective Bargaining Work In Labor Disputes

After enjoying a few days off last week, starting back to work is no easy task. Just a few days away from the 'grindstone' is rough, especially with all the heat.

Washington— Events preceding the steel strike emphasized a major change in national labor policy wrought by the Eisenhower administration — from a pro-union bosses policy to one of neutrality.

In brief, the Eisenhower administration proposed to let collective bargaining work — in contrast with the New Fair Deal policy of coercing business into accepting union demands.

The big question raised in political Washington as the steel strike began was, Will the White House adhere to this policy? Before the strike began—Secretary of Labor James Mitchell announced that the government had no intention of intervening. This, of course did not include normal mediation service activities.

Labor union bosses have repeatedly demanded that the White House intervene in their behalf — in the automobile guaranteed annual wage strike — in the Westinghouse Electric and other disputes.

Labor union leaders are not, however, unanimous. Some have praised the Eisenhower administration for adherence to collective bargaining, as contrasted with government meddling in labor matters. And the record shows the policy has been successful. Despite some indefensible strikes, labor peace has predominated under President Eisenhower.

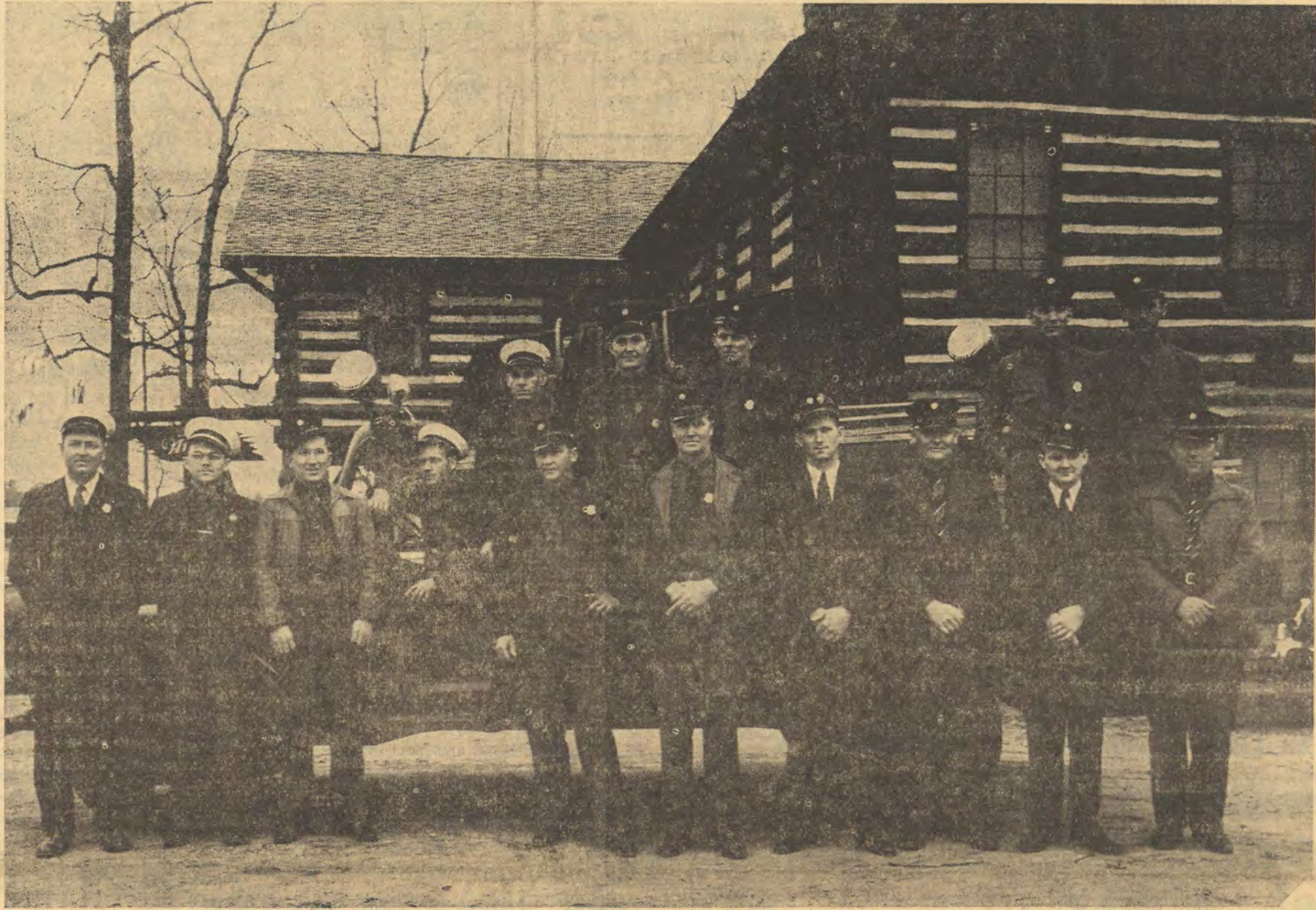
Secretary Mitchell's statement of non-interference in the steel strike was highly encouraging to those who believe that labor controversies should not be carried to Washington for settlement — but should be handled through collective bargaining — and the law of the land. The administration, these persons contend, should not use its vast power and influence to favor either side.

In the Truman administration — also under Roosevelt — union leaders were reluctant to settle major strikes through collective bargaining. They knew if the dispute could be transferred to Washington they would have a powerful ally in the White house — In fact, the man who now heads the steel union, David J. McDonald said just before the steel strike began in 1952 that the union "is particularly fortunate in having a rather friendly gentleman in the White

Southern Pine Interested In Employees Owning Homes

"This friendly gentleman" — President Truman — entered the steel controversy to the wage Stabilization Board — an 18-man tripartite body composed of representatives from industry, labor and the 'public'.

The Korean War was being waged — and the government ostensibly was seeking to avoid further inflation. Nevertheless, the WSB — although charged with the duty of stabilizing wages, recommended the largest increase in pay and other benefits in the history of the steel industry — plus the union shop.

The north bank of Conn Lake which lies on the southwest boundary of Diboll will be granted for inclusion in a park for that neighborhood, it was announced today by Arthur Temple, Jr. The lake shore being granted lies on land owned by Southern Pine Lumber Company and by Arthur Temple Jr., individually. It is being given, according to Temple, as part of a program to beautify and improve the neighborhood in cooperation with the ones living there.

Authorization from the Federal Housing Administration is being sought for a fifty house project for that section of town as part of the same program.

Technical difficulties which will have to be overcome in order to satisfy requirements of the Federal Housing Administration presently stand in the way of commencement of this project. When all requirements can be satisfied for the FHA, work on privately owned houses will commence.

"Southern Pine Lumber Co., as part of its major policy, is interested in seeing the people who work in its plants own their own homes in pleasant happy surroundings. As fast as possible we are getting out of the house renting business.

The Conn Lake neighborhood has the full encouragement of Southern Pine Lumber Company in order to carry out this policy. We are in the lumber business and are not interested in being landlords to any greater extent than is absolutely necessary in order to be assured that the people who work in the Southern Pine plants are adequately housed until they can have their own homes," according to Temple.

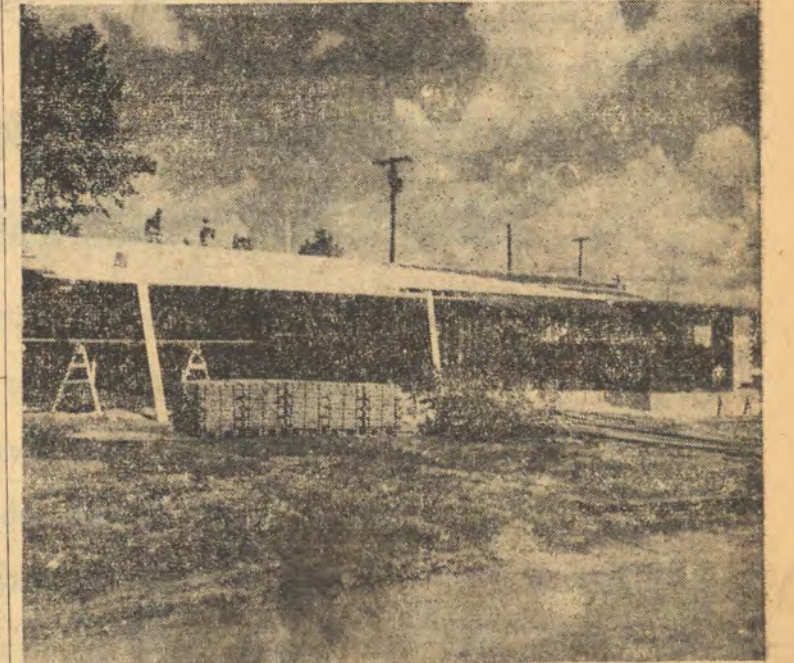

More Agriculture Production Planned

Austin—New legislation to provide greater protection for the Texas farm industry is being planned by Agriculture Com-missioner John C. White.

Commissioner White is con-ducting a series of conferences with farmers and agricultural industry men over the state, in mapping out proposals for sub-mission to the Texas Legislature next year.

"My purpose is to let the farm-ers set up their own future goals and outline their needs," White said. "The Department of Agriculture will inaugurate pro-grams on a self-supporting basis eliminating the need for addi-tional tax money from the state.

A major part of Commission-er White's departmental expen-ses are self-provided by fees for services rendered.

"This is the only practical way to adequately cover the increas-ed demand for new services to agriculture in the state," said White.

The Commissioner, who is now seeking re-election to the top agricultural job in Texas, point-ed out that activities of his de-partment have been expanded 400 per cent since he first took office five years ago. Yet by putting the costs on a self-sup-porting plan the burden of ex-pense is kept from the shoulders of the taxpayers.

"My major concern is to im-prove our farmers' and ranch-mens economic outlook in these critical drouth years," White added. "Our farm industry must have every opportunity to help itself pull out of the current slump."

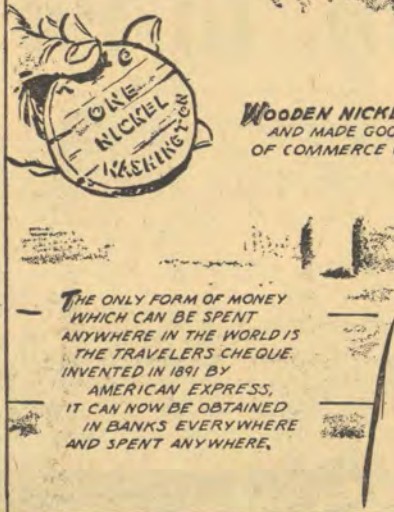

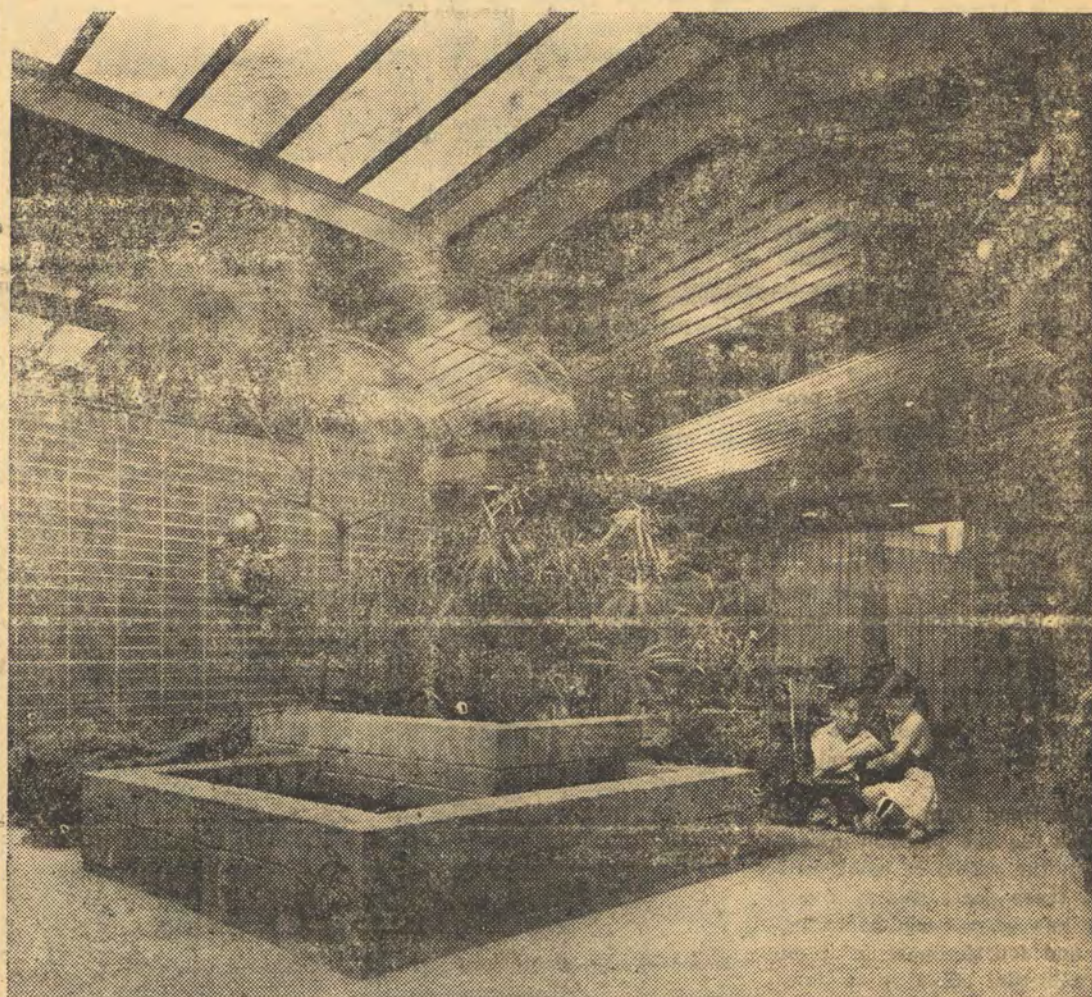

Rudder Lends Prestige To Job As Land Office Commissioner

Austin—Earl Rudder, who has served as Land Commissioner since January 5, 1955, is seeking his first elective term in that office. Rudder's platform stresses two points: (1—Under his administration public confidence in the Veterans' Land Program has been restored;—(2—The General Land Office is now operating under new and unprecedented efficiency.

Rudder took office shortly after veterans' land scandals first rocked the state.

He is a veteran himself—one of the country's greatest heroes of World War II. As a Ranger commander Rudder on D-Day personally led his troops up the 100-foot high cliffs of Normandy to destroy a German coastal battery. He was shot twice, but accomplished his mission.

General Omar N. Bradley, the Commander of U. S. Ground Forces in Europe recently has written in his memoirs that the D-Day assignment he gave Rudder was the most difficult he had ever given any soldier in his entire military career.

Rudder was decorated for bravery in action seven times, by three governments — the United States, France and Belgium.

Rudder, the only veteran in the race for Land Commissioner, has been commended for his work in the Land Office by the American Legion and the VFW.

Rudder's first act on assuming office was a wholesale clean-up of the veterans' land program. Not a single whisper of a scandal in that program has been heard since. With legislative help, the program has been decentralized — a County Committee must now screen the veterans' transactions before they

may be submitted to the Veterans Land Board, which Rudder heads. This control at the county level has greatly speeded up the cleanup, Rudder says.

Rudder also has restored order and efficiency in the Land Office. This office handles about \$84,000,000 of the public's money each year — mostly the funds which support Texas public free schools, and the University of Texas. The money is derived principally from lease of public lands to oil and gas companies. Rudder increased the price which these companies must pay for such leases thus helping the school funds. The permanent free school fund now totals about \$350,000,000 of which about \$48,000,000 — or 15 per cent of the total — has been collected since Rudder took office. Similarly, the University fund has been increased under Rudder's administration to over \$256,000,000. Just recently, over \$16,000,000 was added to this fund in one lease sale alone.

The Land office houses thousands of priceless documents — land surveys, maps, etc. Rudder discovered on taking office that many of them were frayed and worn through neglect. These re-

ords are now being restored and preserved — and Rudder's methods have been praised and approved by a committee of the State Bar of Texas.

When Rudder became Commissioner, Land Office books and accounts were in many cases inconsistent. Rudder immediately requested a thorough audit of the Land Office, by the State Auditor, and further requested a thorough audit of the Land Office by the State Auditor, and further requested a continuing audit be maintained. On the basis of audits already completed, the State has profited substantially in collections on overdue accounts, etc. And Rudder says, as future audits are completed they will serve as guides for further businesslike operation of one of the State's most important agencies.

Rudder was born at Eden, in West Texas. He attended John Tarleton and Texas A and M. He is 46 years old, married and the father of five children.

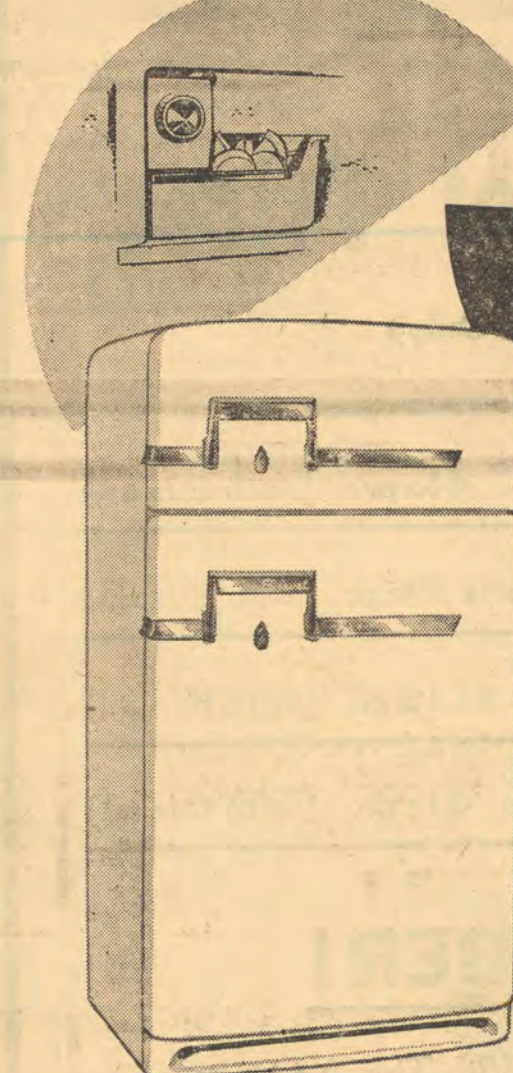

Aikin Pledges Continuance Farm-To-Market Road Program

Continuance of the farm-to-market road program in Texas to keep pace with growing needs is being stressed by State Senator A. M. Aikin, Jr., of Paris in his campaign for Lieutenant Governor.

"It was my privilege several years ago to be a co-author and sponsor of a bill that set aside fifteen million dollars each year to be used exclusively in the construction and maintenance of a farm-to-market program, recalls the veteran of 19 years in the Texas Senate and four years in the House.

"I sincerely feel that this has been one of the finest programs that has been adopted, and I know you will agree that it has done and is doing a lot of good for our people."

The co-author of the Gilmer Aikin laws for public schools also feels that "our counties should receive some help financially from the state on purchase of right-of-way. The Picture Of Health

Can X-Ray "Cure"?

Most people, when they think of x-ray treatment think of cancer. And perhaps this has proven to be the greatest contribution yet in a somewhat longer list of diseases that x-ray may indeed cure, or arrest, or even merely help. For x-ray is undeniably useful in ways that other medical methods, including the much newer "atomic medicines," have only begun to tackle.

The radiologist is the physician specialist who uses both forms of therapeutic aid, that is, both x-ray and other radiant energy including radioactive substances. This physician is usually trained to use x-ray for diagnosis as well as therapy though it is therapy only that concerns us here.

In treating cancer with x-rays, of course, the goal is to "fight fire with fire," to use it to destroy the malignant cells, while carefully protecting the normal working cells. X-rays are also sometimes used in this way against blood tumors and other tumors which are not malignant such as the keloids growing in scar tissue, to remove corns, moles and warts, and help kill fungus infections. Sometimes x-rays are also a weapon against the overactive thyroid gland, known as goiter, or against oversized adenoids and tonsils.

The use of x-rays in properly selected dosages by qualified physicians has been tried with considerable success against varying conditions, including acne, allergies, arthritis, bursitis, overactivity of the sweat glands, shingles, sinus infections, and skin conditions of numerous kinds.

We must always bear in mind, however, that x-ray is a potent weapon and it should be administered by a certified radiologist.

Co-Author Gilmer-Aikin School Laws

★ Over 3,200 Read Local Paper

More than 3,200 people in Diboll and the surrounding area are now reading The Diboll News-Bulletin each week. These figures were compiled last week using actual circulation number as multiplied by the national average of four members in each American family.

This is not an all-time high for the publication. Circulation dropped during the years of 1954-55, but is now steadily climbing and should reach its 1956 peak by October of this year.

News-Bulletin circulation manager Beth Durham said last week that by December 1947, more than 5,000 persons in the Diboll trade area would be reading the community publication each week. If subscription continues at the present rate, Diboll's trade area now encompasses about 1250 homes with approximately 5,000 population.

Diboll itself claims 900 homes with a population of approximately 3800.

The Diboll News Bulletin, still very young in the field of weekly publication was established in September, 1952. Texas' oldest weekly newspaper, The Rusk Cherokeean, was established 108 years ago.
