Court Upholds UNION SHOP

Texas' controversial right-to-work law has lost another round in the courts. But champions of the law say the issue is far from being finally settled.

By a 6 to 3 decision the State Supreme Court upheld a closed shop contract between unions and Santa Fe Railway Co.

Texas law prohibits compulsory union membership, but a 1951 act of Congress authorized closed shops in the railway industry.

Atty. Gen. John Ben Sheppard, who had intervened on behalf of Texas law, predicted a motion for rehearing after the court reconvenes Oct. 3.

The full question of compulsory union membership is yet to be determined," said Sheppard. "Nor do I think the majority decision abrogates our right-to-work law."

Their decision, majority judges noted, paralleled a U. S. Supreme Court ruling in a similar case from Nebraska. Union shop contracts, said the Texas ruling, do not "compel full union membership, but only payment of union dues and assessments."

Dissenting judges spoke out against "Compulsory financial support of a private organization by those who do not subscribe to its program" the chief evil to be forever prohibited.

Record Vote Of Approximately 550 Cast In Precinct 19 Saturday

A near record vote of about 550 were cast in Precinct 19 the last week as voters turned out in numbers even better than in the 1952 election primary.

Votes in this precinct figured prominently in the county returns, especially in the sheriff's race. Precinct 19 voters went along with the rest of Angelina County on most candidates, indicating that few from this area "lost" or "threw away" their votes as the old saying goes.

Fishing Accident May Cost Loss Of One Eye

Mrs. Willis Stringer, who lives two miles north of Diboll on the Highway 49, will long remember a gala fishing trip made by she and her family last Friday.

Her left eye was almost totally ruined on that trip—one that started out gaily and only to have a very painful ending.

Mr. Stringer was casting with rod and reel on the Neches River last Friday. He had already made several casts into the river and was unaware that his wife was coming up behind him.

It was too late. He had begun the swing of the rod. The hook on the end of the swishing line went back, down, and up, hooking Mrs. Stringer's eyelid.

In the next, split second her husband began the final step of the swing, dragging the hook deeper into Mrs. Stringer's left

eye. She was rushed immediately to Dr. Stanley Stevenson at the Village Hospital Clinic in Diboll. Advanced treatment is being administered by Dr. Bernard Hyman of Lufkin.

The full effects of how permanent the injury will be, have not yet been determined. Mrs. Stringer can still perceive light, and is recovering from shock, doctors say.

Mr. Stringer, who drives a gas truck in this area, told The News-Bulletin he hoped mention of the accident in these columns would impress other fishermen to be extremely cautious on their fishing trips.

People are injured by aptomobiles, lawn mowers, and now by fish hooks.

Diboll merchants this week kickoff what they think will be one of the most successful trade at home series ever staged in Diboll.

The series begins in this issue of The News Bulletin with a full page mat that will attempt to show Dibollians that their purchasing dollar buys more than just merchandise when spent in their own community. This mat series will continue in The News Bulletin until local businessmen have explained all they have to say on the subject of trading at home.

The series has been especially prepared by D. E. Scott of Wellington, Texas. He is particularly interested in the situation of Diboll and its trade area since he has studied many other similar cases.

As one of the ads states, this series does not contain the customary trade-at-home lecture. Rather, the ads attempt to explain what is actually true about community people spending their dollars to help another community.

For example: A dollar spent in Diboll may later be contributed to some civic function, to assist the high school band, to sponsor Little League baseball, to aid needy families at Christmas, or to help the small business people so that they may later help the community. This example tells of only several services your dollar buys when spent at home.

The drag on local businesses to support this and that is a constant one. And that drag, even in proportions of five dollars here, one dollar there, runs into quite a lot of money in no time at all.

And, supporting all the above things plus hundreds more is the responsibility of the local merchants and businessmen. But at the same time it is logical to figure that these same businessmen have a right to expect their neighbors to patronize their business establishments.

more—trade in diboll. At the same time local business personalities are of asking people in the Diboll area not to trade in another community as the needed items aren't available here. There are times too when certain items can be bought in other communities a few cents cheaper because of larger wholesaler connections and 'chain' outlets. However, the cost of gaso-

line, the element of time, plus NO return for your spent dollars other than your merchandise, would seem to be enough to keep us all trading with our local firms.

And though we spend thousands of dollars annually in other communities, many of us constantly ask ourselves and our neighbors why our leading businessmen don't do more for the community.

At any rate, nobody is trying to make anyone trade here. Let's all hope that such situations as that are forever gone from our way of life. But what I, and all other businessmen are asking is that you read these special ads each week. They make good reading because they're true. . . . Read them, and if they make sense and shed a little light on this subject for you, our mission will be accomplished.

Our growing pains here in Diboll could well be waning unless all of us get behind the community in every way possible. Although the surging industrial power of Temple daily works wonders towards increasing our place and prestige among the growing towns of Central East Texas, the people of a community must be able to operate as proudly and independently as one unswaying unit.

I happen to think that keeping our hard-earned buying dollars in Diboll where we will receive more than just merchandise in return for them, is the first step in the right direction.

Locator Post Planted For New Plant

Christians Are Devoted To Restoration Of New Testament Christianity

To the average person, confused by denominationalism, the subject how to become a member of the church has upon it the stigma of modern "church-anity." The simple Christianity of the New Testament times has been greatly modified and virtually supplanted by a complex churchianity in the 20th century. It is not uncommon for some person to ask at the conclusion of a service this question: "What must I do to become a member of this church?" He is perplexed when he is told that church has not laid down her own peculiar terms of admission, authorized by some ecclesiastical council and stated formally in

an official creed of the church. He is equally amazed when we urge him to do what Jesus commanded men to do in order to be saved, resting confidently upon his promise to save him and add him to the church.

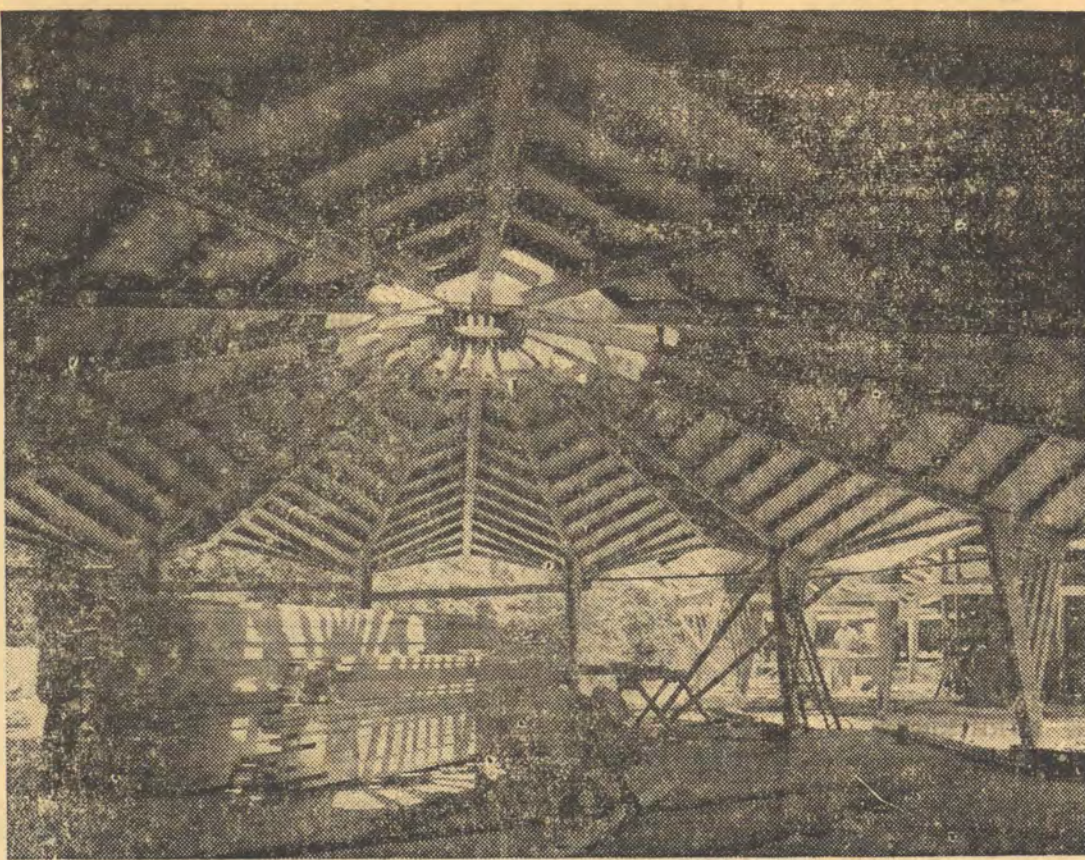
All who confess Christ before men with unfeigned faith are assured that Christ will confess them before the father in heaven (Matthew 10:32). All who, in the obedience of faith, repent of their sins and are baptized for the remission of their sins are added by Christ to the church (Acts 2: 37-47).

The law of admission into the church is no different in our New Testament than are the terms of pardon. They are identical. What one does to please Christ makes him a member of the church of Christ, which is his body. This may be simply illustrated by the case of the Corinthians. In Luke's history we read, "And many of the Corinthians, hearing, believed and were baptized" (Acts 18:8). Later Paul addressed a letter to these same people as follows: "Unto the church of God which is at Corinth, to them that are sanctified in Christ Jesus, called to be saints" (I Corinthians 1:2).

The sinner is not commanded to obey the laws of the church. The church cannot save. Jesus saves, and he adds the saved to his church. The firm foundation of God standeth sure, having this seal, "The Lord knoweth them that are his. And, Let every one that nameth the name of Christ depart from iniquity" (2 Timothy 2:19). The wisdom of the Lord has dictated that saved people be added to a fellowship of saved people. Through this fellowship of singing, praying, mutual confession of faults, instruction and meditation, giving and serving one another, and gathering in the unity of the Spirit to observe the Lord's Supper - through this fellowship the saints retain and protect their integrity as a people sanctified for the Master's use. In this sense only can we speak of the church saving a man.

The vital question is "What must I do to be saved?" (Acts 2:37; 22: 10, 16; 16:30,34). Thus it is plain that one becomes a member of the church when he fulfills the requirements of salvation through primary obedience. It is a matter of pleasing Christ and doing his will rather than pleasing the church and doing the will of the church. This is the essential difference between New Testament Christianity and modern, churchianity.

The question may take another form scripturally: "What must I do to become a citizen of the kingdom?" The kingdom of Christ and the Church of Christ are identical and coextensive.

Make Your Home A Safer Place

Among America's 17,000,000 children under six, according to national statistics, accidents cause more deaths than disease. Four out of five of these accidents occur in the home. And the pity of it is that most of these accidents could be prevented by a little more care and forethought on the part of parents.

One of the major causes of accidents among children is curiosity—the desire to explore abandoned furniture and refrigerators in cellars, garages and local dumps. Cabinet doors swollen with age and dampness often stick and doors on abandoned refrigerators, too heavy to push outward, can suffocate youngsters shut behind them. You can help prevent such accidents by removing the hinges and punching holes in such equipment before you store them or toss them out.

During the past ten years alone, over 110 children are known to have died because of mechanical suffocation. To help solve this problem, General Electric engineers have designed and brought out a new refrigerator with a magnetic safety door that even a very small child can push open from the inside.

Make a resolution to check around your home to eliminate all possible hazards. Keep all poisonous medicines in properly labeled containers—high out of the reach of toddlers' hands. Kerosene, varnishes and such liquids should be properly stored out of harm. When throwing away

broken glass, china and razor blades, wrap them first, then dispose of them where the children can't get at them. When you discard old utensils, see that there are no jagged edges to cut or harm the child who picks them up to use as playthings. Teach your children the proper use of common tools and equipment; point out the dangers of sharp blades and unattended fires.

With such precautions, your home will be not only safer for the children, but easier on your nerves as well.

Members of the church are citizens of the kingdom. In the Colossian letter Paul clearly indicated that members of the church constitute the kingdom: "To the saints and faithful brethren in Christ which are at Colosse" (1:2).

To these brethren he gives this admonition: "Giving thanks unto the Father, which hath made us meet to be partakers of the inheritance of the saints in light; who hath delivered us from the power of darkness and hath translated us into the kingdom of his dear son" (1:13).

This identity between the church and the kingdom is also seen in Ephesians 1:20,23, where the position of Christ as head of the church is described in terms of a king on his throne. Read also Matthew 16: 18-19. The Apostle John also speaks of the church as the kingdom in Revelation 1:4-6 "John to the churches in Asia." In verse 6 he rejoices with them in the fact that Christ "hath made us to be a kingdom". (RV)

These facts are pertinent in considering the problems of how to become a member of the church. Jesus was very emphatic in speaking to Nicodemus about the terms of admission into the kingdom. In John 3:3,5, he urges: "Verily, verily, I say unto thee, Except a man be born again, he cannot see the kingdom of God - - Except a man be born of water and of the spirit, he cannot enter the kingdom of God."

The experience of conversation to Christ is identical with the new birth described by Jesus to Nicodemus. Every case of conversion recorded in the book of conversions, Acts of Apostles, is a spiritual regeneration conforming to the pattern of John 3:5. These converts were added by Christ to the church which is equal to saying that each new born child was inducted by Christ into his kingdom.

The simple spiritual procedure is as follows: (1) In each case the gospel is preached.

This means that the seed of the new birth was sown in their hearts. (1 Peter 1:23-25). The gospel is the seed of the new birth, hence the urgency of preaching the gospel to men who cannot see the kingdom without this new birth (Mark 16:15-16).

"Faith come by hearing and hearing by the word of God" (Romans 10:17).

(2) Thus hearing and believing the gospel, with a disposition to obey Christ, each convert repented of all sin and turned his face toward God through Christ (Acts 2: 38; 3:19; 16:33). One must fall out with Satan an sin if he will fall in with the Savior and salvation (Acts 17: 30).

(3) A brave confession of Christ before the world, before neighbors and friends, before the church of the Lord, is part of the procedure which brings one into the fellowship of the church. This does not need to be a formal confession. Jesus said: Who shall confess before men, him will I confess before the Father who is in heaven" (Matthew 10: 32). Paul said: "With the heart man believeth unto righteousness; and with the mouth confession is made unto salvation" (Romans 10:10).

(4) In no case of conversion was salvation, independent of their obedience in baptism. Jesus had commanded this (Matthew 28:19). This is the water of the new birth, from which one rises to walk a new life (Romans 6: 3-5). See also Acts 2:38; 8:36-38; and 22:16.

One becomes a Christian in order to be a Christian. Other lessons will follow this emphasizing other matters pertaining to your salvation. If you are not a Christian, these are the first principles of the doctrine of Christ (Hebrews 6:1) Obey these in your primary obedience, then leave the first principles and move on unto perfection through the infallible directions which Christ has given unto us.

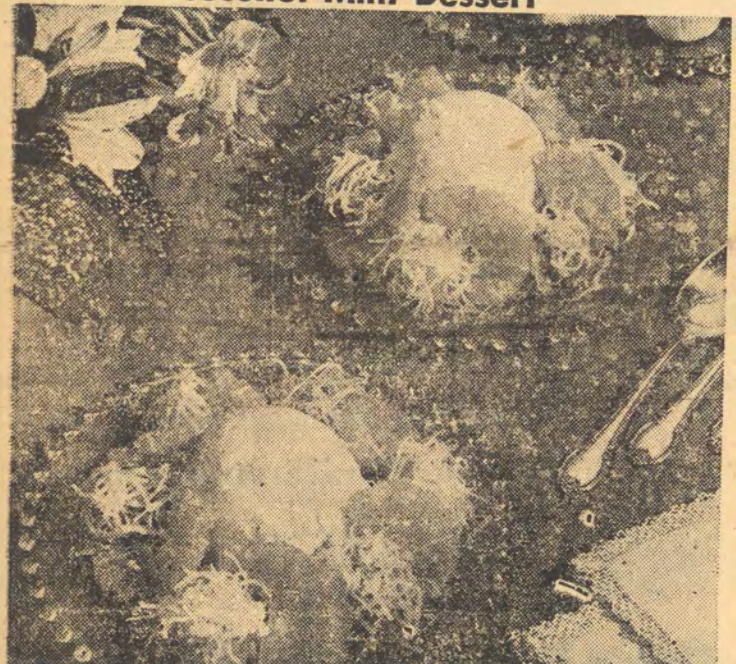

Tips on Touring

Sooner or later most drivers get lost and have to ask directions. Here are some tips on asking questions so as to get the most helpful answers—and on listening so you'll remember them.

When you stop to ask directions, get out of the car and go over to the person you're addressing. After all, he's doing you a favor. Sitting in the car and yelling "Hey, you" is one way of not getting help.

Tell him where you want to go, giving as many details as you know. Mention names of roads, nearby towns, etc.

In listening to directions, concentrate on what the other person is saying—not on the next question you want to ask. Try to get visual symbols: "turn right at the big red barn just past the bridge" is much better than "it's the fifth road after the second red light." Don't accept mileage figures alone: "turn left when you get to the Shell service station—about two miles ahead" is better than "turn left about two miles from here..." Try to get specific road numbers—U.S. 6, U.S. 101, etc. Ask if turn offs are well indicated and, if so, how. Ask names of towns you'll pass through so you'll be sure you're going right.

Repeat the directions to the person; then repeat them to your passengers.

And don't worry. You can always stop and ask again.

Officers Seek Clues Of Missing Kyger

The mysterious disappearance of B. H. Kyger of Houston was still unsolved as The News-Bulletin went to press this week.

Several clues have been checked out in the case according to Constable Dan Fenley. One lead was that Kyger was seen with a group of boys and girls from Diboll over in Trinity County. The lead did not check out, however, and no other Dibollians have been linked with the missing man, Fenley said.

Another lead that Kyger was seen in Trinity County last Friday failed to produce any new evidence. It was thought that authorities were checking commercial transportation lines for a trace of the Houston brokerage operator.

Monday, the story had dropped out of sight in daily newspapers, for five days, indicating that authorities have uncovered no new clues and have been unable to connect anyone with Kyger since his disappearance.

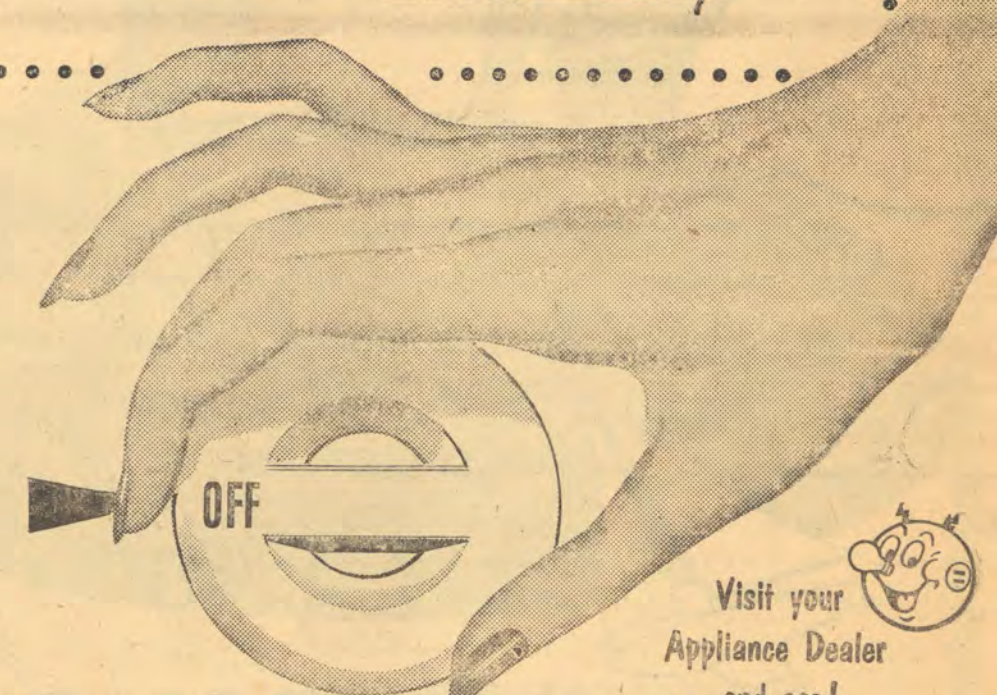

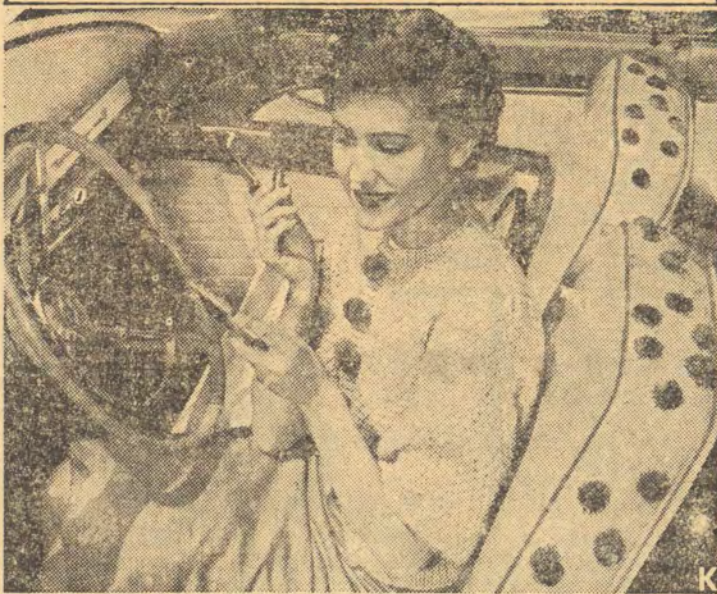

Executive Committee Adopted Resolution Favoring Small Dams

The Executive Committee of the Texas Forestry Association adopted a resolution favoring small dams and opposing large wasteful projects such as the McGee Bend Dam as now proposed on the Angelina River north of Jasper, Texas.

E. E. Wagoner, executive secretary of the Association said, "Since 1914 the Texas Forestry Association has promoted forest preservation, the conservation of water and wise use of forest resources in order that each acre of our timberlands will contribute its full share of income to the economy of East Texas. Clear cutting and flooding 129,000 acres of valuable forest lands plus the acquisition of huge easements on 40,000 additional acres is in opposition to TFA policy, when a lake of approximately 60,000 or 70,000 acres would supply all water needs."

The Texas Forestry Association is interested in water conservation as well as forest conservation. The Association is not opposing the McGee Bend ex-

cept in its proposed size. The committee recognizes the need of water in the Gulf Coast area for irrigation and industrial use, but the Army Corps of Engineers has reported that these needs can be adequately met with a small dam and lake. The small dam would also permit more orderly development of water resources in all the Angelina Watershed above the dam site.

The action of the Executive Committee joined the TFA with the American Forestry Association, the Gulf States Section of the Society of American Foresters, the Angelina County Chamber of Commerce, and other East Texas groups, urging further study of the McGee Bend Dam Project before final action is taken to approve construction of the large dam.

Church of Christ Plan New Parsonage

Workmen began clearing ground at the Diboll Church of Christ last week to make room for construction of a parsonage.

The church, located in the south end of Diboll on highway 59, has not had a parsonage although the present building is several years old.

Bill Thompson, who now lives at Groveton, will occupy the parsonage as the church's present pastor.

More Integration Predicted

More integration in Texas public schools next year is predicted by the Texas Commission on Race Relations.

Austin headquarters of the anti-segregation commission said last week that 300,000 students in 71 districts attended wholly or partially integrated schools last year.

This meant that one in five of the state's 1.2 million students and one in 26 school districts were affected. None of these was located in the eastern quarter of the state nor in the major cities of Houston, Waco, Dallas and Fort Worth.

Ninety Negroes are expected to enroll with some 18,000 white students at the University of Texas this fall. Thirty will be freshmen who passed admis-

sions tests; 19 transfers from other colleges and about 40 returning graduate students.

This will be the first time for Negroes to attend the University undergraduates schools.

Shortage of Teachers And Reasons Why!

Austin, Texas. — Texas' critical teacher shortage and some reasons for it are spotlighted in two reports just released.

With school bells due to ring in a month, an estimated 7,615 teaching positions still are vacant in Texas, according to the Texas State Teachers Association. To fill these jobs only 1,310 teachers are known to be available.

This means six openings for each teacher wanting a job, said TSTA Executive Secretary Charles Tennyson. Almost 4,000 teachers left the profession last year.

Apparently explanation for this wholesale snubbing of class room posts came in statistics reported by Dr. Hob Bray of the University of Texas Teacher Placement.

This year's education graduates will average \$346 per month all year.

Teachers with master's degrees do a little better, averaging \$358 monthly. But a master's degree in engineering or science commands an average salary of \$557.

Almost all University graduates go to schools paying more than state minimum requirements, said Dr. Gray. High school salaries in the state at the West Texas oil town of Snyder. There the beginning minimum is \$4,000 for nine months. \$445 monthly.

Less affluent districts have to scramble. University graduates can be quite choosy since demands for their services are exceptionally high. Ratio of jobs to graduates is 10 to one in all positions, 100 to one in mathematics and science.

sulphate, a State Health Department official reports. At least three children have died and dozens more have been hospitalized from thallium poisoning, said the announcement. Texas will be asked to provide 667 men in September draft call, said State Selective Service Headquarters. Lower Rio Grande Valley farmers have ginned 140,073 bales of cotton so far this year, compared with 138,915 for the same period in 1955, said the State Agricultural Department. Texas has won two more civil suits for recovery of veterans land funds. An Austin district court has just awarded the state judgements totaling \$97,611,000. E. C. Nelson, senior engineer assistant at the State Health Department, resigned last week to enter private business. He is the second engineer to leave the department within the past month.

Road Program Announced

Plans to spend \$229,000,000 on building new roads in 1957 have been outlined by the Texas Highway Department.

In addition, \$35 million will be spent on maintenance. Through the federal aid bill, Uncle Sam will absorb \$117,000,000 of the \$264,000,000 total tab.

Motorists can look forward to smooth sailing on the roads planed under the new federal state building program. Some 3,000 miles of modern expressways without cross traffic or railroad crossings are due in the near future, said State Highway Engineer Dewitt Greer. Many will be divided highways. Two-lane roads will be built so two more lanes can be added.

In anticipation of this flood of highway spending, road contractors are trying to get enough engineers and skilled laborers to do the work. Texas Highway Branch Associated General Contractors, is considering two plans.

One is to grant scholarships at engineering colleges. Another

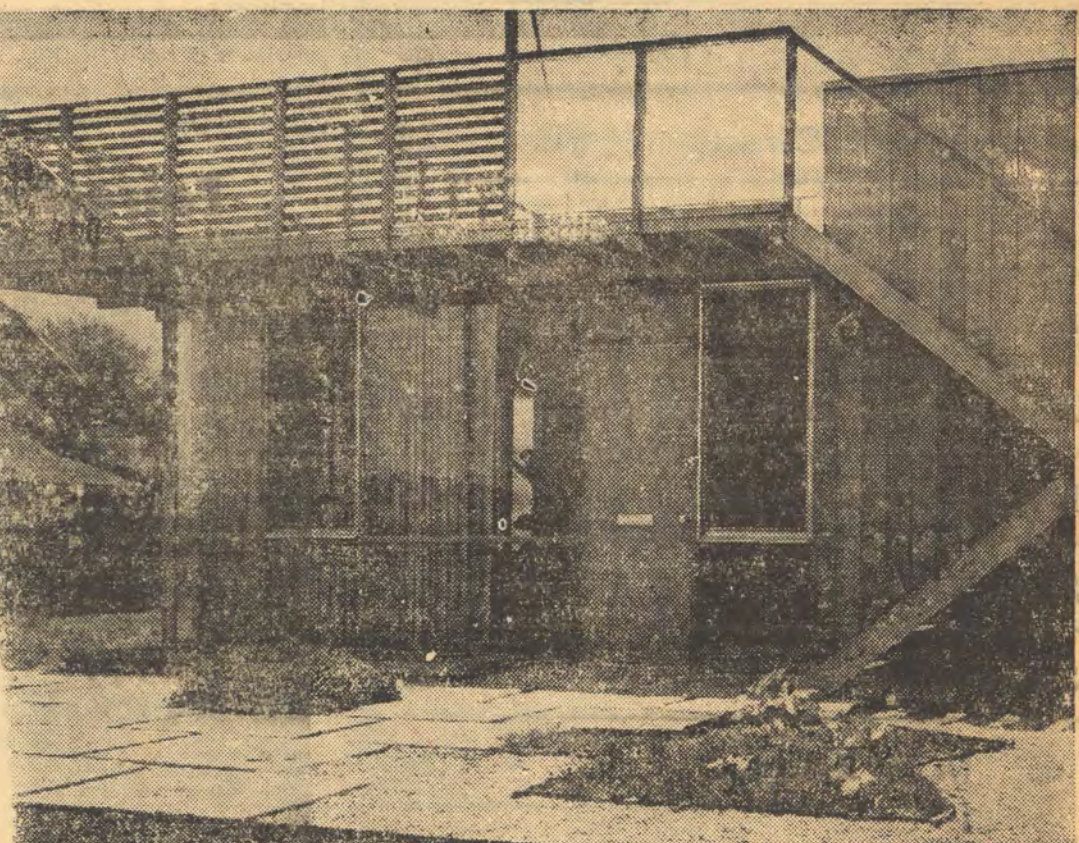

FIRST AID FOR SWALLOWED OBJECTS

Many dogs are natural retrievers, and, being without hands, carry everything in their mouths. Young dogs and eager dogs often accidentally swallow small objects such as stones, balls, jacks, sticks, toys, spark plugs, wire, nails, and bullets, to name a few.

And what do you do when your dog swallows something he shouldn't? If you see him swallow an object, quickly feed him a slice or two of soft bread. Then pour salt on the back of his tongue to induce vomiting. Help the dog rid himself of the object by picking up his hind legs and tilting him head-down.

If you believe your pet has swallowed a foreign object, and you have been unable to recover it, or if the dog swallows sharp objects like nails or pins, have him treated immediately by a veterinarian.

Bones sometimes become wedged in the dog's teeth or throat, and the animal becomes panic-stricken in his efforts to dislodge it. If the bone is accessible and not wedged too tightly, remove it. If not, rush the dog to the veterinarian, who has implements for the purpose.

Don't throw stones or other small objects for your dog to bring back to you, and caution your children about this. Soft rubber balls or other easily broken toys should be eliminated since portions may be swallowed by the dog. Do not feed him chicken bones or other small bones.

Feeding Tip: Except for flat rib bones and large knuckle bones, don't give bones to dogs. The essential calcium needed in their diets can be easily and safely supplied by feeding your pet high-grade, all-purpose dog meal, such as Friskies, which contains bone meal.

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The Picture Of Health

Who Needs X-Ray?

Most people would probably like to observe all the rules to keep the doctor away if they only knew what the rules were. Preventive medicine, this is called, and it is always well worth the cost.

Of course, it is hard to lay down rules for everybody because everyone has his own particular physical and chemical pattern, just as everyone has his own way of living and eating. Your best advisor on how you personally should keep fit is your own doctor. Yet there are certain general suggestions worth listing.

As an aid to medical diagnosis, x-ray has a sizable role to play in preventive medicine. First and probably most important for everyone is the chest x-ray once a year if you're under 45; twice a year if you're over, or if you have smoked heavily. This would safeguard against tuberculosis (which can start almost symptomlessly) and also help against early lung cancer and some forms of heart disease. If you report any symptoms, such as indigestion, diarrhea, or the like, your doctor may send you to the radiologist to have the so-called "G.I. series" of x-rays with barium. G.I. in this case means gastrointestinal.

Any particular complaints of bursitis, arthritis, or injury may also need to be x-rayed. You can never be sure whether you have a broken bone and neither, without x-rays, can your doctor.

Some people learn to put up with pain because they think it normal. You should report to your doctor any pain or anything else not normal, including moles constantly irritated, sores that don't heal, bleeding warts and the like.

The doctor has a battery of aids to help him detect other serious conditions, including the electrocardiogram, the urinalysis, the prostate examination for men and breast examination for women, and the smear test. A physician reporting on one industry says periodic medical checkups have materially reduced bad heart attacks, obesity, the cancer death-rate, and other ills. What works for employees can surely work for a family, including the kids.

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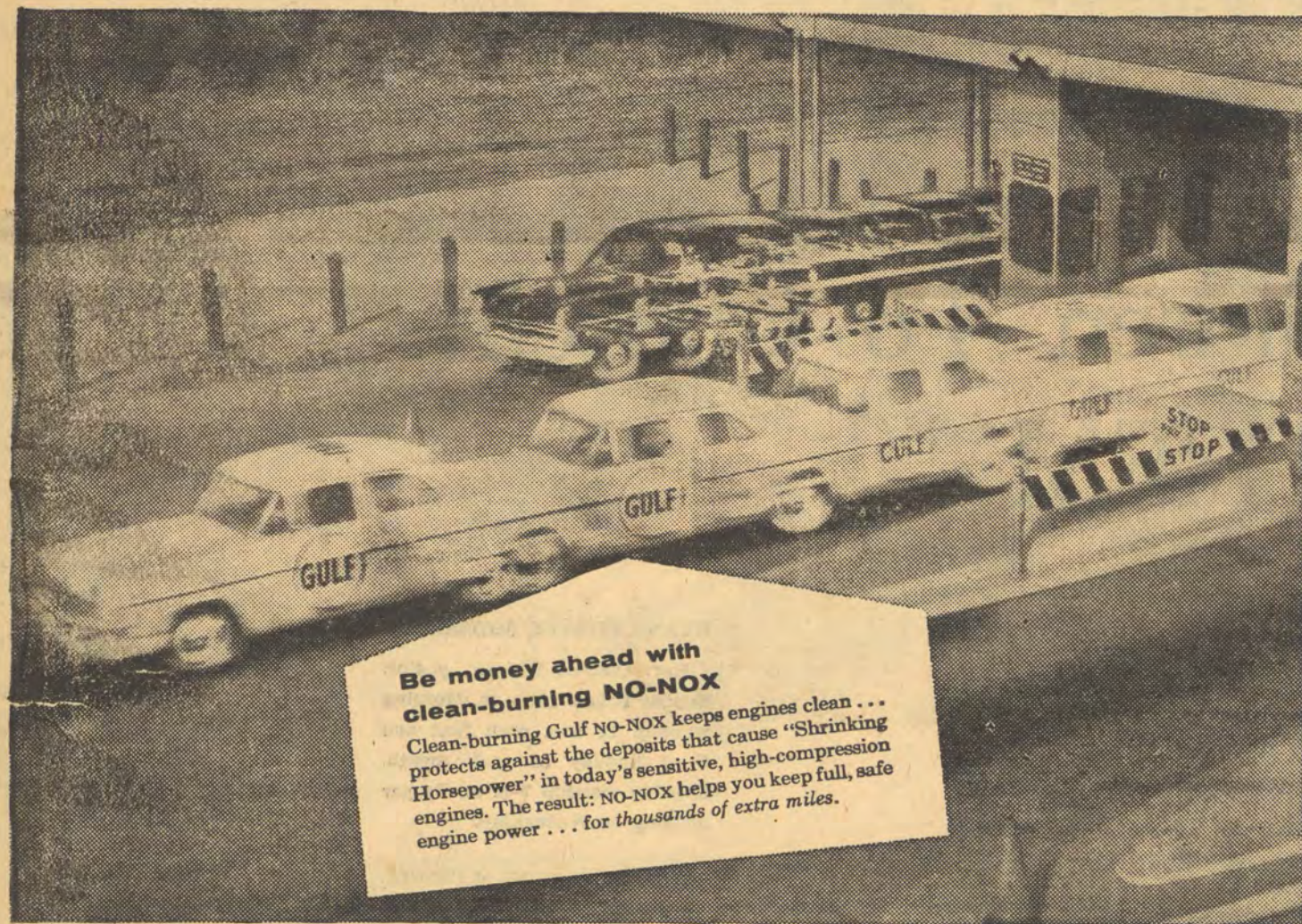

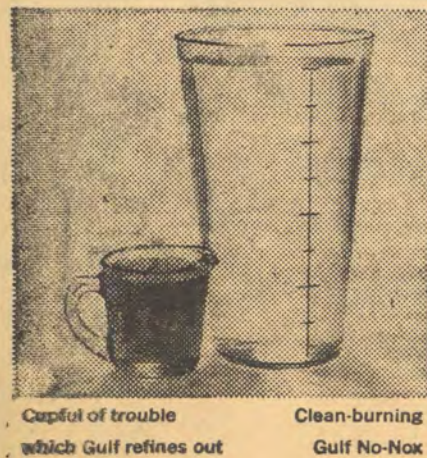
