Diboll merchants are making great strides toward serving the community these days.

First, they began the trade-in-Diboll series in this paper last week. Then the meeting at The Pine Bough Tuesday night showed that Diboll Business men are well on their way toward forming a Chamber of Commerce.

Finally, Horace Stubblefield has released a list of committee members for the forthcoming Diboll Day celebration, which includes a large number of businessmen as workers.

There is no standing still -- you're either going forward or backward. Our merchants seem to be doing all possible to better the community stepping forward more each day.

The population of Diboll is steadily growing, via transfers of Southern Pine people from Pineland, Southern Pine is also bringing in fresh college graduates and trained professionals for the new Temple Fiberboard plant.

Speaking of Southern Pine, that company is putting on a third shift at the mill beginning August 20, if late reports on the subject are true.

To our knowledge this is a new twist for Southern Pine. They have run two ten hour shifts in the mill heretofore, but never a third shift. As we have it, the shifts will run consecutively from 7 till 3, 3 till 11, and 11 to 7.

The demand for good southern yellow pine lumber still outweighs our methods of production. As long as this is true none of us need worry about the future of the lumber industry.

Diboll's happy-go-lucky jet pilot Alvin Morgan is scheduled for discharge from the Air Corps the latter part of August. We haven't talked with his parents lately, but several months ago Alvin told us he planned to continue his career in forestry, following his release.

Alvin says he can do his surveying from an airplane, which leads us to believe he has grown quite fond of flying in the past couple of years.

Our friend Lamar Lewis of the Galena Park Reporter was a guest newsmen on a KGUL-TV panel show down at Galveston the other night.

Although he completed his schooling only recently, Lamar is an ex-Marine married with a family and an experienced writer.

He is doing very well in his new capacity as editor-owner of the Reporter which last week cracked a record for advertising inches in a single issue.

A. L. Carter, Pioneer Dies July 24th

(Note: This was written the day of Mr. Carter's death by TLMA secretary Al Cudlipp. We think it is worthy of reprinting now.)

Aubrey L. Carter, pioneer lumberman and managing partner of W. T. Carter and Brother in Camden, died in Herman Hospital in Houston this morning at 6 o'clock after a long illness.

Mr. Carter has been active in the lumber industry for more than a half a century—is a director of Southern Pine Association and other associations, as well as banks and retail yards in Texas.

It has been my privilege to have been intimately associated with many of the great men of the lumber industry, particularly in Texas, and I have never known a finer, or more capable lumberman than Aubrey Carter. He was sound, substantial and a great friend once you knew him.

To the Hall of Fame in The Great Texas Lumber Circles — John Henry Kirby; Frank Bonner, Bob Wier; "Chief" Myers; S. W. Henderson, Sr.; Watson Walker; Henry Temple; Paul Sanderford, and many more — the name of Aubrey L. Carter takes its rightful and well earned place.

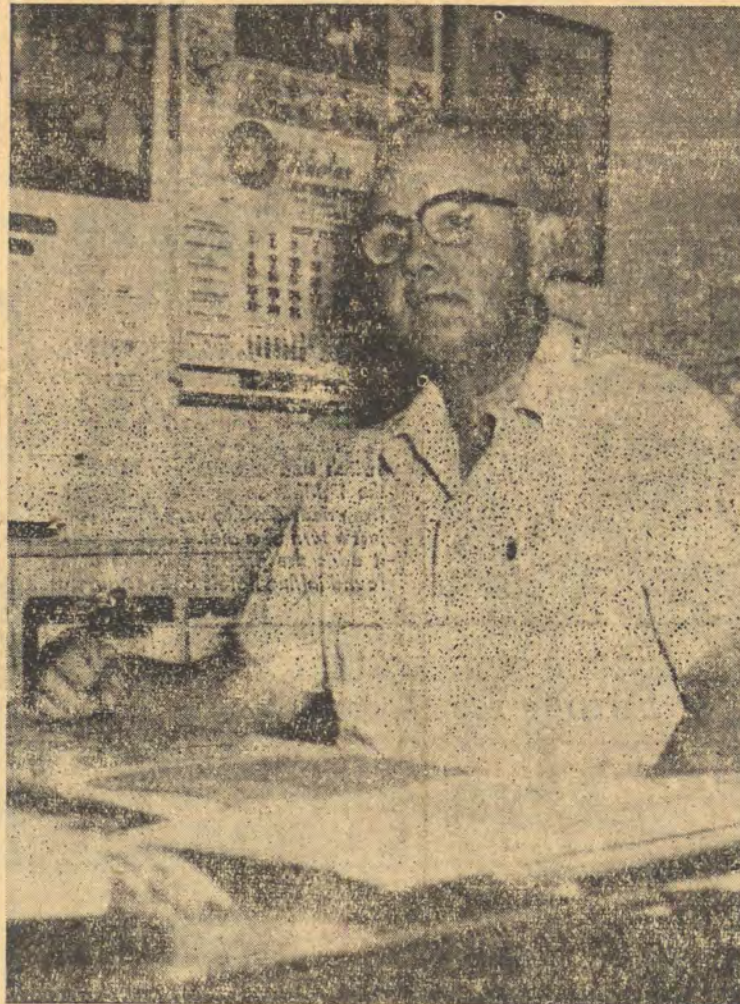
"It's just practical selfishness to buy where you live, because trade makes a richer community, and makes your own business, or your own job better and your own property worth more," they point out.

ATTEND CHURCH SUNDAY

For the first time in sixty-one years, Southern Pine Lumber Co. here will add a third production shift to its working schedule. Starting date for the extra shift has been tentatively set for August 20, according to Personnel Director Vernon H. Burkhalter.

Southern Pine president Arthur Temple Jr. said Monday that third shifts have been used by other lumber mills. He added that the "graveyard" shift scheduled for inauguration here August 20, is a first for Southern Pine in its sixty-one years of continuous operation.

Mr. Burkhalter told the News-Bulletin that the majority of job openings for the shift had been tentatively filled, and that he anticipated no problems in the filling of remaining job vacancies by the August 20 date.

NO HOUSING SHORTAGE

In commenting on the availability of housing facilities for workers on the new shift, Mr. Burkhalter said: "We do not anticipate any housing problems, since Diboll is now a city in its own right and has privately owned real estate for rent and for sale."

"Too, Diboll is in easy commuting range of Lufkin, Corrigan, and other nearby residential communities. Those of us who have served in the Armed Services have knowledge of the workers who commute for distances up to 20 and 30 miles every day, and in heavy traffic at that. We feel that our commuters will not have such traffic worries, and one of our many attractions is a wide choice of nearby residential communities. "We anticipate that the vast majority of our employees will own their own homes in Diboll, in the near future, especially as this has been the popular trend during the past eight years," Burkhalter concluded.

BULLETIN

Dr. Standley Stevenson, local physician, said Tuesday that Diboll might have its first polo case unless initial tests taken at the Village Hospital Monday do prove wrong.

Local Man Killed In Traffic Accident

Arriol L. Wilburn, 25, of Diboll was killed instantly Friday night at 10:10 p.m. when the car in which he was riding was in a head-on crash with another car. The accident occurred about 200 yards south of the Garden of Memories cemetery.

Also killed instantly was Bobby Lynn Crigger, 18, 2713 Taft Street, Houston. Critically injured was the stepfather of the dead Crigger, Wilson Odell Sullivan. He drove a 1952 Ford that rammed a 1953 Pontiac driven by Crockett A. Luce of Lufkin. Mr. Luce works in Diboll and lived here until a few weeks ago. He suffered bruises and lacerations but was reported in satisfactory condition Sunday.

Both of the dead men were killed instantly. Each were thrown to the pavement only a few feet from the cars in which they were riding.

The 1952 Ford, driven by Mr. Sullivan and occupied by Mr. Crigger was headed north toward Lufkin. The 1953 Pontiac, driven by Crockett Luce, and occupied by Wilburn, was going south toward Diboll. Front ends of both the Ford and Pontiac were crumpled.

NO COMMENT

Washington — The record of the 84th Congress with respect to business can be described as neither good nor bad — the truth lies in between.

Business can rightfully voice disappointment over the failure of Congress to cut expenditures and reduce wartime taxes which burden industry. Both were possible.

But conservatives in Congress find satisfaction in the failure of many radical measures extending the "Welfare State" concept. They also point to some affirmative endorsements of private enterprise.

The congressional record includes:

FISCAL AFFAIRS — Congress held appropriations within the presidential budget. This budget indicated a \$400 million surplus next June 30. Thus, the growth of business boosting revenues and a vigorous economy movement could make future tax cuts feasible.

However, spending may reach a new high as a result of congressional commitments. Instead of cutting taxes, the recently adjourned Congress continued discriminatory personal and corporate tax rates, and added new highway and social security levies.

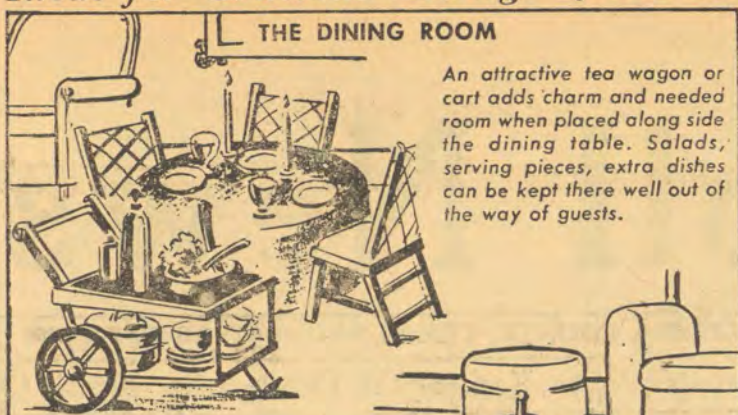
BUSINESS AFFAIRS — Two important measures which would have done great harm to industry were defeated in the last few hours of the session by some conservatives.

The first bill required prior notice of mergers under conditions which would have subjected business decisions to a few bureaucrats. The second would have substantially destroyed the good faith defense in price discrimination cases.

STATES RIGHTS — A major failure of Congress was not carrying forward the original Eisenhower program of reducing the huge central government and transferring more responsibility to states, local government and citizens. Proposals to this end were largely ignored.

The Smith - McClellan bill, which prohibited courts from

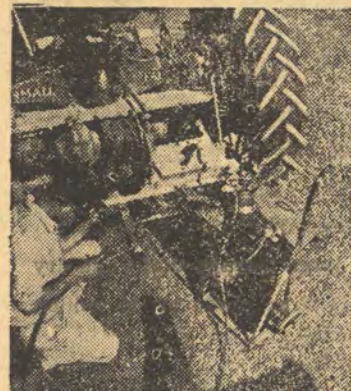

More Than 200 Apply For SS Benefit

More than 200 self-employed farmers who have reached age 65 have in the past 6 months filed their claims for social security benefits in the 12 East Texas counties served by the Lufkin Social Security office, according to L. R. James, District Manager.

These persons, James said, filed their 1955 tax returns, paid the self-employment tax thereon, and have already grossed \$800 in creditable farm income in 1956. By a special provision in the law, farmers past 65 who meet the two conditions just outlined may file their claims now, without having to wait until the end of 1956, their second year of coverage under social security.

Payments will be made this year to those who do not expect their net earnings for the year to exceed \$1,200, but cannot make a reasonable estimate of the expected net for 1956, his claim is still approved, but no checks are released until the end of the year when exact figures become available, or at an earlier time if he can make a fairly accurate estimate.

As there may be advantages to having a claim filed at this time, James urged all self-employed farmers who are over 65, who file their 1955 tax returns, and who are still operating their farms, to get in touch with the Lufkin social security office in the very near future. A copy of the 1955 tax return and cancelled check or money order stub showing payment should be presented when the claim is filed.

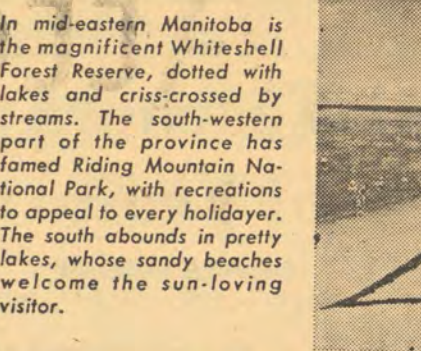

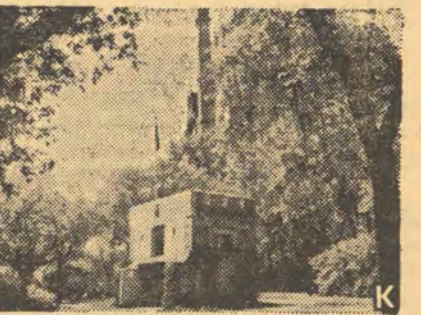
fun 'n frolic in Manitoba

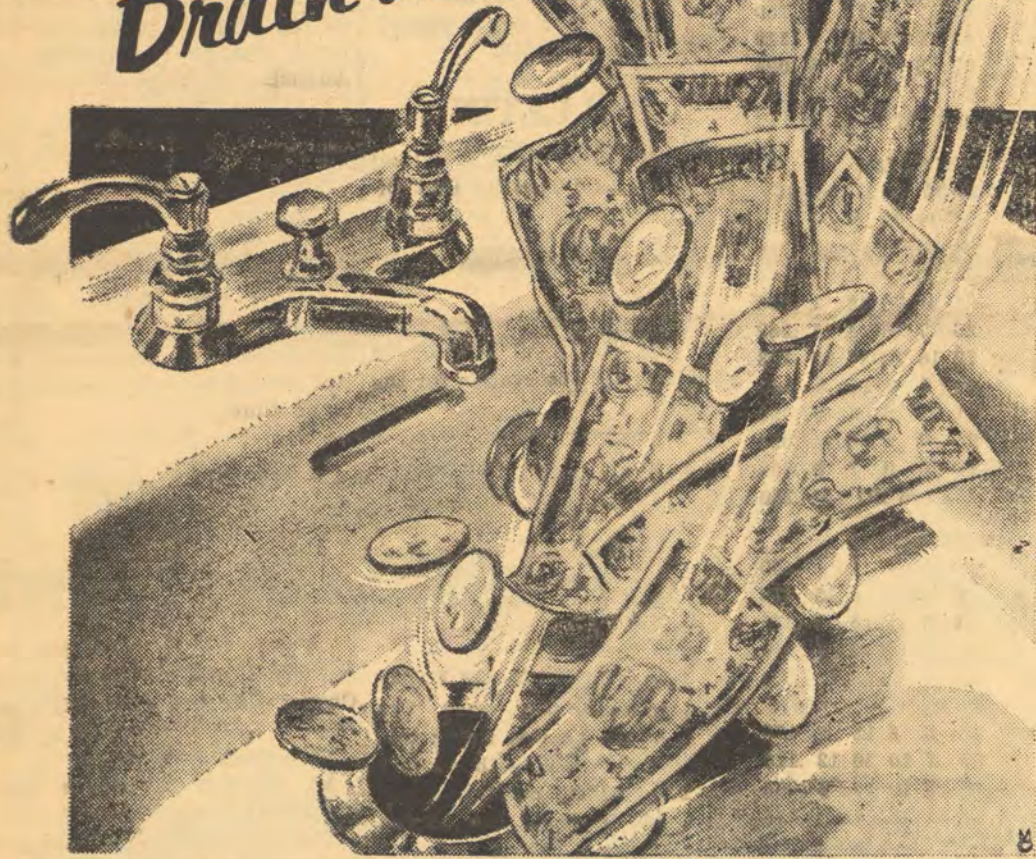

voiding states laws because Congress had legislated in the same field—unless Congress so stated—was killed. This was a blow to believers in state rights.

Laws dealing with state control of subversives, violence in labor disputes and similar matters have been nullified or placed in jeopardy by court decisions—but Congress failed to meet the issues.

PRIVATE ENTERPRISE — The session revealed that Congress is closely divided on many issues involving private enterprise vs. government ownership and operation.

Some examples: The Senate approved a \$400,000,000 government atomic energy program, but the House rejected it as an invasion of the field of private enterprises.

The Senate passed a bill authorizing the State of New York to develop expanded Niagara River power. The House failed to act, thus standing by private enterprise which offered to do the job.

In a third matter the Senate stood for private enterprise. It killed a bill to have the federal government spend hundreds of millions building Hell's Canyon Dam—when private capital already is doing the work.

Opponents of government—type business operations won another fight. A proposed "rider" on an appropriation bill—which

would have made discontinuance of business type operations of the Defense Department subject to congressional committee veto—was rejected. The Defense Department now is free to continue to turn many tasks over to private industry.

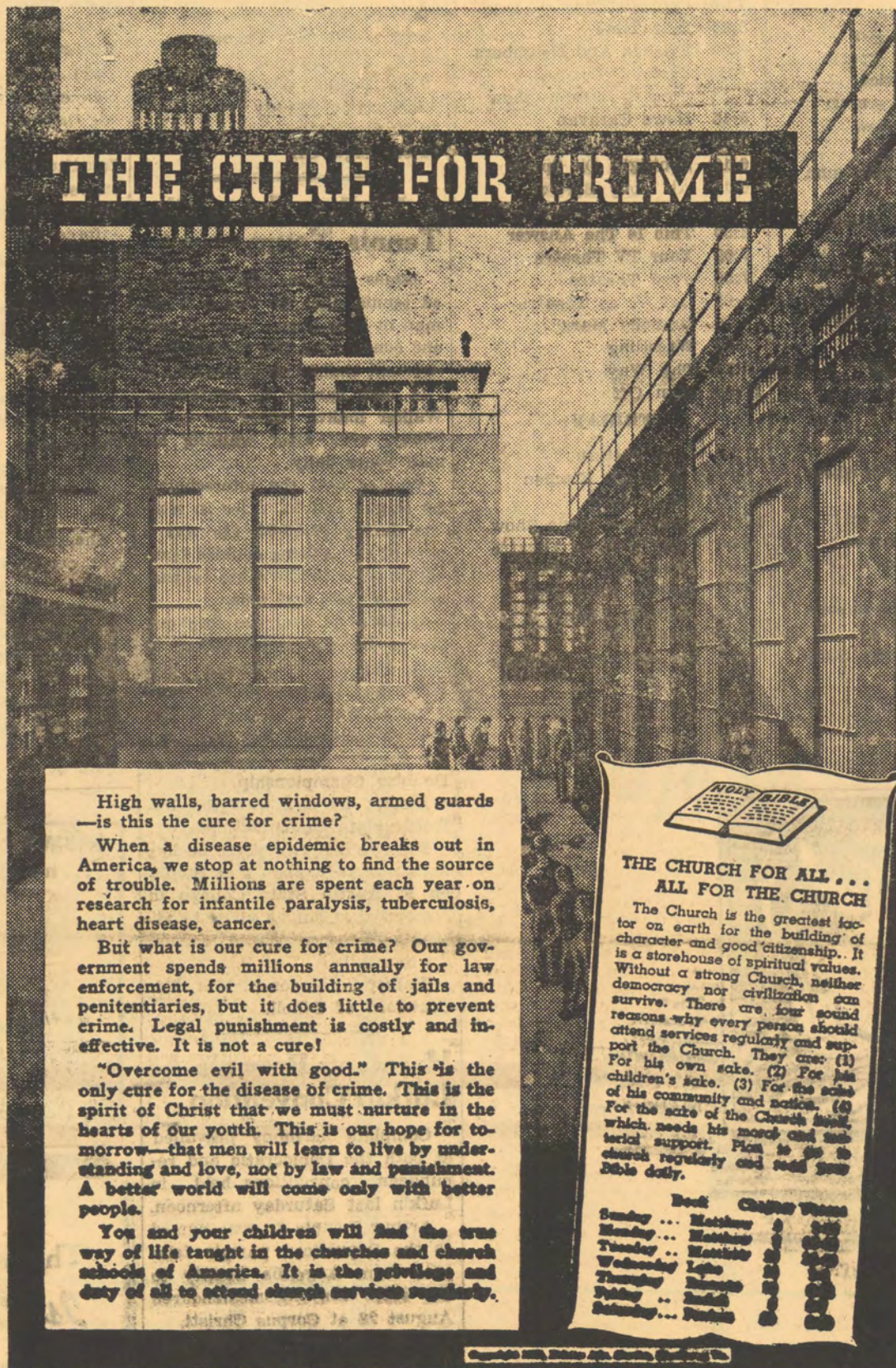

John Ben Shepherd Releases Resolutions

Austin — Attorney General John Ben Shepherd today released the contents of three interposition Resolutions with the request that they be acted on favorably at the Democratic County Conventions Saturday, August 4. A fourth resolution dealt with segregation and intermarriage.

Included in the three interposition Resolutions are (1) Proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the United States and appealing to other States to join in a request to Congress to call a Convention for the purpose of proposing an amendment to restore the power of the States to conserve and regulate the exploration, production and distribution of their petroleum products, water, sulphur and all other minerals and natural resources. (2) A recommendation that the next session of the Texas Legislature pass a resolution proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the United States returning to the respective States the power to make and enforce laws to prohibit and punish acts of sedition and subversion.

Shepherd pointed out that the Supreme Court had taken away powers of various States to conserve and control their Natural Resources and to prohibit and punish sedition and subversion. The country today, said Shepherd, is without effective control over Communism or any other form of subversive activity.

Shepherd further proposed that county conventions call on the next session of the Texas Legislature to join other states in proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the United States limiting the maximum rate of federal taxes on income, estate and gifts to 25 per cent except in time of war. (Texas would be the 31st State to propose such a change.)

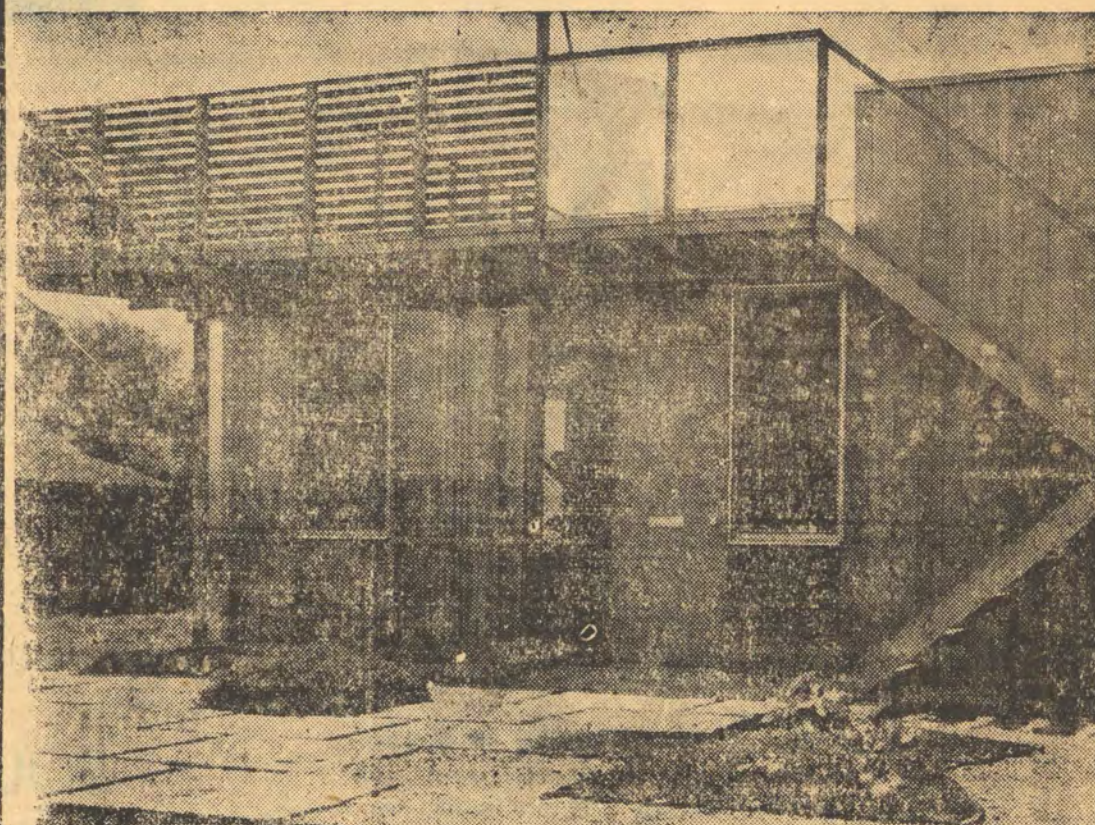

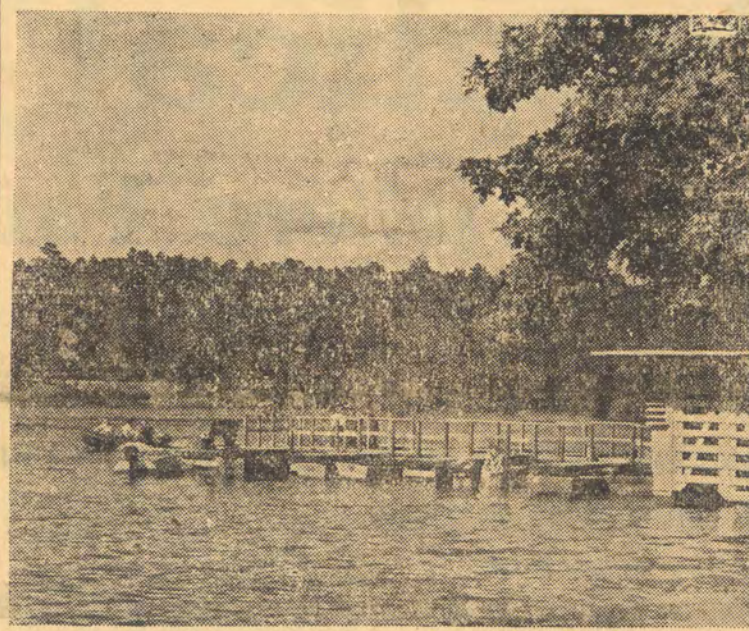

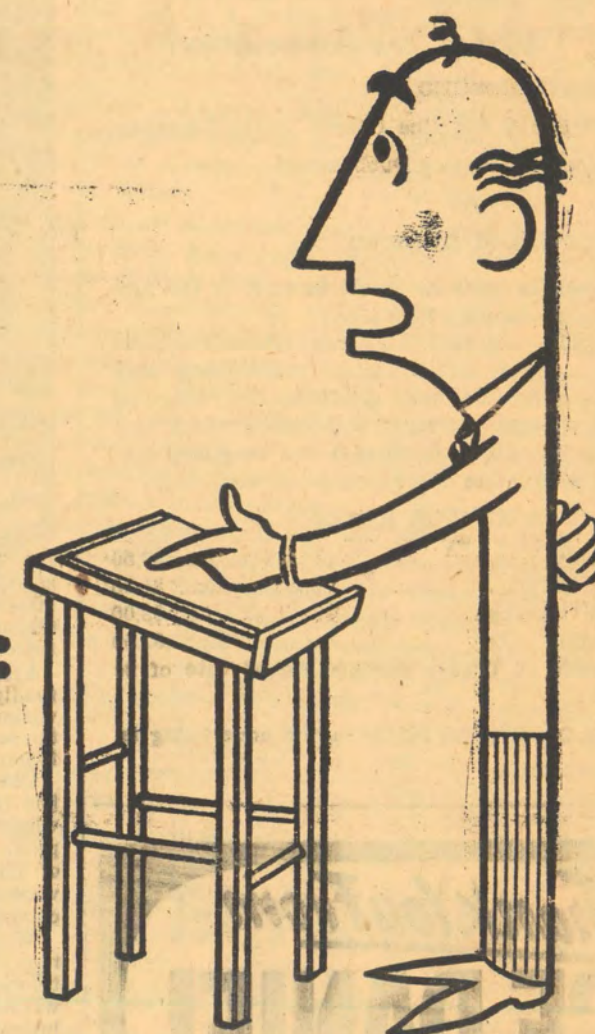

Christians Are Devoted To Restoration Of New Testament Christianity

THE CHURCH OF CHRIST SPEAKS

A PLEA FOR UNITY IN ONE CHURCH

Some months ago The Saturday Evening Post carried an article by E. Stanley Jones on unity among the Protestant denominations. The article is a reflection of that growing sentiment among people who believe

in Jesus Christ that such believers should be united. It not only states that the need for religious unity but also it outlines a plan by which the author believes this desired unity could be achieved. This plan calls for the organic union of all denominations in one federated Church of Christ, the various denominations to be branches of this one church, maintaining different practices and differences in belief, but acknowledging the supremacy of their membership in this one church. This federated Church of Christ would be controlled by a group composed of individuals who serve as representatives of the separate denominations.

The widespread comment the article received is a proof that more and more people are coming to a clearly stated Bible truth, the truth that Christ established only one church and that all Christians are in that one church and that all Christians are in that one church (Matthew 16:18; Ephesians 4:14; Colossians 1:18). The conception that Christianity should be divided into separate denominations, as was held for so long by many people is being rapidly discarded by people of all religious faiths.

The prime question remains, however, "How can a genuine unity be achieved?" As the conception of one church is presented in the Bible, the Bible

should be investigated to see what it says about Christian unity. Only in the light of its contents is man justified in making plans for religious unity.

The Bible has a great deal to say about unity but for the most part its teachings on this subject can be divided into two headings, (1) the basis on which all Christians are united and (2) the disturbance of this unity once it is established. Only the first of these headings need be considered at this time.

Christians are united by virtue of the fact that they are Christians, not because as Christians they accept some plan which will unite them. When a person becomes a Christian he has a new relationship to God. He has entered into a covenant with God, this covenant being established by Jesus Christ. But he is not alone in entering into this covenant; others enter into it also. As by obedience of the laws of this covenant a person enters into a new relationship with God, so when two or more accept it they find themselves in a new relationship with one another. God is now their Father and they are brethren. The fact that not one but many people are under this covenant relationship with God is thus the basis for the church. There is one church in actuality for the reason there is but one God and he has established but one covenant by which man can enter into a saved relationship with him. When a person accepts the terms of this covenant he is united with all other Christians and the group into which he has entered is one—the church which Christ established.

At this point, there is a major difference between the Bible and the teachings of men on this matter of how unity can be achieved. Man conceives as the basis of unity a plan found outside of the Bible. The Bible basis for unity is the truth of the Christian religion; nothing more. When two people accept the Christian religion as the Bible presents it, they differ on what Christianity is, no plan can really bring them together. Unity is a by-product of the acceptance of the

Festival At Baalbeck



Against a magnificent natural background of towering Roman ruins, some of the world's leading musicians are presenting a series of concerts which mark the opening of the month-long International Festival of Baalbeck, held in Lebanon's historic "City of the Sun."

American artists are sharing the concert platform with the Hamburg Symphony Orchestra, which is featuring the best known works of Mozart in commemoration of the 200th anniversary of the great musician. Guest conductor for two of the orchestra's performances is Leon Barzin, from the United States. Another American, pianist Aldo Mancinelli, is performing a special composition entitled "Concerto No. 2" by Anis Fuleihan, former instructor of music at the University of Indiana and present director of the National Conservatory of Music in Beirut.

In addition to the musical concerts, which will continue through August 5, the Baalbeck Festival will include four plays presented by the Comedie Francaise during the week of August 11: Racine's "Mithridates" and "Phedre," Shakespeare's "Julius Caesar" and Jean Cocteau's "Infernal Machine." Starting on August 25, the festival will play host to England's Regent Park Players, who will present Shakespeare's "Hamlet" and "Twelfth Night." During all these performances Baalbeck's historic ruins, including the 2,000-year-old temples of Jupiter and Bacchus, are flooded by a huge new electric plant which was installed after the tremendous popular success of last year's initial festival in the ancient town. This year's festival, sponsored by Lebanese President Camille Chamoun and Madame Chamoun, is part of a national program to develop greater appreciation of the Arts in Lebanon and to provide cultural events of universal appeal for the thousands of tourists who flock each year to the ancient land of the Phoenicians.

President Kuwatly—Syria's "Grand Old Man"



Although he is only 64 years old, Syria's President Shukry Kuwatly, is the "grand old man" of his nation's politics. Now serving as Syria's chief executive for the third time in his long career in government, the President has been fighting for the independence of his

country since the days when he joined the Arab underground movement against Turkish rule in 1913. In fact, he once opposed foreign domination so successfully that the French government sentenced him to death—but fortunately he escaped in time to Palestine and Europe.

President Kuwatly's first term in office began in 1943, after he had served in his country's Finance and Defense Ministries. Five years later, in 1948, he was re-elected as President, but in the following year a military junta seized power in Syria and the President fled to Alexandria, Egypt, where he remained in exile for six years.

Now, with a solid coalition backing him in the Syrian Parliament, President Kuwatly has four years in which to firmly set his nation on the road of progress and stability. Syria now is undertaking an ambitious program of economic development, and its popular President, who was elected on August 18, 1955 by a two-third majority of Parliament, is sure to have a good chance of achieving this ambition.

WHEN DISTEMPER STRIKES

Of the many diseases which threaten dogs, distemper was the one most feared by pet owners until a few years ago. Inoculations and new drugs have lessened the danger of the disease a great deal. However, it still does attack, and it strikes puppies more frequently than older dogs.

The first rule, if distemper is suspected, is to place the dog in the care of a veterinarian at once. In the early stages of

the disease he will administer distemper serums which may save the pet's life. Other effective drugs used are penicillin and antibiotics.

Dogs may exhibit several or all of the symptoms of distemper: loss of appetite, vomiting, diarrhea, temperature over 103 degrees, convulsions, shivering, coughing, running eyes and nose. In distemper the dog's normal temperature of 101 rises sharply and falls.

Although the dog is best treated in an animal hospital, there are cases in which the vet may recommend home care. Follow his instructions for medications. The patient should be kept warm and out of drafts. Use an ointment recommended by the vet or a boric acid solution to keep the eyes clear. The nose should be cleaned and you may be advised to use nose drops.

If the animal has trouble breathing, try placing a vapor lamp in the room or rubbing his chest with camphorated oil or substances containing eucalyptus oil or menthol. See that he has nourishing food to build up his strength. Scraped beef is excellent. Other foods that may appeal to him are eggs, milk, cooked rabbit meat, chicken and fish. Vitamins and cod-liver oil should also be given.

Feeding Tips: Dogs recovering from injuries or diseases that cause fevers need twice as much protein as when they are well.

State Recovers over 1/2 of Land Grant Loss

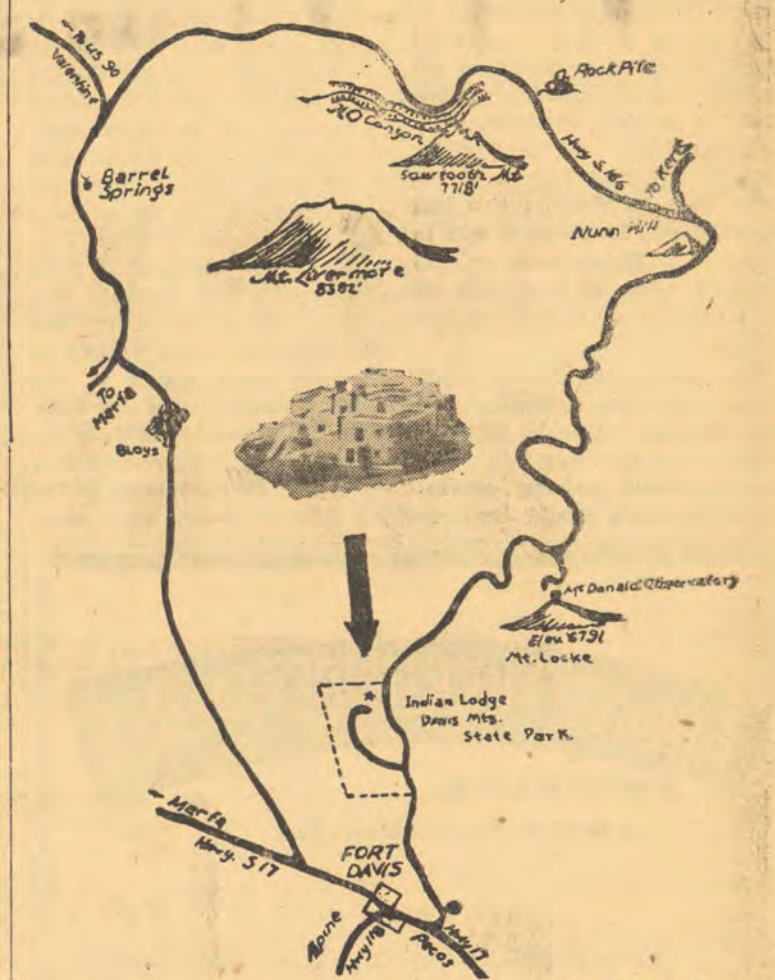
Austin — The State of Texas has won judgments amounting to \$1,770,000 which represents over one-half of the amount involved in cases in the Veteran's Land clean-up and recovery program, it was announced this week by Attorney General John Ben Shepperd.

The latest judgments won by

the State were against J. Paul Little, Crystal City for \$69,054.94 and against Carol Springs, Carizo Springs for \$112,700.00.

Shepperd pointed out that the State had tried 22 out of 35 cases filed, winning all of them. He also pointed out that with the value of the land in the recovery suits plus the interest due, the State will realize a profit even on the questioned transactions.

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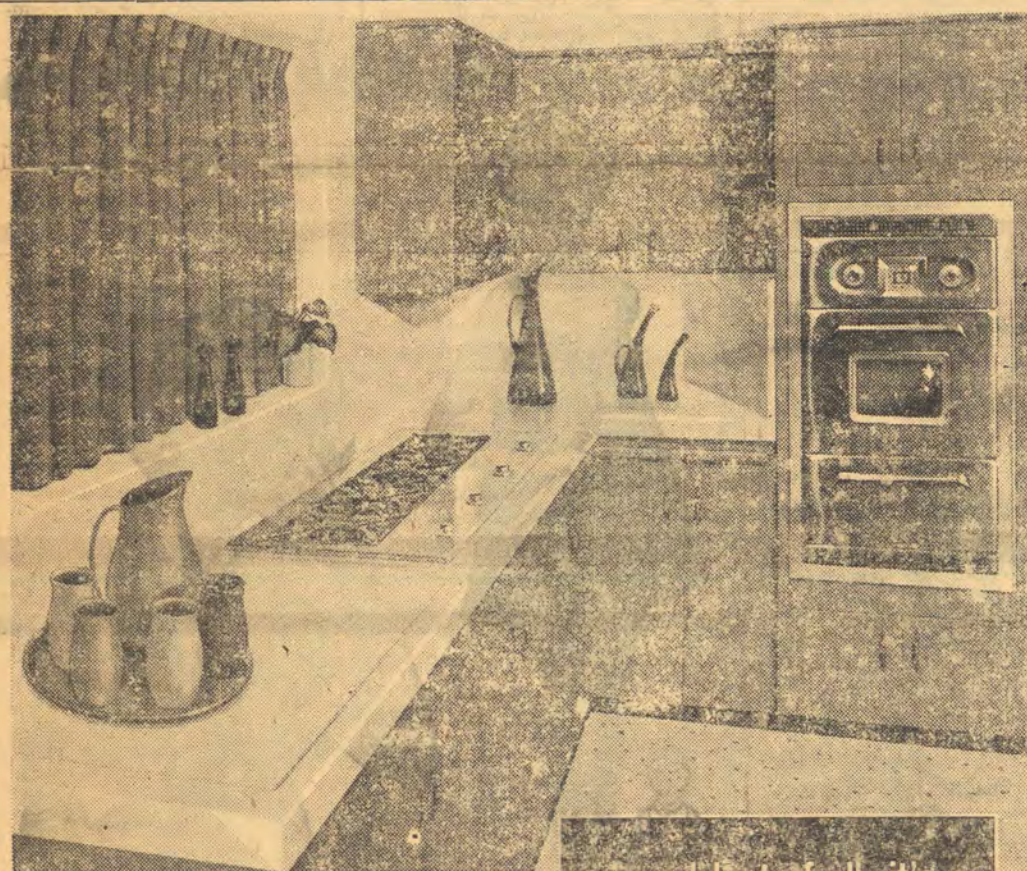
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Daniel's Record Lead Strongly Indicates Great Runoff Victory

In the Democratic primary, voters gave Sen. Price Daniel the greatest numerical lead over the runner-up with which a Texas candidate for governor ever entered a runoff race, with one possible exception, depending on final complete returns. No runner-up ever overcame a lead anywhere near so great.

On analysis of Monday returns, cold arithmetic and logic indicate only a remote possibility of Ralph Yarborough's winning in the second primary—provided Sen. Daniel's supporters do not rest on their oars. They show that Daniel led Yarborough by about 155,000 ballots, polling slightly short of 40 per cent of the total vote, to Yarborough's less than 30 per cent. In order to win in the runoff Daniel needs only 10 per cent more of that total, as his opponent must gain 20 plus per cent.

In other words, Daniel would have to get only 157,000 of the 469,607 votes scored by O'Daniel, Haley, Senterfitt and Holmes to have a runoff majority, whereas Yarborough would have to

corral some 313,000 of them to win.

The question is, who will get the votes that went to the four also-runs? It doesn't appear to be very perplexing riddle. Haley, Senterfitt and Holmes are pronounced conservatives, so it is reasonable to estimate that at least 90 per cent of the 132,084 votes they received, in the total cited must be conservative. Surely 75 per cent of them should go to Sen. Daniel in the runoff. If so, he would then have to get less than one-fourth of the O'Daniel vote to have a majority. Yarborough on the other hand, must pick up about three-fourth of O'Daniel's votes plus more than one-fourth of the other 3 candidates' votes to win.

During the campaign there were reports that O'Daniel was cutting into Yarborough's support here and there, mainly in the rural areas. Maybe so, but Pappy's strength was far from topheavily liberal. Actually he has the most conservative record of all the candidates in the first primary; reactionary, some

This new discovery will be a boon for home and resort owners as well as for farmers. Approval has been granted for its use in picnic areas, dairy barns, poultry houses, stock pens, stables, kennels, and other places where flies are a menace.

The fly-killing ingredient in Fatal-Fly is Bayer L 13/59 (Dipterex), the effective new discovery developed in a German lab.

This new product is odorless and will not stain. After initial control has been established in the treated area, one or two applications a week is usually enough to maintain good fly control. It can be used as a dry bait or it can be made into a water solution.

call him. Many supported him for that reason. Sen. Daniel has every reason to expect at least a 50-50 split of the O'Daniel vote—perhaps much more.

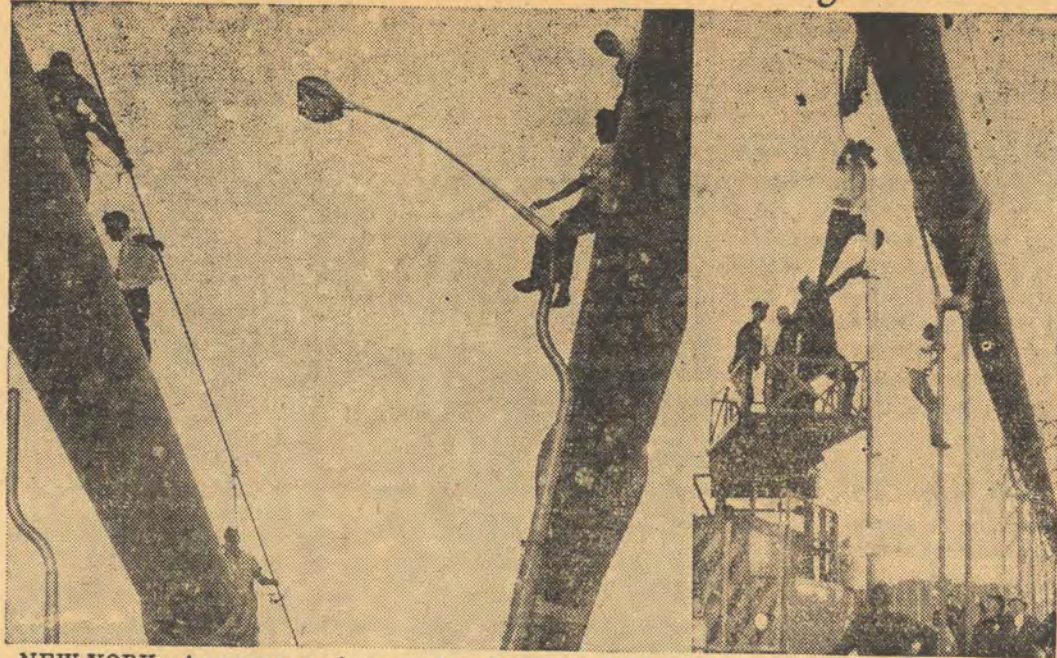
In short, the election figures and the practical political logic point to a resounding victory for Price Daniel in the runoff.

This prospect is subject to only one condition that is now foreseeable. The senator warned of it in his election comment, predicting certain victory if his supporters do not become overconfident and relax their efforts. It is not likely that they will do so.

Mr. Yarborough stands in the same position that Homer P. Rainey, the liberal candidate for governor, occupied just 10 years ago. Beauford Jester's first primary lead over him, in a large field, was about the same as Price Daniel's is over Yarborough's. Friends told Rainey it would be futile to go through with the runoff and urged him to withdraw. Rainey insisted on fighting it out, and in the second primary Jester beat him nearly two to one.

Having trouble with scorched hands? Try sliding a paper plate over the shank of your fire tongs or long-handled forks. The plate will deflect the heat.

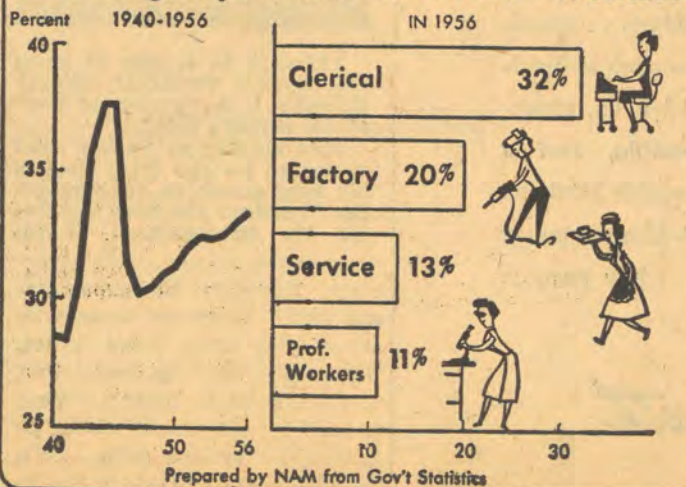

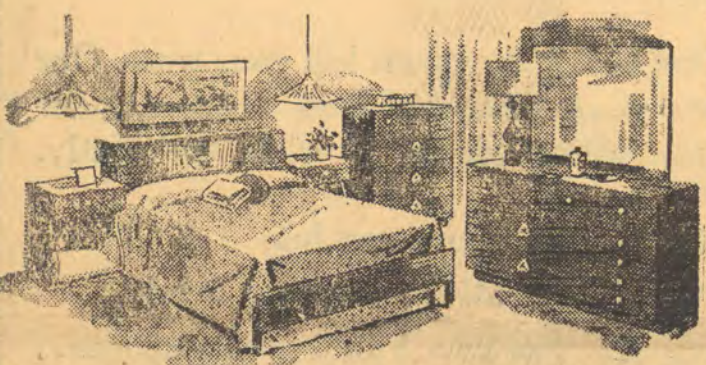
