Diboll State Bank Receipt Total Two Million At Close Of 3rd Year

Growing, growing, gone!
The Diboll State Bank opened its doors to the public on June 18, 1953. Since then, it has surpassed even the fondest dreams of those far-sighted businessmen who founded it.

When the bank opened in the summer of 1953, it had less than \$900,000 in deposits and capital assets, according to Charles Hanks, vice-president and cashier. Now this bustling enterprise boasts deposits of more than \$1,750,000. Total assets and liabilities total more than \$2 million. In a three year period, Diboll State has more than dou-

bled its amount of assets and liabilities.

INDUSTRY HELPS

Mr. Hanks, in comparing Diboll State Bank with banks about the size of Diboll, said that this growth in a three-year period is nothing short of phenomenal. "Many banks in towns of comparable size have failed to show this kind of gain in ten years," Hanks said.

He attributed this gain to the vast industrial growth of the Diboll area, commenting that few communities are so fortunate as Diboll in having large companies upon which large economy is based. Peak banking years in Diboll still lie in the bright future of Diboll, Hanks declared.

OTHER CUSTOMERS

Diboll State Bank does not derive all its business from Dibollians. Many checking and loan accounts belong to persons living in outlying communities. A great many accounts belonging to Lufkinites are on file also.

Hanks attributes good business from surrounding communities to three things: Diboll is a short drive from most communities; there is plenty of parking space and little traffic; Diboll State makes it easy as possible for people to at least talk about loans, etc.

CAN EASILY EXPAND

Temple Associate architects made it possible for officials to expand banking facilities with a minimum of remodeling.

There are two more teller windows which can be opened when business increases. There is adequate space for bookkeeping facilities that should take care of any upswing in work.

The vault still provides ample space for many more safety deposit boxes, etc. And the architects also made it possible to install a drive-in window if one is ever desired.

MANY FEATURES

Hanks said that the local bank featured the same banking needs found in any town or city. Some of these are: Night deposit; bank money orders; travelers cheques; safety deposit; checking accounts, automobile, farm, and commercial loans; and pays 2 pct. per annum on all savings accounts.

A member of the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation, all accounts at Diboll State Bank are covered with up to \$10,000 insurance. It is also a member of the Texas Bankers Association.

SERVES 2,000

Diboll State Bank serves about 2,000 regular customers. These include only those who have checking and loan accounts and does not include those who only cash checks and do a "traveling business".

The East Texas PREP PARADE By Bob Bowman (Tyler Morning Telegraph)

As any dyed-in-the-wool fan will tell you, there's nothing sportsworthy in the fall except the World Series and football.

The latter pops into prominence Friday night when the largest (Sut, that's Texas) high school football show opens.

Like all other sections of the state, East Texas will open in grand style. Twenty-three games in Three conferences—AA, A, and B—will be played in the area. The big boys of the Texas Interscholastic League—The Class AAAA and AAA teams—don't open until the following Friday, Sept. 14.

East Texas has been divided into 12 "true East Texas" districts and from these 12 leagues chances are good that the area will be represented in the state playoffs.

In District 8-AAAA, Texarkana appears the stronger team with Longview offering stout opposition. State finalist Tyler, riddled by graduation losses, will be rebuilding this fall.

Gladewater, likely to possess East Texas' fastest backfield, shapes up as the top team in District 7-AAAA. Kilgore and Carthage will also be tough.

Cleburne, potent in every phase of the game, has the edge in District 8-AAA. Palestine is rebuilding, so the Wildcats won't be as powerful as in past seasons.

The scramble for the championship of District 12-AA will be wide open. Grand Saline, blessed with a wealth of weight and Terrell, a perennial toughie, look good, but could run into resistance from Kaufman and Van.

Bonham has both speed and weight and should snare the 13-AA title with ease. However, Mt. Vernon and Pittsburg are the type capable of upsetting the

apple cart.

Gilmer's Buckeyes have potential aplenty in the 15-AA race and could be an East Texas representative in the state playoffs. New London, 1955 state semifinalists, and dangerous Daingerfield are capable of throwing monkey wrenches into the business however.

Hawkins' Hawks' who have won some sort of title since 1950, and White Oak, another consistent winner, seem destined to battle it out for laurels in District 16-A.

Any of three teams—Chapel Hill, Gaston, or Lindale—could emerge as champion in 17-A, a new district set up by the Interscholastic League. Lindale, a 1955 titlist, has enough line weight, but lacks backfield speed. Chapel Hill and Gaston appear to have plenty of both.

Canton, blessed with red-head Mike Hackney who should win all-state recognition hands-down looks excellent in District 18-A. Hackney was the Eagles' big gun last fall and showed even better form in pre-season workouts.

In District 14-B, Everett's Chapel, 1955 state Class A quarter-finalist, should have it made. The Lions return to Class B this fall after a more successful tour of Class A. East Mountain and Lunion Grove will likely battle.

Defending champion Alto, unhurt by graduation, should sweep through 21-A if Trinity doesn't interfere.

Garrison, another victim of graduation losses, will likely take a backseat to Timpon or Hemphill in 22-A after capturing titles for the past two years.

On the left side, Bobby Glover, a senior, will play end, with James Johnson a likely starter at tackle. Leo Clark will be at left guard and veteran John Hannah will hold down the center post.

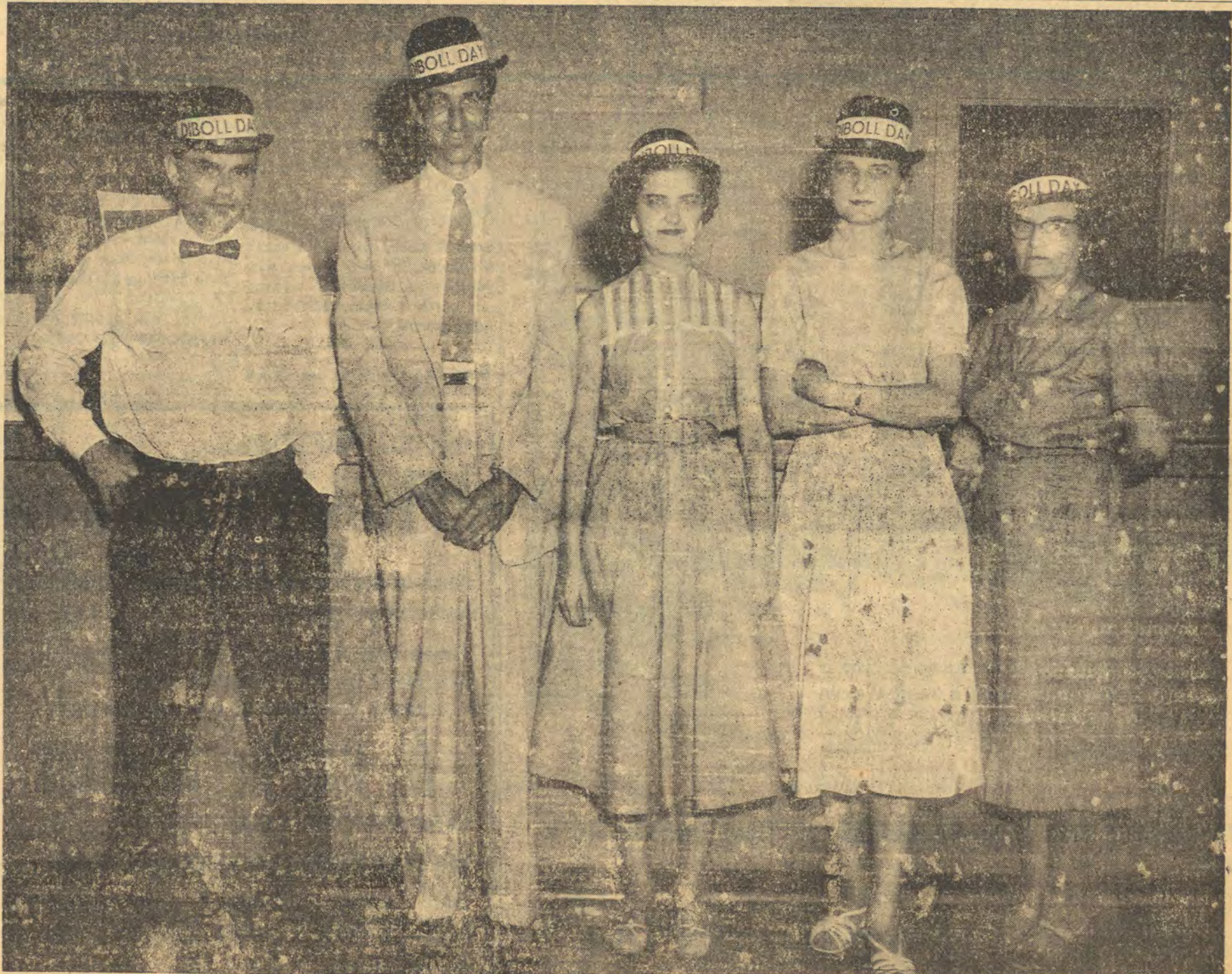
The Lumberjacks average as a team, 162 pounds per man, the line averages 158, and the offensive backfield will average about 152.

Mr. Truman at Chicago

Harry S. Truman, most active past President in recent U. S. history, whittled himself down a few notches at the Democratic convention in Chicago recently.

Mr. Truman's behavior reflected his belief that he was still The Power within the Democratic Party. But, as things turned out, Adlai Stevenson, the 1952 party nominee, is the number 1 man in the Democratic party, just as Stevenson's supporters had known all along.

Mr. Truman never got over Stevenson's campaign attitude of 1952. Stevenson rightly concluded the American people were fed up with Trumanism, Truman scandals and the Fair Deal. In his campaign, he was the boss, and he ran it his way. He did not "give 'em Hell" like Truman would have, and he did not let Mr. Truman run the show.

The fact that this attitude got under Mr. Truman's skin is something intimates Stevenson have known for a long time. Mr. Truman plotted his revenge carefully and with a coldblooded eye. He came out in dramatic fashion for Averell Harriman in the Saturday afternoon before the Democratic convention opened.

It seemed that this announcement might deadlock the convention at the time, and that Harriman might move forward into real contention. However, Mr. Truman's announcement failed to have the impact it would have four years ago. . . because Mr. Truman has no patronage and no real, practical political power.

Hereafter, Mr. Truman's endorsement at a national convention, or any where else, will be viewed with little weight. His stature and his power is reduced to practically zero and Mr. Stevenson — by bucking and beating Truman at his own game, has

emerged as the leader of the party beyond any shadow of a doubt.

A Bill That Didn't Pass

Several bills were introduced in the 84th Congress which would have made it compulsory for slaughter - houses to utilize humane methods in the slaughtering of hogs, lambs, cattle and so on.

However, they did not pass. Immediately after adjournment, a group of Congressmen visited slaughtering plants in Kansas City, St. Joseph, Mo., Fremont, Nebr. and other places. The Congressmen viewed slaughterhouses where cattle are struck with a pole axe before being slaughtered, where hogs, lambs and calves are shackled, hoisted and then knifed and bled to death—even when they are fully conscious.

They also visited a company where cattle are mercifully rendered insensible to pain, a humane replacement for the pole axe. They visited a company where animals are rendered unconscious through the use of carbon dioxide, before being knifed and bled. Hormel is the major slaughterer in the country which saves hogs the pain and terror of the cruel slaughtering process by using carbon dioxide. The Seitz Packing Company, of St. Joseph, Mo., uses a captive bolt pistol instead of the pole-axe.

Only fifteen companies, of all the slaughterhouses in the U. S. practice modern humane slaughtering methods. Yet in Switzerland, England, Scotland, the Netherlands, Sweden, Finland, Denmark, Norway, Germany and in other European countries, cruel methods of slaughtering animals have already been made illegal.

The National Humane Society says about 150,000,000 cattle, lambs and calves each year in the United States are caused terror and suffering to such a degree that it is a national disgrace.

We hope the Congressmen who visited the various slaughterhouses — members of the House Agriculture Committee of which Congressman Harold Cooley (D. -N.C.) is chairman, will see to it that in the 85th Congress a bill providing for compulsory humane methods of slaughtering animals is passed as soon as possible.

Lumber Association To Hold Meeting

A. E. Cudlipp, secretary-treasurer of the Texas Lumber Manufacturers Association today asked for full attendance on the part of the membership at the quarterly meeting to be held at Boggy Slough on September 8.

Mr. Cudlipp said that Senator Ottis E. Lock, principal speaker, would discuss: Tax matters, with relation to timberland owners; and water conservation and its legal aspects.

posse will not be robbing. — cops fining likely looking citizens of the county.

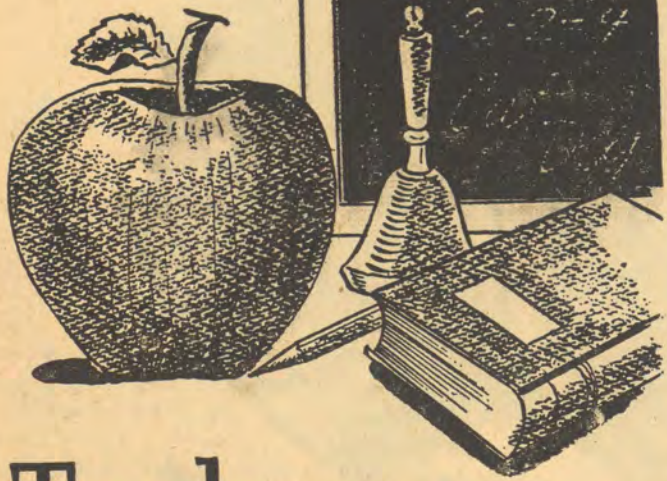

Seventh of a Series

Christians Are Devoted To Restoration Of New Testament Christianity

The Church of Christ Speaks

When the great persecution arose against the church at Jerusalem, the disciples were scattered abroad and went everywhere preaching the word. "Then Phillip went down to the city of Samaria and preached Christ unto them" (Acts 8:5). It is well to note that in preaching the Word, he preached Christ, he preached the kingdom of Christ, he preached the name of Christ, he preached the baptism commanded by Christ. No man can preach the Word without preaching these things.

The people of Samaria believed the preaching of Phillip and were baptized, both men and women (verse 12). After Phillip had done an outstanding work in the city of Samaria, he was directed by an angel to go south to the road that led from Jerusalem unto the town of Gaza. Phillip arose and went and thus by divine guidance he was brought in contact with a soul in whom the God of heaven was interested, the man of Ethiopia, an eunuch of great authority under Candace queen of the Ethiopians, who had charge of all her treasure.

This man had been to Jerusalem to worship. The distance he had gone to worship is proof that he was very interested in pleasing God. Even though, he had gone to Jerusalem to worship and was he returning, he had not yet done the will of God. I hope the time will soon come when people will awaken to the fact that it is impossible for them to worship God, yea even from the heart and still stand in need of obeying the gospel. Jesus said in Matthew 15:8,9, "This people draweth nigh unto me with their mouth, and honoreth me with their lips; but their heart is far from me. But IN VAIN they do worship me, teaching the doctrines the commandments of men." This man had made a long trip and had engage in worship, yet he needed to become a Christian to



please God.

But his trip yielded fruitage, or God sent a gospel preacher to him to teach him the truth. It takes the truth to get people right with God and no man is made free short of obedience to the truth which is the Word of God (John 8:32, 17:17). The Ethiopian was investigating, was reading, as he rode along in his chariot. The Holy Spirit spoke to the preacher and commanded him to "go near and join yourself to the chariot". No notice that the Holy Spirit did not go to the man who was to be converted, he went to the preacher and directed the preacher to the man to be converted, that he (the preacher) might, by the guidance of the Holy Spirit, teach the man to be converted to the will of the Lord. Since one must do the will of the Lord, before he can enter heaven (Matthew 7:21) the preacher was directed by the Spirit to the Eunuch to teach him the Lord's will.

The man of Ethiopia was reading the prophet Isaiah concerning the Christ. The preacher impressed the importance of an understanding and began at the same scripture and preached unto him Jesus. When a gospel preacher mounts the pulpit to day he preaches Jesus. This cannot truthfully be said about many modern preachers, for when they mount the pulpits, they preach about matters that are purely social, secular or governmental in their nature. They spend their time preying upon the emotions and passions of frail humanity. But Phillip, the gospel preacher, preached unto him Jesus. As they went on their way they came unto a certain

water and the eunuch said, "See here is water; what doth hinder me to be baptized?" The record doesn't say a thing about Phillip even mentioning baptism. It just says that he preached unto him Jesus. Then how can we account for the eunuch demanding baptism, seeing that Phillip only preached unto him Jesus? Certainly, it is because in preaching Jesus, baptism is preached. In fact no man can preach Jesus fully, without preaching baptism. I know that Phillip was not like many modern preachers.

If he had been, when the eunuch said "See, here is water, what doth hinder me to be baptized?" "Phillip would have said, "Now Brother Eunuch, we will have to go back to Jerusalem and find out what is the pleasure of the church." You know that it is done by many preachers of our day. But why didn't Phillip do it that way? Simply because Phillip was a gospel preacher. Yes, if Phillip had been following some human creeds, he would have taken the man all the way back to Jerusalem and voted on him for baptism. Such practice is unauthorized and unscriptural. When the Eunuch said, "See here is water what doth hinder me to be baptized?" Phillip said "If thou believest with all thine heart thou mayest."

He made the good confession, "I believe that Jesus Christ is the Son of God." Upon this confession, they stopped the chariot and both went down into the water both Phillip and the eunuch and he baptized him. Now had Phillip been like many preachers of this century he would have told the eunuch to keep his seat and would have gotten some water and sprinkled or poured it on the head of the eunuch. But Phillip was guided by the Holy Spirit to take the candidate to the water and down into it and baptize him. In Ephesians 4:5 we are taught that there is one baptism and in Romans 6:4, Colossians 2:12 we are taught that baptism is a burial and a resurrection. This man of Ethiopia was baptized by the Spirit (1 Corinthians 12:13) for the Spirit directed the whole conversion through the preacher. Thus, here we have a clear cut New Testament example of conversion. How can they believe without hearing and how can they hear without a preacher? (Romans 10:14-17) Thus, the preacher was sent to him, he preached Christ, the Ethiopian (1) heard, 2 he believed, (3) he repented 4 he made good confession and 5 he was baptized into Christ. He went on his way rejoicing.

Wooden Arches Are Now In Use

TIMBER TITANS

Wood arches up to 300 feet in length are now in use for construction, and builders predict the use of even larger wood members in the near future. These arches are made of one and two inch thicknesses of seasoned Southern Pine Lumber glued in shaped under high pressure. They are stirring excitement in building circles because they are bringing the special attributes of wood to bear in heavy construction for the first time. When laminated lumber is used for their "backbones," the largest of buildings have a light appearance, while the huge wood arches provide the eye appeal as well as the support. Some contractors estimate that savings of 20 percent are possible through laminated wood methods of construction. Ease of erection is a big factor.

USDA RATINGS

On the basis of laboratory findings, the United States Department of Agriculture rates Southern Pine Lumber ahead of other structural species in bending strength and nail holding power.

BASEMENT CONVERSION

Often it's possible to double the available living and storage area in the home by basement conversion. This is a comparatively simple, inexpensive job in a house that's structurally sound. There is no need for costly structural alteration. All that's needed is the nailing of finishing materials to the upright wall studs and to the floor joists which in the basement appear as horizontal ceiling members. Short lengths of Southern Pine Lumber can be used on both paneling and ceiling since the framing members to which they are nailed, are close together. The use of well seasoned, good qual-

Diboll Nursery To Do Landscaping

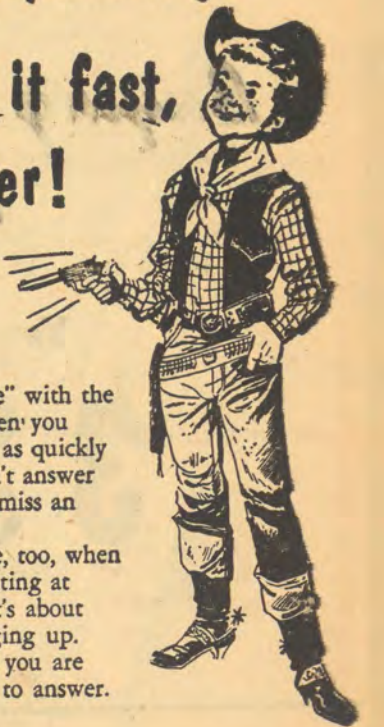
Maynard Schinke of Diboll Nursery and Florist, announced today that his firm will handle all landscaping work for the Temple-White office building.

If some one asked you to name your most valuable possession, you probably would not answer: "Time."

If time is your most priceless possession, it stands to reason that you should use the always shortening supply of it well. A presidential candidate used a good phrase the other day in a speech. He spoke of the "unrepentant minute". That is a good description. The minute or hour once gone, never returns - not that same one.

If you use it incorrectly, now, you have missed the boat. So, the lesson is to spend your time wisely. Get all you can out of it. Actually your time is what concerns you. Time does not die and fade away—time is infinity. But you and I die and pass from the scene.

So our portion of time is a priceless possession. It is the one thing you can't increase in this life. You only have so much and you will never have as much tomorrow as you had today. — That's a pretty good argument to do something worthwhile today. It's worth a thought.

Without a doubt, Senator Estes Kefauver weakens the Democratic ticket in the South, or in some Southern states. At the same time, there is little doubt that Richard Nixon weakens the Republican ticket among some voters also.

On the other hand, it is undoubtedly true that both Kefauver and Nixon strengthen the ticket in other areas, Kefauver adding strength to the Democratic ticket in the Midwest and Nixon adding strength to the Republican ticket with the many friends he has made through active, loyal work in behalf of the party and the President in the last three and one half years.

The Democrats obviously believe they will carry most of the south, and that the addition of Kefauver to the ticket will gain more in the Midwest and other sections that it will lose the party in the South.

A majority of Republicans ob-

viously believe that dumping Nixon, at a late date, would do the party more harm than good, since it would have been an admission that Nixon was unqualified to be Vice-President, a post the Republicans nominated him for four years ago.

Thus the country has two controversial Vice- Presidential nominees. There is every indication that Estes Kefauver will direct his fire largely at Vice-President Nixon, and the Vice-President is not likely to sit by and not return the fire. This may be one of the more lively phases of the campaign.

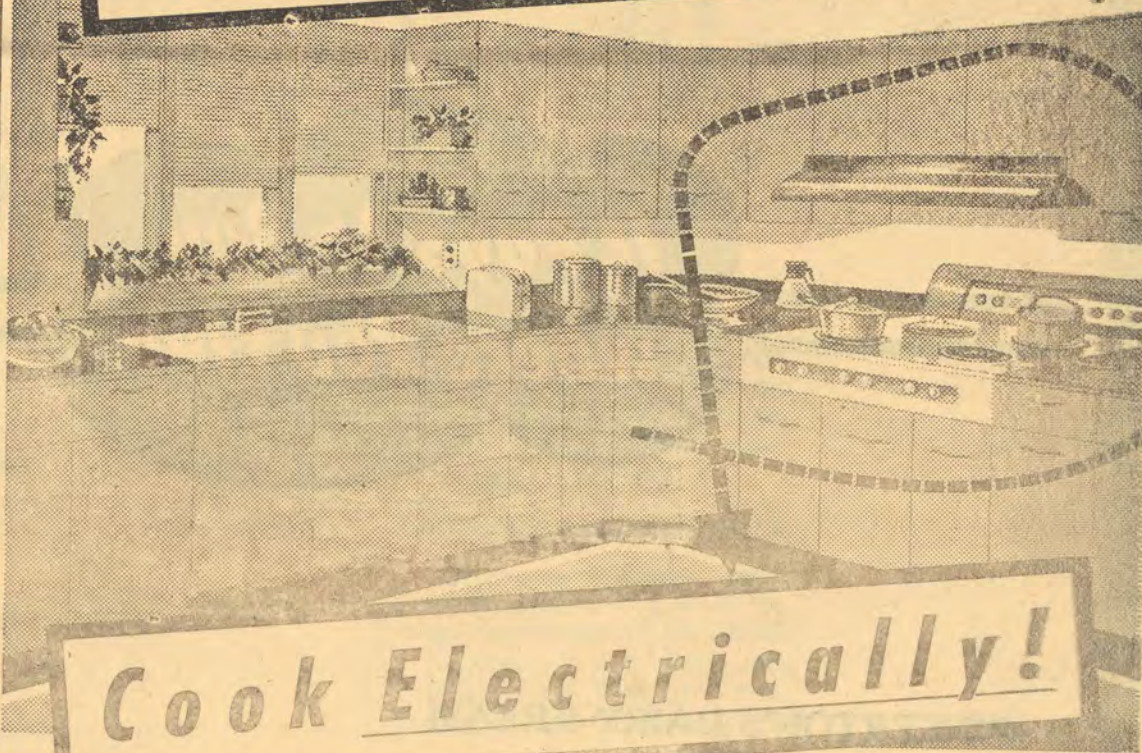

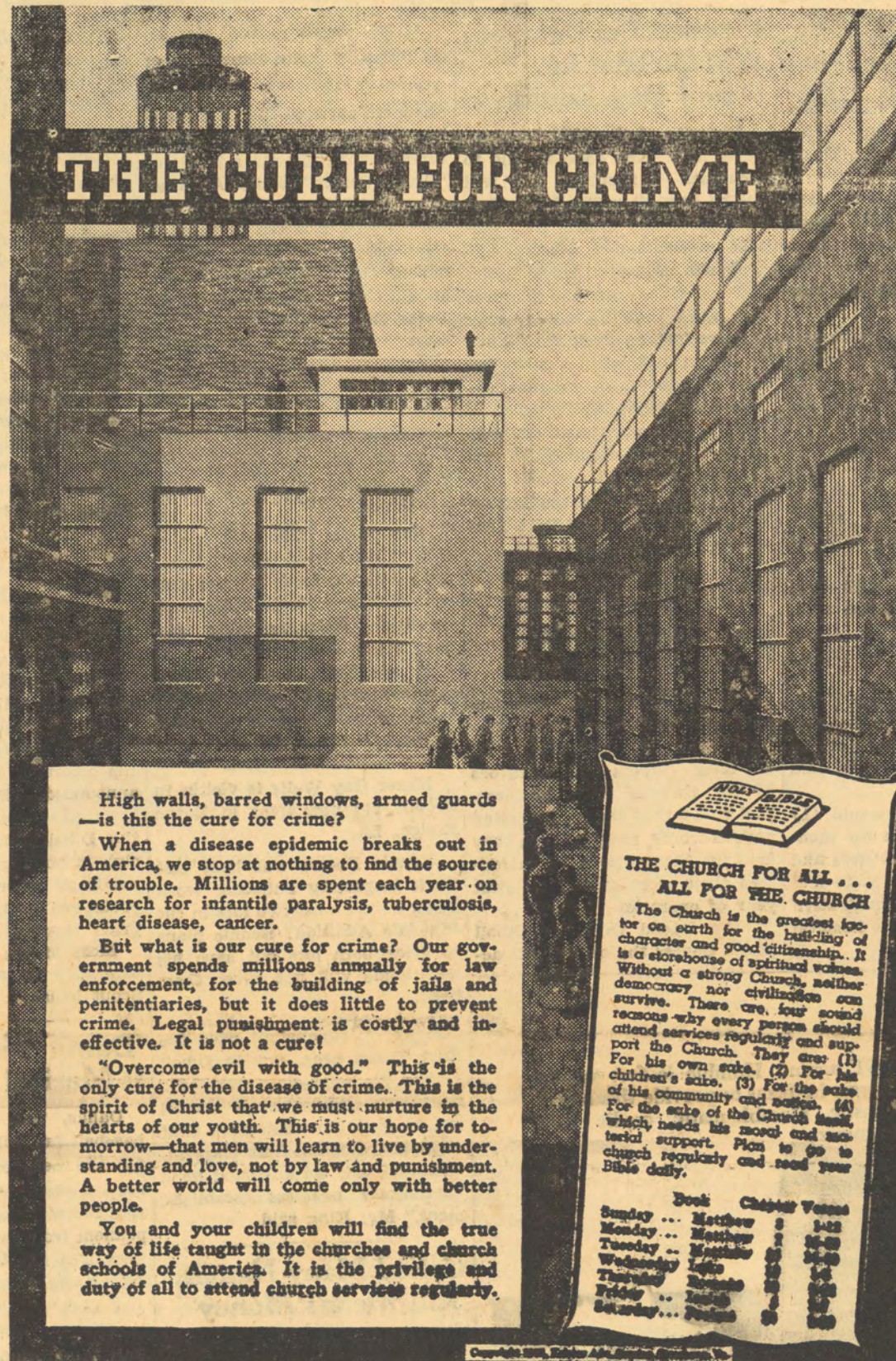

Highlights and Sidelights

From Your State Capitol...

Close—Instead of simmering down at summer's end, Texas' political pot is boiling more furiously than ever.

New significance has been added to the already-controversial State Democratic Convention of next week. Monday the executive committee must certify a winner in one of the most breath-taking close gubernatorial races in Texas history.

Official counts showed that Price Daniel leads Ralph Yarborough by some 3,000 votes. But each side regarded returns in certain areas as questionable. It promises to be an even

closer finish than in 1932 when Mrs. Miram Ferguson edged out Ross Sterling by 3,798 votes.

Decision of the executive committee apparently is all-important. In the Ferguson-Sterling contest courts refused to interfere with the committee ruling. They said it would delay the general election.

SENATE CANDIDATES JUMP IN—Would-be successors to Price Daniel didn't wait for the vacancy to develop to start scrambling for his U. S. Senate Post. Political observers predict a "real horse race" if Daniel does resign in time for a special election.

First formal announcement came from State Sen. Searcy Bracewell of Houston. Bracewell promised to vote with the Democrats in organizing the Senate, but made it clear he voted for Ike in '52 and would do so again.

He is a major threat to the Texas GOP's official endorsee, Thad Hutcheson, a young Houston attorney. Hutcheson promised "no token fight."

James P. Hart, former Supreme Court justice and University of Texas chancellor, also has announced.

Congressman-at-Large Martin Dies indicated early in the summer that he would run.

"Names in speculation" include just about every other Texan in or formerly in public life—Yarborough, J. Evetts Haley, Lloyd Bentsen Jr., John Ben Shepperd, John C. White, Wright Morrow, etc.

He has invited both nominees to speak in Texas this fall. Vice presidential Candidate Kefauver was specifically urged to attend the Heart of Texas Fair in Waco to be held Sept. 29-Oct. 5.

NEW HEALTH CODE—Proposals to streamline Texas mental health code are being drafted by the University of Texas Law School.

Financed by the Hogg Foundation, the project is being conducted with the guidance of the Board for State Hospitals and Special Schools.

Suggested changes would (1) encourage earlier care for mental cases to speed recoveries and reduce expense to the state and (2) modernize administrative procedures for the state hospital system.

Called many names, the \$4 million plant is the only one being constructed at present, and will constitute a lot of growth in both population and business for Diboll.

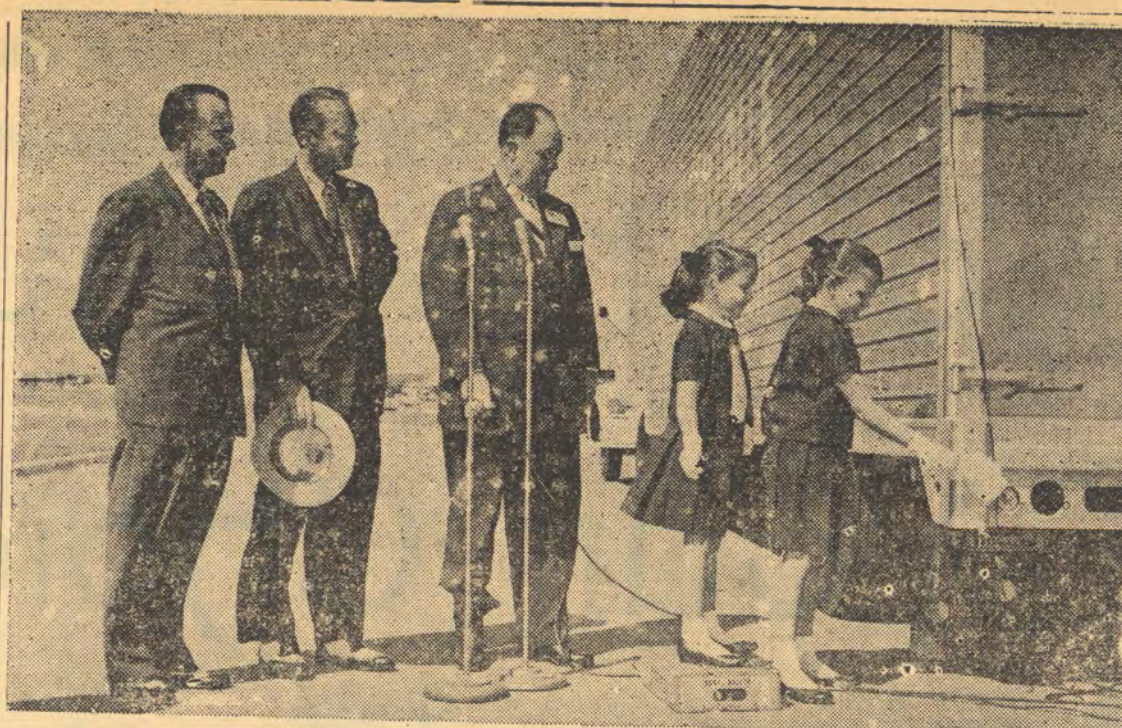
