Humble Cameras Will Cover Diboll Day!

Jacks Grind Out 12-6 Win In Opener; Play Colmesneil There Friday Night

The story here last Friday night primarily concerned the fact that Diboll won its opening game for the first time since 1949 as they upset the highly-ranked Elkhart Elks 12-6.

Let us make these observations: Diboll has more spirit than they have shown in seven years; they have a good full-back; good quarterback; and nine other boys who have found out that the best substitute for experience is to run hard, hit hard, and never quit until the final whistle is sounded.

HOW IT WENT

Robert Rector kicked off for Diboll. Elkhart moved the ball four plays and punted. Diboll tried three running plays with little success, then tried to run with 12 yards needed from their own 18 yard line. Elkhart took over on downs, but promptly fumbled on Jack 15. The battle see-sawed back and forth about the same way for two quarters, with the Elks driving through the Jack twenty three times to be stopped by fumbles. Elkhart fumbled six times during the game.

Finally, with five minutes in the first half, the Elks began a 90-yard march with Dawson gaining on ground plays. A pass completed near the goal line was nullified by an offside penalty, but Artis Moseley promptly fumbled back and hit Jake Sheridan right down the middle. Sheridan ran the play for another 25 yards and an Elk T. D. A confused attempt for the extra point failed. First half ended, 6-0, Elkhart.

SECOND HALF

A combination of Grimes and Capps running, coupled with a 30 yard pass completion from Grimes to Dude Courtney, put the Lumberjacks on the Elk 7 soon after the second half began. Grimes carried over from the one on a quarterback sneak. A running try by Grimes failed for point after, and the game was tied, 6-6.

Early in the fourth quarter, Don Capps picked up 40 yards and Grimes tip-toed for about 25 as the Jacks drove 70 yards for the winning tally. Grimes was injured in his last 12 yard trip to Elkhart's five yard line. Mike Kerr replaced the All-District quarterback, and on two successive sneaks, tallied the final six points. Rector's kick for the extra point was wide to the right.

Grimes' injury was apparently a 'charlie horse' in his right leg. He returned to the game after the kickoff. An Elk pass was intercepted on Diboll's 45 in the waning minutes. Grimes and Courtney carried the ball, following long signal counts, until a Courtney fumble was recovered on Elkhart's 35. Trying three unsuccessful aerials, Elkhart's hopes for a last-minute victory were killed with the final whistle seconds later.

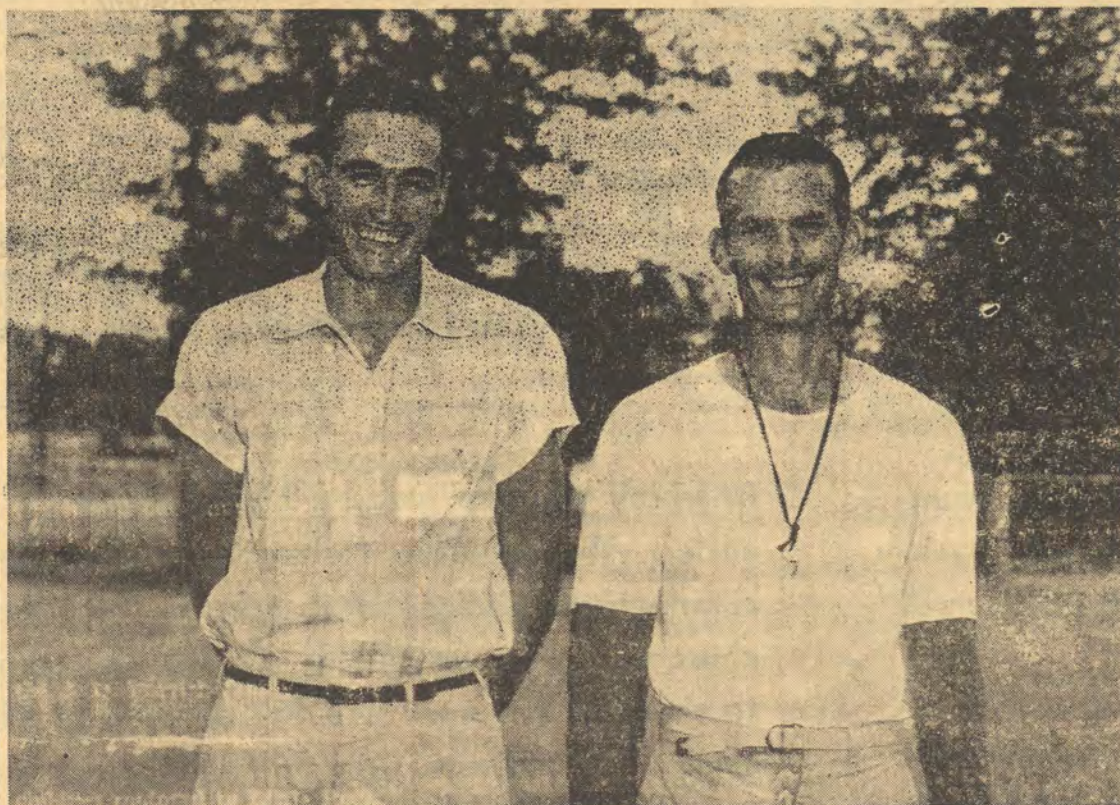
CARR AND RECTOR

Charges Filed On Two Diboll Men

Theft charges were filed in Angelina County Court Monday on Alvin Kennedy and Guy Williams of Diboll. The case had earlier been subject to Grand Jury action, but was returned to county court.

Kennedy pleaded guilty and was sentenced to thirty days in jail. Williams entered a plea of not guilty and posted \$1,000 in bond to await court action.

Sen. Ottis Lock Addresses Group

Questions on water conservation were posed by Senator Ottis Lock in the opening remarks of an address to members of the Texas Lumber Manufacturers Association. Quarterly meeting of the TLMA was held Saturday at Southern Pine Lumber Co.'s Boggy Slough clubhouse.

Senator Lock said that 'the overall need for water in Texas is not yet acute enough to cause the conflicting interests to resolve their differences'. The speaker then called attention to other differences, and discussed tax problems affecting the lumber industry.

Question and answer sessions were held following both addresses. Senator Lock was introduced by Paul Hursey, president of the association. Mr. Hursey announced that he has appointed a water resources committee of George Stanley of Houston, Mr. Clyde Thompson of Diboll, Tom Carter of Camden and Sam Reid of Woodville.

Southern Pine's Ben Anthony said that about 80 people were fed 'good Boggy Slough food' at the Saturday meeting.

ATTEND CHURCH SUNDAY

Diboll's annual celebration now known throughout East Texas as Diboll Day will be filmed for television by Humble Oil and Refining Company for a broadcast over NBC stations, it was announced today by George Wilmoth, Vice President.

Diboll Day which has grown into an institution of note and interest to the entire pineywood region of Texas, has attracted the attention of the Southwest over recent years because of the unique recognition it gives the forest products industry of Texas. This great industry long ignored in the states' publicity is one of the oldest of Texas industries and contributes vastly to the wealth and prestige of the region.

\$120,363.49 Asked In Civil Suits Here

A total of \$120,363.49 was asked in judgments on two civil suits filed Thursday in Lufkin's District Court.

Largest of the suits was filed for Marcella Ruth of Diboll who asked \$115,000 in judgement from the Texas and N. O. Railroad and others involved in an auto-train accident March 8th, 1955.

The suit alleges that the woman was a passenger in a car driven by C. C. Cook. When the auto and train collided near here, she claimed property damages and injuries.

Attorneys for the plaintiff are Musick, Shepherd and Musick of Houston.

A judgement of \$5,363.49 was asked by the plaintiff in the suit styled Billy M. Brown and wife Millie Ruth Brown, vs. Betty Joyce Berry, suit for damage reportedly occurring from an auto accident.

The plaintiff claimed damages from the accident which occurred April 24, 1955 when the defendant "failed to keep proper lookout, unsafe driving distance and excessive speed" resulting in a collision.

Diboll Man Hit While Crossing Road Monday By 'Doches Woman

A Diboll Negro man was accidentally struck by an automobile as he was crossing Highway 59 about one-half mile south of the Diboll city limits early Monday morning. The accident occurred about 7:30 a.m.

Constable Dan Fenley said that Mrs. Beulah McWilliams Holt of 1406 Pearl St. in Nacogdoches was on her way to Chester, where she is a teacher at the high school, when the accident occurred.

The man, Bud Smith, was apparently crossing Hwy. 59 east to west when he stepped in front of the auto. The automobile was reported to have skidded several feet before the impact that knocked the victim some 40 feet it was reported.

It was thought that Smith might have been walking to a nearby community to the south, or trying to catch a ride.

Both Fenley and highway patrolmen MacDillard and Harold White, who investigated the accident, termed it 'unavoidable'. Fenley said charges would not be filed.

Smith's condition at noon on Monday could not be determined by The News-Bulletin. At the scene of the accident, it is assumed that one leg was either fractured or broken. Bruises and cuts were visible on the local man's head.

At Dallas Convention ...

Bar Assoc. Shows Contempt For Supreme Court Decision

What amounted to a clear rebuff of the present Supreme Court took place in Dallas recently. There the American Bar Association was holding its annual convention. The matter was the Supreme Court's controversial school integration decision.

That decision, of course, is and was not backed by one court-case precedent, and in the view of perhaps a majority of trained judges (most of the Supreme Court's members are political appointees and were never gages), it is certainly a very questionable one.

The American Bar Association refused to support forceful integration at its recent Dallas meeting, but more than that, it barely approved what was called willing compliance with the highly questionable Supreme Court decision, as an alternative to enforced compliance.

The vote on approval of will-

ing compliance, as an alternative to forceful compliance was 118 to 101. Taking into consideration that some would vote for willful compliance rather than enforced compliance only because this seems to oppose force, and also considering that many will feel they must go on record, as a matter of respect for the system of the court, as favoring compliance with any decision, the 118 to 101 vote is a smashing depreciation of the Supreme Court.

It certainly makes it clearly understood that the highest court has little respect for the bar. Take away the votes of those who feel they must vote for compliance of any court decision, as a matter of principle, the votes of those who understand the recently-passed resolution as one against force, and those who were timid about voting against Justices before whom they argued cases, and there probably

wouldn't have been fifty votes for the Supreme Court.

Never before in history has respect for Supreme Court Justices touched such a low ebb. Certainly Congress should take the initiative in an effort to change the political plum nature of Supreme Court appointments, making judicial experience, on a court of a respective level, a prerequisite to service on the Supreme Court.

(We whole heartedly agree—and further emphasize that your supreme court of today has only approximately 14 years judicial experience combined. That is, before they were placed in this high judicial office.—Gentlemen we can see making a barber out of a butcher, but we can not see making a butcher out of a pole cat. Which in our estimation fits Mr. Warren and Mr. Clarke.—M.A.)

At Southern Pine Plant

New Kilns Start Up As FL. Unit Operation Is Halted

Southern Pine Lumber Company last week added an additional 200,000 feet to its drying capacity as two new dry kilns churned into operation. Under construction for the past three months by Temple Associates Contractors, the kilns began operating approximately on schedule. Southern Pine can now kiln dry about 1,200,000 feet of lumber per week.

Operation of the new kilns was timed perfectly with the shut-down of the second shift hardwood flooring unit, which will begin operation with the flooring unit at Pineland the first part of 1957.

Supervisors worked this week on a schedule which has planned to start the sawmill here on two shifts of pine. The second shift has been cutting hardwood. All hardwood operations are in the process of being moved to Pineland.

New Machinery
Still another plant project moved toward completion with

finger-jointing unit. The new machinery will make possible a more rapid "cutoff" procedure for the finger-jointing unit which in effect, "makes long boards out of short ones."

The cutoff machinery comes from Tri State Machinery Co. in Dallas. Its installation will necessitate another two workmen on the finger-jointing unit, making a total of six. Southern Pine feels there is a bright future in the fields of laminating, edge-gluing, and finger-jointing in the lumber industry.

When machinery has been installed, production on the finger-jointing unit should reach about 10,000 feet per shift, using 1x4 short stock.

Rufus Taylor is foreman of the unit, and Bill Smiley serves as leadman.

Although the second shift on the flooring unit was shut down last Friday, the day shift will continue to operate for several months, until stock on hand is utilized.

Six employees from the second shift were transferred to Pineland, with the remainder taking jobs in the lathe mill and sawmill here on the second shift.

Remodeling Plans

Southern Pine engineers continued their research on several remodeling projects, details of which will be announced at a later date.

Christians Are Devoted To Restoration Of New Testament Christianity

The Church of Christ Speaks

"Brethren, my heart's desire and prayer to God for Israel is that they may be saved. I bear them record that they have a zeal for God, but not according to knowledge" (Romans 10: 1-2.) Paul, the Apostle, who was formerly Saul of Tarsus, could write those words with real feeling and understanding because he had once possessed a great zeal for God that was not according to knowledge and by it he had been led to oppose the way of God and persecute the Son of God.

Saul's conversion is a strong witness to a great truth about conversion. That truth is that even the most zealous and earnest and sincere religious people may need to make radical changes in order to be saved. Saul was such a person, intensely religious, extremely zealous, and unquestionably sincere. But these things contributed to make him, in his own judgment, chief of sinners because they were responsible for his violent opposition to Christianity.

One claim concerning his religion is recorded in Galatians 1:14. "I profited in the religion of the Jews above many of my equals, being more zealous than they of the traditions of my fathers."

His claim concerning his sincerity he made before Agrippa: "Myself once thought that I ought to do many things in opposition to the name of Jesus of Nazareth" (Acts 26:9.)

But he was wrong, very wrong, and he had to change.

The accounts of Saul's conversion record an unusual event. Jesus appeared to him personally on the Damascus road. "He appeared to me" he wrote in his letter to the Corinthians (1 Corinthians 15:8.) He heard the voice of Christ's mouth (Acts 22:14.) That this was an experience of tremendous import no one would deny, but some of the inferences drawn from this are to be denied.

First, it is to be denied that such appearances of Jesus are to be expected in conversion today. Many people have been led to pray for and to expect some personal, physical experience of the physical presence of Jesus. Even in the New Testament accounts of conversion Saul is the only person who had this type of experience.

Secondly, it is to be denied that this appearance of Jesus gave Saul the assurance of salvation. Jesus did not speak peace to Saul's soul on the Damascus road. He pierced it with a sword of agony. There was never a man more wretched, a man farther from the peace of God, than was Saul when they led him into Damascus.

Thirdly, the appearance of Jesus to Saul did not set aside Christ's own world-wide terms by which men should be saved. Jesus had said, "He that believ-

eth and is baptized shall be saved." (Mark 16:16.) That Saul believed in Jesus Christ after he met him on the road is not to be questioned but it was not enough merely to believe.

"What wilt thou have me to do, Lord?" Saul asked. Jesus. And the answer came, "Go into Damascus and there it shall be told you what you ought to do." He went into Damascus to pray and fast for three days and nights. Then his instructions came from Ananias, a devout man, whom the Lord had sent to him. "Arise and be baptized and wash away thy sins." The most wonderful fact of all about the conversion of Saul of Tarsus is that he was not only converted from something but to something.

He ceased to be a persecutor. He left his old religion. He was forgiven of his sins. Of many, many people when these things are said, their story is written. They fade away into a sea of non-entity. But not Saul of Tarsus. The most hateful persecutor of Christians became the most energetic proponent of the Christian message. The antagonist of Christ became the evangelist of Christ. The scourge of the church became the surge of the church. The Hebrew of Hebrews became the Christian of Christians. The chief of sinners became a chief among saints.

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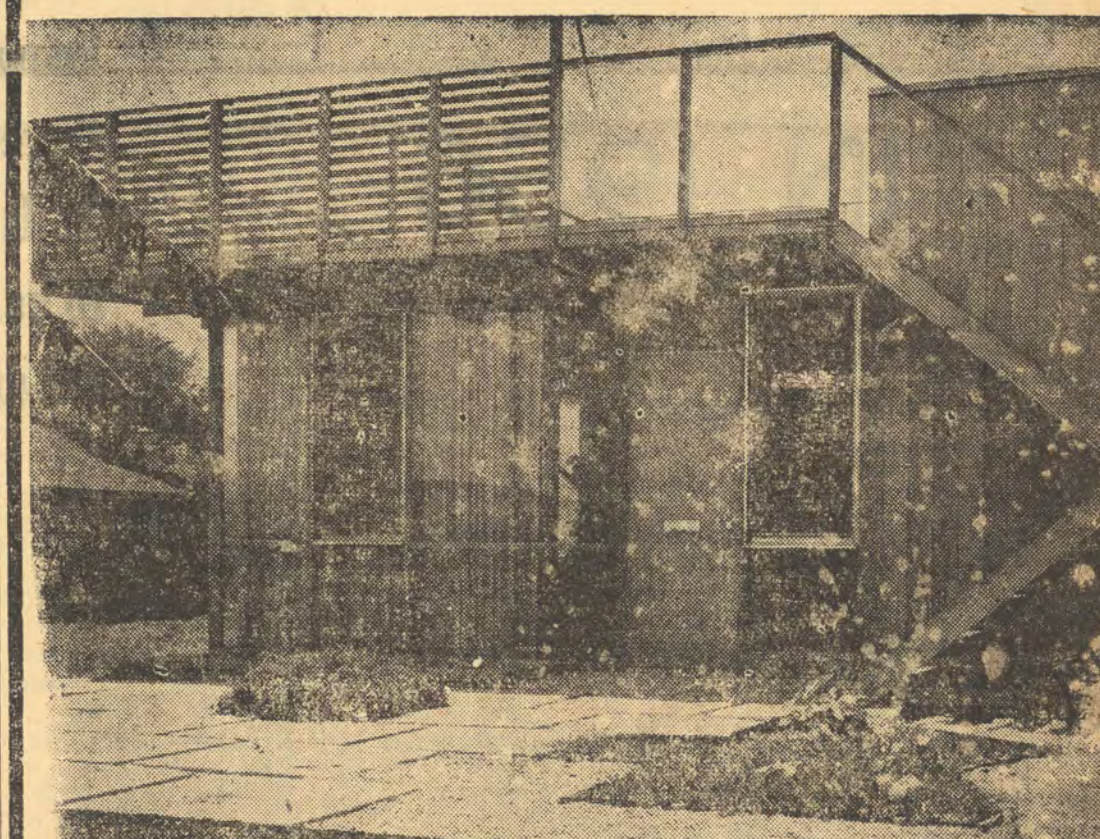

Diboll Will Not Enter AA Status Next Year; 1956 Enrollment Insufficient Pate Says

Diboll High School will evidently not be jumped into the Class AA category in the Inter-scholastic League last year because of this year's high school enrollment, W. F. Pate said today.

It was anticipated that more than 200 students would enroll, since there were 187 attending last year. Only 192 have enrolled thus far, however, so the Diboll Lumberjacks will continue to play football in Class A circles.

The small enrollment figure is probably a blessing in disguise as far as football in Diboll is concerned. The Lumberjacks have been unable to play 500 seasons since 1949-50 season as they compiled a mediocre 5-4 record. And the Axemen are playing in a tougher district this year. Whereas they had only Woodville and Groveton to contend with, they now have Cushing, Garrison, Hemphill, and Timpson — four schools which nearly always field rough and tumble gridiron specimens.

Total enrollment in Diboll School System finally wound up at 626. Figure showed no increase in grade school which registered 330; Junior high showed a slight jump of 104; and the high school registered five less than last year with 192.

CAR DEALER RIGHTS BILL

President Eisenhower recently signed a bill allowing auto dealers to take to Federal courts certain grievances against car manufacturers. The new law permits dealers to sue in the Federal courts for damages, including legal costs, growing out of the failure of a manufacturer to "act in good faith in performing or complying with any of the terms or provisions of the franchise, or in terminating, canceling or not renewing the franchise" of a dealer. Under its terms, the manufacturer also may raise counter charges involving lack of good faith on the part of the dealer.

Agencies Ask For Bus Consideration

Texas school superintendents, news editors, and other citizens have been requested to give a statewide emphasis and interpretation to the oft-neglected Texas law which requires all vehicles to stop when approaching a school bus loading or unloading children. Three state agencies — The Texas Education Agency, the Texas Highway Department and the Texas Department of Public Safety — joined in making the appeal.

Texas school buses were involved in 379 accidents in rural areas outside city limits during 1955. Three children (one of them in Madison County) and 2 adults were killed in these accidents.

"Even one preventable accident, as we all know is one too many," said J. W. Edgar, commissioner of Education. "A study of the various replies which have been made to the question of what drivers of other vehicles should do when they approach a school bus which is loading or unloading children reveals a lack of understanding concerning the statutes of law."

The law says, in effect, that upon meeting or overtaking in either direction a school bus which has stopped on the highway for the purpose of receiving or discharging children, the driver shall stop then proceed with due caution at a speed that is prudent and does not exceed ten miles per hour. The law does not apply within city limits.

Let's protect our children. Drive Safely at all times.

JOBLESS PAY

Initial claims of workers for unemployment compensation benefits declined by 27,500 to 212,400 during the last week of July, as compared with 197,700 for the same week of 1955. The number of workers making continued claims for benefits declined by 40,200 to 1,219,700 during the previous week. This compared with 1,104,600 a year ago.

POLIO VACCINE

The Government has eased its export restrictions on Salk polio vaccine — now in good supply in this country — to permit shipment of 1,000,000 doses abroad by October 1st. So far, only 23,481 doses have been licensed for shipment out of this country since the vaccine was approved for license in early 1955. First shipments will probably go to Latin-American countries, but only when the ministry of health of the country concerned endorses the requests.

BEEES ATTACK DRIVER

Baltimore, Md. — Following closely behind a panel truck, loaded with bee hives full of bees, Randolph Fenton, 22, suddenly was attacked by a swarm of the insects which escaped from one of the hives. Fenton drove to Union Memorial Hospital where he was treated for stings on the face, head, neck, hands and arms.

Looking at WASHINGTON

ON FAIRER INCOME TAXES

A special House subcommittee, the chairman of which is Representative Wilbur D. Mills, (D-Ark.), is now engaged in preparation for a study of the entire tax structure.

The special subcommittee will make a broad study of the tax laws in the books and recommend changes. Mills, it is good to note, agrees with Representative Daniel A. Reed (R-N. Y.), a key-member of the tax-writing House Ways and Means committee, and the two could probably do much towards getting an equitable tax bill out of the House committee, where it must originate.

On the basic points of taxation, Mills and Reed see eye-to-eye. They do not agree on the details of tax rate reductions in some of the middle and lower income brackets, although both believe that the top tax rates are too high.

Also both believe that the tax base should be broadened in the United States. We are heartily in accord with these views.

It seems that the best opportunity which has presented itself in a number of years is now presenting itself. The Government has begun to operate in the black for the first time in some years, and Representative Mills and Reed, and others, will do their country a great service if they are able to correct the many inequalities and inequities in our tax laws. Since there are to be tax reductions, we would think that the combining of these reductions with a general overhaul of tax laws would be the simplest way to correct inequities in the present laws.

We hope the Eighty-Fifth Congress, in its first session, will take care of this pressing problem.

NEW CANCER DRUG

A report on the use of the compound Krebiozen was recently issued by several prominent doctors. Dr. Andrew C. Ivy, professor of physiology and head of the department of clinical science at the University of Illinois, is the senior author of the report.

Co-authors are Dr. John F. Pick, head of the department of plastic surgery of Columbus Hospital, and Dr. W. F. P. Phill

ips, of the general practice department of St. Francis Hospital in Evanston, Illinois.

These three physicians have been engaged in tests with Krebiozen in human beings since 1948, when a supply of this chemical compound was made available to them by a Yugoslav physician, Dr. Stevan Durovic.

The report indicates that Krebiozen has an effect on cancer, but does not claim that it has a curative effect. However, it aims, in an analysis of the administration of the compound to 588 patients, that some of them have survived more than four or five years since the start of treatment, and that some of these survivals occurred in patients who had been classified as "hopeless" cases.

The report stated that Krebiozen possesses palliative potency in the management or treatment of sixty-eight per cent of patients with several types of cancer. There was also some evidence, the report continued that Krebiozen causes cancer growth to diminish in size.

The physicians believe that further tests with Krebiozen are in order even though this chemical compound has been the subject of medical dispute since it was first brought to this country several years ago. In fact, Dr. Ivy and Dr. George D. Stodiar, a former president of the University of Illinois, both lost their academic positions in a dispute over whether Krebiozen should be tested at the University.

Responsible medical organizations previously claimed that Krebiozen had "no effect" in the treatment of cancer. So there is no general agreement on the value of Krebiozen, although the latest report stirs anew an old controversy and gives the detractors of the drug new material to study, and renews interest in the controversial product.

KIDNAPING SOLVED

The solving of the Weinberger kidnaping brings to light a shocking story.

Angelo LaMarca, of Plainview, New York, has been arrested as a suspect in the kidnaping and has reportedly confessed.

According to the story given to the press, LaMarca left his home with a ransom note already written and used a "hit and miss" method to find a young child. It could have been anyone's child in that area, and it just happened to be the Weinberger child.

LaMarca reportedly told police he attempted to bring the child back, but was frightened by a crowd, including policemen, and then decided to get rid of the child, and left it on the side of a road, only a few miles from the Weinberger home.

The reported confession is an especially black story. Of all the crimes possible, that of kidnaping, and selling narcotics to children, are — in our opinion — two of the most despicable. And while a newspaper should not attempt to impose a sentence, for a particular crime com-

mitted hundreds of miles away, we think the stiffer the penalty in kidnaping cases, when and if the guilty is apprehended, the fewer the number of kidnapings in the future.

A death sentence for a kidnaper who is responsible for the death of a little child is certainly what many Americans expect, and is also what will impress criminals with the futility of attempting to pick up easy money by this method.

PRISONERS GET LOBSTER

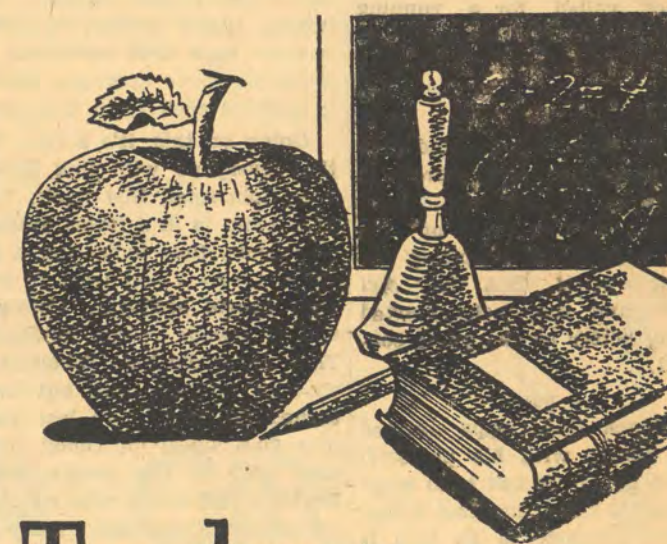

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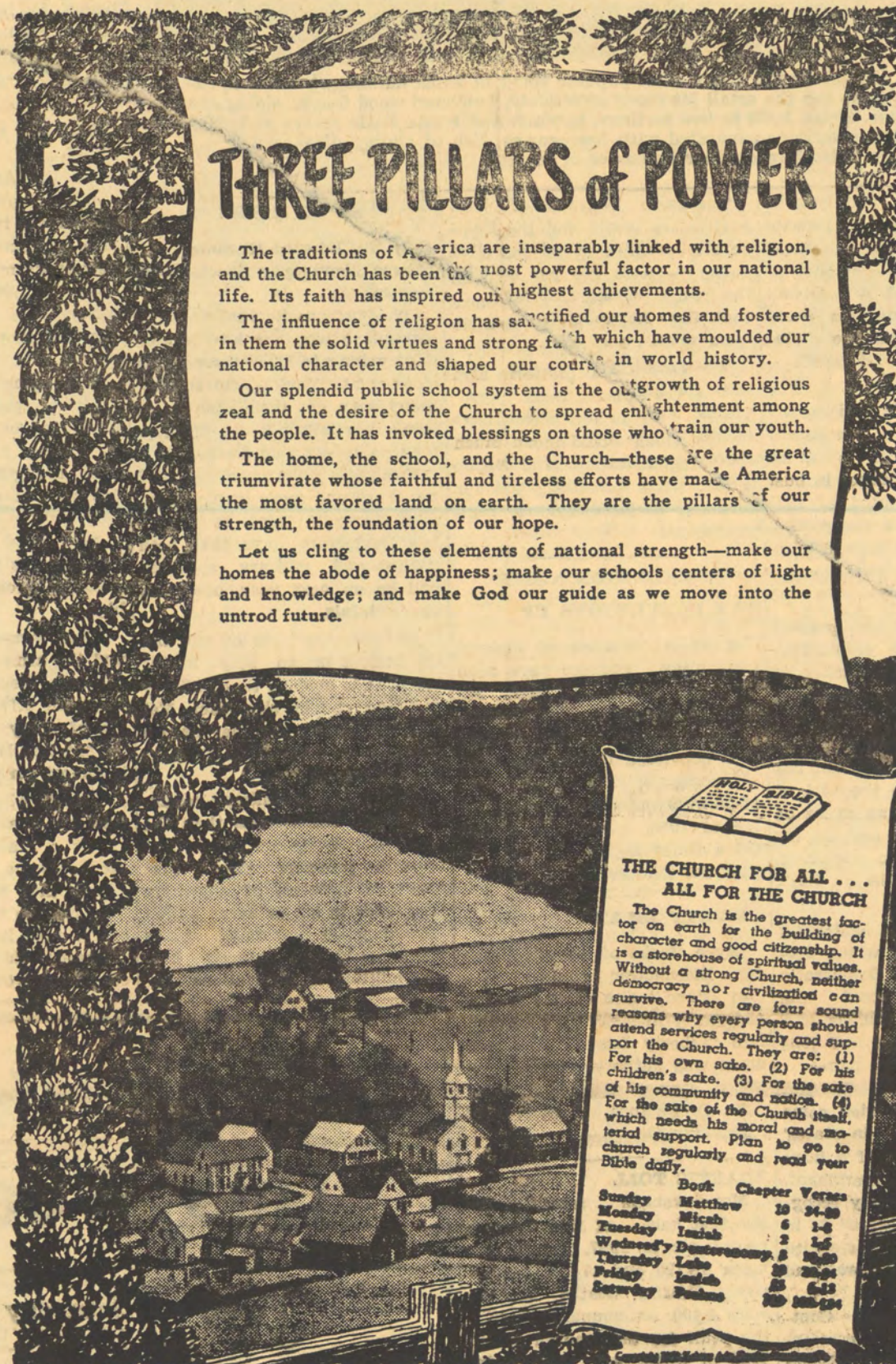

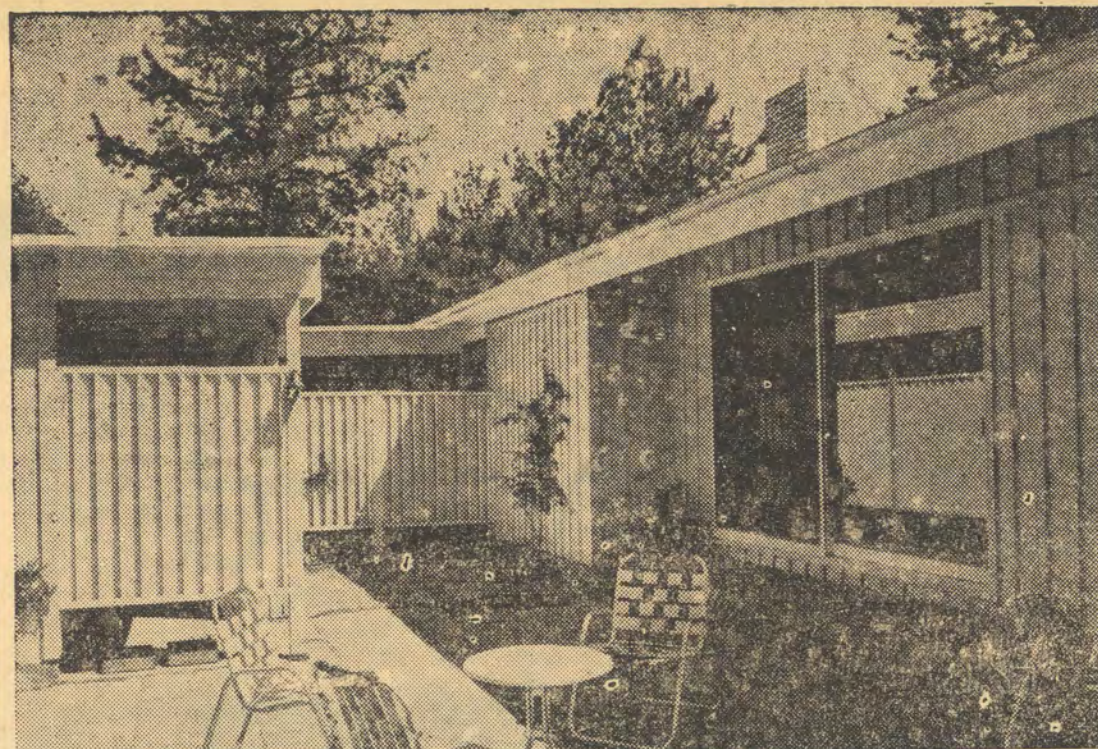

Washington — The Democratic national platform — viewed in the light of potential results — is regarded by Washington politicians as being considerably to the left of the platform written by the Republicans.

This estimate is made in the light of the fact that both platforms — conforming to custom — made extraordinary promises to the voters. The platform-writers evidently were conscious of pressure groups which seek constantly to tap the federal treasury.

But the Republican platform-makers appeared to be seeking to buttress their document on the rock of private competitive enterprise, fiscal responsibility, and more state and private assumption of welfare duties.

The Democratic platform, to a considerable extent, repeats the Truman "Welfare state" program of 1948 — much of which was rejected by a Democratic-controlled Congress — and submissively accepts the dictation of the labor "bosses."

BUSINESS POLICY — The Republican platform said "sound economic policies" of the Eisenhower Administration created an atmosphere of confidence in business which contributed to record prosperity — a recognition that a fair attitude toward business is a prime necessity for the good of the country.

The Republican platform, on the other hand, charges that the Republicans became the tool of business — became an agent of special privilege — and, in effect, the Democratic document promised to put curbs on business.

Instead of merely endorsing government policies which foster prosperity, the Democratic platform-makers endorsed the "full employment" principle of a government guarantee of jobs for all at satisfactory wages.

STATES' RIGHTS — The Republican platform carried some hope for believers in states' rights and opponents of a huge centralized federal government.

The Democrats merely recognized "honest differences" as to the true location of the constitutional line between federal and states' rights.

Advocates of Hoover Commission proposals found comfort in an endorsement in the Republican platform. Similarly, it had kind words for the Kestbaum Commission report on federal-state relations.

The Republican platform included a positive declaration for discontinuance of business-type activities of the government which compete with private enterprise. On the other hand, the Democratic platform did not contain such a fervent promise — which may be traced to the fact that several members of the platform committee, while in Congress, opposed legislation to disperse with business type activities.

SPENDING — Both platforms call for numerous federal activities which would entail heavy spending, such as federal aid to education, legislation for so-called depressed areas and expanded health services.

But the Democrats outpromised the Republicans and went far toward the "welfare state" conception so earnestly advocated by some "Fair Dealers" in Congress.

The farm programs of both parties are costly, but the Democratic promise of 90 per cent parity — with 100 per cent as the goal — would cost far more than the Republican flexible farm plan.

The Democratic platform also calls for numerous farm programs, such as production payments, which would mean much more regimentation. The Republicans, while promising aid for farmers, declared against regimentation.

WASHINGTON NOTES

TAX CONVICTIONS UP

A record number of Federal income-tax dodgers have been convicted so far this year, according to the Justice Department. A high of 445 tax evaders was convicted during the first six months of 1956 — an increase of 56 over the corresponding period of 1955, and was almost three times higher than in the first six months of 1952.

LIBERTY ISLAND

By a stroke of his pen President Eisenhower channeled "Bedloes Island," site of the Statue of Liberty in New York Harbor, into "Liberty Island." The new name was authorized in a resolution sponsored by Senator John O. Pastore, Democrat of Rhode Island.

TRAFFIC TOLL

Motor vehicle fatalities for the first half of 1956 broke a record set in 1937, the figures being 18,120 and 17,320, respectively. Traffic deaths in June were 3,400, as compared with the peak for the month set in 1952 of 3,119. An average increase of 7 per cent in deaths was reported by cities, while the nationwide jump was 14 per cent.

NEW NATIONAL PARK

Two-thirds of the 19-square-mile island of St. John in the Virgin Islands group in the Caribbean, became the twenty-ninth national park recently when President Eisenhower signed a bill creating the park. Gleaming white sand beaches and a semi-tropical climate, which encourage bathing and fishing, are among the distinctive features of the park area.

ICEBOX LOCK BILL

A new law designed to save children from being trapped and suffocated while playing in old refrigerators was recently signed by President Eisenhower. The bill bans interstate shipment of any household refrigerator that is not equipped with a door that can be opened easily from the inside. The ban is effective with in two years.

While the country was \$2,000, 000,000 in the black this year this surplus, even if next year's tax collections are higher than this year, will not provide the extra money needed by the Administration next year.

And tax collections might not be higher if tax rates are cut. So President Eisenhower and his colleagues may wind up looking for three or four billion dollars to keep the books from being marked up in red for the fourth time in five years come next spring.

There are other things which support the prospect that U. S. troops overseas might be drastically reduced. The Army, for example, is working out a plan to field combat teams built around modern atomic weapons.

The Army isn't calling these teams, or battle groups, companies, regiments, etc. It is calling them task groups and they use about half the manpower, to accomplish the same job, or a bigger job, than today's ground forces.

So the Army could actually reduce its ground power, or even increase it, in Europe and reduce the number of troops. This new program is the basis for rumors all over European Army camps that half of all Americans in Europe will be sent home in the next twelve months.

The other two services are following the Army plan, in principle, as far as possible. Because military appropriations are going up next year, but not as much as military leaders have requested, there seems a very good chance that manpower totals will be reduced, especially abroad, where costs are high.

New weapons are expensive and the armed services want all of them they can get. Because they are effective, and do the job of many soldiers, the trend toward smaller manpower totals is almost certain.

This is what Admiral Arthur Radford, chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, meant when he shocked some people recently by saying that this country would soon be able to reduce the number of men it kept under arms. Radford did not mean the United States would reduce the ef-

fectiveness or firepower of the military. Rather, that will in the next year or two — in line with the modern military program about to take effect.
