Jacks Outlast Dragons In Defensive Battle

Ervin DuBose's Lumberjacks clung to their theory that they can win any ball game in which they can hold their opponent to six points here Friday night as they flashed across a quick TD in the first quarter, then manned the barricades for three more quarters to outlast a light but scrappy team of Dragons from Shelbyville.

Dude Courtney took a pitch out on his own thirty and circled his left end. Behind good blocking he found running room to the fifty, then cut back to midfield and outran the Dragon secondary for fifty more yards for the only touchdown of the game. The play came with the game only five minutes old, but only after a 45-yard Jack drive had ended on the Dragon 15 earlier.

A 40-yard punt return by Grimes was called back on an offside infraction only minutes before the long trip by Courtney. The 70-yard run was Courtney's second such run in two weeks. He traveled 63 yards against Chester to set up a TD last week. He left the game Friday with a leg injury in the 4th quarter.

The Dragons lived up to expectations as a defensive unit after the long scamper. Donald Capps was the only consistent ground gainer for the Jacks after that. The big fullback bulldozed his way for several good gains. The Dragon's Goodson and Bevens teamed up to put a stopper on the fleet Grimes. Time after time the little halfback was hauled in behind the scrimmage line before he could clear his blockers and move into the secondary. Grimes' left foot was

badly bruised although he finished the game. During the waning minutes of the third and all of the fourth quarters, the Dragons were at the Big Red door of the Lumberjack forward wall. That door was opened for them several times, moving them to the local light with five minutes in the game. They were never pushed back farther than the 18, and were on the 12 when the game ended.

DuBose pitted Robert Rector, Charlie Carr, John Hannah, Vernon Oaks, Carroll Black and Donald Capps against all the Dragons had to offer, however, and these boys capped a Lumberjack defense which fought down the dogged attempts of Devens, Doggett, and Harbison for the Dragons. Devens almost broke loose several times during the fray, but one was overhauled by Robert Rector, 210-pound tackle who defied the flashing halfback's speed to stave off a Dragon TD drive.

Royce Grimes fumbled a snap from center on Diboll's try for the extra point and Hannah finally kicked it wide to the left. The missed point loomed time and again as the deciding factor as the Dragons persistently banged deep into Jack territory. Diboll's only decent pass attempt, by Claude Welch, was intercepted as it was thrown from a spread formation and returned to the Jack 30 where an enemy drive fizzled out.

First downs were at a minimum with Shelbyville outscoring Diboll 8 to 7. The Jacks netted 182 yards on the ground to 91 for the Dragons, who also collected 60 yards through the air.

Little "D"

The big day is over at last. And to most of the 100 committeemen and dozens of others who volunteered their services, the fact that it is over comes as a rather pleasant repose in some respects.

As we said last week, it takes a lot of hard work to get together such a parade as was seen here Saturday, as well as arrange for various and sundry other phases of festivity.

We could name many who worked diligently in preparing their specified duties. In fact, everyone did a commendable job in mapping out and executing the biggest celebration ever seen in Diboll. And for that, we could sum it all up by saying that Horace Stubblefield did an excellent job of picking his committeemen and of giving them definite instructions.

A lot of money has gone into the Youth Building Fund as a result of this hard work, and that, after all, is the objective of the big day anyway. If Diboll Day couldn't help our school age children, no amount of publicity or success could make it really constructive for the town.

We can't throw enough praise to many who worked for D-Day, so we won't try and can therefore (I hope) keep from hurting anyone's feelings.

All of us though owe a vote of thanks to Dan Fenley, the Sheriff's Dept., and Highway Patrol for a wonderful job of traffic direction Saturday. We should all be thankful that we were able to have so many people in cars, going the same way, trying to get them on time with the end result of no accidents. Dan said not even a fender was scratched that he knew of, and I'm even more proud that not one of the hundreds of kids running wild during the day didn't get in front of an auto.

We would find it a tough row to hoe, indeed, if we had to do without our law enforcement agencies.

I'm sure Arthur Temple's gift of the portable TV to Mrs. Farrington was one of the highlights of the day for all of you as it was for me.

Since it happened the way it did, I for one wouldn't have had the drawing go any other way.

Village Furniture's gift of the Philco TV to the Boosters might induce other merchants to do the same with other merchandise at our next Diboll Day. The \$159.00 set was a beauty and doubtless sold many tickets along with the sleek Riviera boat.

Although Diboll's Lumberjacks have probably already drawn as many fans this year as during the entire campaign last year the paying customers have yet to see either of the scoreboard clocks in operation at the three home games. It's regrettable of course, but school officials seem to be doing all possible to get the big clock and scoreboard repaired. Perhaps we will see it in operation tomorrow if the repaired parts return in time from Illinois.

Apologies are in order to Robert Rector, Bobby Glover, and John Hannah, whose pictures did not appear on the football page last week. Discovery of their photos has not yet been made. When we find 'em, we'll run 'em.

Biggest Crowd In History Sees Diboll Day Close Out 'Better Than Ever' Sat.

The Diboll Booster Club staged the largest and most successful Diboll Day in its four year history here last Saturday as this once dormant sawmill community blossomed into a city of its own amid the cheers of Homecoming residents on this big day of celebration.

Saturday night, Horace Stubblefield wrote off the celebration as the 'best yet'. Weary but happy with the outcome of things Dibollians and their visiting friends agreed.

No less than 8,500 people lined the streets of Diboll Saturday to watch the biggest and most colorful parade in this city's history and later jam their way to the Community Park to take part in an almost endless number of activities. The day of the homecoming and celebration began at 10 a.m. with the parade and ended at 4 p.m. with the drawing for a \$1600 fishing boat.

The 19-band parade was interspersed with novelties, bicycles, commercial, civic and industrial floats, and a magnificent array of horses. Ending almost an hour after it started, the parade broke up at the high school and the majority of the crowd moved to the Community Park.

There an address was heard by Martin Dies, Congressman-At-Large. Mr. Dies presented Miss Billie Jean Clark as Diboll Day Queen, following a reading of the final standings by Horace Stubblefield. Approximately \$5,000 was taken in on the queen's contest which included sales of boat and barbecue tickets.

Observers at the park saw trophies presented to the Doctor's Office for their float on the Future Nurses of America; to Anthony Page for best bicycle; to Merschel M. Payne for best novelty; to First Methodist Church for best decorated car; and to Bonnie Hunt as the best horseman.

Senator Daniel's Successor Should Represent Majority

Now that he has won the nomination for governor (and with it the governor's office) U. S. Senator Price Daniel and the Texas Democratic Party are faced with the problem of how he is to give up his seat in the Senate with some semblance of gracefulness that will at the same time protect the party's traditional hold on that office.

The one major point in the public interest is that the next junior senator from Texas shall be named by a majority of the voters rather than by a minority number of voters.

It is certainly possible, even probable, that a "sudden death" election in which the candidate with the most votes wins would see a senator installed with much less than 50 per cent of the total vote. The democratic principle of self government rests solidly upon the proposition that the majority would probably prevail.

That fact makes a special Democratic primary for the senate more necessary despite the high cost for such an election. The Secretary of State has ruled that such special primary is legal; some students argue that such a special primary is mandatory under the language of the law.

Texas Democrats, understandably, have a selfish interest in a primary. They face the real threat of losing the seat to the Republican party and with such a loss could very well go Democratic majority in the U. S. Senate. The last Congress was organized by the Democrats with a single vote majority. The Democrats could lose control of Congress by a single vote and that vote could very easily be a Texas senator's vote.

A way out of this tight squeeze is to hold the primary on Nov. 6 (general election day,) the run-off if it be needed, on November 13 when there is a constitutional amendment elec-

tion slated anyway, and the special election early in December.

This plan eliminates special election dates for the primaries and ensures widespread voter participation because the dates are election days already. Further, the December special election between a Democrat and Republican candidate would give clear choices to the voter.

The Nov. 13 election is to authorize the Legislature to give public assistance to mentally or physically handicapped persons. The date was set by a Legislative error in calling the election. Thus, cost to the Democratic organization will be negligible if party leaders can be persuaded to rally to their organization and serve on that day without pay.

The only weakness in this plan would be the time element in event a run-off is needed. Cooperation by local officials and a quick tabulation could prevent any complications in this regard.

The only argument we are interested in is that a majority of the voters shall be represented in the final selection of a senator.

We strongly urge the Democratic party in Texas to give this plan serious consideration. We appeal to the party's leaders to lend a hand in the interest of patriotic service and help the election costs moderate. We believe this is a workable plan and we know it is a fair one.

Adlai Stevenson, Democratic Presidential nominee, has said that the draft should be ended as soon as possible. Stevenson, it is assumed, would move to abandon the draft as quickly as possible if he were elected president.

It would be irresponsible for this country to end the draft until it had an adequate compulsory reserve training program, which the country does not now have, even though such a program was presented to the 84th Congress. At its first session, the Eighty-Fourth Congress watered down the reserve training program and passed it in greatly weakened form.

Since that time the reserve program has produced a number of volunteers, who have been trained in the six months training program of the Army, with considerable success. However, the number of these volunteers is as yet not sufficient to con-

stitute justification for ending the draft.

We believe Stevenson may gain votes by his statement, though we cannot agree with the Democratic nominee on the soundness of his proposal.

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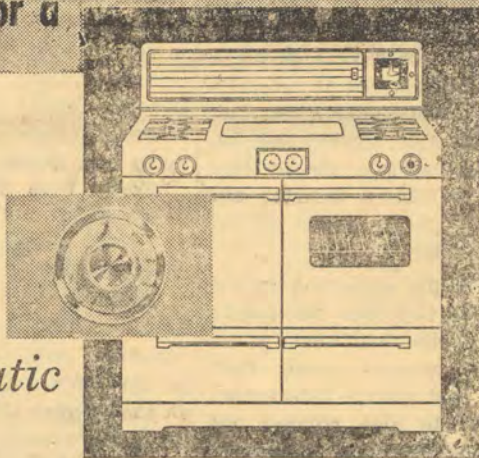

That's why I still like Ike—better than ever!

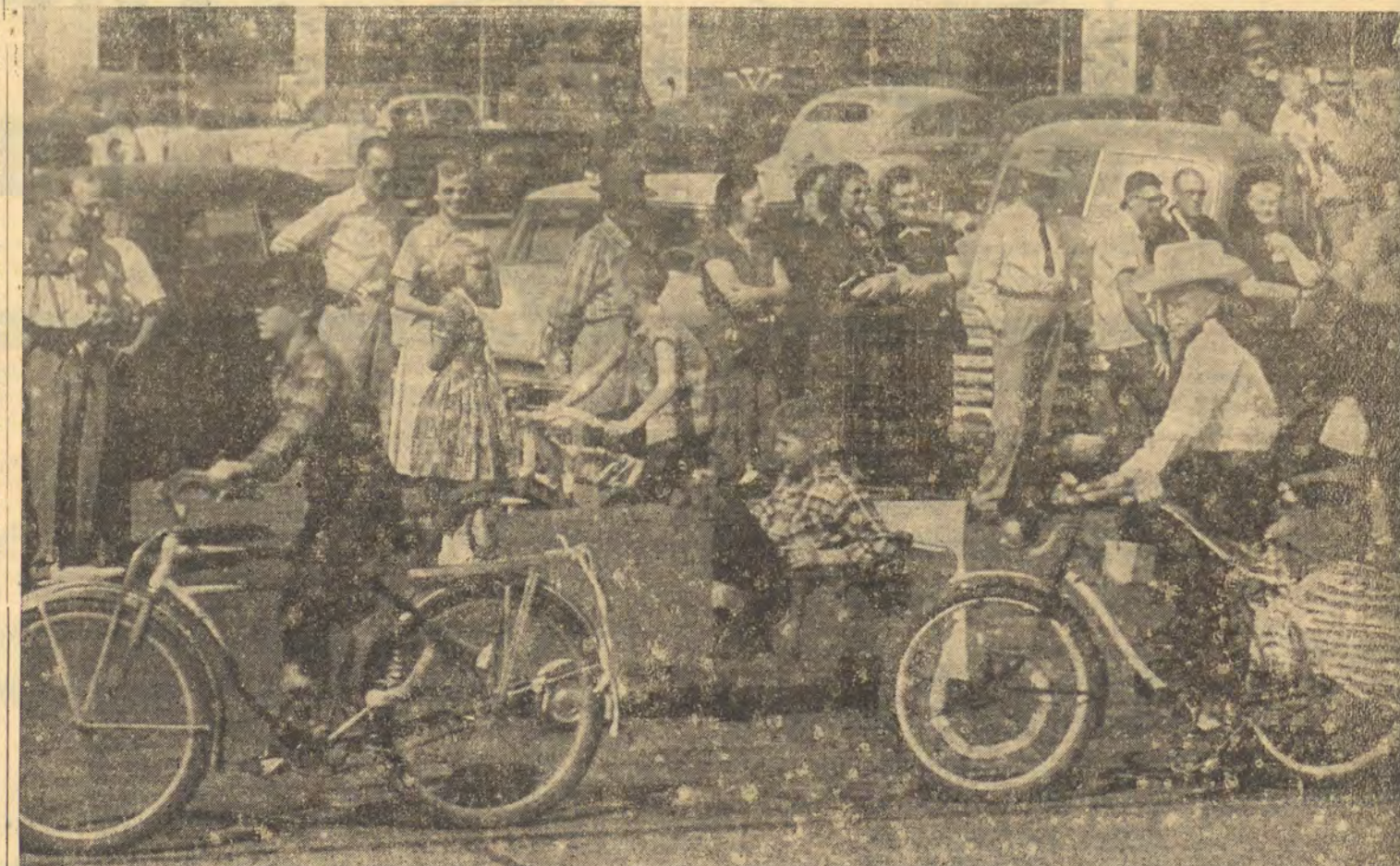

Rural Voters Overwhelmingly Support Will Wilson for Attorney General

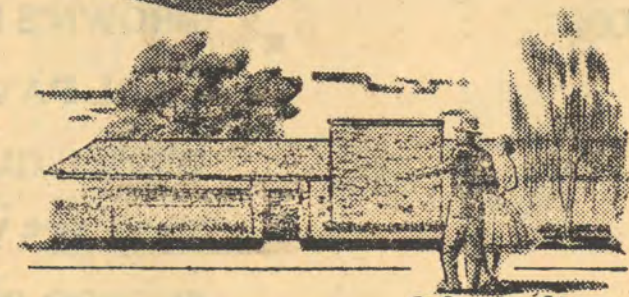

St. Louis Doc Has A Remedy For Headache

Dr. Robert E. Ryan, of St. Louis, Mo., reminds us that the beautiful Fall weather we are already having in some sections of the country is the cause of headaches for a number of people — although they are unaware of it.

In an article in Medical Times Dr. Ryan points out that a number of people have an unusual sensitivity to temperature change in the form of a physical ail-

gy. Such people are also sensitive to air - conditioning or drafts, and sudden changes in humidity and atmospheric pressure may also cause them discomfort.

Dr. Ryan says the cause of this physical allergy is a spasm-like disturbance in the small blood vessels of the head muscles. There are several ways to combat this physical allergy, and Dr. Ryan suggests a combination of two drugs.

One of the drugs recommended is nicotinic acid, which dilates the small constricted blood vessels in the head muscles, and thus prevents the allergy. The other drug is mephenesin, a muscle relaxant.

This drug gives relief from the tension-pain of the attack, and Dr. Ryan has found that the combination gives both a preventive and a symptomatic relief in seventy-five per cent of the sixty patients he had treated. Other remedies might include a muscle stimulant, wet heat, massage, or anything that will increase the blood flow through musculature of the head.

Kitchen Decorators Use These Rules

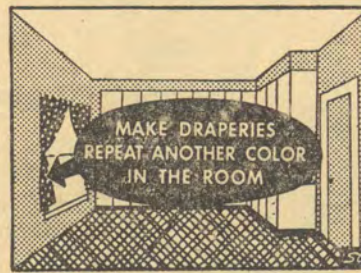
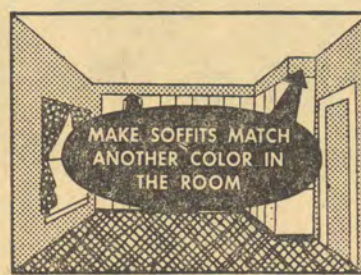
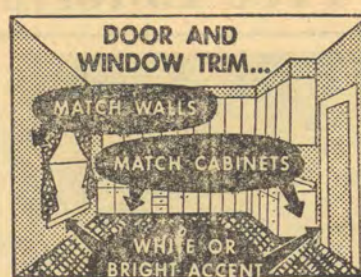
It's easy to color-decorate your kitchen like a professional. Just follow these simple rules used by leading decorators and compiled by the Youngstown Kitchens Planning Institute:

For your steel kitchen cabinets, choose what decorators call "earth" colors—a soft white, a clean, dawn yellow, a meridian blue, or a sunset copper shade. These are colors found in nature, colors that harmonize with almost all others. Do not use "faddish" colors. They become tiresome and rapidly go out of style.

Choose the basic room color to suit your taste, avoiding dark shades. This color goes on your walls and sets the room tone. Here, a faddish color may be used, because wall repainting is simple. White is almost always best for ceilings.

To achieve over-all harmony, follow the rules illustrated at right. Door and window trim can match wall color, cabinet color, or can be painted an accent tone. Soffits should usually match ceiling or wall color. With very low ceilings, soffits can match wall cabinets. Draperies should repeat another color in the room. Floor coverings should be neutral and repeat a major room color in the pattern.

Professionals sometimes break these rules, but faithfully following them will always give you an attractive kitchen.

Christians Are Devoted To Restoration Of New Testament Christianity

The Church of Christ Speaks

Paul's first convert, to Christ at Philippi was a business woman named Lydia. She was a "seller of purple" a cloth so desirable for the proud Roman citizens that made up the bulk of Philippi's population. Her home had been the city of Thyatira in Asia Minor, a place noted for the production of purple dye cloth used by royalty and the very rich Romans. In carrying on her business she had gathered about her a group of helpers that comprised her "household" and these women joined with her in her worship of the one true and living God. Whether Lydia was a Jewess or a proselyte, she was faithful in observing the Sabbath, meeting regularly with her women out by the river side to pray. Philippi was a Roman colony so had no synagogue, but this fact did not prevent Lydia from faithful service to God according to the law of Moses.

Divine Providence was directing the preacher with the saving message to Lydia in Philippi. At Troas Paul saw the vision of a man standing on the shores of Macedonia across the sea and saying, "Come over into Macedonia and help us."

Every evidence points to the fact that God was directing the preacher with the message to the sincere persons needing the saving message. God uses men in presenting the gospel, the power to save, to lost men.

Paul taught this sincere woman and her companions by the side of the river. The Bible says concerning her that the Lord opened her heart to give heed to what Paul spoke. Luke uses this same expression in Luke 24:32, 45 with the same meaning. It does not teach that God had to work some miraculous power over her before she could hear what Paul taught. To open the heart is to arouse within one the desire to learn.

While stating that she "attended" or "gave heed" to the things spoken by Paul, it does not mention specifically that she believed, or that she repented, or that she confessed her faith in Christ as the Son of God. The only act of obedience recorded is that she was baptized in obedience to Christ's command. Yet this is not to say that because faith, repentance and confession are not specifically mentioned, one can be saved from sin by baptism alone. Her baptism was the culminating act of obedience to the gospel that made her a Christian and it presupposes that she had believed, repented of her sins, and had confessed her faith in Christ. This is an important

point to remember when studying New Testament conversion: Not every step of the gospel plan of salvation has to be repeated in so many words in connection with every case of conversion.

The household baptism here mentioned are used by some religious groups to justify infant baptism. However, a "household" is not synonymous with infants, for you can have a household without infants. To illustrate, in the New Testament four households are mentioned in cases of conversions: Cornelius; the Philippians; Stephanas; and Lydia. Cornelius' household contained no infants because all spoke in miraculous tongues and gloried God (Acts 10:46.) The jailor's household included no six more in the Army.

infants because his entire household believed in God, being obedient to exercise faith: (Acts 16:34.) Stephanas' household baptized by Paul (1 Corinthians 16:16) contained no infants because they had distinguished themselves in ministering to the saints (1 Corinthians 16:15.) In the light of these cases we should not try to make Lydia's household include infants that could not listen, give heed to the words spoken by Paul, nor obey the gospel.

May the example of this godly business woman encourage many other capable business women in our modern age to turn to Christ and obey the gospel that they might rejoice in the new-found peace Christ alone can give.

FIGHTING: DOG vs. DOG

In the long ago, dogs roamed wide regions, much like wolves, in search of food. Very often two or more of the wild animals would square off in a fight to the finish. And so today's dogs, although tamed and accustomed to the ways of humans, often fight other dogs through instinct, fear, jealousy and just plain bad temper.

Regardless of why they do it, the important thing is to stop them. And the first thing to re-

member about stopping a dog fight is to never reach for the collar of either dog. You're almost certain to be bitten.

Instead, catch hold of a hind leg or tail of the more aggressive animal and pull. If you're strong enough, lift the dog off the ground and throw him as far as you can. Then scold the dog, using a loud, severe tone that demands attention.

If you're walking your dog on a leash and he gets into a scrap with a stray, hold him up by the collar with his front feet off the ground until he quiets down. This works even better with a chain "choke" collar.

Sometimes your dog may bark at other dogs in yards. Walk him on your left side with the leash in your right hand and with about 10 inches of free leash. Every time he barks and indicates wanting to fight another dog slap him smartly on the nose with the leash. The blows won't injure him and they will cure him of this bad habit.

Sometimes a dog shows a tendency to be unusually ferocious toward one particular dog in the neighborhood. Occasionally this great canine dislike can erupt into a bitter fight. One suggestion to get dogs to "make up" is to put them in an enclosed area with muzzles on. The physical damage each dog can do will be minimized, and after a few such meetings their dislike may be remedied.

Feeding Tip: Protein is used primarily in building body muscle and tissue cells while fats and carbohydrates (cereals) supply most of the energy. A high-quality commercial dog food, such as Friskies, supplies between 20 and 25 per cent protein mixtures providing excellent nutrition for your pet.

Postmaster Hines
Stresses Traffic
Safety After Dark

"Beware of the darkness in nighttime driving and walking - it hides danger."

That was the warning issued local postal employees by Postmaster Hines in the safety-after dark traffic safety program now being conducted by the Post Office Department and the National Safety Council.

"The hours of twilight and dark bring danger on our roads and highways, not only to motorists but also to pedestrians," he said.

Pointing out that the National Safety Council estimates that the millage death rate in an average year is three times as great at night as in the daylight hours, Postmaster Hines said that 56 per cent of the traffic deaths in 1955 occurred at night.

"The hours particularly fatal are from 5 p. m. to 8 p. m., when people are rushing homeward from work, tired, fretful and impatient, and then out again later for some appointment at which they always seem to be late."

The answer? Postmaster Hines says there are several right answers to the question of night traffic hazards and all of them simple but effective.

"One of the answers is good walking habits, an alertness and caution in crossing the street," he said. "Another one is good driving habits - driving carefully to offset the poor vision brought on by twilight and darkness and keeping a sharp lookout for pedestrians and children on bikes as well as for other cars."

Postmaster Hines particularly stressed the fact that night traffic hazards also claim their part of young bike riders, who fail to equip their bikes with a good headlight and tail lights or reflectors, plus making them more visible to motorists by trimming them with white or reflectorized material.
