Little "D"

Readers will notice in this issue a legal notice naming Nov. 14 as the date which will find the Angelina County Commissioner's Court reviewing the application for the Angelina Water Conservation District Number Two. What the notice boils down to is that home and land owners in Diboll have signed a petition granting rights for a dam to be constructed on Cedar Creek, a tributary of the Neches River. Estimated cost of the project says the notice, will be approximately 2 1/2 million.

This move not only will strengthen Diboll's public water resources but will make possible further industrial expansion, as the insulation board plant, now under construction.

We have noticed several road improvement projects underway in this part of the county, primarily to the old Diboll highway. Thus far, small gravel and asphalt has been added to the old highway from a point about five miles south of Lufkin down to Burke. Several carloads of gravel have been stockpiled at Burke, indicating that our commissioner plans to extend the improvement another 1000 feet or so toward Diboll.

The old Diboll highway and the road which winds from Southern Pine's Treating Division around behind the mill have always been maintained by the County. At any rate, we are wondering if the improvement program is scheduled to stretch as far as Loop 210 here in town. The old highway, from the old picture show site on Loop 210 to a point just a few hundred yards this side of Burke is badly in need of repair. The old road, immediately abandoned as the new Highway 59 was constructed, is now being used by more and more folks who want to elude fast traffic on the new highway.

Several Burke residents report that the new gravel and asphalt improvement will continue from Burke to Diboll, although we have had no word of this from our commissioner.

It is a known fact that Johnny Stubblefield did a lot for Diboll and other nearby communities with his road improvement program, although citizens in the area gave the challenger Calvin Poulard a 2 to 1 margin in the last election.

Mr. Stubblefield still has his many friends in this area, though a lot of those friends voted for Mr. Poulard, obviously with the idea of giving a young man a chance at the job.

We hope the young prove as adept as the old in giving lower county residents a decent network of roads.

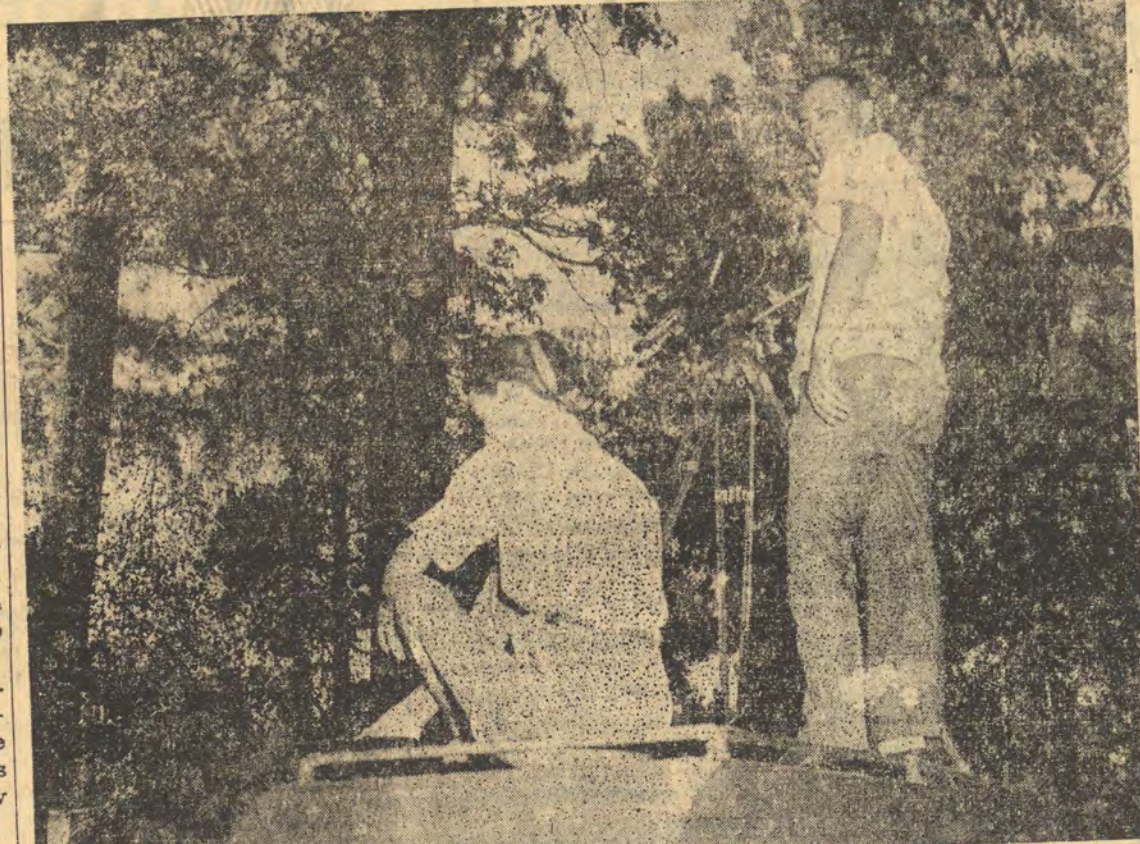

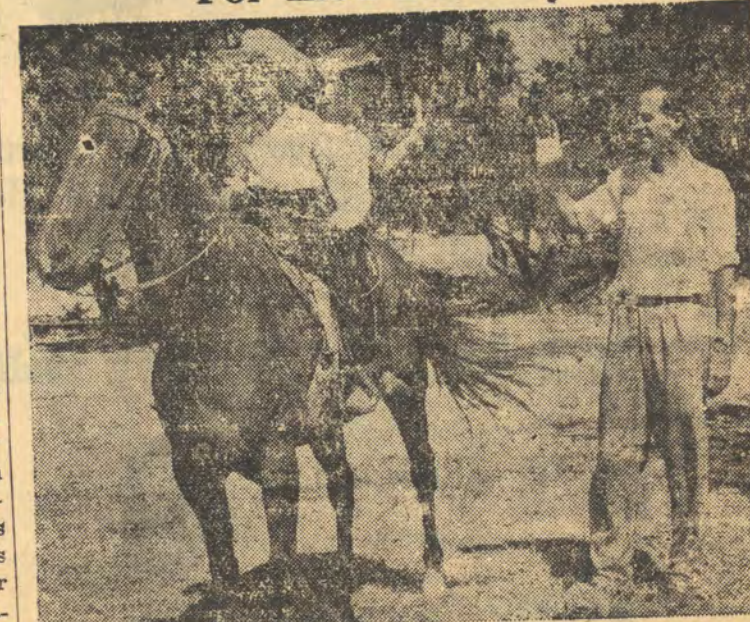
We stick with Diboll tomorrow again, and brashly pick them over Cushing by two touchdowns. Diboll 20, Cushing 6.

Ips Pine Beetle Reported In East Texas Lbr. Area

An outbreak of Ips pine beetles has been reported in Liberty, Hardin, Tyler, Polk and San Jacinto counties and may be present throughout the whole East Texas area, Don Young, head of Forest Management Department, Texas Forest Service at College Station has reported. "Timber land owners in East Texas are urged to check their forest areas for possible attacks of Ips beetles. The trees attacked by the Ips should be immediately removed from the stand in order to prevent the insects spreading and killing other trees," Young said.

"Normally working in weak-end or dying trees, the small, barrel shaped, tan to reddish insects have been able to attack many trees which have had their resistance lowered by the drought and forest wildfires.

"If the crown color of the pine has changed and there are white or reddish brown pitch tubes on the trunk of the tree, it is very likely that the Ips beetle is present," Young stated.

"However, as the pitch tubes may not be evident as a result of the drought or fire, a thorough search should be made for reddish boring dust on bark crevices, spider webs, and on the ground at the foot of the tree," Young added.

The Ips beetle enters the tree and deposits its eggs. White grubs hatch from the egg. When fully developed they transform into beetles, chew exit-holes in the bark, and fly to attack other trees."

The Ips beetle could be present in Angelina County, though no proof has yet been reported.

Pulp Industry

Temple Associates Now Laying Foundations For Pulp Digestors

Elwyn Jones, vice-president of Temple Associates Contractors, said today that concrete foundations for the pulp digestors in the pulp mill are now being formed and placed in position at the local Temple Fiberboard plant site. Temple Associates, whose home offices are here in Diboll, will do all construction work on the 4-million plant.

Slight delays in some points of construction on the big plant have been unavoidable due to the lack of completed blueprints, Mr. Jones said. Full scale construction must now await proper foundation work on the pulp digestors, he said. If rapid delivery on all machinery is made, the pulp mill portion of the plant should be in operation by March 1, 1957. The fiberboard process will probably not swing into production until the latter part of next year, some 12 to 15 mos. from now.

Plans tentatively approved for the ultra-modern plant call for a 140x840 foot building with the overall height ranging from 20 feet to 50 feet. The mammoth building will nestle in the boundaries of a 12 acre plot, located just a few hundred yards north of the mill ponds and across from Southern Pine's sawmill site.

A modern office building has been occupied by engineers working on the project. Finishing touches will be made to the offices at a later date.

Jones also revealed that Temple Associates has begun construction on an office building for Temple Manufacturing Company in Dallas, large-scale manufacturers of beverage cases.

The building will incorporate about 3,000 feet of floor space, Jones said.

3 SWC Games To Be Aired

A live telecast and broadcast of three Southwest Conference football games will be sponsored Saturday by Humble Oil and Refining Co. Lufkin's KTRE-TV will apparently not carry the SMU-Rice game Saturday night, but KTRE radio will carry the broadcast, beginning at 7:50 p.m.

The Texas and Arkansas game from Austin will be broadcast by Bob Walker and Dave Smith over KRBA, 1340, in Lufkin, beginning at 7:50 p.m. Saturday.

Jacks Invade Cushing Friday Night; Four Wins May Mean Chance At District

Coach Ervin DuBose will move his Lumberjacks to Cushing tomorrow afternoon for a 7:30 district tilt. The contest will be the second district game for Diboll, who stank 0-1 after their 20-13 setback by Garrison.

The locals will enter the game Friday night with new vim and vigor, however, since they learned of the edgy 7-6 victory Timpon hung on the Bulldogs last week, Garrison now has a 1-1 record in district play, while the Timpon team struts as the leader with a 2-0 mark. They downed Hemphill 15-6 for their other conquest.

Should Diboll move through their other district games unde-

feated, which must include a victory over Timpon, they will move into a three-way tie for first place with Garrison and Timpon. Garrison cannot afford another defeat and stay in competition, neither can Diboll, and Timpon can stand only one loss.

Corrigan's Bulldogs loom as the giant-killer in District 22. Improving with every game, this arch-rival stands a good chance of beating the more powerful Lumberjacks since the annual game will be played in Corrigan this year.

Coaches DuBose and Young expect to have their charges in physical readiness for Friday's game. Royce Grimes' bruised

foot is improved and the little back is expected to team with runback artist Dude Courtney and line-busting Donald Capps to once again give DuBose his 1-2-3 inside-outside-inside combination for the game. The Diboll mentor has been working the Jacks on pass defense this last week, realizing that after the Garrison game everyone in the district knows Diboll's weak points.

Cushing hasn't shown the team they had last year, although they have won two games. This will probably lessen the pressure on the Lumberjacks, who must win to stay alive.

Diboll shouldn't have so much trouble with Timpon as did the

Garrison team. The aerial-minded Bulldogs threw only a half dozen passes and these by converted fullback Dan McNair.

They were playing without the services of their regular quarterback, Byrd, who reportedly suffered a nervous breakdown and was in Galveston's John Sealy hospital all last week. His loss naturally hurt the Bulldogs and Timpon found the stopper for Buddy Pierce's quick off-tackle slant which worked so well against Diboll. Pierce tried this play for Garrison's extra point last Friday and his failure to make it cost the Bulldogs a tie ball game.

Game time at Cushing Friday night is 7:30.

WIRE NO TEETHING RING.

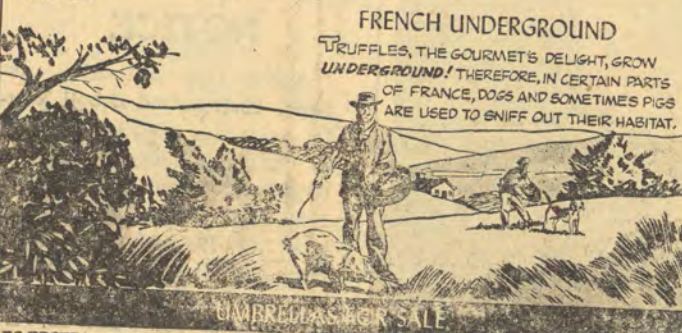

Eleventh of A Series

Christians Are Devoted To Restoration Of New Testament Christianity

The Church of Christ Speaks

After preaching in Macedonia where Lydia and the jailer were converted, Paul finally came to the wicked city of Corinth, the political and commercial capitol of Greece. It was one of the greatest cities of that time. Paul entered it alone with no friends to greet him and without money. The brethren in Macedonia had sent him aid while he was in Thessalonica, but even that must have been used up by the time he began his new work. Fortunately, under God's providential care, he came in contact with two people, Aquilla and Priscilla, of his same trade, tent makers. He went into their home and worked with them (Acts 18: 2,3).

To undertake to evangelize a great city when he had to support himself by humble trade was a tremendous task. Though he was fully aware that Jesus had promised to be with his disciples always, "even unto the end of the world," he felt his own weakness and from words written years later we read, "I was with you in weakness and from words written years later we read, I was with you in weakness and in fear and in much trembling." Though Paul worked at his trade during the week, he preached in the Jewish synagogue on the Sabbath so that he might have the opportunity of presenting the Christ to them. "He reasoned in the synagogue every Sabbath, and persuaded Jews and Greeks." He endeavored to prove that Jesus was the Christ predicted by the old tes-

tament. Some of the Jews took offense and he had to leave the synagogue to preach in the home of Titus Justus. This man was impressed with Paul's message and wanted him to be given the opportunity to preach further. While many opposed and blasphemed, "Crispus, the ruler of the synagogue, believed in the Lord with all of his house; and many of the Corinthians, hearing, believed and were baptized." (Verse 8.) The conversion of Crispus, in the face of such severe opposition Paul's preaching, indicates that he was a man of independence and deeply concerned with his soul. It is most commendable when one has the courage of his conviction to obey Christ when his associates are trying their hardest to hinder his obedience.

But let us look more carefully at the conversion of the Corinthians. It is plainly said that they heard. How important it is to hear. That is the very way faith comes, "So belief cometh of hearing, and hearing by the Word of God" (Romans 10:17.) That Paul preached the Word of God is certain for in writing to the Corinthians long afterwards he said, "And I, brethren, when I came unto you, came not with excellency of speech or of wisdom, proclaiming unto you the testimony of God. For I determined not to know anything among you, save Jesus Christ and him crucified" (I Corinthians 2:1-2.) Likewise in I Corinthians 15:1-4, he gives us a summary of what he preached to

them. "Now I make known unto you, brethren, the gospel which I preached unto you, which also ye received, wherein also ye stand, by which ye are saved, if ye hold fast the word which I preached unto you, except ye believed in vain. For I delivered unto you, first of all that which also I received, that Christ died for our sins according to the Scriptures; that he was buried; and that he hath been raised on the third day according to the Scriptures."

Besides preaching these great facts of the gospel and making known that they could be saved by the death of Jesus for their sins, he told them to appropriate this salvation. This is understood from the results of his preaching and recorded in the words that they "believed and were baptized." While repentance is not specifically mentioned it is clearly implied for it was one of the conditions of salvation and always preceded baptism (Luke 24:46-47) and Acts 2:38.

Though many centuries have passed since the Corinthians were saved, today when men learn that through Christ salvation is found, and then comply with the same law of pardon they will be saved in the same way.

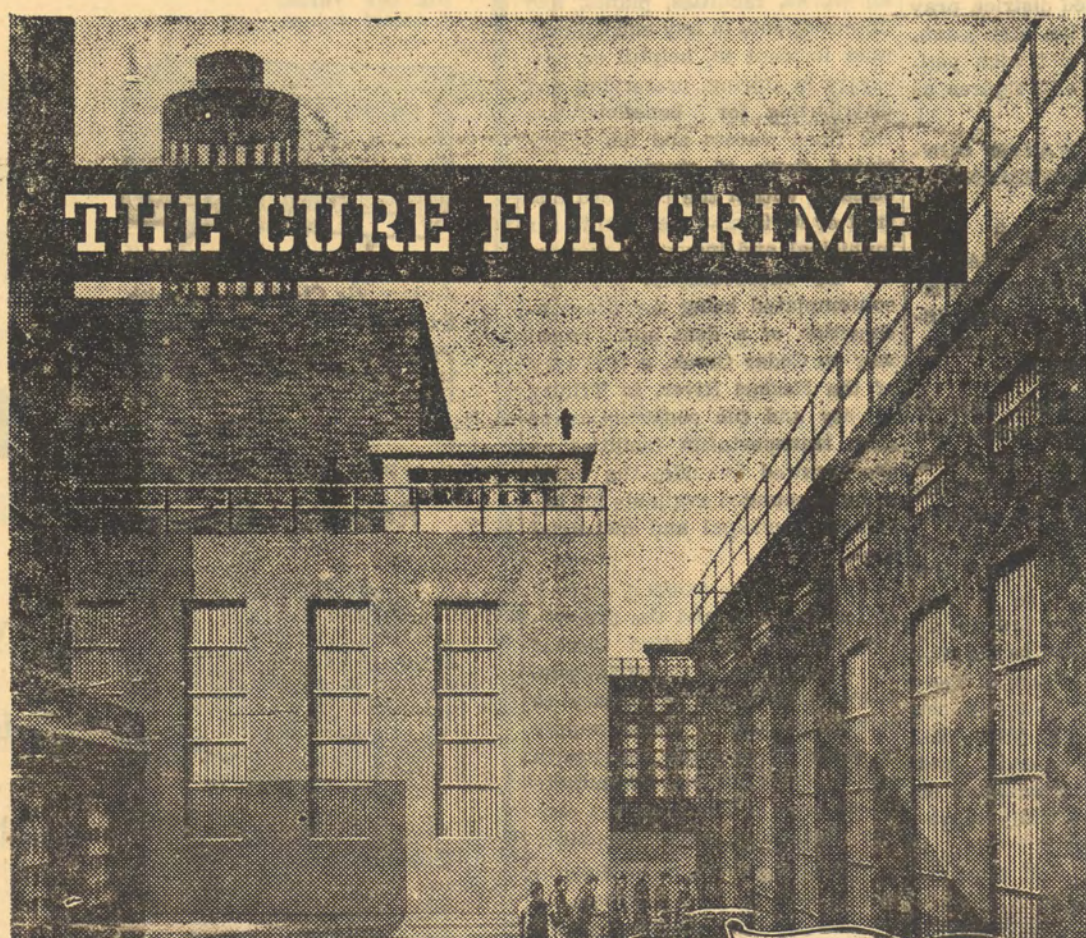

TAKE NOTICE that a petition for the creation of ANGELINA COUNTY WATER CONTROL AND IMPROVEMENT DISTRICT NUMBER TWO has been set down for hearing before the Commissioners' Court of Angelina County in the Courtroom thereof in the Courthouse in the City of Lufkin, Texas, at 10:00 a.m., on the 14th day of November, 1956.

THIS NOTICE is given pursuant to an order duly made and entered by the County Judge of Angelina County on the 11th day of October, 1956, upon a petition signed by more than fifty (50) persons who are land owners within the proposed district, praying for the creation and establishment thereof and which petition is in words and figures as follows, to-wit:

PETITION FOR WATER CONTROL AND IMPROVEMENT DISTRICT

THE STATE OF TEXAS COUNTY OF ANGELINA: TO THE HONORABLE COUNTY JUDGE AND COMMISSIONERS' COURT OF ANGELINA COUNTY, TEXAS:

Being out of and a part of the J. A. Prado League, the Antonio Chevano League, and the J. R. Chevano League, Angelina County, Texas, and being described by metes and bounds as follows:

Beginning at a point in the J. A. Prado League, which point is N 20 W 255 varas from the N W corner of the J. R. Chevano League and the N E Corner of the Antonio Chevano League;

THENCE S 70 W 950.4 Varas to an iron stake for corner;

THENCE S 20 E at 265 varas the N. B. L. of the Antonio Chevano League, at 1,285 varas center-line of the Southern Pacific Railroad R.O.W., at 1,100.8 varas iron stake for corner;

THENCE N 70 E, at 55 varas the center-line of Highway No. 59, R.O.W., at 950.4 varas the

E.B.L. of the Antonio Chevano League and W.B.L. of the J. R. Chevano League, at 1900.8 varas an iron stake for corner; THENCE N 20 W, at 1,635.8 varas the N.B.L. of the J. R. Chevano League, at 1900.8 varas an iron stake for corner; THENCE S 70 W, at 380 varas center-line Highway No. 59 ROW at 690 varas center-line South, ern Pacific Railroad ROW, at 850.4 varas the place of beginning and containing 640 acres of land.

3. That the number of land owners within the boundaries above set forth is more than fifty (50) and accordingly this petition is sufficient if same is signed by more than fifty (50) of such land owners

4. That the general nature of the work to be done and the purpose of the organization include all works, facilities, plants, and improvements in any and all manner incident to, helpful or necessary in storing, preserving and distributing for beneficial use the flood waters and unappropriated flows of rivers and the streams within the proposed district or its immediate vicinity for municipal and industrial purposes; the improvements presently contemplated being for the construction of a dam and reservoir on Cedar Creek, a tributary of the Neches River, in Trinity County and the construction of such transportation facilities as are required to make the water to be impounded available for beneficial municipal and industrial uses.

5. That there exists a necessity for the area and the processing and transportation thereof for municipal and industrial purposes; that it is necessary to provide a surface water supply in order to promote the health and welfare of the inhabitants of the area and to meet the rapidly increasing water demands.

WHEREFORE, your petitioners respectfully pray that this petition be set down for hearing, that a date be set for such hearing, that notice of such hearing be given, that such hearing be held, and that thereupon this petition be in all things granted, and the proposed Water Control and Improvement District be created; that temporary directors of such district be appointed as provided by law; and your Petitioners further pray for all such other and further relief and orders as may be necessary and appropriate in the premises and to which they may be entitled even though herein not specifically mentioned.

Smoking Proves To Provoke Cancer

An official investigation of the American Medical Association has now officially connected heavy smoking with lung cancer. In a recent statement, an official official said that heavy smokers suffered a rate of lung cancer which was twenty-seven times that of non-smokers.

This statement is the latest of many official sources which link

heavy cigarette smoking and lung cancer. It is a statement which cannot be ignored by those who smoke heavily and who are not going to change their habits regardless of medical findings.

The cigarette industry, rather than dispute these claims and rather than attempt to paint a different picture, should certainly put all its efforts on the problem of finding the answer to the connection between cigarette smoking and lung cancer.

In other words, if a new type filter could be produced so that the objectionable elements might be reduced or removed, then the answer would have been found for the cigarette industry.

We realize that the cigarette industry is one of the biggest in the United States, and that any tampering with this industry, in the way of its functioning and prosperity might have major repercussions on the U. S. economy. Nevertheless, the health of the average American must come first, and if heavy cigarette smoking causes lung cancer, then the American people are entitled to know about it and no one should seek to keep the facts from them.

To smokers we suggest they limit their use of cigarettes, in view of many recent findings concerning heavy smoking and lung cancer and we suggest that those who cannot limit themselves to a reasonable number of cigarettes a day, stop smoking altogether.

Washington—Despite the fact that the World Series is the big baseball news of recent days, we can't refrain from looking back on the strange failure of the Milwaukee Braves—who, three games before seasons end, had a tie 2 they could win two, and a pennant if they could win the three.

They were a full game ahead going into that crucial last series and should have emerged with at least a tie. Failing to do so, they unfortunately left the impression that the Milwaukee team doesn't have it in the clutch, and somewhat dimmed the shine of Manager Fred Haney's armor.

The pitcher who cost the Braves the pennant—after getting them in position to win it relatively easily—was Bob Buhl. A terror against the Dodgers until the last of the season, he not only failed against the Dodgers in his last try, but he failed against the St. Louis Cards in his last starting role.

Warren Spahn, the old pro, almost pulled it out for the Braves with a performance over the last six weeks that stood out among Brave hurlers. But Buhl's loss of form could not be overcome. He had been the big guy all year; when he went dead, the Braves did too. That is the story in a nutshell—in spite of the fact that some of the hitters tensed up.

Meanwhile the Dodgers, who tried to lose the pennant by losing three out of four to Pittsburgh in one of their last series, came back with three out of three against the same eager Pirates in the last three games of the year.

Sal Maglie said his victory in this series, a 6-2 triumph, was the toughest of the year. It followed his no-hitter and was the Big Game the Brooks had to win. When Sal won it, the pressure that had been on Brooklyn shifted to the Braves. And the Braves couldn't come through. All they could do was salvage a single game of their last three—that after the pressure was off.

Therefore the writer—and many others—must admit wrong in predicting the Braves would win the pennant. We did the same thing last year, on the strength of their pitching. Last year they flopped early. This year we became converts in mid-season, after the change of managers. Will we ever pick them again?

Admittedly, it will be hard to do. The Braves should have won this year. As early as July, even Brooklyn fans were saying the Bums could never make it again. Sal Maglie was the difference. Junior Gilliam was the key man

at bat. Maybe the Braves will make it next year—but maybe they have missed the boat for a long time.

ON COMPULSORY MILITARY TRAINING

Mothers and those who get faint of heart when thinking about compulsory military training, should keep in mind that, as long as the United States is at peace, their sons will not face the danger, the hardship or the sacrifices which millions of Americans have already faced in many wars in the history of this country, in undergoing military

training.

The results obtained from the Reserve Forces Bill, passed by the Eighty-fourth Congress have not been impressive. That is, while the product turned out has been highly acceptable, not enough youngsters in the 18-year old bracket have joined in the program to make it adequate for the nation's defense needs.

It, and especially the trials of the infantrymen on the ground

during the winter of that war and in the areas of the Pacific should be considered realistically by every American parent. If he is to avoid this sort of thing he must agree to allow his son to be given the training which will equip him for hazardous duty in future emergencies.

The nation needs an adequate military reserve. It is not getting it under the Federal Reserve

program. If another war occurs, the same veterans who fought World War II and the war in Korea will have to be called again. This would not be a national scandal and disgrace, but it would shake the very roots of faith of many in this country.

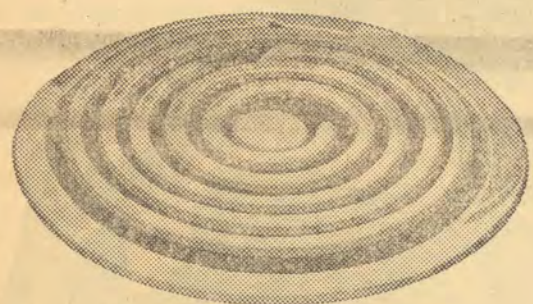

Tight Money Market

Soft Spots In Business Must Be Patched By Administration

Despite all the statistics from Washington about a record national gross product, record personal income, record business spending for new plants and equipment, and a record number of people working, there are definite soft spots in the economy, which the Republican Administration would do well to take care of in the very near future.

The Republican Administration has attempted to check inflationary pressures by raising

the interest rate for Federal Reserve banks and this has, in turn, raised interest rates for almost everyone. The result is what financiers call "a tight money market".

The tight money market is hard on the small business man, and many such business men may find themselves unable to borrow the funds they need and therefore some of them are having to go out of business. In fact, business failures have been running at a record level recently.

At the same time, consumer credit has reached a total of over \$37,000,000,000 and this—as measured as of July, 1956—represents an increase of almost 5 million dollars in a year. There has been a dip in the construction of new dwelling units despite predictions that this year would constitute a record year in this field. Heavy industrial and public building has offset this decline somewhat.

Despite the fact that farm prices appear to be moving up once again early this year, they dropped again in midsummer, and there is no doubt but that farmers are in a squeeze. The automobile industry and the equipment industry are also in a squeeze.

In addition, there is a softness in the lumber industry, the appliance industry and in the textile industry. These factors cannot be overlooked by President Eisenhower, or the Republican Administration, or a Democratic Administration—it is elected in November.

The question seems to revolve around the tight money policy. While the Administration is now fighting inflation, it nevertheless does not want to pursue a policy which will make money so tight that it will force business failures. Yet, there are certainly signs that tight money is a prudent policy at this time, what with record borrowings, and so on.

The net result, in attempting to appraise the economic future, is that 1956 is a year of mixed signs. We would suggest that the reader not be misled by extravagant claims of prosperity. There is a general prosperity, but there are also many soft spots which need attending to.

What the Administration in power does in the next twelve months, and how the nation gets along, economically, in these 12 months, determines whether the high level of business will move further upward or a reversal in the trend will be experienced.

Neither is assured, and either is possible.

Better Methods For Raising Dairy Calves

Dairy herd improvement starts with proper calf management. Breeding, feeding, sanitation are the keys. Neglect any and your production will suffer.

A 24-month study by the Nutrition Council of the American Feed Manufacturers Association has produced a list of good practices that will eliminate much of the confusion which has existed among dairy farmers, the result of previous inconsistency.

HOUSING CALVES

1. Dairy calves should be raised separately—one calf to a pen from the start until at least one week after milk or milk substitute is discontinued.
2. Calves may be raised in groups not exceeding 10, beginning one week after milk or milk substitute is discontinued.
3. The age difference between calves in any group should not exceed two months.

SPACE NEEDS

4. Minimum pen size for individual calves is 24 square feet; in groups with no outside run 30 square feet per calf.

WATERING DEVICES

5. Automatic drinking bowls are preferred over calf waterers. Where pens are used for watering, they should be kept clean and well filled with fresh water. Also, tanks used in outside runs.
6. Top of drinking bowls should be 20" from the floor.
7. Watering equipment for calves should be located at the front of the pen, for groups an outside tank may be used. In either case, keep it away from the feed.
8. Provide 2 bowls when more than 5 calves are housed per pen.

FEED BOXES

9. Calf ration box for the individual pens should be 8" by 10" by 6" deep. It is desirable to make boxes removable for cleaning.
10. When calves are raised in groups, calf ration feed boxes should be 10" by 6" deep, allowing 2 feet per calf. Two troughs per pen are preferred.
11. Top of calf ration feed boxes should be 20" from floor.

PEN CONSTRUCTION

12. Solid partitions between individual calf pens will reduce chilling drafts. Fronts of calf pens should be slatted.

TEMPERATURE

13. Desirable pen temperature range for raising young calves is 50° to 75° F. Keep temperature as uniform as practicable. Dryness in pen is important because dampness intensifies cold.

FEEDING

14. There is no minimum time to leave the vigorous newborn calf with the cow. It is very important that the calf gets colostrum the first three days either by nursing or drinking.
15. Young calves may be taught to drink from a pail or a nipple feeding device. It is important that pails or other calf feeding equipment be kept scrupulously clean.
16. Calves may be turned out to pasture as soon as practicable after four months of age. They should have access to salt, water and shade.
17. High quality hay should be fed to calves from the start. Ensilage may be fed after calves are 6 months old.
18. A safe age at which whole milk or milk substitute may be replaced entirely by a suitable calf starter, grain mixture and roughage is usually six weeks though healthy vigorous calves may be changed earlier with good results.

These recommendations will repay you in larger milk production and fewer losses through calf illness and mortality, says the Agricultural Service Division of the Union Bag Camp Paper Corporation, makers of multiwall paper bags for feed.

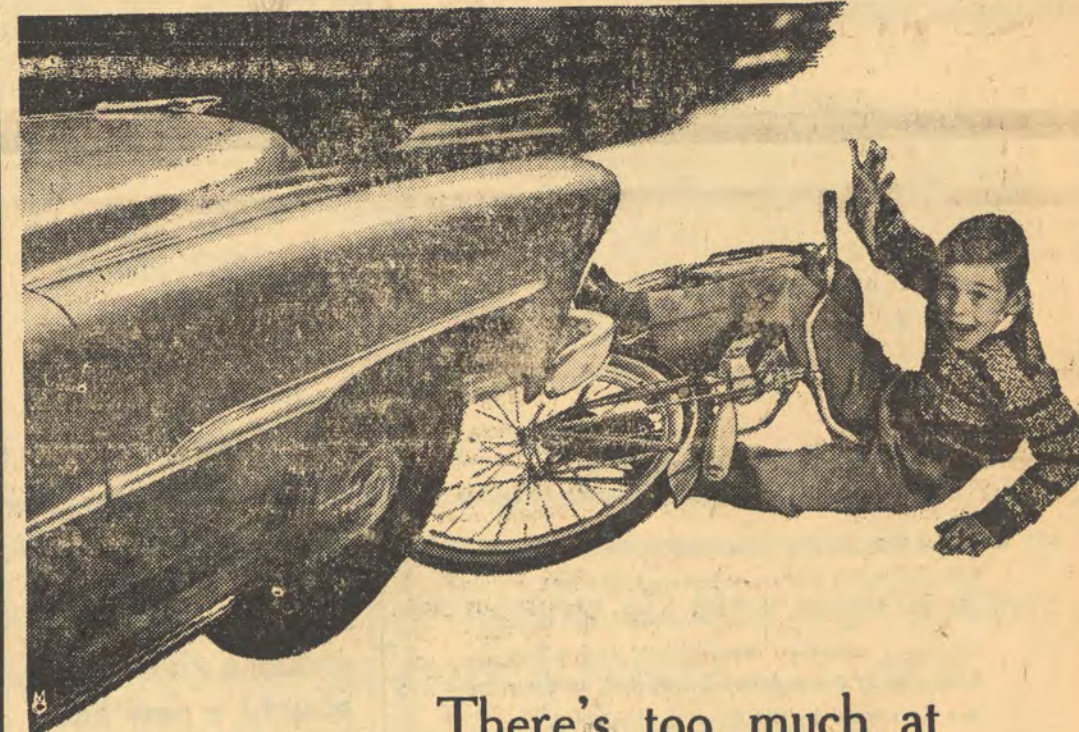
