Should they wind up with a 6-4 season record and a 3-2 district tie, giving them a tie for second place, we figure that Ervin DuBose will have given Diboll its share of football glory in his first year here.

This week's grudge game with Corrigan should prove just how good the Jacks are once they know they must play second fiddle to teams such as Garrison and Timpson. There is little to doubt that either team is better than anything Diboll can offer on any given night of this season. The Axemen led Garrison 13-7 at the half and wound up a 20-13 loser. Tentative plans for a small Sunday morning newspaper in Diboll are being studied. This information was released by the publishers of The Diboll News-Bulletin.

Plans, although incomplete, call for a four to eight page tabloid newspaper to be issued to local subscribers early each Sunday morning. The paper would specialize in feature stories, industrial news, late Friday night ball games, and up-to-the-minute news and feature stories complete with photographs.

If tentative plans materialize, starting date for the new publication would be around January 1, 1957.

Idea for the Sunday paper has stemmed from the definite success that this Newspaper has had with its local readers during the past four years. In the event a Sunday paper is begun next year, the Thursday edition of Te Diboll News-Bulletin will continue to come out on schedule, as in the past.

Such an edition would be on an offset-type press, giving subscribers what is probably the ultimate in news-photo reproduction. This paper would deal strictly with news of this immediate area and would not attempt to compete on large-scale news coverage with the larger city editions. This Sunday paper would be delivered by carrier to the subscribers door.

News-Bulletin publishers said that the plan had not, and might not, be approved, although every phase of such an operation was receiving careful study.

The publishers also invited potential subscribers to comment on the plan by addressing their mail to Letters To The Editor.

New Radar Speed Meter



CHICAGO—Because excessive speed is the chief cause of automobile fatalities, law enforcement authorities are using more and more speed control devices to check on motorists near schools, community boundaries and busy intersections. Latest device to be produced is a new radar speed meter that does everything but chase violators and write tickets. Developed by Admiral Corporation, the compact 26-pound unit, shown above, will register the speed of all cars or, if desired, only those exceeding the speed limit. It can be set to "hold" the reading up to two minutes, eliminating the need for the officer to keep his eyes glued to the meter. A description of the car, license number, date and time of violation can be recorded on an optional tape recorder, as Officer John Sweeney of the Chicago Park District Police is doing above. According to officials, the mere presence of "Radar Patrolled" signs in a community causes the average motorist to reduce speed as much as 10 miles per hour. Forty seven of 48 states now using speed radar units report a decrease in fatal accidents in the area of use.

Henry Temple Memorial Park will be moved to a new location soon, if reports from most recent Booster Club meeting are correct.

The television show was presented six days following the live presentation of the program, which was held Saturday night, Oct. 27, in Diboll.

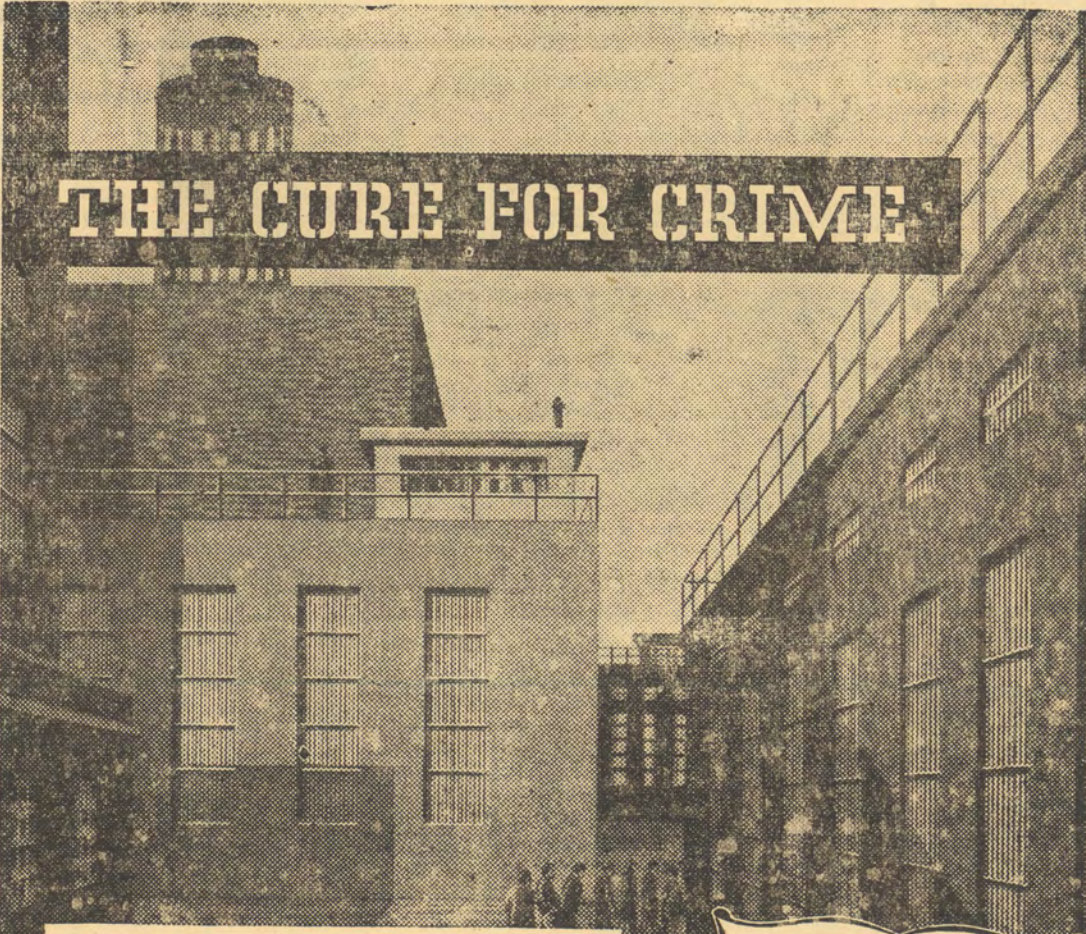

150 Acres Burned

Southern Pine Aided In Fighting On Tri-County Forest Fire

A fire which could have represented a devastating loss of livelihood to literally hundreds of people in the Angelina-Trinity-Houston County region and which could have destroyed the modest farms and homes of a great number of families in the region was brought under control Friday by the well-coordinated efforts of the Texas Forestry Service aided by timber owners in the region.

A fire which started simultaneously thirty-five points in a

straight line paralleling a forest road was first discovered at approximately 7:30 a. m. Aircraft under the supervision of Texas Forest Service and of Southern Pine Lumber Company took to the air and maintained constant radio contact with the Angelina Trinity and Houston County volunteers who did battle with the threat.

Damage to game alone, according to forestry experts, might have restricted hunting seasons for several years to come if the one hundred "sets" had got out of control.

The fire was located in an area south of Highway 103 between Lufkin and Crockett.

"Our first objective was to control the fire and prevent it from reaching homesteads along Highway 103, said Bobby Farley, forester for a locally owned lumber company and timber grower.

No estimate of the jobs and earnings of present and future Angelina, Trinity and Houston County citizens which will depend upon this timber in possible, according to forest products experts here. However, published figures of the southern pine industry show that approximately twenty-eight man hours go into the manufacture of every one thousand board feet of lumber. At this rate each one hundred acres would represent 31,000 hours of employment for local people or approximately eleven years of employment for one breadwinner in one of the many mills in the East Texas region. These figures do not contemplate the loss of future growth which may be expected but are computed solely on standing timber.

Preliminary estimates reflect that approximately one hundred fifty acres were burned before the potential conflagration was brought under control.

Mr. Gordon Horn Reports Sales Rise

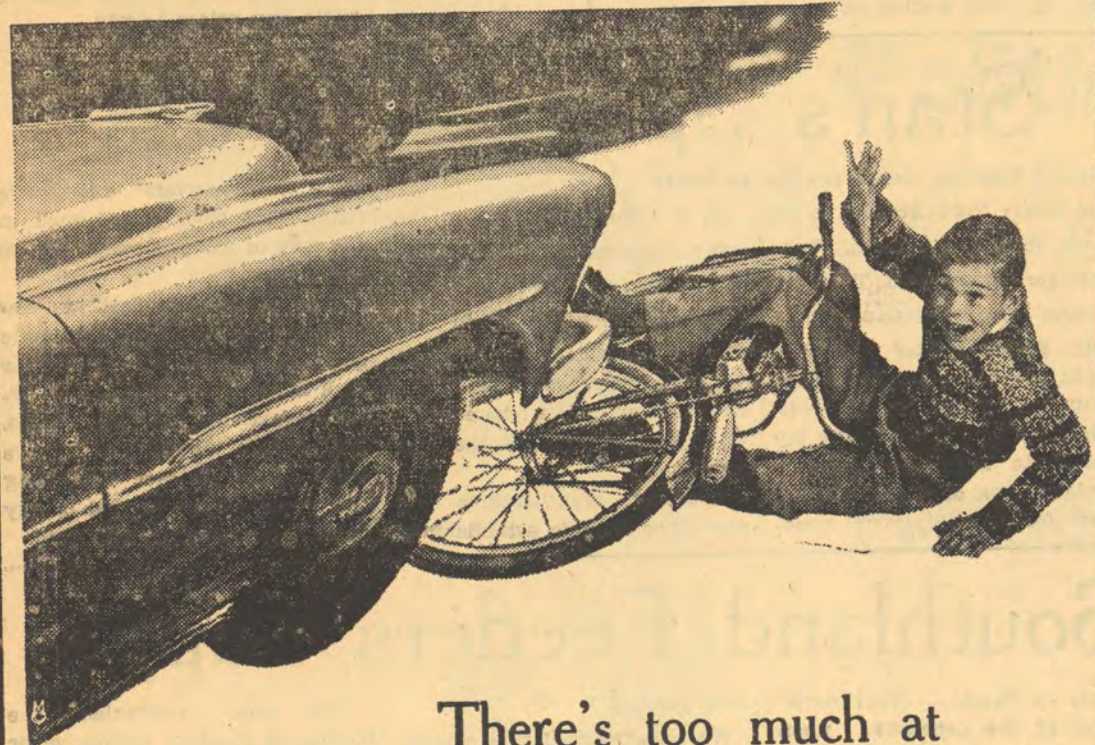

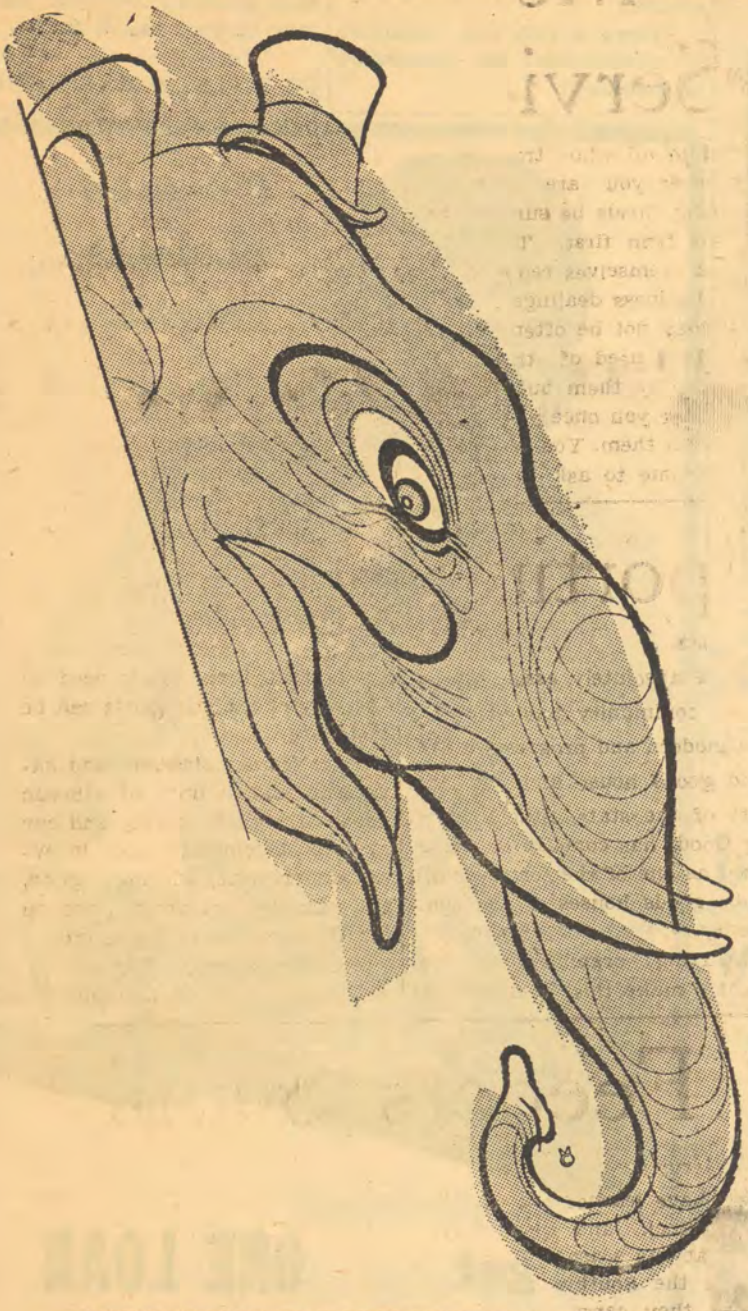

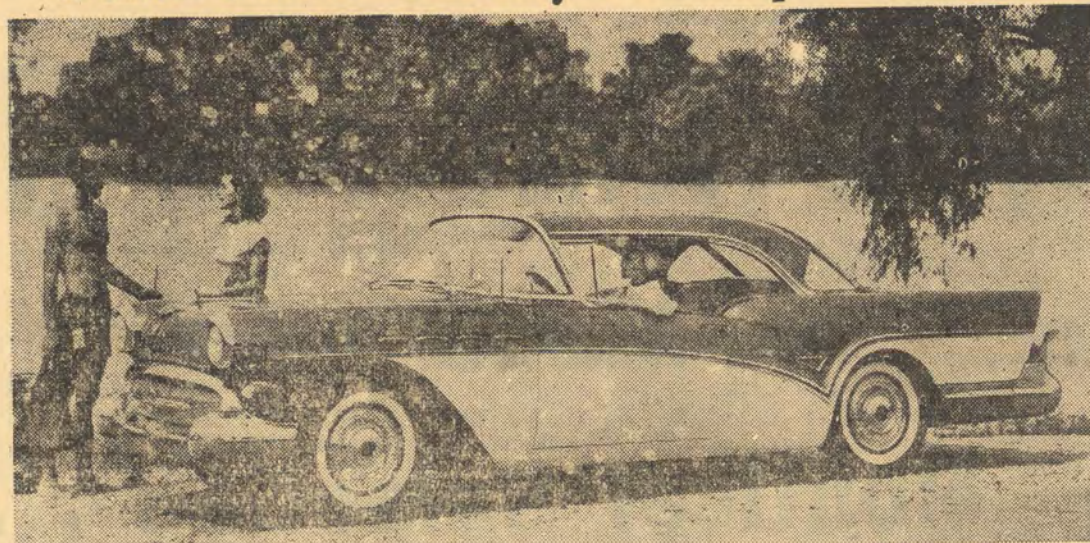

Advice For The Sneezing, Cough, And Ache Season

The most widespread of these is the "common cold." It is impossible to calculate the time lost from work on the national level because of colds. When neglected, they lead to serious diseases. In many cases, a neglected cold may develop into pneumonia, which can be fatal.

Prevention of the common cold, influenza, or bronchitis depends, among other things, on a correct diet, fresh air, enough clothing to protect the body, and avoidance of drafts. Warm or tepid baths, instead of hot, prevention of fatigue, and a hygienic way of life which strengthens the tone of the body are all factors to consider. The best way to treat a cold is to prevent it, with a healthy body which is resistant to disease. 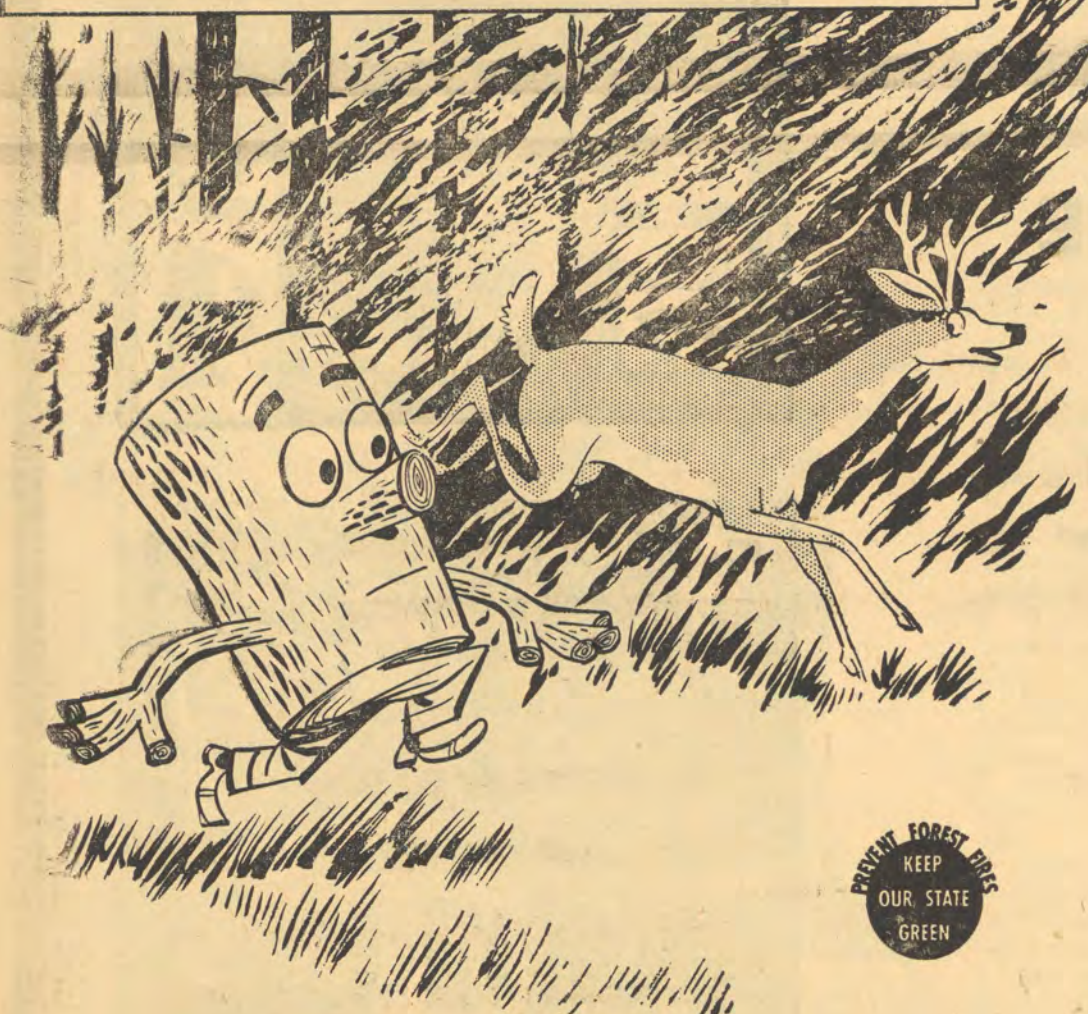

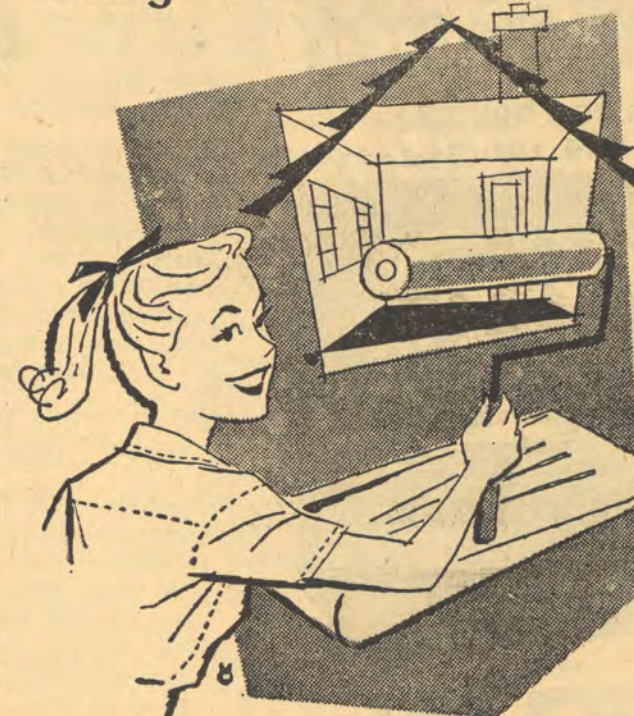

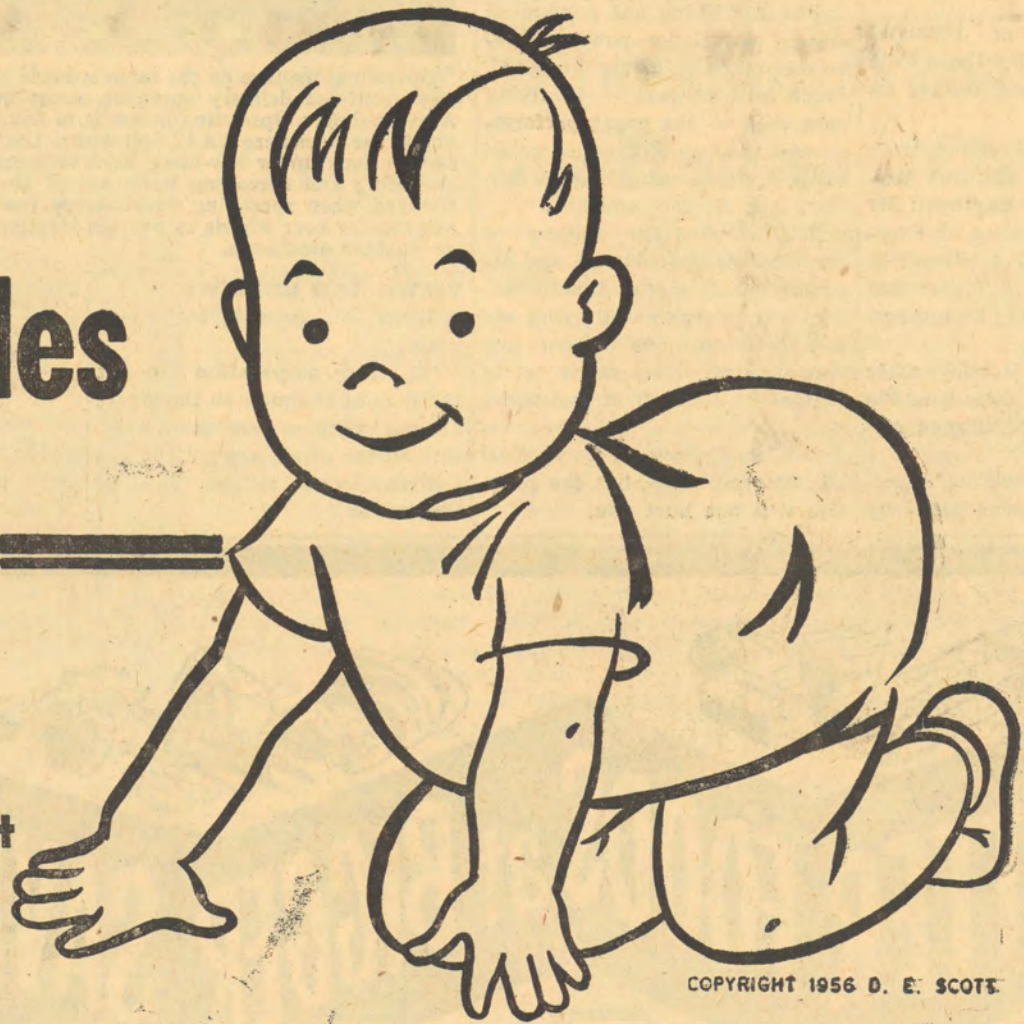

escaped injury when their country home burned last weekend. The Squires were completely burned out, retrieving only a hunting jacket, two pictures, and a rifle from the flaming night fire.

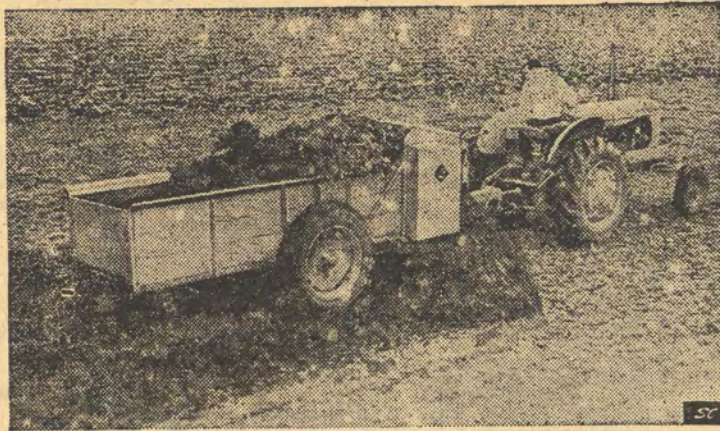
THE LATEST ON ROCKET PLANES

New Front-End Spreader



Spreading manure on the farm is made cleaner and easier with a new front-end delivery spreader, according to its manufacturer, Allis-Chalmers. Spreading action is in front with distribution down and to the sides across a 12-foot width. Loading from rear and sides can be done under low-hung barn cleaners or shed roofs because shredding and spreading units are at the front. The load moves forward when spreading which keeps the weight on the drawbar and tractor rear wheels to provide traction in practically any field or weather conditions.

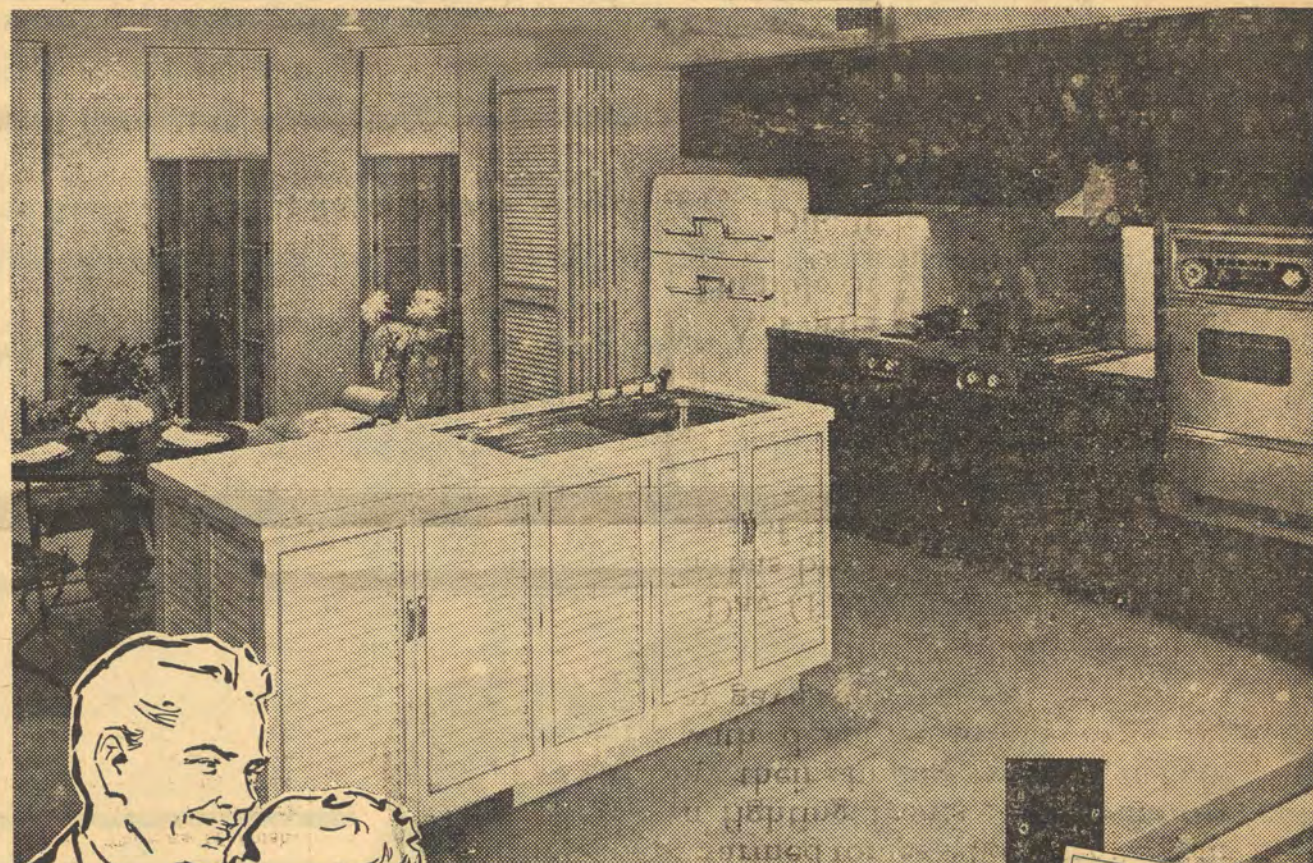
