There are many advantages in building with wood and our elementary school is a perfect example of these advantages.

Many thousands of dollars may be funneled into teachers salaries if all districts used wood instead of more expensive, and wasteful, materials.

Looking with confidence to a bright future in elementary education and a rise in registrations there, these several Dibollians have used much foresight in the setting of a vivid example for school districts in all our Southern United States.

Employees Retire Pay To Get Public Vote

Austin—Sept. 19—Nov. 5, 1957 may be remembered for a long time by State Employees. On that day of the Constitutional Amendments election, the people of Texas will have an opportunity to give their public servants one of the most modern Retirement Systems in the nation if they vote for Number 1 on the ballot.

The people's vote will determine whether or not Texas will have an Employees Retirement System ranking favorably not only with those of State employees in the nation but also with industrial employees throughout the country.

If HJR 37 passes, a lapse of time to September 1 of 1958 will allow a period to work out necessary rules, to inform departments and employees, and to complete detail work for the change-over to the new system without confusion.

All of which makes me wonder if yellow is a favorite color for fishing lures because the fish see it quickly, the same as we do.

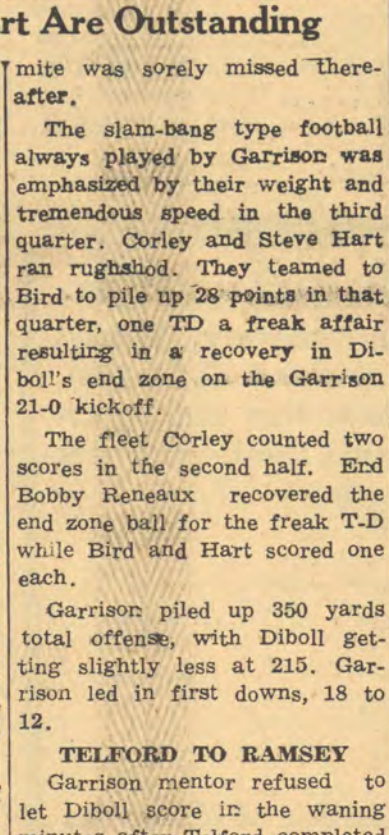
Local Farmers Elect Officers In Diboll

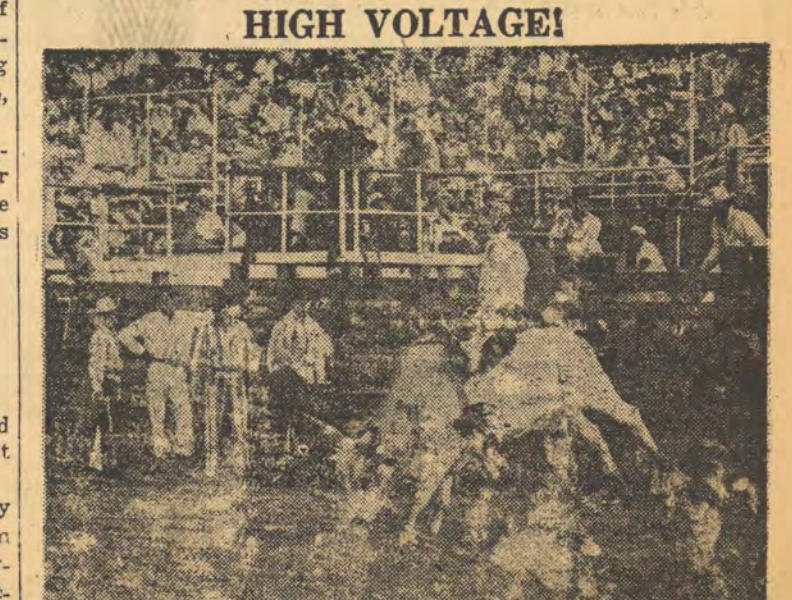
Joaquin plays a solid, old style type of football, coached by Billy Freeman who earlier in the year had plans of assisting DuBose at Diboll.

NO COMMENT

WASHINGTON—Political predictions and trends in Washington are as variable as the weather in the nation's capital.

Although Congress is not in session, there is plenty of activity in the departments and agencies and among committee staff members on Capitol Hill who are preparing for a busy session of Congress next year.

One thing Washington observers agree upon—that now is the time to be thinking of the 1959 federal budget, which must be approved by Congress before it adjourns next summer prior to the important November elections.

President Eisenhower and Budget Director Percival Brundage and new Deputy Director Maurice H. Stans have held several meetings at the Chief Executives vacation retreat at Newport, R. I.

Budget message—There is no indication how much the President will ask for in his budget message to Congress next year. However, in view of the fact that Congress pared the President's budget request during the last session, and the fact that there is a tremendous economy drive on in government departments and agencies, there is a possibility that the request next year may only be slightly lower than the last year.

Senator Byrd (D-Va.), chairman of the Senate Finance Committee, has written his constituents thanking them for their support in the economy drive of this year, and urging them to communicate with the President and the Bureau of the Budget to keep the 1959 money requests below the record-breaking peace time budget submitted last Jan.

The Senator warned that now is the critical time in the formulation by the President and the Budget Bureau for next year request for funds.

The Administration is making every effort to put the brakes on spending in order to keep in the \$275 billion statutory debt limit.

Taxes—Another reason for the increased effort to control spending is to insure the possibility of a tax cut next year. Former Treasury Secretary Humphrey insisted that a \$3 billion surplus should be available before a tax cut is made.

"Some vocal Texas politicians who have campaigned for the Republican party for years and years are now running over Texas hiding their Eisenhower buttons.

"Everybody knows that I have opposed this administration with all the means at my command, so it is not necessary for me to issue any exculpatory statements.

"However, no real American can fail to be saddened by the tragic conflict dividing this country. Now is the time for a statesmanship not brinkmanship.

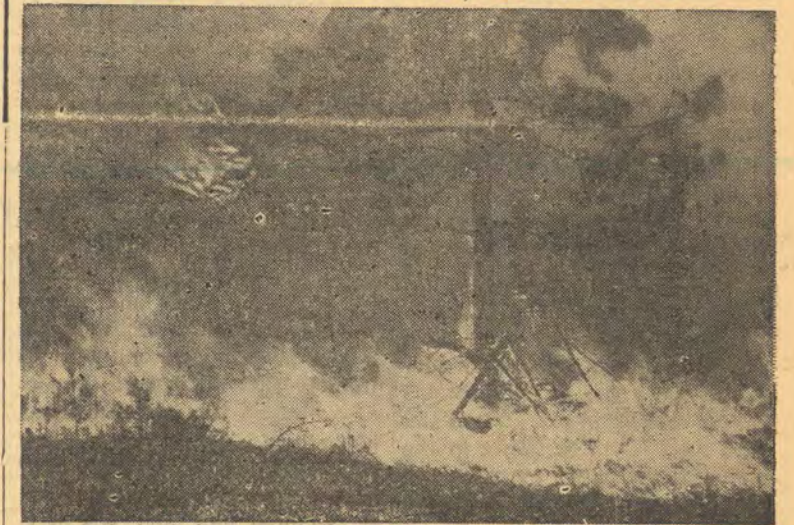
Local units throughout the state, with a present membership of 607,544 will seek to recruit others to a program of concern to all that affects the happiness of the child in home, school and in community.

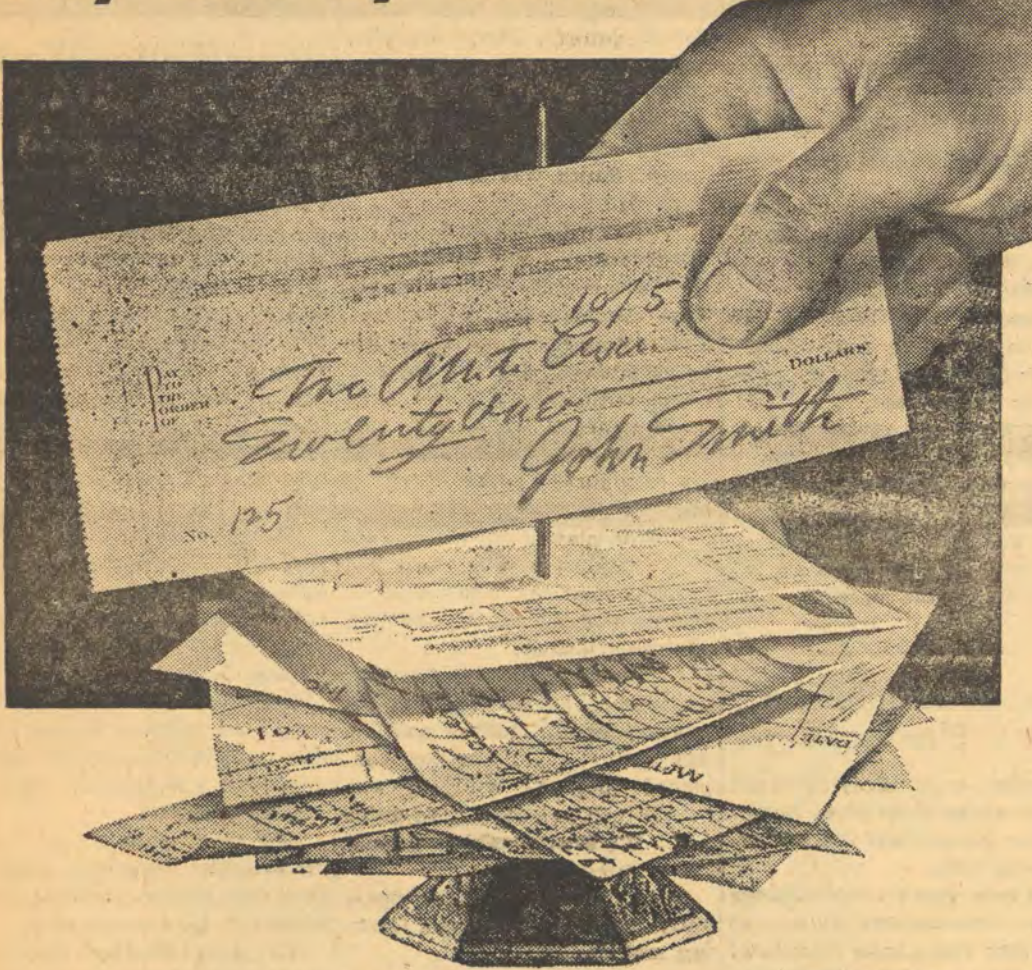

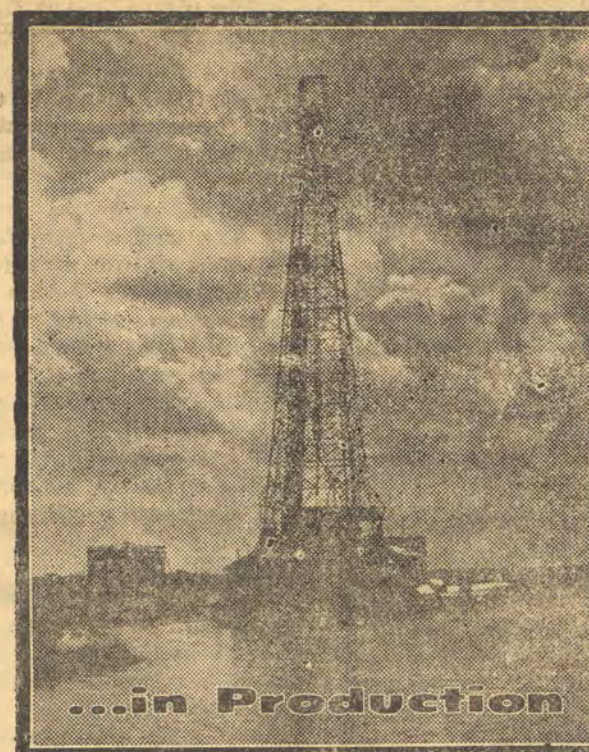

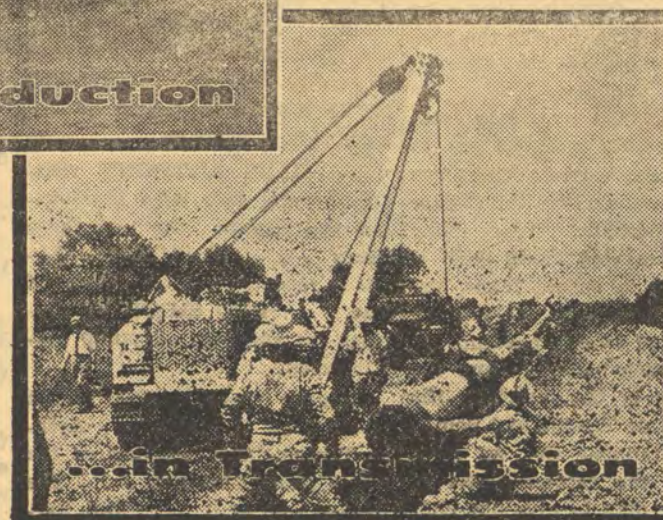

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Spotlight on HEALTH

Science Features

Modern medicine has enabled Americans to live nearly as long as the biblical three score years and ten. As a consequence, the diseases of aging, such as hardening of the arteries, heart disorders, and cancer, are increasingly the causes of death. Now the task of medical science is to combat these diseases so that we may enjoy this longer life. The battle against angina pectoris, an illness which increases beyond middle age, is one example in which a new, partial victory has recently been won.

The meaning of angina pectoris is simply pain in the chest. It is caused by a narrowing of the coronary arteries, which cuts down the flow of blood nourishing the heart muscle. In this condition, exercise which places extra demands on the heart causes pain. In severe cases, climbing stairs, walking against the wind, digesting a heavy meal, or emotional excitement may bring on an attack.

Occasionally the pain of an anginal attack can be extraordinarily severe. A French physician in the early nineteenth century compared it to "iron nails or the claw of an animal tearing asunder the front of the chest." More often the pain is described as a squeezing, crushing or vise-like sensation. It may be felt in the chest, heart, neck, left shoulder and arm, or upper stomach.

Angina pectoris was first treated in the eighteenth century with narcotics and alcohol and, later, with inhalation of chloroform. None prevented or halted an attack, they merely deadened the pain.

The first real victory over angina was won in 1867 when a Scotch physician used nitroglycerin, the common explosive, to treat an attack. Later it was discovered that the explosive's effectiveness was due to its temporary ability to dilate the arteries that feed the heart, not only relieving pain but stopping,



or preventing, an attack. However, the effect of nitroglycerin is only temporary, seldom lasting longer than a few minutes.

A new drug, derived from an explosive of the same family, was developed several years ago. Peritrate, as the drug is called, gives longer lasting relief—up to four or six hours. This advance has now been followed by the introduction of an even newer "sustained action" form of Peritrate which provides round-the-clock protection against attacks of angina pectoris with only two tablets daily. In its new form, the drug is contained in a special wax base which gradually dissolves over a twelve-hour period.

To the four million Americans—most are past middle age—who suffer from angina pectoris, this new development promises less pain and greater activity—more enjoyment of their later years.

WHAT MAKES A SCHOOL "GOOD"?

Americans just don't stay in one place. I've moved four times since I've been married and I'll bet I'm not permanently settled yet. We don't just move from one house to another in the same town, either. Like many Americans who move, we change states as well as houses.



This mobility of our population creates problems for the schools and for the parents of school-

age children. Here's just one problem the schools face. Many of the school districts today that need classrooms, teachers, textbooks—just about everything—didn't even exist a few years ago. They're new housing developments in suburban areas and nobody anticipated how many children would be crowding into schools.

There's the classic case of an enormous housing development put up for GIs after World War II. Thousands of houses were built and everything was thought of by the engineers. They made space for a community swimming pool, super markets, churches, police stations, fire house. The only thing they left out of the blueprints were schools. Those GIs were young married men and they bought the houses, moving in with their wives and kids. It was years before they got a regular school where the children could go full time.

Parents who have to move for one reason or another write us and ask whether the schools are good in the communities they're going to. This is an awfully hard question to answer with a yes or no. But there are some yardsticks you can use to measure a good school.

Find out how many teachers a

school has for how many students. Find out if the students are going to school full-time or if they have to go on half-day sessions. Find out what courses are offered. Find out, if you can, how much of an interest the community takes in its schools. If it's an alive community that recognizes the importance of its schools, chances are your child will get a better education there.

But there's another side to this question of a moving population. People are moving into communities as well as out of them. Are your schools the kind that attract new people?

A few years ago, we asked major corporations what they looked for in deciding where to build a plant. To a man, these executives told us that one of the first things they found out was how good the schools were.

A community that lets its schools go to pot is one that's keeping new blood and new industry out of town. No wonder so many Chambers of Commerce and other local businessmen are getting behind programs to improve their local schools.

Background Scripture: I Corinthians 5-6: 13
Devotional Reading: Romans 6:12-23

A Moral Church

Lesson for October 13, 1957

THE letter of Paul to the church at Corinth shows us, so to speak, a church with the lid off. These letters were plainly not intended for publication—that is, they were not sent out broadcast over the church at large. They were sent to the church concerned, one of Paul's problem churches.

If Christians today sometimes think that their church would be free from its faults if only they could get the right preacher, they should remember the Apostle Paul. Even he had problem churches—almost "boiling" else but.

Last week we noticed how highly Paul speaks of the church as an ideal, and yet how dark the reality sometimes was. One illustration of this was the crime at Corinth. For crime it was, right in the church, the crime of incest. The case seems to have been well known. Paul does not need to mention names. But the church had done not one thing about it. None of them had had the nerve even to speak out about this. (Were they too squeamish to mention it, or were the sinners perhaps prominent people?)

The Church Talks Morality

The church at Corinth is dead and gone long since. But we ask questions about the church of today. Is it moral? It certainly should be; the aim for every one of its members is nothing less than to be like Jesus. The church certainly talks morality. At least half an hour every week is spent listening to a serious talk which, in spite of what rambling these may be, does hold up high ideals. The Ten Commandments are posted on the wall of the Sunday school hall. Every Sunday school class is in favor of morality. You couldn't get a vote against morality in the whole place.

But does the church talk morality? Does it teach social responsibility? Does it hold up the same standards for the rich and the strong as for the poor and weak? Is the church putting its finger on the sins of our time or does it spend more energy denouncing a few simple sins than some of the bigger ones? Does the church talk morality on any higher level than (say) a luncheon club? Does the church lead the moral progress of the time, or does it do no better than to follow prevailing trends?

The Church Understands Morality

The church can see into morality, what it really means, too. The church today, at any rate, just any church on any corner or country road—knows, or at least it has heard dozens of times, that immortal 13th chapter of I Corinthians, "—greatest of these is Love." The church knows, or has often enough been told, that love is the fulfilling of the law (Romans 13:10). Ask almost any church member what is the most important quality in the Christian life, and he will usually say "Love."

But does the church understand this? On the one hand it understands that all the law of God comes down to and is focussed in just those two commands, love God and love your neighbor. But has the church often struggled with the question, how does love work out, in business, in education, in race and industrial relations, in any of the complex areas of today's puzzling, pushing life? Is the church's understanding of love something of words more than of works?

The Church Upholds Morality

The church upholds and insists on moral standards, too. Action in civic reforms always is the Ministerial Association. But what ministers and churches do in their own circles may be something else again. In how many congregations will the church tolerate a minister if he persists in pointing out and condemning, in God's name, sins and wrongs committed generally by the members of that church? Don't congregations often muzzle their ministers, as good as telling him he must not preach about this or that "controversial" theme? And, most painful question of all: When there is known to be wrong-doing in a congregation, what are the members likely to do about it? Do they, like the Corinthians, shut their eyes and pretend not to see it? Can a church be said to uphold morality if it never does a thing to, about or with those who drag morality down?

was out here on my farm yesterday afternoon telling me about his troubles.

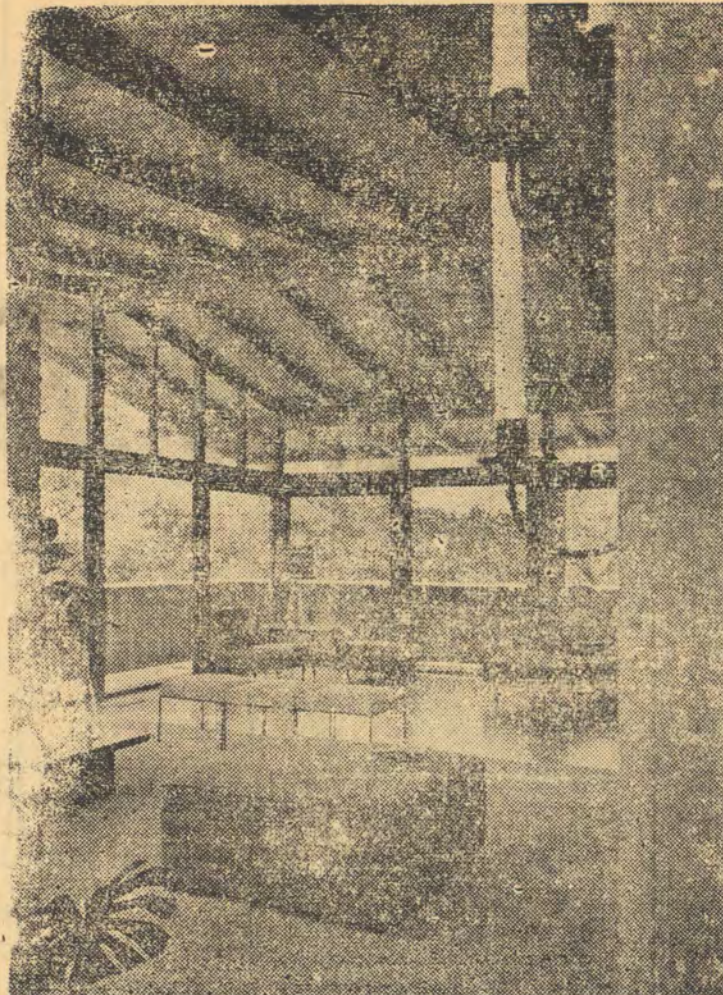
According to him, he has been trying to convince his family President Eisenhower is right as he says reckless spending is helping cause inflation, and he called a family conference to go over

OFFICIAL MEMORANDUM

GREETINGS:

Our Constitutional guarantee of freedom of the press is a guarantee of an individual's right to own and to control a printing press without subservience to a government. That guarantee established the fact that a free government of free men does not need to live in the thoughts and fords of its free citizens.

Today, the freedom of America depends on the freedom of the press. The free flow of information to the public is essential to the preservation of our American way of life, and we must be continually vigilant against any efforts to impede this freedom of information.

Texas newspapers and newspapermen have consistently given recognition of the great obligations and responsibilities which go with freedom of the press.

THEREFORE, I, as Governor of Texas, do hereby designate—the period of October 1-8, 1957, as NEWSPAPER WEEK in Texas, and urge due recognition of the contributions of a free press.

In official recognition whereof, I hereby affix my signature this 18th day of Sept., 1957.
