Jacks Engage Mighty Bears In Acid Test

DuBosemen Invade Bearland In Effort To Hold Coveted Second Place In Dist. 22-A

Ervin DuBose's Lumberjacks invade the sanctuary of the mighty Timpson Bear Friday night at 7:30 in an effort to hold onto their present second place tie with Hemphill's Hornets in District 22-A.

Thanks to the manner in which the 22-A schedule gave Diboll the easiest opponents first in Joaquin and Cushing, the local Jacks know enjoy what will probably be their most dramatic slot in the district calendar.

The locals show a conference record of two wins and one loss, the same as Hemphill, and a 3-4 record for the year. Timpson sports a 2-2 conference record and a slate of 4-4 for the season.

Timpson played Hemphill a close game while losing 25-19. They lost to Garrison by 25-7, and recently racked up impressive scores over Joaquin and Cushing.

They are expected to keep on rolling over Diboll this week. The Bears averaged a 7-6 halftime deficit here last year to cop a 27-7 win in the second half, then went on to become co-champs of the district with Corrigan.

Monday of this week showed the Lumberjacks at near peak strength. If they stay that way until Friday, however, it'll be the first time that DuBose and line coach Happy Point have had all their boys together since the 6 of Sept. game at Elkhart.

Timpson, for the most part, operates from the single wing, but the Bears pose no threat as a passing unit. They do have a lot of speed in the backfield and on the line. The Bears also have "that Bailey boy" who literally tore Jack ball carriers into little pieces here last year.

Friday's game will mean everything to Diboll. For, if Timpson can be had, surely the DuBosemen can summon enough to whip Corrigan's sliding Bulldogs in the classic that will take place here the following week.

Such a showing would give Diboll a 5-4 season's record and would definitely place them in position to upset the Hornets on Nov. 15. And such optimism is not exactly dreamy because the Axemen have as much talent as any club we've played.

That little pigmy inside each boy's heart labeled "desire" has not united itself with talent and love of contact long enough this season, however, to produce our boy's fullest capabilities.

For the sake of argument, desire and love of contact is what makes Vernon Oaks a fine line-backer; it will eventually make Robert Squires one of Diboll's best all-around ends; it makes Morris Smith run harder, quicker; and this alone made Carrel Black the most outstanding on the field against Cushing.

At any rate, the Jacks will have to get "up high", eat a lot of beefsteak and calcium pills if they are to lick Timpson.

Mail Parcels Overseas On Time To Assure Christmas Delivery

Time and instructions for the mailing of Christmas parcels to members of the Armed Forces overseas were released this week by the local Postmaster.

The time for mailing of parcels by surface mails is November 1 to November 20; and by air mail is December 1 to December 10.

Size and weight limitations—by surface mail, 70 pounds and 100 inches length and girth combined—50 pounds and smaller limitation applies to certain overseas destinations addressed by New York (check at P. O.); by air mail, 2 pounds is the maximum weight and 30 inches maximum length and girth combined.

In preparation of parcels, boxes addressed for delivery overseas must be of strong construction—wood, metal, solid fiberboard, or strong double-faced corrugated fiberboard boxes to be wrapped in heavy paper. All should be securely tied with a strong cord. Sufficient cushioning material should be used so that contents are tightly packed to prevent crushing.

Prohibited articles are matches of all kinds and lighter fluid. Cigarettes or other tobacco products and coffee are prohibited in parcels addressed to certain A.P.O.'S.

Christmas cards to members of the Armed Forces overseas to be mailed within the periods designated for parcels.

basic research fields and are lavished with rewards, we deprive our scientists of prestige incentives, frequently look down at the teaching profession and offer too little compensation in the pure science fields.

We need a reappraisal of our technological programs in order to regain our creative and inventive leadership. Sound progress toward any significant solution for the entire problem demands wholehearted cooperation between industry, large and small alike, and our educational institutions, both publicly and the privately supported.

AUSTIN—Gov. Price Daniel today urged all eligible Texans to go to the polls on Nov. 5th and vote for the water development amendment, which is Proposal Number 3 on the ballot.

"The urgent need of dams and reservoirs in the state is evident to everyone," Daniel stated.

"Phoposal Number 3 will make possible such projects. It is a self-financing plan and the water amendment does not call for and will not necessitate tax."

Daniel pointed out that all of the state's public officials are backing the proposal. "Furthermore the amendment has been endorsed by a multitude of state associations and other organizations, newspapers, manufacturers and Chambers of Commerce."

Inspiring Sermonette

First Methodist Women Observe Successful Week Of Prayer at Church Last Friday

Texas Chamber of Commerce, West Texas Chamber of Commerce, South Texas Chamber of Commerce, Rio Grande Valley Chamber of Commerce, the AFL-CIO, and the TMA.

"Here is Texas' opportunity of a lifetime," the governor added. "Here at our finger tips is a potential \$600,000,000 for water to be paid out of revenues."

Texas' chief executive also cited the flood damages and the tremendous loss of lives and of property that have resulted from uncontrolled waters.

"Why should Texans continue to suffer millions of dollars in property damage every year? Why should good water that can be used by cities, by industries and by agriculture be allowed to flow unrestricted off our rich lands and on into the Gulf of Mexico?"

Then, as if to answer all the questions, he summed up his remarks with the statement that "the water development amendment, which is third on the Nov. 5 ballot, is a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity for Texas and all of the Texans to have what is now needed and without taxes. For this is a self-financing program that not only will pay itself out, but eventually may mean millions of dollars in revenue to the State."

Health Code To Keep Development Pace

The Texas Legislature passed a new Mental Health Code which goes into effect on Jan. 1, 1958. This new code was enacted both to keep pace with new discoveries in the area of mental health, and to eliminate objectionable provisions of the old laws which required the mentally ill persons to be tried as a criminal before he could receive treatment at a state hospital.

Society recognizes that mental illness is no more than a disease which affects the mind. As a result of this recognition, the new code allows the patient to receive treatment as quickly as possible.

The New Mental Health Code provides for both voluntary and involuntary treatment. This article discusses how a person may receive State medical treatment when he recognizes his own need for psychiatric care.

When the proposed mental patient seeks care from a state hospital he should go directly to the nearest mental hospital and make written application to the head of the hospital. He must agree in his application that he will stay at the hospital for at least ten days, unless he is sooner cured and discharged. The application must be signed by the patient, unless he is a minor, in which case it may be by his parents, guardians or court judge with his consent.

Upon his admission the head of the hospital will inform the

VETERANS BOND ISSUE SEEMS MORE FAVORABLE

AUSTIN—Land Commissioner Earl Rudder noted Friday that the bond market seems to be growing more favorable for the sale of some part of \$100,000,000 of Veterans Land Bonds.

The bonds were offered for sale in May by the Veterans' Land Board. No bids were received.

"The average interest rate on bonds of our type was 3.5 per cent this week," Commissioner Rudder said. "The market has got to go down a long way yet," he added.

The average interest rate on the market was 3.57 per cent several weeks ago.

The State Constitution says—the Veterans Land Board can pay no more than three per cent interest on its bonds.

"One of two things must happen before we can sell our bonds," Rudder said:

"1. The Constitution must be amended so that more interest can be paid; or

"2. Bond market interest rate must drop considerably."

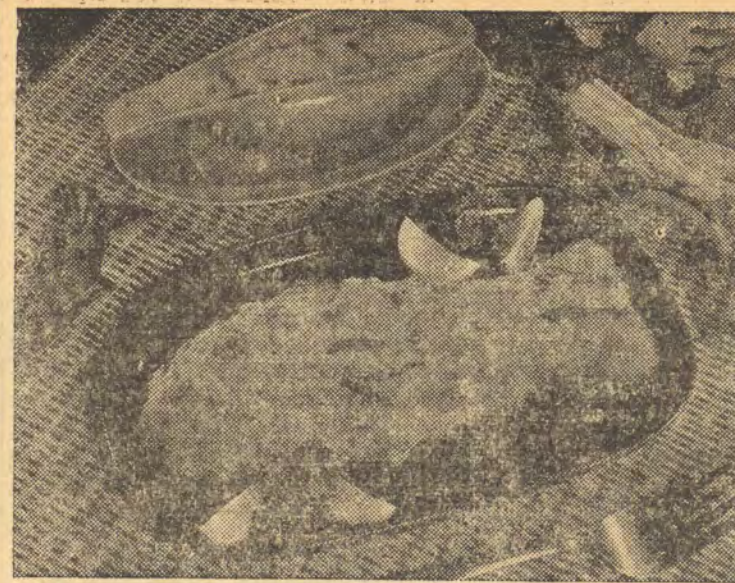

Aunt Martha's Salmon Loaf

Savory and satisfying—that's this piping hot salmon loaf. Bake it in an old-fashioned fish mold for a different looking loaf! It looks lovely decorated to resemble a fish. But cooked in a mold or a loaf pan, it's a perfectly seasoned salmon main dish made refreshing with lots of lemon juice.

SALMON LOAF

INGREDIENTS:

2/3 cup uncooked white rice
1 teaspoon salt
1 1/3 cups water
1 pound can of salmon
Evaporated milk
2 tablespoons grated onion
2 tablespoons chopped pimiento
3 tablespoons lemon juice
1 egg, beaten
1/2 teaspoon black pepper
1/2 cup water
1, 10 1/2 oz. can condensed cream of celery soup

METHOD: Put the rice, salt and 1 1/3 cups water in a 2-quart saucepan. Bring to a vigorous boil over a high heat. Turn the heat down low. Cover with a lid. Simmer over this low heat 14 minutes. Remove the saucepan from the heat but leave the lid on 10 minutes. Drain the juice from the salmon into a measuring cup. Add evaporated milk to make 1 1/3 cups liquid. Flake the salmon. Add the milk mixture, onion, pi-

miento, lemon juice, egg, black pepper and cooked rice. Mix well. Thoroughly grease a glass 9"x5"x2 1/4" loaf pan holding at least 5 cups with shortening or salad oil. Use a greased fish mold which may be placed in the oven, if desired. Pour in the salmon mixture. Place in a preheated 350°F. oven. Bake about 55 minutes or until a knife inserted in the center comes out almost clean. This is a moist loaf. The loaf will brown around the edges and pull away from the sides of the pan.

While the loaf bakes, make the sauce. Cook the green pepper in the 1/2 cup water about 7 minutes or until tender. Stir in the celery soup. Season with salt and pepper if desired. Heat until very hot. Add a small amount of water until the sauce is the consistency desired.

When the loaf is done, remove from the oven and allow to stand about 5 minutes. Run a knife around the sides. Place a large platter over the pan and invert. Remove the loaf pan. Garnish the loaf with pimiento strips, lemon wedges, hard-cooked egg slices or parsley. If a fish mold has been used, decorate with an olive slice for the eye and green pepper or pimiento strips for the fins. Serve with the hot celery-green pepper sauce. This recipe makes 8 to 10 servings.

In Worship

Lesson for November 3, 1957

WHY do people go to church? There are very poor reasons, such as showing off a new hat, or keeping up a respectable front. There are reasons which are only middling-good, such as enjoying the music, or going to please your wife. There are also very good reasons; the best of these is simply to worship God.

There are different ways Christian churches use in worshipping God, and it is rarely that one particular service makes use of one way alone. Hymns are one way, and prayer is another, and offering is another. But the way of worship which most churches feel to be most sacred is the observance known by the names of Eucharist, Lord's Supper, Holy Communion.

Long Years, Wide Road

What is the right spirit of worship? In particular, how can we make the most of Communion? Saint Paul offers us some plain and valuable hints in the letter he wrote to the church at Corinth. That church needed some plain-spoken help, for two reasons. For one thing, the Christian religion was hardly thirty years old. There was no long tradition, no prayer-book, no New Testament to go by. For another thing, many of the Corinthians Christians had been outright pagans till recently, and pagans had some very odd notions about how to worship their gods, such as getting drunk in their temples. So Paul had to make some things clear. One is that the worshippers at the Lord's Table are not alone; there is a tradition behind them, there are hosts of other churches also at worship in this way. We worship best when we are mindful of the whole church of Christ. We are travelers on a road stretching through two thousand years now, not thirty years only—a road wide enough to take in worshippers from every country in the world. Remembering this, we shall be solemnly grateful that we too can share in this age-old Remembrance of Christ.

"In Remembrance of Me"

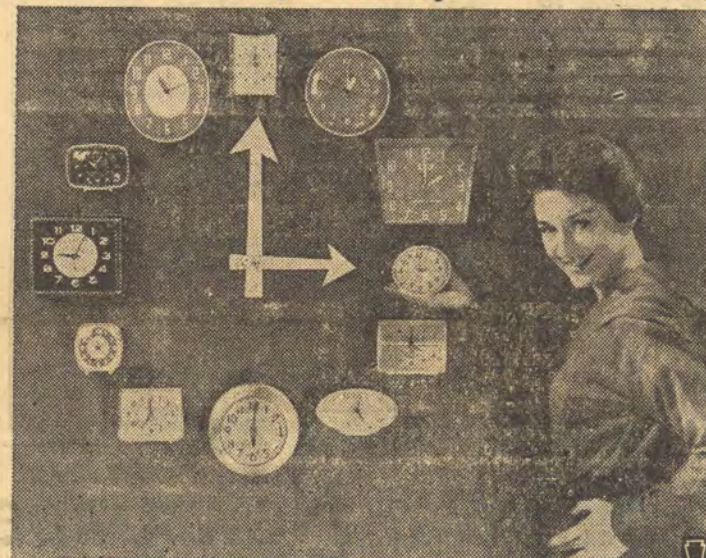
For this Lord's Supper is a rite of remembrance. How shall we best approach it? To come carelessly, thoughtlessly, is to cut ourselves off from its meaning and its blessing. We should come to it remembering the One in whose Name it is celebrated. But how shall we remember him? There is something more here than simple memory. We do not well remember a good mother's birthday by getting drunk, or by polishing off a shady deal, or by being hateful to members of our family. We best remember Washington not by making speeches about him but by being patriots ourselves. So we can best remember Christ not by being suddenly reminded of him by seeing that this is Communion Sunday, not by merely recalling that once such a Man lived and died. We come and worship in his name rightly when we come remembering, and praying for, his spirit in our lives. Those who get most out of Communion are usually those who have been keeping closest to their Lord.

Remembering Others

Protestant churches take seriously another thought in Paul's lines about the Lord's Supper. That is, that this is not something we can best do alone. There is room for private worship of God, and a necessity for it. But there is also room and necessity for the public worship of God, and the Holy Communion is public, social, communal, corporate, rather than private and individualistic. That is the way theologians would put it. For the plain worshipper, the point is this: In coming to this sacred high-point of worship, we shall get the most out of it if we give thought to others not less than to ourselves. We need to remember the Church in whose company this feast is kept. We need to remember the Body—not only the broken body of Christ, but the Church which Paul (in the very next chapter) calls the body of Christ. We need also to remember those who are in need. Most congregations use the Communion-time for special offerings for the poor or otherwise needy. So again, the right way to approach this hour of worship is to come already in the spirit of unselfishness. It is a poor sort of Christian who has to wait for the Communion service to remind him to love his neighbor as himself.

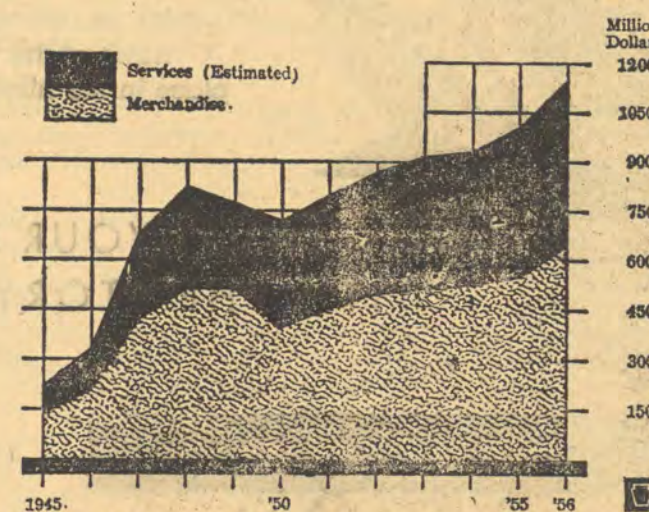

Venezuela—A Billion Dollar Customer



Venezuela is the leading South American customer for U. S. goods and services and second ranking world customer, on a per capita basis. It spent more than \$1 billion in the U. S. in 1956, according to a recent study by an independent research organization.

The study, released by Creole Petroleum Corporation, largest oil producer in Venezuela, recorded a continuing growth of trade between Venezuela and the United States. Since 1945, this progressive South American country's imports from the United States have risen almost 400 per cent, an increase made possible primarily by its oil production. More than 70 per cent of the dollars spent by Venezuela are obtained from the sale of oil.

United States products imported by Venezuela, which is approximately the size of Texas and Oklahoma, totaled \$648 million in 1956. They include agricultural and transportation equipment, construction materials, food and beverages, textiles, paper, chemicals and a variety of other items. Venezuela also purchased from the United States an estimated \$500 million of "intangible" services performed by banks, insurance firms, shipping companies, air lines and innumerable other institutions.

DOG TOYS FOR CHRISTMAS

Your dog will be one disappointed pup if there's nothing under the Christmas tree for him. So make sure there's a toy or two and see that it's wrapped, for dogs love opening packages.

But remember, there are right and wrong toys for dogs. Rubber toys, unless they're the



hard and indestructible type, should be taboo. A piece of rubber, if swallowed, may cause a serious (or fatal) intestinal blockage necessitating major surgery. All but large knuckle bones should be taboo, too. Small bones can splinter or lodge in the throat.

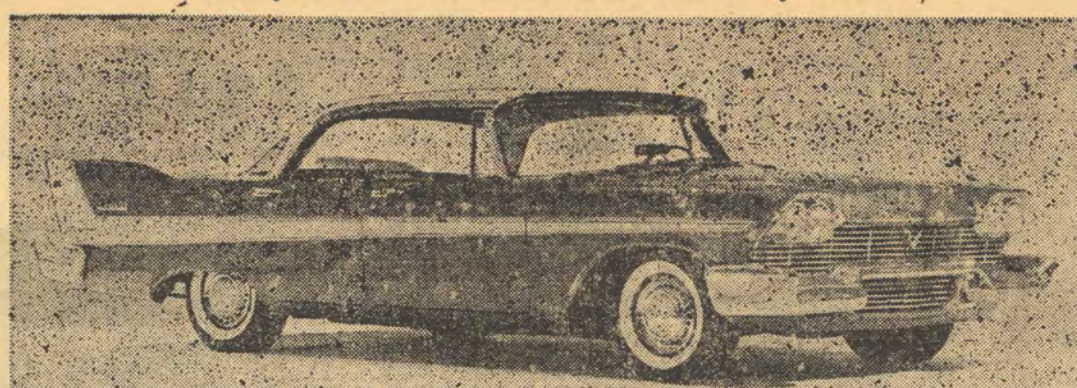
Leather toys are safest, they are fun to chew on and can easily be made at home by you and the youngsters. Get some old inner soles or leather scraps from the shoemaker. If the leather is thin, cut out a couple of bone-shaped pieces with scissors. With an ice pick, punch holes through both pieces, a quarter of an inch apart, and in from the edge. The youngsters can lace both pieces together with a leather shoelace. No need to stick to the bone shape... you can cut circles or boots, leaving the top of the boot unlaced so that it can be filled with cubed dog biscuits.

A tug-of-war toy is also easy to make provided you can get hold of one of Dad's or Junior's old belts. Cut off the buckle and punch a hole at the edge where the buckle was. Secure the two ends of the belt together by lacing a leather shoelace through the punched hole on the one side and the belt notch on the other.

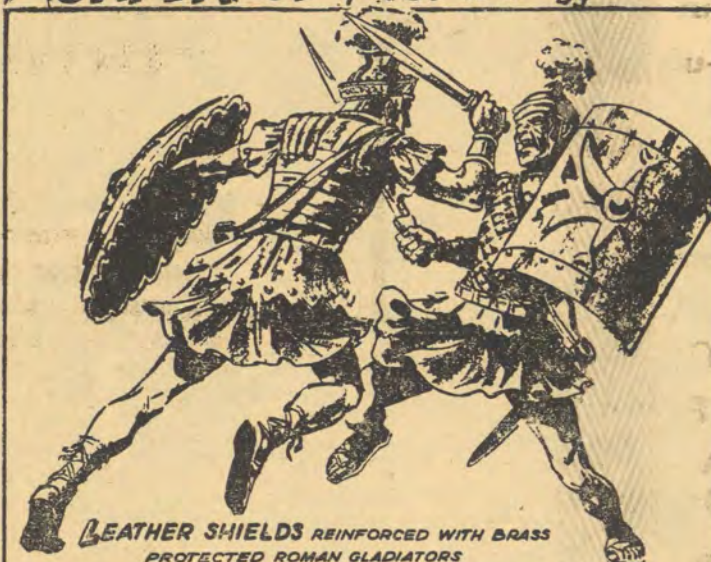
