With Chester

Axemen Prepare For First Game

Baseball coach Al (Happy) Point today released the DHS 1958 schedule.

A total of 13 games are mentioned on the schedule and some of the toughest 'baseball towns' in East Texas are included. Point will throw his charges against the Chester Yellowjackets in a warm-up game this Friday, February 18.

The Lumberjacks, loaded with talent from returning lettermen of the Dist. 22-A south zone championship team of 1957, will take on Livingston here on March 7 in another warm-up affair. The Chester game tomorrow will also be played in Diboll at Miller Park.

Included on the Lumberjack's non-district slate are two opponents who haven't done battle here in many years. The two are Center and Kirbyville, and both are scheduled for two games on a home-and-home basis.

The Axemen march into district play with rival Central Consolidated at Central on April 1. The remainder of the district tiff has Hudson playing here on April 8, Central here on April 11, then the locals finish it up in zone play at Hudson on April 18.

Should they get by Central and Hudson, the Jacks will do a repeat of the 1957 season by meeting tough Hemphill of the north zone of 22-A in a best two-of-three playoff series for the district trophy.

Bad weather has kept the Jacks off the practice field for all but a few days since regular practice sessions began two weeks ago. Players have been working out in the gym, however, and Point said he wouldn't 'try to push' his boys in any of their games until they've had more vigorous workouts on the field.

The Lumberjacks have fielded a large squad this season, and by scheduling some of the larger East Texas schools on the practice slate, Point said he hopes to prove the 'temper' of his potentially powerful team.

The couple have three children, all boys, named Rickey, Larry and Stephen.

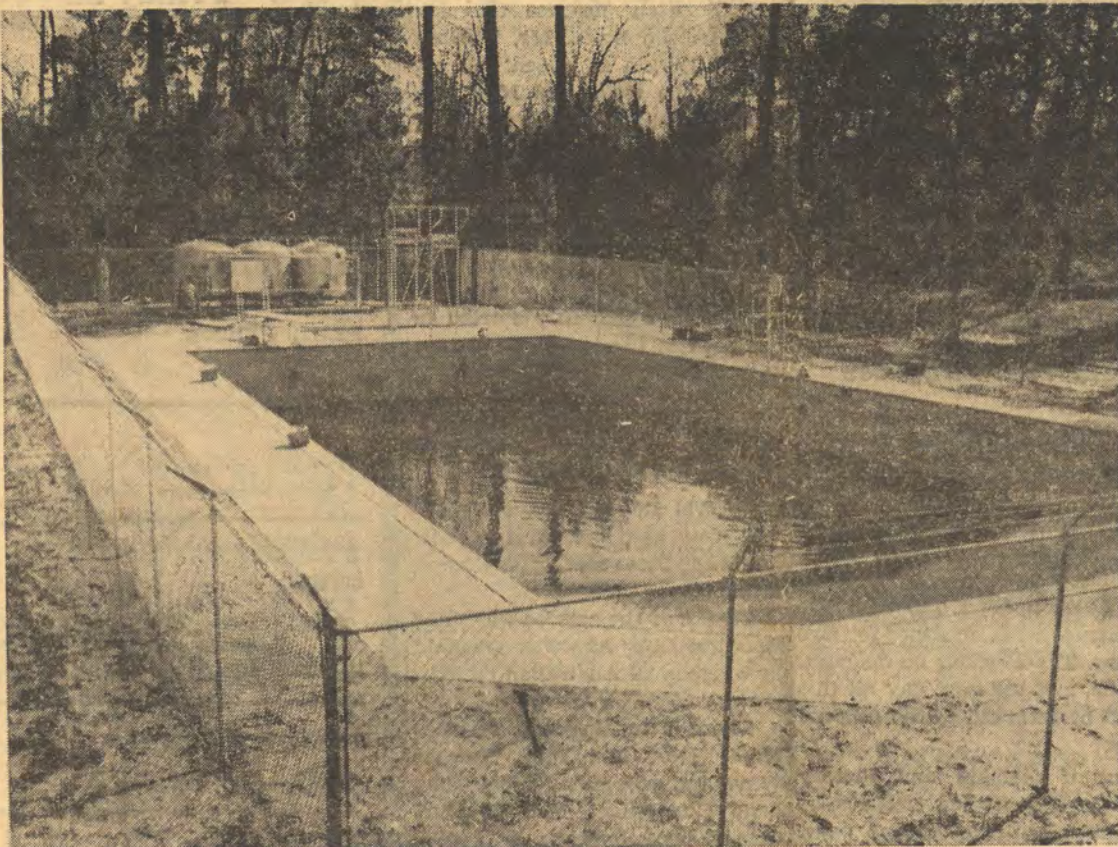
Dean's station will be open from 6:30 until 8:30 p.m. every day.

The incumbent in this race, George N. Johnson, has not yet indicated whether or not he will seek re-election.

Pinkerton's name added to the list makes a total of 19 Angelina Countians who have announced for office races in the upcoming election this year.

Last week William D. Winston of Lufkin authorized The News-Bulletin to announce his candidacy for the state representative seat to be vacated by D. B. (Bryan) Byrd of Lufkin. Winston is currently completing his college education. He's a law student at the University of Texas.

Winston and Pinkerton are the only two candidates who have thus far authorized The News-Bulletin to announce their candidacy. A statement is probably forthcoming from Martin Dies, Jr., who expects to make the race for state senator.

Pinkerton is a long-time resident of Diboll. Prior to moving into the city several years ago he lived near here and was an employee of a pipeline company. He is active in civic activities and until late last year operated the Dairy Kream in The Village.

Law Uncovers No Leads In \$400 DHS Burglary

Local law enforcement officers reported earlier this week that no clues or leads had been uncovered in the burglary of the Diboll High School building last Tuesday night, February 18, in which \$403 in cash was taken.

The burglar, or burglars, entered the building via the south entrance either late Tuesday night or early Wednesday morning, jimmied three safes and a money drawer, and left unnoticed.

Supt. W. F. Pate told The News Bulletin that such large amounts of cash are seldom ever kept at the school. He had intended to make a bank deposit Tuesday afternoon but got busy and forgot it, The News-Bulletin learned.

The money, most of which was taken from a safe in Pate's office, consisted of funds from the grade school cafeteria, cold drink machines, typing fees and various class activity accounts.

The safes, which actually are filing-cabinet-style equipped with concealed combination locks, were ripped open with a heavy instrument, according to officers. This was the case with all the safes except the one in the superintendent's office. The outer door on that safe apparently was opened by key and the burglars then worked the combination. This explanation was the only one that could be given by Constable Dan Fenley, who investigated the theft along with chief deputy Luke Lankford of the Sheriff's Department.

The Sheriff's Department did not take fingerprints, according to Supt. Pate.

Constable Fenley told The News-Bulletin this week that burglars also hit schools at Burke and Corrigan the same night that the \$403 was taken here. Reports said that nothing was missing from either school, except food items from the Burke system.

Fenley said that investigation would continue. In the meantime, officers will be on the lookout for reports on the same type jobs committed in other towns in East Texas.

Supt. Pate told The News-Bulletin: "I feel like this is the work of transient semi-professionals. Those fellows had the tools to work with...the way the south doors were torn open indicates that. Should they hit us again they won't find any money here at all, much less a large amount like \$400."

H. W. Pinkerton this week authorized The News-Bulletin to announce his candidacy for Justice of Peace of Precinct Five, and issued the following statement:

"To the voters of Precinct Five: I have announced my candidacy for the office of Justice of Peace of Precinct Five and hereby take this opportunity to give you a brief look at my background.

"I have been a resident of Diboll for the past 15 years. I'm a married man with grown children, a member of the Methodist Church, and I like to feel that I am being helpful to my community and my many friends in it my being as active as possible in civic projects.

"Naturally I feel I'm qualified to hold the office I am seeking in the first primary, else I would not have announced. I am definitely NOT running against anyone who might be a candidate for the same office . . . rather, I am running for the office itself.

"If I am elected as Justice of the Peace of Precinct Five I will do my dead-level best to perform my duties in a lawful and acceptable manner."

DEPRESSION OF 1932

Most Remember Blackest Period In History When 15 Million Americans Were Jobless

This was the depression.

The peak was in 1932. The government didn't even know how many people were unemployed . . . some economists said eight and one half million, labor sources claims 13 million, and one estimate hit as high as 17 million.

The probable total in the worst of the depression . . . about 15 million.

In that year of 1932, the total wages paid American workers had dropped 60 percent from the 1929 figure; corporation income reported by 450,000 business firms ran five and one half billions under corporation expenses; the automobile industry operated at less than 50 percent of capacity; sales of corporation securities, which provide capital for business expansion, in 1932 were only one-twenty-fourth of the 1929 levels.

But the raw statistics can't tell the whole story.

There were the breadlines and the long lines of jobless waiting patiently outside factory gates in hopes of finding even a few hours work. There pullmans carrying just two people on overnight trips, and hundreds of thousands of migrants riding freight trains in aimless wandering.

Farmers Hit

There were the farmers, as hard hit as their brothers in the city. Farm income in 1932 had dropped from 12 billion in 1929 to five and one half billion in

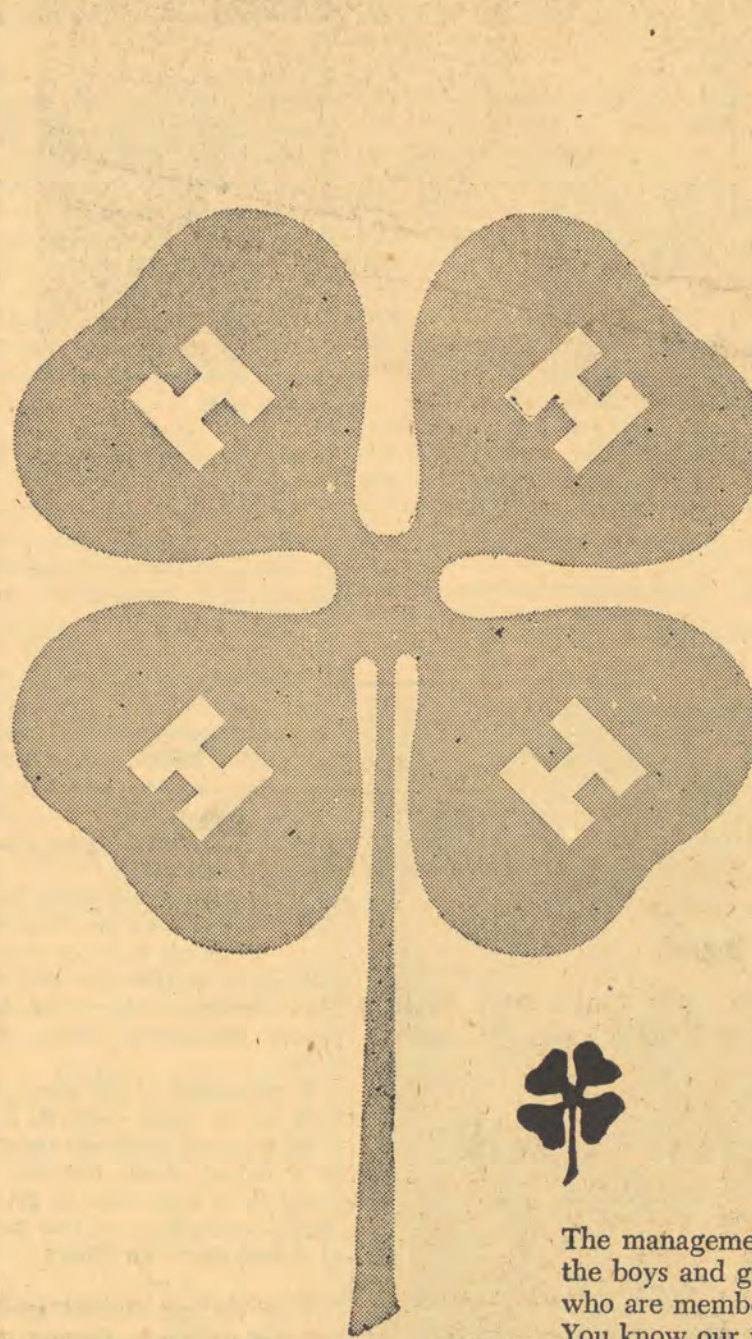

Claims Even The Russians With All Their Science Still Have Farm Problem

Editor's note: The Stovall Creek Philosopher on his Johnson grass farm on Stovall Creek claims he's found Russia has a farm problem. Anything to get the spotlight off his own farm problem.

Dear editor:

I know it's customary these days to believe the Russians can do anything, they just press a button and order up a satellite, they can pause between two sips of vodka and send off a guided missile so accurate it could knock the braces off the corner post in any corner of my pasture out here, if they hadn't already fallen off on their own before it got here, etc., but while I never like to discount the power of the other fellow, still I've always had my doubts about some things in Russia.

For instance, doesn't Russia have a farm problem? I don't care how smart his own newspapers say he is, there never was a dictator so smart he could farm out in the open and never get wet, for example. Or run out of gas, or blow a gasket, or even a flat.

Well, yesterday I was reading an article in a newspaper I found caught on a fence in my pasture—I don't suppose the publisher aimed it there that accurately, but it was lodged there, none the less—that bears out my suspicions about Russian farming.

According to it, the Russian government was having a little trouble with its grain farmers.

As I understand the system, all the land belongs to the government over there, and a farmer has to work as many acres and as many hours as he's told to, and can keep only a small amount of the grain for his own use, the rest going to the government.

Well, that's the way the farmers have been farming, but it turns out most of them don't have room for much grain storage, so naturally they put their own grain in what barns or sheds they have, and carefully pile the government's share out in the open. And just when it came time for the government trucks to pick up the grain, it started raining and the roads over there got

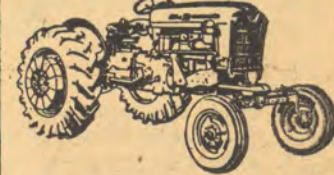
Mary Lou Purcell explained the meaning of the special day in a speech, "Arbor Day." A poem called "What We Plant" was then rendered by Jimmy Farley.

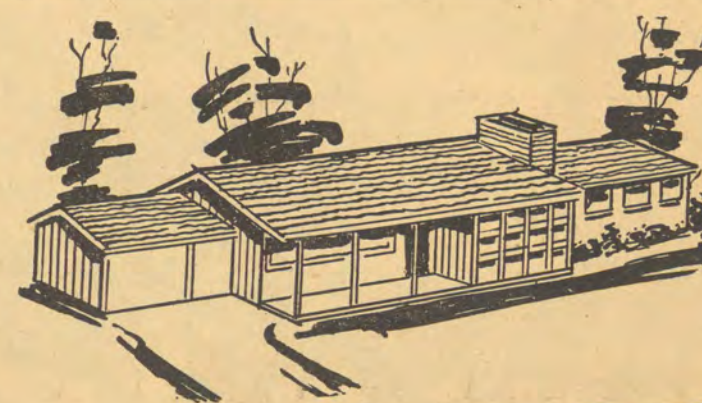
