Post Office Agents Indicate Complete

A representative of the United States Post Office Department was in Diboll last week to study possibilities of constructing a new Post Office building.

This information was released today by Postmaster B. F. Hines.

Hines said that the visit was brought on due to a 25 per cent increase in receipts in February over the same month in 1957. He reported that the local Post Office has registered a 25-30 per cent increase each month of 1958 over a corresponding period a year ago.

Hines said the representative stated he would 'start the ball rolling' to see what could be done about putting up a new building, which would be better equipped to handle the ever-increasing amount of mail.

At least three locations are being studied for erection of a new building, when and if the Department gives its go-ahead signal.

Happy Point's Lumberjacks bounced back from two sound lickings last week to score decisive wins over well-rounded teams from Center and Kirbyville.

The Axemen fell to Center last Tuesday, 5-4, when a seventh inning rally paced by ringing doubles from the bats of Billy Frank Pate and Bobby Ramsey failed to gain enough runs to win.

They bounced back in a game played here Thursday, and smacked the Roughriders thoroughly, 7-3. Larry Goins took the loss at Center, and J. R. Telford relieved just long enough to get credit for the victory in the second contest.

A good Kirbyville team posted a 2-0 win over the Jacks at Miller Park Friday afternoon. The game featured beautiful pitching from the stout right arm of Kirbyville's James Gunter. He was shaky in the first and seventh innings, but worked his way to victory without too much trouble.

He allowed Diboll one bingle, a single by Bobby Ramsey, went on to strike out six and walk six. Larry Goins absorbed his second loss of the season, and the second for the team. He was relieved by Robert Fenley, who held the visitors runless for two innings.

Fenley Sharp Again

Fearless Fenley charged back into the fray Saturday afternoon to pitch a masterful one hit game and beat Kirbyville, 6-1.

Fenley had a no-hitter going into the seventh, when Jim Holway doubled to right field. He struck out 16, walked five and hit one batsman, as he stayed in front of the hitters all afternoon. The powerful righthander, prone to be scatter-armed at times, received excellent backing from his teammates. Third sacker Jerry Brezeale turned a sure hit into an easy out in the fifth with a nice stop of a hot ground-er.

Lynn Springfield took the loss for Kirbyville. He was bailed out by Don Turner in the fourth with the score 3-0.

Diboll's hitting power was provided by Jerry Brezeale, who got two for four, Larry Bowman with two for three, Bobby Ramsey with one for two and Travis Parker with one for two.

Hendricks Walks

Don Hendricks, who thus far has been subbing between infield and outfield, may prove to be Coach Point's best prospect as a lead-off man. Hendricks seems to have a knack of getting walks. He could fill the rightfield position now occupied by Senior Vernon Oaks, who hasn't gotten a hit in seven trips to the plate.

Point still hasn't found a key-stone combination, which leaves his infield vulnerable. Bowman looks like a permanent installation at second and J. R. Telford may wind up at short, which so far has been played by everybody but the batboy.

Point is getting good catching from Mike Kerr and Kelley Welch, although neither has blossomed as a hitter. Welch seems to have the stronger arm, however.

Low Average

First baseman Bobby Ramsey heads Jack hitters with seven hits in 18 times at bat for a .388 average. Other .300 hitters are Larry Bowman with a .375 mark, Jerry Brezeale and J. R. Telford slugging at a .333 clip.

DuBose Announces Competition Dates

Ervin DuBose this week announced dates for district competition in the annual Interscholastic League track and field events.

Diboll will enter the Pineywoods Relays at Nacogdoches on March 28, the Trinity Valley Relays at Trinity on March 29 and the District track and field meet at Nacogdoches on April 2.

DuBose will also coach the high school volleyball team when it goes to the district meet at Huntington on March 27.

He reported Monday that he expects to enter boys in every phase of the three contests. "We probably will concentrate on the broad jump, 880 run and mile relay," DuBose said.

DuBose last year coached Bobby Glover to the Regional meet in the broad jump. Glover was the first Diboll representative ever to place in Regional competition. He missed the state meet by one-half inch in preliminary qualifying round.

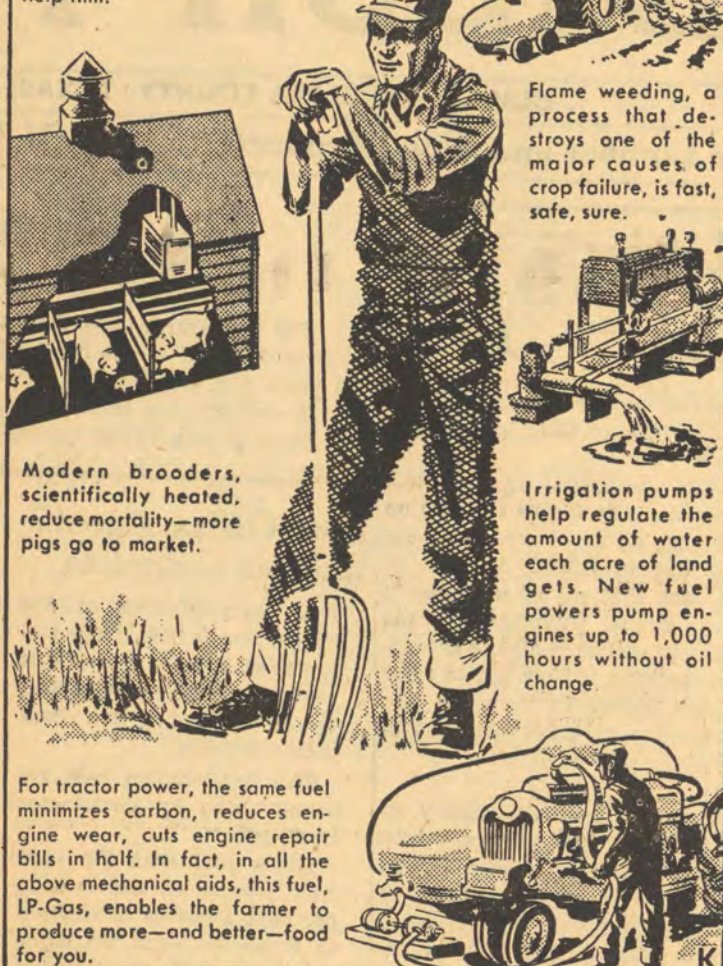

Dear editor:

Generally I'm so busy worrying over whether my own finances are in good or bad shape I don't have time to find out whether the rest of the country is prosperous or depressed. I learned long ago a man could be over-drawn at the bank even at the very peak of the biggest prosperity boom in the history of the nation, but when everybody keeps hammering away at the idea that a recession has indeed turned up, at least in lots of places over the country, I'm not one to argue about it. Recessions don't scare me. I've had em for years.

However what interests me are the solutions being offered to cure the thing, all the way from raising the price of postage stamps and lowering the price of farm products to cutting the income tax rate, although the best one I've read so far came from a top expert in Washington.

According to him, "What the economy needs at this time is primarily more spending by individuals and business."

That's more to my taste. This old idea that you whip hard times by pulling in your belt never did appeal to me, it's like arguing you ought to walk until you can pay cash for a car, it's an attack on the down-payment system, it's an attack against the credit system, and without borrowed money most people would never drive a car and most nations would never launch a satellite. This may not make sense to some people, but you've got to remember some people don't make sense to me.

But back to the idea that the way to whip the recession is for you and me to spend more. I was discussing this with a neighbor and he said it won't work, the reason we're in the shape we're in now, if we are in such a shape, which I'm not sure of, is because people have been spending more than they make.

I'm not saying he's right or wrong, I'm as capable of a politician's viewpoint as the next man, but the world never makes any progress without experimenting, and I'd like for you to get in touch with Washington and inform the experts I'm willing to give th's new idea a trial, I'm not afraid of the pioneering instinct.

If Washington will send me the money, I'll roll up my sleeves and test this theory out. I'll do my part, I'll guarantee to spend every nickel they send me, but I want it understood that an economic experiment of this magnitude takes time and Washington needn't be expecting to get complete results in a few short weeks. You don't wipe out a recession a thousand miles from my farm with one spending spree you've got to chip away at it steadily, month after month. If Washington will start the checks, I'll prop up my mail box out here and get ready to go into action. I won't guarantee it'll work, but here's one job I won't loaf on.

Time has had an equally soothing effect on memories of the shooting incident. The horror is almost forgotten . . . but the humor grows with the years.

The Brave One

Veterans fondly recall how one lawmaker, livid with rage at the height of the shooting, stood up, shook his cane at the gallery where the bullets were coming from and shouted:

"It is against the rules of the House to shoot guns!"

Then there's the story of the newsman who just couldn't conceive of anybody shooting real bullets in the house chamber. He had heard the noise, though it was a gag. He bravely approached the would-be assassins . . . members of a Puerto Rican Nationalist gang . . . to get a 'color' story on some one shooting firecrackers in the house chamber. He turned green when he saw a guard seize the gun and empty a clip of real bullets.

Good Joke

A favorite anecdote of the shooting is the complaint of one lawmaker that he was entitled to 'combat' pay for service in the House . . . and there was the newsman who pinned a temporary identification tag on his lapel while covering the story, the tag reading: "I am not a congressman."

Special Glass

Rep. Joseph Martin, then House Speaker, chuckles when he recalls his first visitor the day after the shooting. It was a safety glass salesman who wanted

to put up a bullet-proof glass partition in the House.

Really Not Funny

To the four terrorists responsible for the shooting, it wasn't humorous at all. They were convicted and given prison terms.

And the five lawmakers who were wounded consider themselves lucky to be alive and still in Congress. They have a date for lunch each year on the anniversary of the shooting.

A Letter From John Dowdy

Dear Friends:
The Willis Subcommittee of the House Judiciary Committee is continuing its study of bills seeking to protect America and the American people from some of the decisions of the United States Supreme Court.

The Senate Internal Security Subcommittee is presently holding a public hearing on the same subject. The Senate bill under consideration would curb the Court by taking from it the right to review decisions in the security field such as convictions for subversion and advocating the overthrow of our form of government by force and violence.

Supreme Court would be deprived of the power to review cases concerning convictions under our national security laws, or for violation of state laws against subversion. The bill would likewise have the effect of protecting the right of local school boards to fire communist and subversive teachers, and the right of the states to bar communist and subversive lawyers from practice in the state courts. The Supreme Court has been denying that the school boards and the states have such rights. The bill would also protect the investigative powers of Congress, which have been impaired by the Court.

The Constitution empowers the Congress to limit the Supreme Court's appellate jurisdiction, but fortunately, only once before in our history has it been necessary to do this. However, it now appears that the Court, unless prevented, is determined to destroy our "checks and balances" system of government, and by usurpation and encroachment, rewrite our Constitution to suit itself, and thus create a judicial oligarchy to replace

KNOW YOUR FEET

By DR. WM. M. SCHOLL

Do your ankles have a tendency to turn suddenly without apparent reason? Don't blame it on "weak ankles." You may be suffering from weak arches.

Ankle-turning, tired feet and tenderness in the heels are frequently early symptoms of weakness that may develop into fallen arches or flat-foot if corrective measures are not taken in time.

The trouble begins when the ligaments that hold the arch in position become strained and the supporting muscles lose their tone. In advanced cases, the foot may lose its natural arching entirely and become partially or completely rigid.

In these cases the ligaments have become so stretched they cannot hold the bones in their natural arched position. Under the crushing weight of the body the arch breaks down until it is entirely flattened.

Weakened or broken arches can cause rheumatic or arthritic-like pains in the ankles, legs and knees, reduced blood circulation in the foot, corns and callouses, and a shuffling, dragging gait.

There are many causes of weak and broken arches. The ailment is common among people whose occupations require much standing and walking. Waiters, policemen, mail carriers, store clerks are all subject to foot strain that may develop into flat-foot.

Adults who gain weight quickly or who carry heavy loads are apt to have weak feet. Among children the ailment is caused by rapid growth that puts additional strain on the ligaments and muscles before they have acquired the strength to support it.

Even favoring one portion of the foot to escape the pain of a corn or bunion may cause sufficient foot imbalance to put abnormal strain on the arches.

Weak arches can be prevented by wearing properly fitting shoes and stockings. Shoe fit is particularly important for children between the ages of five and fourteen.

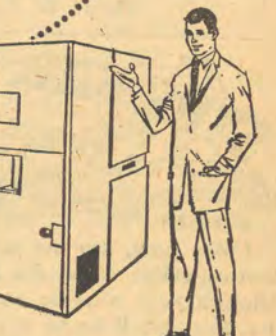

"It takes a lot of patience and understanding to cope with us, I know," one girl said. "Most parents don't want to try to do this. They give us lectures instead."

Independence Vs. Firm Guidance

Parental responsibility is to maintain a balance of giving boys and girls a certain latitude to try out and gain further independence, at the same time providing firm guidance when it is so often needed.

Despite the desire of youngsters to have greater opportunity for making decisions, 90% in a poll said they thought families should get together and discuss each other's problems.

Not Before They Can Swim

Our job is to teach them to swim on their own, certainly—but not to throw them into the very deep water of our complex modern life before they have learned well. We must BE THERE and feel our way on when to give the helping hand.

In my long experience trying juvenile cases I have found that in cases of delinquency the mother and father are usually missing—wholly or partially—from the life of the child. Good relationships, love, and understanding are basic in the child's development.

The record discloses that of the 365 paralytic cases reported last year, 218 were pre-schoolers under five. That figures out to be 59.7 percent for Texas, compared to 45 percent for the nation as a whole.

Of the remaining Texas cases, 44 were between the ages of five and nine; 23 were in the 10-14 age group; 19 were between 15 and 19; and 61 were over 20.

Clearly revealed in these "age group distribution" figures is the necessity of placing special emphasis on the immunization of pre-school children, while at the same time keeping in mind that everyone up to 40 years of age should take the series of three shots in proper sequence.

It still takes almost eight months to take the entire series. The second shot is given two weeks after the first, and the third seven months after the second.

Parents must take the initiative in seeing that their younger children are properly immunized and in getting immunized themselves.

In the four years since the advent of Salk vaccine, its efficiency in conferring immunity against the crippling effects of polio has exceeded all expectations: This is its record of performance for the past five years.

In 1952, Texas suffered 3,984 cases of both paralytic and non-paralytic polio. That was the worst year in state history. In 1953, reported cases totaled 1,751. There were 3,037 cases in 1954; 1,931 in 1955; and 1,359 in 1956.

Now compare those yearly totals with the 729 cases last year—slightly over half the number experienced in the lightest year of the previous four.

The time for parents to take action toward having their youngsters—especially those of pre-school age—vaccinated is right now, before the polio season begins. And parents will be making a mistake if they neglect

to get themselves immunized at the same time.

The tendency of many people is to take one or two doses of vaccine, and forget about the third. True, one shot does give some protection, and two shots give even more. But only by taking that third shot can maximum protection be assured.

Getting vaccine is no problem nowadays as it was in the beginning. Latest estimates put the nation's vaccine supply at 30 million doses.

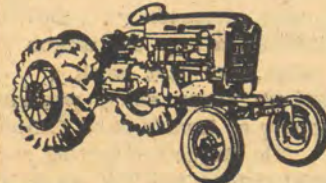

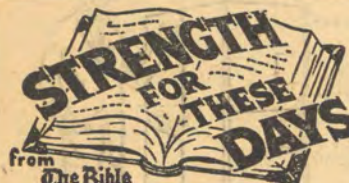

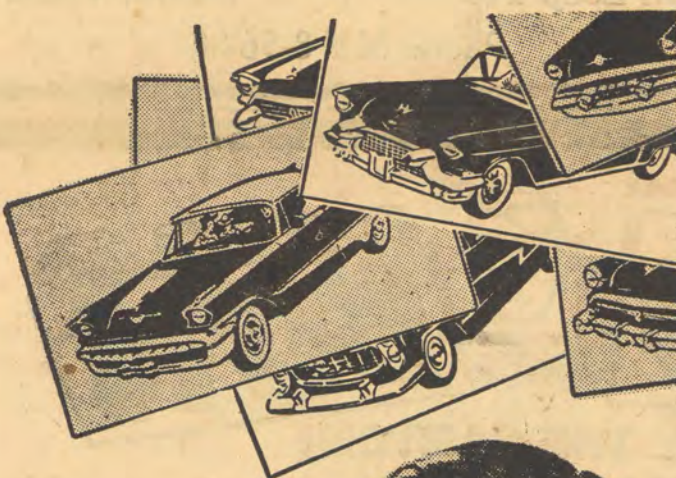
