Ramsey Keeps Slugging Lead For Dibollians

DIBOLL—Bobby Ramsey, a 15-year-old southpaw sophomore, retained the batting leadership for Diboll High Lumberjacks this week after ten games.

Ramsey, who performs regularly at first base and does some pitching chores, has clubbed out ten hits in 27 trips to the plate for a .345 batting average. He has also scored five runs.

Jerry Brezeale another major reason for the Lumberjacks' 6-4 season record, moved into second place with nine hits in 27 appearances for a .333 mark. He has accounted for seven runs.

Larry Bowman, a senior second baseman, holds third place with four hits in 14 trips for a .286 average. Robert Fenley ranks fourth with five hits in 20 trips for .250. J. R. Telford is fifth with two hits in eight trips for .250, and Travis Parker ranks sixth with six safeties in 28 appearances for a .214 average.

Larry Goins has one hit in five attempts for .200. Don Hendricks has two in 13 for .154. Ashworth has two for 20 and .100. Billy Pate has two in 25 trips for .086, and Kelly Welch has one hit in 16 trips for .063.

Fenley is the top pitcher. He has hurled 41 2-3 innings, struck out 67, walked 19, and gave up 20 hits, and has a 3-0 record. He has also permitted 16 runs and 11 earned runs average of .238. Telford, has a 2-0 record, has struck out nine, walked one, and has permitted opposing batters three hits and two runs. For five

D-Navy Set To Navigate Neches For Second Time

Engineers Work To Cure Odors

Arthur Temple, Jr., president of Southern Pine Lumber Company, said today that engineers are investigating waste facilities at the Fibre Products Division (Templeford Plant) to see if reports of odors coming from there are well-founded.

Mr. Temple told The News-Bulletin: "I haven't noticed any unpleasant odors which could be coming from our new plant. However, it's possible that our intermittent operating schedule has resulted in 'fermentation' of portions of our pulp material. If rumors of odors in the air at night are true, we'll do our best to correct the situation. Actually though, I believe that full-time operating schedule should prevent the discharge of any unpleasant smell to our residential sections."

Templeford engineers are checking their disposal procedures to see if all necessary precautions against release of odors have been taken.

Several reports on the new odors, similar to those of the paper mill in Lufkin but less noticeable, were phoned into The News-Bulletin last weekend.

Kids To Go Along As Part of 'Shook' Expedition No. 2

Diboll's own Navy, accompanied this time by a few Lufkin Allies, will depart on 'Shook' Expedition Number Two down the Neches River this Saturday afternoon.

At least ten boats in the 14-16 foot runabout class will shove off from the river bridge on Hwy. 59 near here at noon Saturday, to follow the same course they navigated to Dam B last March 30. The 100-mile cruise to Dam B will take about eight hours running time, according to Temporary Commodore Hillary Poulard who will set the pace in boat The Green Hornet.

Boat captains, navigators, and other officers and passengers will take along their sons. The boys, ranging in age from six to thirteen, also made the voyage last March.

The group which leaves at noon will motor to Rockland where they will spend the night. The remaining 30 miles to Dam B will be gobbled up Sunday morning. The boat captains, their seamen and officers will be greeted at the Texas sportsman paradise by Captain Lynn Mettauer in The Big Mo, a ship too large to navigate the Neches straits.

Trail Blazers

The runabout boats, powered by motors ranging in size from 25-40 horsepower, will again attempt to follow the navigation plans of John O. Booker, who chartered the first Shook Expedition. The 1957 trip was the first recorded voyage made by such a large group from the Hwy. 59 bridge to Dam B. A United States Navy amphib boat made the trip back in 1945, to prove that the Neches was then a navigable East Texas waterway.

Fight Obstacles

In order to reach Dam B the group must go over and around fallen trees, detour around the Rocky Shoals near Rockland and hack their way with axes and power saws through dense underbrush.

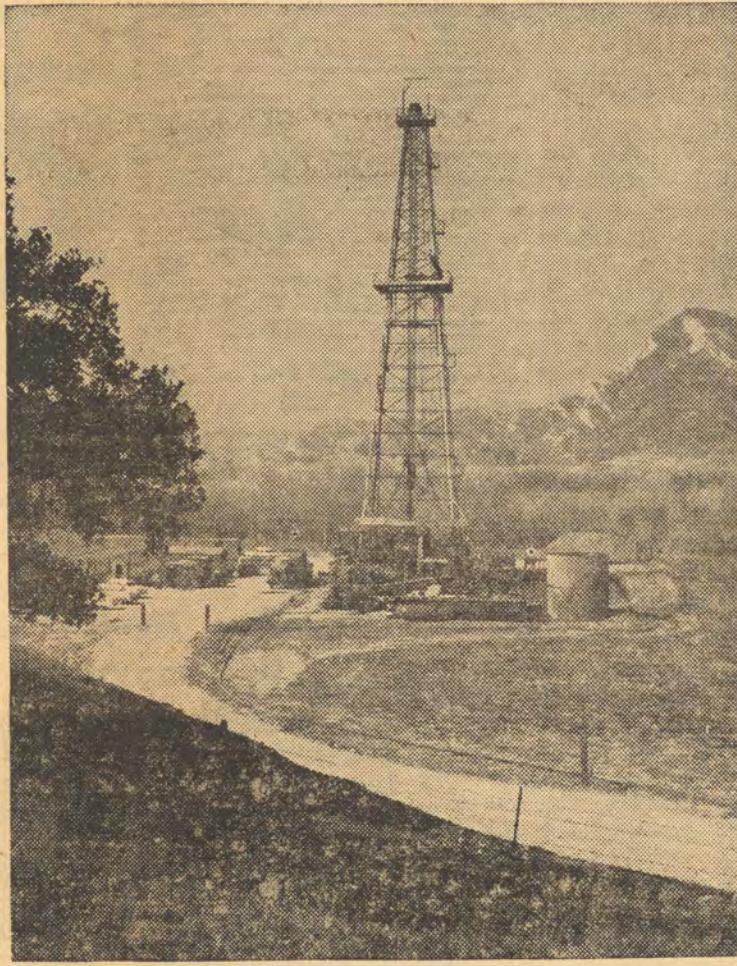
Commodore Poulard said that weather conditions are expected to be favorable, while the river depth (the most important factor) is still a questionable item.

At least three boats will push off early Saturday morning in an attempt to blaze a trail for the large group that will follow. The first boat party will try to make the entire 100-mile trip Saturday.

On The Record

In keeping with the Easter season that has just passed, many record companies have issued or re-issued albums and single sides with a religious theme. Johnny Mathis offers proof of vocal dexterity in a Columbia long play album called "Good Night, Dear Lord." Mathis interprets famous religious songs of various creeds.

One of the better inspirational standards has been re-issued by RCA Victor. It's Perry Como's version of "One Little Candle." This song has also been waxed by Fred Waring on Decca and Jane Froman on Capitol.

The Norman Luboff Choir joins forces to present a dozen religious selections on a Columbia album entitled "The Hymnal." Decca is out with three Fred Waring Easter albums: "Songs of Easter," "The Holy City" and "Songs of Devotion." Also available are the standard single versions of Irving Berlin's "Easter Parade" by Bing Crosby, Guy Lombardo and Al Jolson.

The small fry have not been overlooked this year. Columbia has gathered Rosemary Clooney, Gene Autry, Art Carney and Burl Ives together for their entertainment. They're on an album called "A First Easter Record For Children." The Easter bunny is the cause of most of the warbling, but Miss Clooney also sings "Eggbert, The Easter Egg," while folk-singer Ives sings "Mister Rabbit."

One of the best sounding duets in a long time is one by Frank Sinatra and Keely Smith singing "How Are Ya' Fixed For Love?" It's a Capitol recording with romantic interrogations tossed back and forth by the two. A fine, swinging beat is supplied by Billy May's orchestra and the upbeat tempo and lyrics are reminiscent of the style popularized by the late Buddy Clark and Doris Day. Keely is in fine voice and even shades "The Voice" a bit on this one. The flip side, "Nothing in Common," is also well done. This has all the earmarks of a hit.

The best new group vocal treatment of a standard tune is the Platters' version of "Twilight Time" on the Mercury label. It has a sharp, steady tempo that is nicely paced off. For an excellent sound of a vocal group doing blues in modern style listen to the Four Freshmen match close harmony on a number called "Whistle Me Some Blues." Their dissonant blending never grates and the song moves solidly from start to finish. Fine orchestral backing with Dick Reynolds conducting.

The Freshmen are truly post graduate performers. The song on the back side, "Nights Are Longer" is another treat for those who like modern sounds.

McGee Bend Fight

Whiteman Blasts Note By Colonel

ALTO, Texas—Gus Whiteman, president of the Neches River Conservation District, today strongly protested statements issued by the district engineer of the U. S. Army Corps of Engineers as being "contrary to the findings of the Corps."

Mr. Whiteman said: "In 1954 the Army Corps of Engineers completed a detailed study of the federal McGee Bend Dam project and filed a report of their findings with Congress. This report pointed out that a water conservation and flood control dam would return \$1.69 for every dollar invested but if the money-losing hydro-electric power feature was included in the project the rate of return would be lowered to only \$1.39 for every dollar invested. This document referred to the power feature as 'economically unfeasible' and proposed it be eliminated."

Thursday morning (April 3) a Southeast Texas newspaper reported, "Col. Walter J. Wells, district engineer of the Fort Worth District of the Corps of Engineers said the corps believes the smaller dam would be uneconomical." Gus Whiteman, NRCD spokesman, challenged this statement and wrote Colonel Wells: "We have previously protested the use of your office for propaganda statements on behalf of the power feature in the McGee Bend Dam project. These protests to you have been ignored and unanswered until Thursday (April 3) when you apparently decided to disregard detailed studies of the Corps of Engineers to make additional statements promoting the power feature."

Mr. Whiteman described Colonel Wells statements as "extremely unusual" and said they deserved an explanation in view of the official findings of the Corps.

Mr. Whiteman and the NRCD has been in the lead in the fight for a water conservation dam at McGee Bend without a hydro-electric unit.

The hydro-electric unit at McGee Bend would require 60,000 acres of valuable East Texas farm and timber land, cost \$22.5 million to build, and block basin-wide development of the Angelina River, whereas a gas-fueled generating plant of the same capacity would cost less than \$6-million and require virtually no land.

ty Imported Fire Ant Eradication Committee and tendered his farm for the first aerial application of insecticide to combat fire ants in Texas in order that a large scale test could be made locally of the program contemplated by governmental agencies to eradicate this pest.

Prior to his service in the Legislature Frank Carpenter served three years as Tax Assessor-Collector, Business Manager and Secretary of the Board of Trustees of the Sour Lake Independent School District and seven years as Mayor of the City of Sour Lake. He is quite familiar with school and municipal affairs and problems, and has been a staunch supporter of a better school system for the State of Texas and increased compensation, both from salaries and from retirement benefits, for school teachers, having been a primary sponsor of the \$402.00 annual salary increase passed by the 1954 Special Session and a member of the Statewide Committee of 25 that worked out the program that made this increase possible.

Other accomplishments during his legislative tenure were passage of the Texas Business Corporation Act, a major revision and modernization of our corporate laws, passage of water legislation recommended by the Texas Water Conservation Committee, vital assistance in the passage of the 1955 Securities Act under which the U. S. Trust and Guaranty Company was successfully stopped from preying on the Texas public, and many other bills of wide public interest. He established a reputation for fairness to all and carefully analyzed all factors for and against pending legislation so that his decision to support or oppose a bill would be made in the light of what he thought was right regardless of pressures or personalities on the opposing side. He was as Active in opposing or revising legislation that tended to favor monopoly or limit individual rights as he was in supporting legislation that was in the public interest. A firm believer in a master water conservation plan for each

major watershed in the state, Frank Carpenter is in favor of dams to conserve water as far upstream as is economically feasible. He favors construction of McGee Bend Dam and all other dams that would have sufficient economic value. He also favors improved educational facilities at all levels, continuation of construction of an adequate highway system, and reasonable wage and salary schedules for State employees. He is opposed to a general sales tax and a state income tax.

"I am offering my services as State Senator," he says, "because I think that I can represent all of the people of my district fairly, honestly and efficiently. I feel that my business and legislative experience, my established contacts with a substantial majority of the members of both the Senate and the House of Representatives, and my sincere interest in people and their problems, will enable me to render valuable service to the district and the State of Texas as a whole. My campaign will be based on my record in office, my personal reputation for integrity, ability and fairness, and a pledge to continue in the office of State Senator the same vigorous, impartial and effective leadership that I exhibited as a member of the House of Representatives. STOVALL CREEK PHILOSOPHER

Tackles Farm Price Situation Without Reaching Satisfactory Conclusion

Editor's note: The Stovall Creek Philosopher on his job. - son grass farm on Stovall Creek takes up the farm price situation this week, but he never does make clear what his ideas are.

Dear editor:

Like a bunch of Congressmen, me and my neighbors have been arguing the pros and cons of the farm price situation lately, which was brought on by President Eisenhower's vetoing a bill Congress passed to keep price supports on farm and dairy products at the same level this year they were last year.

Personally, the problem is too big for a long-range standpoint for me to figure out, but you can get some pretty hot statements on the matter from other farmers.

For example, when Ike vetoed the bill, he said what the farm situation needs is not a freeze but a thawing out.

One of my neighbors said, "The trouble with a thawing out is that generally what it amounts to is that prices don't just thaw out, they melt and run down to practically nothing."

Another neighbor said he understood a lot of Congressmen admitted that maybe from a long-range viewpoint it would be ideal to have no acreage restrictions and no fixed prices, but that a lot of farmers don't see it that way and when a Congressman faces a choice of taking a long-range view and getting beat, or a short-range view and staying in, it doesn't take much mental raveling to come to a conclusion.

Another neighbor said it's a lot easier for a farmer with a job in town to take a long-range view of low prices than it is for a man living altogether off the land. That is, he said, "maybe I could wait for the situation to right itself over the next few years and tough out low prices, a while, but my wife and kids don't see it that way. There never was a woman satisfied with being in style five years from now, and very few kids who postponed their education and ever went back to it." He also added that you've got to remember Ike is a farmer who has a job in town.

Personally, the problem is too big for me, and I hereby turn it over to you. Give it some thought and I hope you'll solve it before the month is out.
