LATE MARKET REPORTS

General survey of Southern Pine Lumber Company sales managers show the following trends in lumber and wood by-products markets:

SPIB 77 and 78 Pine lumber sales progressed slightly less rapid in the first 20 days of June than the sales for the first 20 days of May. However, volume has been sufficient to enable us to increase a few prices that were disappointingly low.

Sale of common lumber to retail building material dealers has proved very active and a shortage of these items is anticipated. Southern Pine still has a swollen inventory of No. 1 common and better items. It is hoped that industrial sales will pick up during the third and fourth quarters of this year so that these inventories can be reduced.

Sales of SP Supreme Oak Flooring are slightly off as expected and predicted. Those sales made have been on a satisfactory price basis, however, and shipments tend to continue at a gratifying rate due to orders on hand.

The bulk of unsold inventory of SP Supreme is in a clear grade which can be readily sold at a price above our cost of manufacture.

It has been difficult to predict the general oak flooring market but it is hoped that it will continue to improve as they have in the past 90 days.

Orders for Hardwood lumber are coming in on a satisfactory basis. Prices on most species are holding firm while some items of oak have increased \$5 per thousand. Most dry lumber on hand at Pineland is covered by order.

Orders for the Treating Division have not developed as we would like. This business has been 'spotty' since last October. Even so, a full-time operating schedule has been maintained. Local manufacturers are confident to continue such a schedule.

Some plants are operating only three to four days per week due to lack of orders. Approximate backlog of orders now totals \$250,000, with new business due daily. With this backlog, the local manufacturer is in a good position.

Competition in this field remains keen and prices on treated materials are beginning to soften a little.

Temple Seat sales were down slightly this week. Key field personnel have reported to the home office here that they feel the seat market will firm up in the near future.

Albert (Happy) Basket will be replaced as head basketball and assistant football coach at Diboll High School by two new coaches this fall, according to word received this week from Supt. Wilbur Pate of the local school system.

Mr. Pate said earlier this week that Lonnie Reed of Huntsville has been hired as assistant football coach under head mentor Ervin DuBose.

Elmer Brumble, who served as a full-time teacher at DHS part of the 1957 school year will take over as head basketball coach.

Both changes took place recently after action by the Board of Trustees of the Diboll Independent School District, Pate said.

Point, former major league baseball player, tendered his resignation here last Saturday. The Board had offered to rehire Mr. Point as a teacher, Mr. Pate told The News-Bulletin.

Point said, however, that he had landed a good job with an insurance firm in Houston and he intended to follow up on it. He served as assistant football coach and head basketball coach here last season. Reed's wife Juanita has also been employed by DHS. She will serve as Junior-Senior English teacher. Coach Reed will also instruct in mathematics.

Brumble seems well equipped to take over as head basketball coach. He was a stellar performer in high school and college in that sport and has had experience as a junior high coach.

Yanks, Russians Agree On Floors

In a lecture recently, the subject of Hardwood Flooring versus wall-to-wall carpeting was discussed by Dr. J. W. Rehn, Special Assistant for Pest Control, District of Public Works Office of the Bureau of Yards & Docks, New York City. Dr. Rehn was lecturing at a recent four-day Insect and Rodent Control Training Course in New York.

Says Dr. Rehn, "Nothing has benefited from modern comforts more than household pests. Take the carpet beetle. We are becoming more and more aware of this pest with the spreading use of wall-to-wall carpeting and central heating."

Dr. Rehn pointed out that most pests live in and feed on all kinds of fabrics, wool, furniture, furs and food crumbs. Carpets, of course, are their favorite food and home.

"I am definitely not against all carpets, as I believe homes should be beautiful. I'm only against wall-to-wall carpeting which cannot be taken up occasionally and sent out to be thoroughly cleaned and moth-proofed. Every carpet should be kept cleaned and by all means moth-proofed," explained Dr. Rehn. "Pests should be pursued constantly with mop, brush and vacuum. Above all, don't give them a chance to assemble en masse beneath wall-to-wall carpets."

When asked if he recommends Hardwood floors, Dr. Rehn answered, "As a scientist, I only state the facts. All I am prepared to say is that a Hardwood floor can be kept clean and sanitary without too much work, thus protecting you and your family's health and property."

An interesting sidelight to this interview is the fact that only a few blocks away a group of Russians were attending the World Housing Forum. They were completely flabbergasted why anyone would want to lay wall-to-wall carpeting over beautiful Hardwood parquet flooring. Their spokesman said, "It's nice, but it's like taking a good suit and then putting a good coat over it."

Mmes, Elnoree Daniels, Eunice Curry, Jimmie Wilroy, Elsie Abney, Lillie Spivey, Deloris Brown, Beulah Goodwin, Faye Rogers, and Pearl Yeoman, instructor.

The exhibit is composed of oil and water color paintings done in traditional style. The majority of the works were done from original studies 'set up' by Mrs. Yeoman.

Eunice Curry's painting of Beethoven's bust captures the intense expression of the noted musician. The contemporary rendition of the roses in the foreground of this picture gives a dramatic contrast to its musical atmosphere, whose tone is enhanced by vivid and contrasting colors.

The watercolors done by Elsie Abney expresses her exceptional skill in utilizing to the fullest the radiant richness, spontaneity and freshness peculiarly characteristic of this medium. By her interplay of tones and colors one is able to discern the atmosphere of the scenes she presents.

The Gladiola study by Lillie Spivey is unusual in its composition. In design the horizontal arrangement of the Gladiolas is effectively contrasted by an upright vase in the background. The flowers as the center of interest

is supported by a difference in colors and values in other areas of the painting.

Simplicity is the dominant feature in the two flower studies by Beulah Goodwin, in both line and color. These, along with the clarity subtle gradation in color presents a most charming effect.

Of special significance in the 'Apple' study by Jimmie Wilroy is the delightful contrast between the color of fruit and the surrounding surface. In this we see a departure from the conventional presentation to a style reminiscent of the expressionist school introduced by Paul Cezanne.

The 'Still Life and Fruit' by Faye Rogers reflects a particular feeling for form and color. This work also shows the artists individual ability to capture the essence of the subject matter.

Deloris Brown's painting of roses presents a study of color articulation. The simplicity of the directional line effects and contrast in colors gives this composition a pleasing design and feeling of gaiety.

In 'Memories,' Elnoree Daniels expresses with photogenic skill, the details of her subject matter. Her color harmony and design quality represent advanced skill in the artistry of oil painting. This we see in the subdued but colorful drapes which form an effective background for the intensity of the color of the flower arrangement.

'East Texas Pines,' by Pearl Yeoman, is a study of the pines in the Diboll locality. Through the use of richness in color and tone effects in which she reflects lights and shadow this artist expresses the spirit of grandeur characteristic of the pine. The emphasis upon the upright lines in the trunks of the trees is cleverly relieved by the foliage on the trees and a winding road, leading the eye into the depths of the woodland.

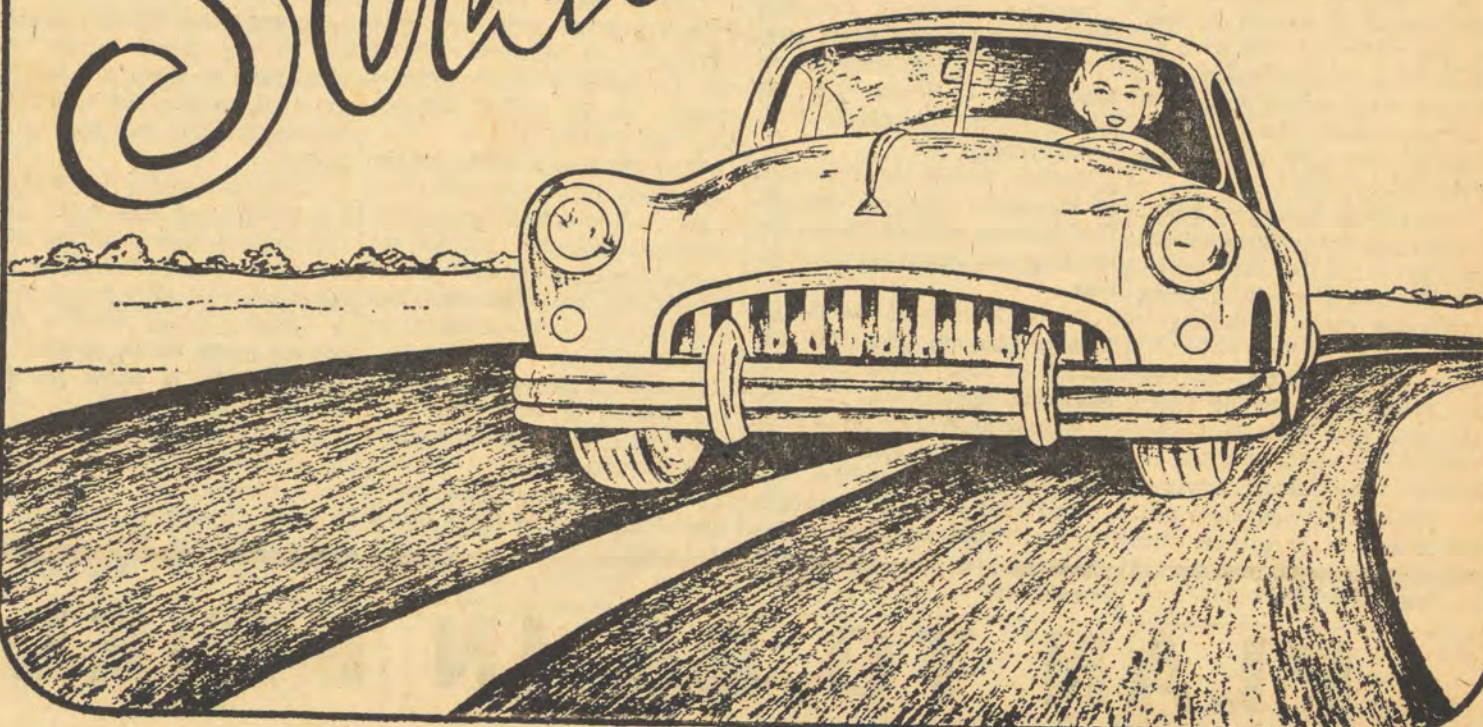
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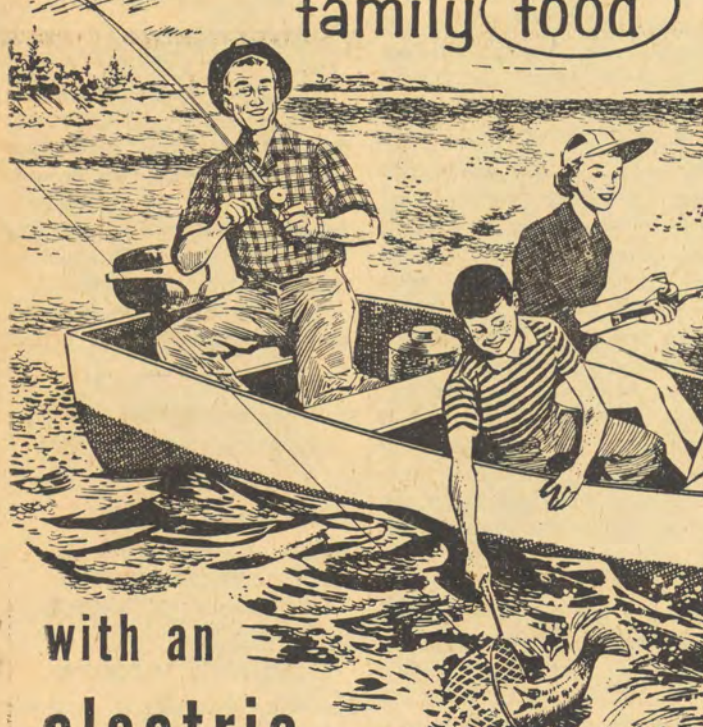

Since most of our Diboll fishermen are members of the Ryans Lake Club, and are affected by it, it is only fitting that this column be dominated with the activities and conditions of that area.

For a time the roads into the lake area were pretty well rutted out by logging activities and loose sand made it hard pulling for the family car. However recent rains have packed the sand and helped the roads instead of making them worse. The lakes are clearing fast and by the time this finds its way into print, and barring more rain, they should be in good shape for all kinds of fishing.

This of course will be especially good news for the ladies, as

they usually like to white perch and bream fish.

An unusual amount of fish have already been taken out of these lakes but they are by no means fished out. Up to now we have only been taking the small ones. And the large fish never give you much play in a river lake until you get the small stock out of the way.

This is true especially in relation to the sun perch and bream, since they are the chief diet for the big large-mouth bass that we like to think are lying in the shadows... waiting for a top water plug. So far, the fishermen who like to drown worms and work a top water fly, the prospects are good and we need your services.

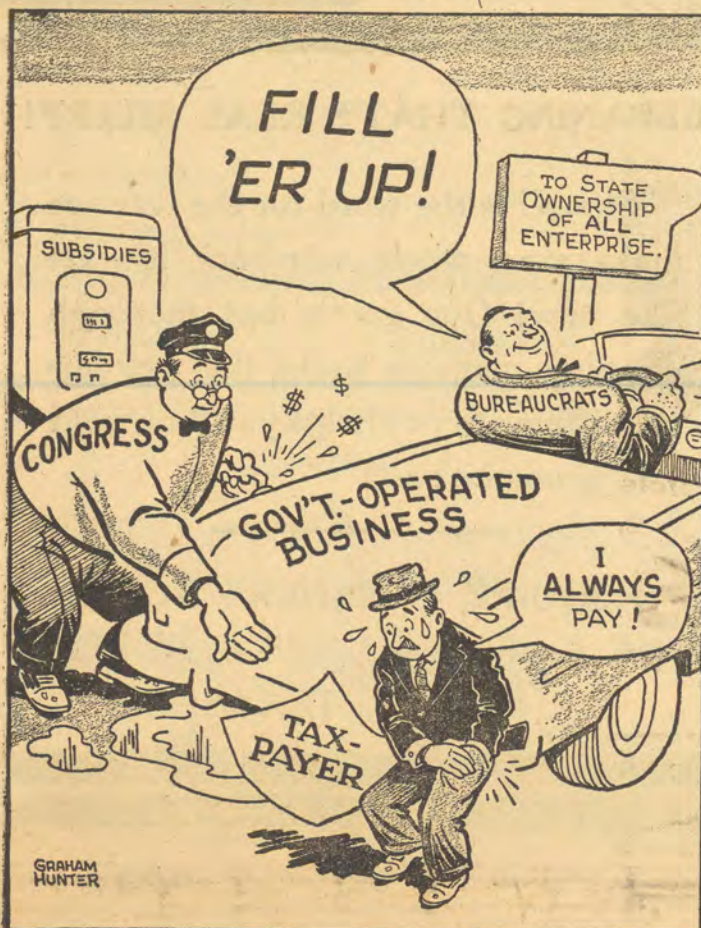

A LETTER From ... DOWDY—

Dear Friends:

The communists have given new evidence that they cannot be trusted in any of their statements or agreements. They recently executed former Hungarian Premier Imre Nagy, and others, as an aftermath of the 1956 Hungarian revolt.

It will be remembered that Nagy and some 41 others took refuge in the Yugoslav Embassy at the time. They left the Embassy after the communists gave a guarantee of their personal safety. In spite of this guarantee, they were immediately arrested. Then early this month Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev sent orders to the Hungarian Government to send Nagy and his associates to trial, and to execute them at once, which was done. On yesterday, June 19, both Houses of Congress adopted resolutions, condemning this perfidy and inhumanity of the part of the communists.

You know of my continuing fight for honesty and against graft and corruption in government. This is a thing about which we must be always alert. Expensive and elaborate "gifts" to government officials and "influence peddling" are ever present dangers. Only a few weeks ago, Federal Communications Commissioner Mack was forced to resign because of "loans" he had received. In the last several days it has developed that Assistant to the President Sherman Adams has accepted an expensive vicuna coat, a high priced oriental rug, and over \$2000 in hotel accommodations from one Bernard Goldfine. Mr. Adams called two federal agencies from the White House to make "inquiry" on behalf of Mr. Goldfine.

A call from the White House to a federal agency is almost in the nature of a command, even

though perhaps not intended as such. To say the least, it is not in strict conformance with political integrity and morality. This affair should be and will be more fully investigated.

The House passed a bill this week which would make it legal for the Federal Government to give away to foreign countries our atomic secrets and atomic materials. I voted against the bill because I feel it imperils our nation's defense to scatter our nuclear secrets over the earth, and because of the great cost of the atomic materials which would be given away.

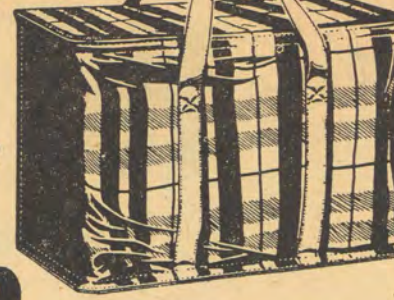

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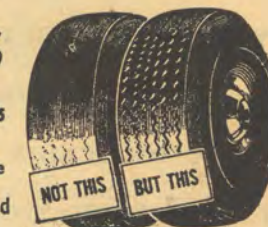

Bread 'n Butter

The National Lumber Manufacturers Association in Washington is a federation of something like sixteen associations concerned with working for different woods and wood products.

Some of these associations are Southern Pine Association, to which most good southern pine lumber manufacturers belong; Western Pine Association; West Coast Lumbermen's Association; Southern Hardwood Producers, Inc. (most producers of hard-

wood lumber in our region belong to this one); National Oak Flooring Manufacturers Association and Hardwood Dimension Manufacturers Association.

These great organizations have just united within NLMA behind an unprecedented multimillion dollar program to promote wood in competition with aluminum and brick and concrete and all the substitutes which have been making such alarming inroads against forest products.

If this big program, which will start around the first of the year, will just get the folks who depend on forest products for their "bread and butter" sold on their own industry's products, it will be worth every cent of the cost.

If every East Texan in the pine woods area understood, for instance, how superior sill and joist floor construction is over concrete slabs and if he would explain its superiority to everyone who would listen, the mills in East Texas all might have to run overtime to supply the demand.

The sills and joists and sub-floors represent something like one-fifth of the lumber that goes into a house. Concrete slabs came in during war shortages as a cheap substitute for the kind of floors most of us have always known.

Thank goodness they did, for it was more important that folks have inferior houses than no houses at all. The harm has been done in having people commence believing these concrete floors are just as good.

That is just not true. Concrete is wonderful for a lot of things, but not for the floor of a home. Why? In the first place it is not as comfortable as a wooden floor. Nor as healthy, in the opinion of many experts. A woman standing on concrete all day can tell anyone this is true.

A father who has scuffled with his kids on a concrete floor, carpet or no carpet, can tell you this is true. Furthermore building on concrete is like building on the ground. Our forefathers learned a long time ago in this part of the country that the termites will eat you up if you build on the ground.

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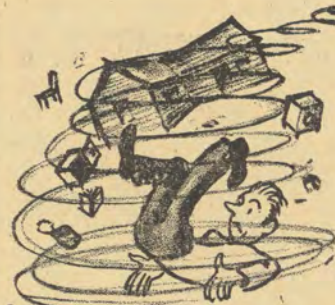

Smith had a set of books which Brown wanted. Brown wrote and offered him \$200 for the set.

Smith didn't answer for six months, and meantime Brown bought a similar set. One day Brown got a letter from Smith saying "I accept your offer of \$200 for the set of books."

Brown told Smith he'd bought the books elsewhere, but Smith still claimed that his belated "acceptance" had nevertheless sealed the contract with Brown.

Was there a contract? No, the offer had lapsed because it had not been accepted in the circumstances within a reasonable time.

There are many ways to end an offer. You may withdraw it, you may say that the offer expires at a given time, or you may die, or the other party may turn it down directly of by making a

counter offer.

Here Smith had failed to accept Brown's offer within a reasonable time, which ended it just as though it had been withdrawn.

What is a reasonable time? It varies. The offer could expire in a few minutes in the stock market or last for quite a while, depending upon what a court would think is a reasonable time.

But in Smith's case six months was unreasonable.

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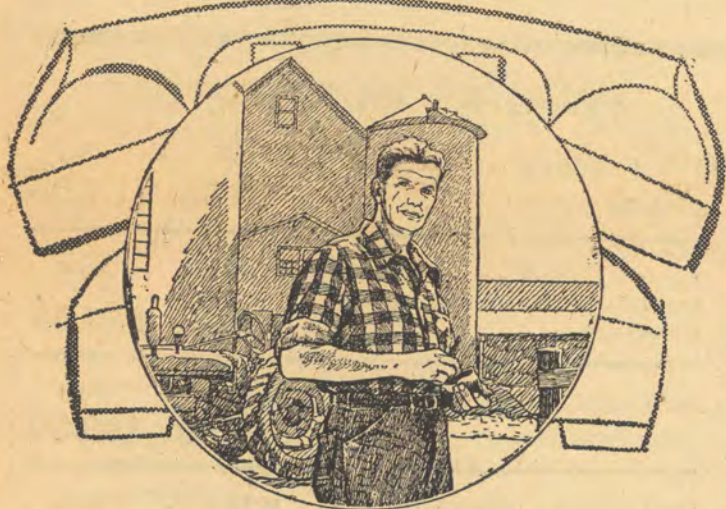
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The Babson Statement

Babson Discusses Tax Cuts And Small Businesses



Roger W. Babson

BABSON PARK, Mass., June 12. There is now much talk about tax cuts. Some say they are overdue, regardless of recession. Certainly, the time has come to give small business more attention.

DEFICIT FINANCING NOW MEANS CONFISCATION LATER

With so many governmental expenses constantly mounting, whether for national defense, for domestic welfare, or for various economic subsidies, "something's gotta give." We can be sure that so long as we are in an arms race with Russia, the "giving" will not be in the vast expenditures for Explorers and Vanguarders or for atomic submarines. I also fear that any party which advocates belt-tightening in domestic welfare measures could not be placed in office in the next election.

The above means deficit financing and borrowing from the future which, if ever paid will, be in far-distant days. Or we may repudiate the borrowings, as was done when we went off the gold standard in 1932. This would surely lead to further inflation—clipping the currency and reducing the purchasing power of the dollar.

IMPORTANCE OF A JUST BALANCE

Various adjustments will be made in the attempt to restore a fair balance between vital economic segments. In this connection, the organized movement to keep independent small competitive businesses in existence has been gathering momentum for 50 years, after a period of great overconcentration in big business even to the point of monopoly.

When the economic machinery goes into a tailspin, unemployment comes first and is greatest in the large industries. The small businesses, especially the 95% of firms which employ 20 or fewer people, operate even in times of boom with a minimum of workers and therefore can not lay them off in times of recession.

PRaise FOR THE FEDERATION OF INDEPENDENTS

The lack of concerted action, until recently, by organized small business (such as the National Federation of Independent Business), has allowed many inequities and discriminations to get into our tax structures. Among the shackles placed on new and small businesses are the privileges and subsidies given to large-scale business by the government. These include research grants for defense work.

Machinery developed by these large concerns, with tax money, also works to the disadvantage of their small competitors. With research now such a vital ingredient of all business, this artificial advantage to bigness is crucial. If research grants to smaller companies, had been adequate, Russia might not have beaten us into space.

OPPOSES ACROSS-THE-BOARD CUTS

Tax allowances for depletion and accelerated depreciation of material resources favor the large concerns. But no allowances are made for the depletion of human resources suffered by small owner-operators, such as 14-hour a day storekeepers and their families. Large concerns receive fast write-offs on new machinery and equipment. But small companies which rely largely on second-hand equipment are not allowed similar write-offs. This discrimination at least as large a proportion of earnings as the bigger concerns.

In family life we do not put as heavy a burden on boys as on should be removed. Small companies should be allowed to retain men. But in taxation we do place too heavy a load on new and small businesses. There should be an exemption of \$25,000 of net earnings for small businesses; and corporation taxes, like individual taxes, should be graduated. These economic injustices and inequities of the present tax structure would only be perpetuated by an "across-the-board" tax cut.

IMPORTANCE OF SMALL BUSINESS

Upon the survival of smaller business depends the survival of our middle class as owners and operators of productive property. A middle class of hired men will not suffice to protect our economic, social, and political freedoms. A sound program of forestry makes provision for saplings as well as for mature trees. The economic saplings are the real "growth industries", insuring a healthy future. We must give more encouragement to accentuating the values of individual incentive. America's greatest danger is not from enemies without, but from enemies within. I have in mind too big bureaucratic government, too big business, and too big labor.



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NO COMMENT

One of the major pieces of legislation pending in Congress is opposed by industry on the ground that it would prevent price reductions to meet competition.

This is regarded as unfair to the public and to industry because it would encourage price rigidity and deprive consumers of the benefits of free and open competition.

The principal threat at the present time comes from a Senate bill sponsored by Senator Kefauver (D-Tenn.) and others.

It would nullify the defense, now available to price discrimination charges, that price cuts were made in good faith to meet lower prices put into effect by competitors.

Enactment of this measure would place in jeopardy current business practices and threaten with legal prosecution anyone who wishes to retain customers by meeting lower prices available from competitors.

This bill has been reported, without recommendations, by a Senate Judiciary Subcommittee to the full committee. The full committee started considering it May 5 and action can now be taken at any time.

A similar measure, by Rep. Patman (D-Tex.), is pending in the House Judiciary Committee. If the Senate should pass its bill, House action would be promptly urged by supporters of the proposal.

Not to be overlooked is the fact that the House, in 1956, passed the Patman bill by the overwhelming vote of 393 to 3. Admittedly, many House members were not aware of the serious import of the legislation and cast their votes on the basis of incomplete information.

They were swayed (for the time being) by arguments from the bill's supporters that it was intended to protect small business and preserve "equality of opportunity."

Opponents of the measure made certain that members of the Senate understood its real nature. The result was that there was no Senate action in 1956—and the bill died with the expiration of the 84th Congress.

But its advocates started all over again when the 85th Congress convened in January, 1957. They decided to try first for Senate action and then, if successful, renew the battle in the House.

An increasing number of Congressmen are becoming aware that the measure, if enacted, could well drive many manufacturers, wholesalers, jobbers, and other distributors out of business. Actually, small businesses

likely would suffer the most. The freedom to meet the price of his competitor is especially vital to the small manufacturer or distributor, who may not be able to offer all the credit or other facilities at the disposal of larger companies—and must depend on the price tag as his ace-in-the-hole.

The purpose of the legislation is to overturn a United States Supreme Court decision of 1951 which said that when a businessman is faced with loss of a customer to another firm offering lower prices, he may reduce his own price "to meet an equally low price of a competitor," if he does so "in good faith"—that is, to retain his customer and not to squeeze out his competitor or to build up a monopoly.

The decision upheld the traditional American freedom of competition—which through our history has protected the consumer against monopolistic practices.

This competition should be preserved. The nation should not let competition be stifled by the proposed legislation.

State Bar president Virgil T. Seaberry of Eastland predicts an attendance of some 2,500 lawyers and their wives during the meeting, to be held at the Gunter Hotel. Hustmyre is retiring chairman of the State Bar board of directors. He will be succeeded by Tonahill as a board member for the Second District at the conclusion of the four-day meeting.

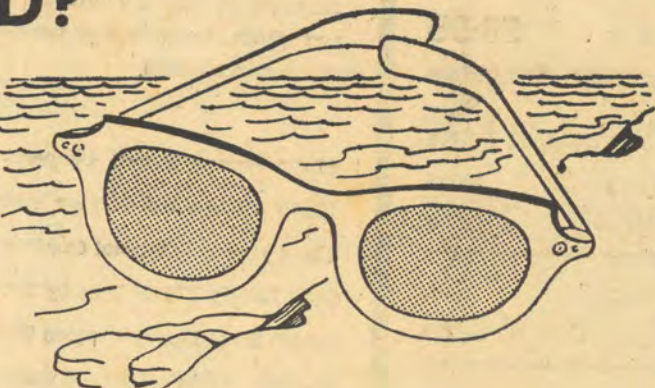

As Elvis put it: "I guess I've always been interested in acting. It's more of a challenge. I might even try Actors' Studio or some other acting school after my discharge. I want to be more than a singer. I'd have a longer future as an actor, I'm sure."

But Presley adds that he won't ever stop singing . . . not as long as people keep buying his records.

In Elvis' own words: "After all, I am a singer. But there's no reason I can't do both, like Crosby and Sinatra have done. I think both improved as singers after they learned how to act."

Singer Tony Bennett credits his jazz musicians with a big assist in his success as a pop singer. The hard-working song writer, who has a strong number going for him in "Young, Warm and Wonderful," says "having jazzmen with me means I never get

stale."

He features them in his personal appearance dates and the solid work of Shelly Manne and pianist Ralph Sharron heaped sock Bennett songs like "One For The Road," "From This Moment On," and "Just In Time," plus his early applause-getter, "Rags To Riches."
