VACATION



IT WOULD be difficult to say just *who* knows better than anyone else that Lufkin Foundry and Machine Company's business has been way below "normal" for many, many months.

No one would challenge the fact that employees of this Company know business has been bad. The lesser amount on their paychecks due to short work-weeks is irrefutable evidence.

At the same time, Management and the stockholders who have invested in this Company know without doubt that the past year and the first six months of this year did not measure up to the usual volume of business.

The salesmen who travel numerous miles each week, wait long hours in customer reception rooms only to be told when they see the purchaser that there will be "no buying this week" can testify that business has not been good.

The merchants in Lufkin and the surrounding areas who depend heavily upon employees' purchasing power are quick to declare their knowledge that "the Foundry's business is off."

But at this particular time of year, there is something else that occupies the minds and hearts of Lufkin Foundry employees and their families. It is vacation time!

Until the latter part of May, that fact didn't particularly bring joy to employees, for many employees under the labor agreement between the company and the union, did not have the minimum number of hours to be eligible for a paid vacation.

However, Lufkin Foundry and Machine Company has offered and the union has agreed to waive the 1400-hour minimum provision in Section 1 (d) of Article XIV of the labor agreement between the company and the union for determining vacation pay eligibility for the year June 1, 1960 to June 1, 1961.

According to Management, the Company desired to completely disregard the minimum provision because it affected most those who were hurt most because of lack of work. The Foundry Department, with particular emphasis on the Main Bay, and the Trailer Division were hardest hit by lack of work and the vast majority of these employees were not eligible for vacation pay under terms of the labor contract.

"It must not be assumed that this is setting a precedent by any means," stated E. P. Trout, vice president. "The Company is willing to do this because the money is available and because we recognize

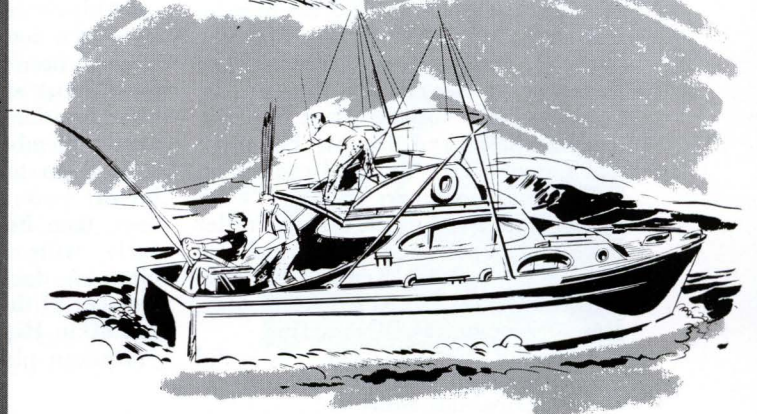
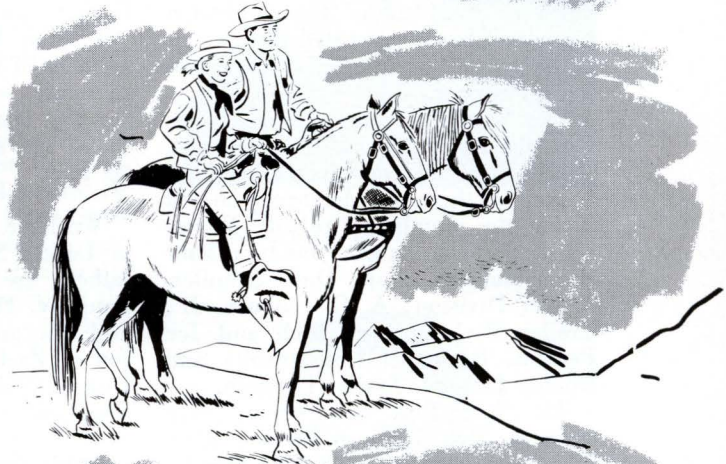
the importance of paid vacations. On the other hand, there may be times when the money would not be available, and the Company could not make this concession regardless of our personal feeling in the matter."

It has been agreed between the Company and the union that this action on the part of the Company is for the year June 1, 1960 to June 1, 1961 only, and will not be regarded as a precedent in determining vacation pay for any future year.

Thus when the plant shuts down on June 30 until July 10, your Company will have distributed approximately \$300,000.00 in vacation pay to employees.

According to the offer made by the Company and accepted by the union, one-year employees will receive 2% pay for the number of hours worked during the year. The five-year employee will receive 4% pay for such hours worked, and the 15-year man will receive 6% pay for such hours worked below 1600 hours. Employees who have worked 1600 hours or more during the year will, of course, receive vacation pay in accordance with the terms of the contract.

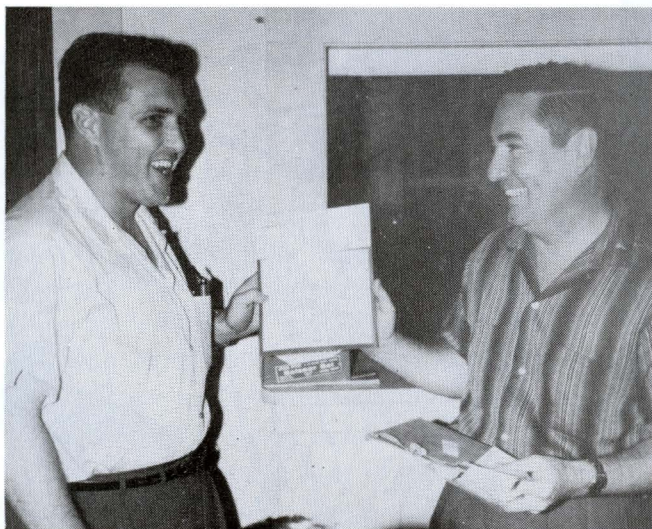

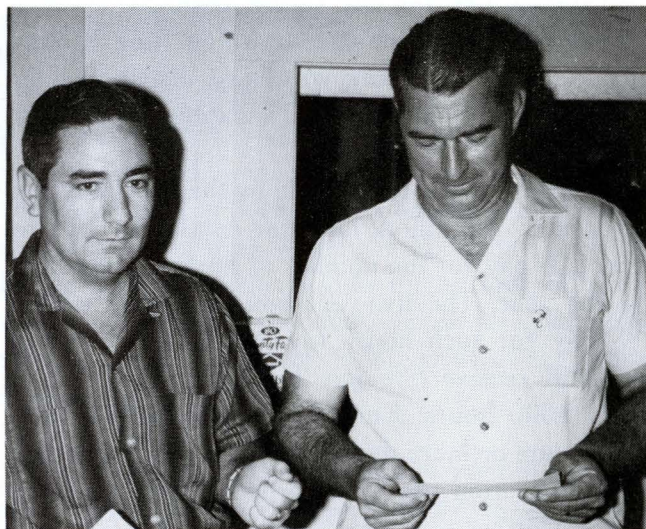

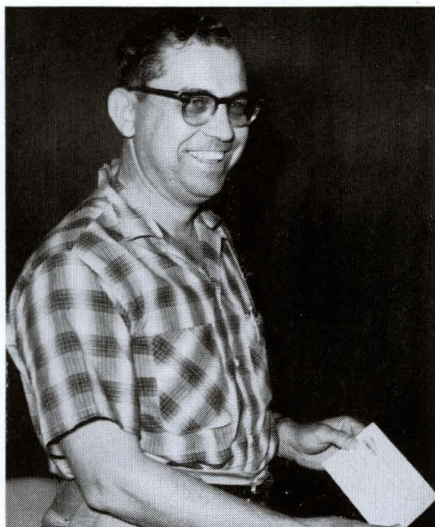
PRESTON WESTBROOK gets belt buckle as having the most improved average during the season.

"LOAN oft loses both Itself and Friend.."



(Editor's Note: The following editorial written by Leslie Gould and printed in the Los Angeles Evening Herald & Express was re-printed in Union Oil Company of California's employee magazine, SEVENTY-SIX. We believe it should have wider circulation and we are carrying it in this month's **FOUNDRY ROUNDUP** with thanks to the author and SEVENTY-SIX.)

SINCE the end of World War II, the United States has handed out in foreign economic and military aid the staggering sum of \$821 $\frac{1}{4}$ billion.

This is on top of \$51 billion in lend-lease, making a grand total of foreign aid in the last two decades more than \$133 billion. Only a token amount has been paid back.

Recipients of this aid include friends and foe—past and present.

Never in history have a people given so generously, asking nothing in return beyond that these countries raise their living standards and live in peace with the rest of the world.

Yet in the current session of the United Nations, the U. S. is defending itself against charges of war-mongering and imperialism, including the diatribe of a bearer stooge of Communism in neighboring Cuba—a country set free at a high cost of American lives and money.

On a critical vote—such as seating Red China, whose soldiers took a high total of American lives in Korea—the U. S. margin of support contracted.

The vote was 42 backing the U. S. position of non-admission, 34 in favor and 22 not voting. Last year the vote was 44 against, 29 for and 9 abstaining.

In addition to the above, there is the more than \$11 billion in lend-lease the U. S. gave Russia, on which to date Moscow refuses to make even a token payment. It was this \$11 billion that started Russia on her way to becoming an industrial power.

The handouts from the United States in the last two decades equal the total cost of the U. S. Government from the start of World War I up to the start of World War II.

The aid—military and economic since the war—including that for the current fiscal year, is nearly four times the income taxes paid by American business concerns, and nearly twice the annual tax bite on individual taxpayers.

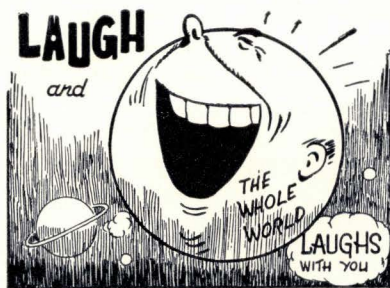
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A lawyer named "Strange" was asked what he would like to have inscribed on his tombstone.
