Highlight of the evening were the tales Westbrook told on each of the retiring employees. He assured his audience that everything he said was true and would stand up in court.

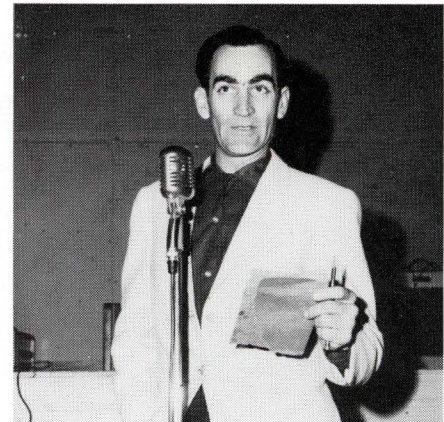
