Arthur Warren... Sportsman

BASEBALL, boxing and racing are just a few of the sports Arthur Warren has tried in his lifetime. "I always liked to give anything one try," Arthur confesses.

Arthur, foreman in the Trailer Division, admits that it is the challenge as well as the enjoyment that prompts him to participate in a new sport.

Arthur's baseball days date back to when the Lufkin "Angels," a professional team, played in 1948. Although the "Angels" existed for only a year, he recalls the exciting games played with other Texas League teams.

From 1946 to 1950, Arthur was a member of the Foundry-sponsored baseball team. Arthur remembers those games as pretty exciting too. He played the position of catcher while on the Foundry team.

Later, Arthur participated in softball when Lufkin had many softball teams in a league. He played for several different Lufkin teams. In 1962, he was selected to play with the Lufkin All Stars team at the Shreveport All-Stars City Tournament.

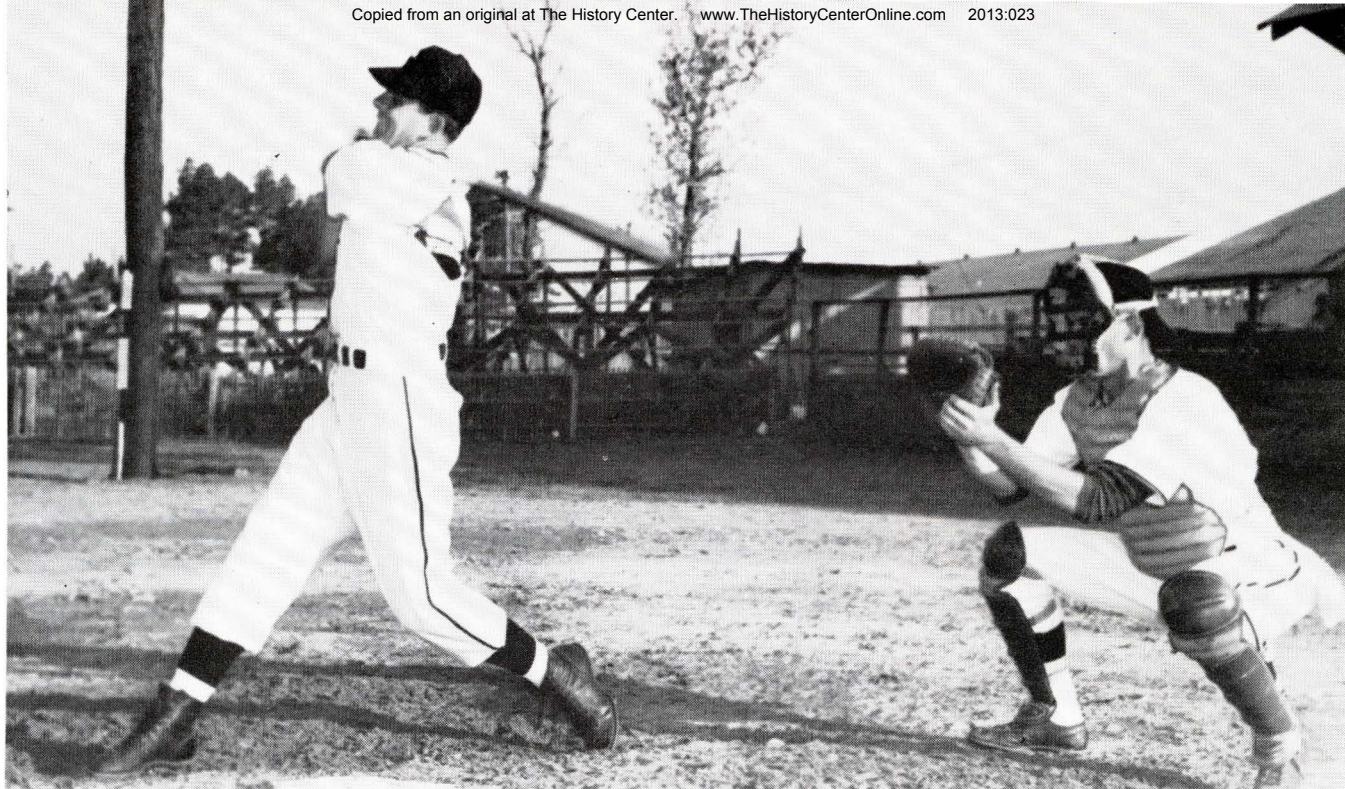
Many of Arthur's later sports interests stemmed

from his Marine Corps days. He joined the Marine Corps in March, 1944, where he spent 14 months in the Pacific. As a member of the Second Marine Division, he was one of the first troops to occupy Japan.

Some of his Marine Corps training in boxing prompted him to take up this sport following his discharge from the service. In 1947 and 1948, Arthur fought in the Golden Gloves bouts in Lufkin. Golden Gloves officials watched a person work out and assigned them a local partner for a match. Arthur boxed only locally. During his boxing days of 1948, Arthur came to work at the Foundry.

Football was another sport Arthur enjoyed while he was in the service. He played the middle line backer position on the starting lineup for the Marine Corps team where he was stationed. This was one sport that Arthur would have liked to pursue further. He is still a great follower of football.

Arthur distinguished himself in the Marine Corps as an excellent marksman. He was awarded a medal of expert marksmanship for his record shooting of 311 bull's eye out of a possible perfect score of 340. Using a 30-caliber rifle, he shot at ranges of 250, 350 and 500 yards. His record had been beaten only once before. Mrs. Warren wears the silver medal on her charm bracelet.

Arthur admits that he is no hunter or fisherman,

and he will readily point out that the "real fisherman" in the family is his wife, Robbie. Robbie enjoys deep sea fishing and is quite successful. She regularly schedules trips to the Gulf Coast with several friends for a day of deep sea fishing. Arthur enjoys eating the red snappers she brings back for the freezer.

Arthur's real fans, besides his wife, are their three daughters. The Warren girls are Diane, 13, Elaine, 11, and Kelley, 5.

A main hobby for Arthur has been racing. He started racing modified cars in 1959, and continued until 1962. He has not raced actively since that time, but hopes to take it up again. "I've fooled with cars most of my life," he says. He has "nearly always owned a car" and has been the chief mechanic when it needed repairs.

Evidence of his racing ability are the great number of trophies he has received. His largest trophy is a top eliminator trophy which he won in 1960 in a trophy dash. This 50-lap race featured the top ten high point men for the year.

Arthur has raced two different cars on this track, both under the number "8A." He still holds the track record of 15.5 seconds. The car he built is still racing.

From the catcher's mitt to the boxing glove, from the football to the racing car, Arthur considers it all "just fun." And it takes a big man like Arthur to excel in so many things.

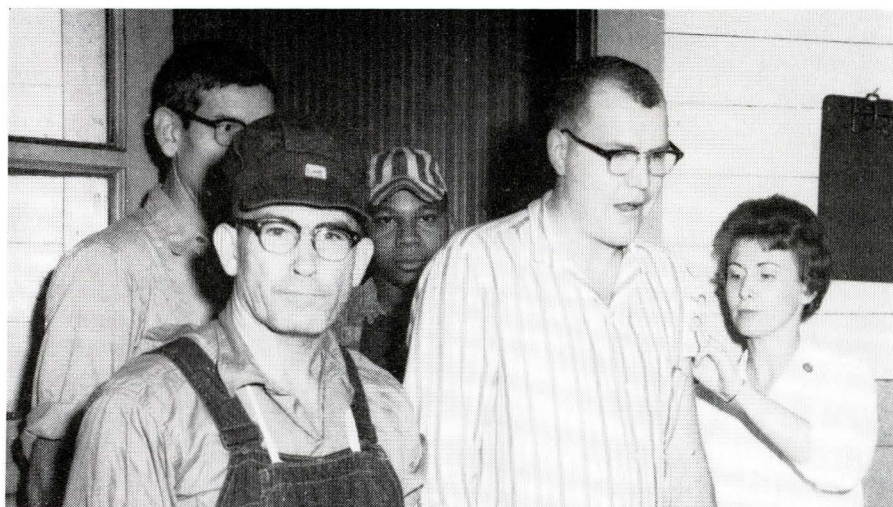

CHARLIE GAULT, Assembly and Shipping Department foreman, is spending part of his vacation in Mississippi visiting one of his daughters.

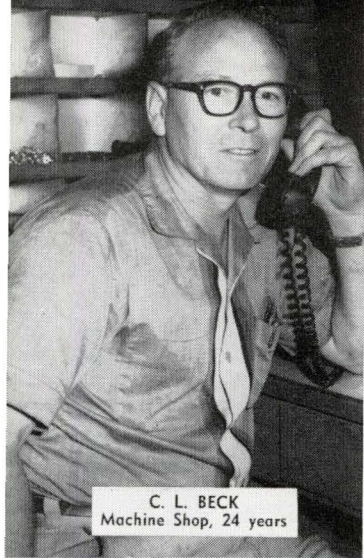

THE MAKING OF A DELINQUENT

YOUR LFM Federal Credit Union continues to move forward. At the close of business September 30, 1965, members had accumulated savings of \$29,921.10 in their share accounts. Outstanding loans totaled \$28,166.49. Net earnings for the nine-month period totaled \$1,126.60 after expenses.

There are still a lot of employees that should be members. A 25-cent entrance fee and a \$5.00 share starts you on the way to building a nice nest egg.

Wouldn't it be nice to have \$1500.00 put away? Did you ever stop to realize that if you saved the equivalent of one pack of cigarettes per day and regularly deposited this saving in your Credit Union, it, together with the anticipated dividends, would grow to \$1500.00 in approximately ten years. 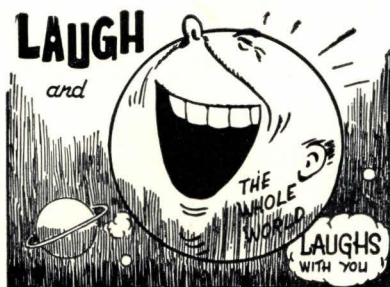
