from the President's Desk . . .



MANY of us can remember when we used to take up a collection from time to time to buy flowers for fellow workers who were sick or had had a death in the family.

This was eliminated when we first put cold drinks in the plant and the profits were used for this purpose. The Company furnished the electricity and the space for the machines and the profit went into the "flower fund."

As the fund grew, it was partially used to aid employees either with a loan or with an outright grant in cases of serious accidents or long illnesses.

The fund then was put into a foundation called The Lufkin Foundry and Machine Company Charitable and Educational Foundation.

In 1965, four scholarships of \$2000 each were awarded to children of employees and four more were recently awarded to 1966 graduates.

No one connected with the Company is on the award committee. I personally don't know the members of this group and I don't want to know who they are. No pressure can be exerted in anyone's favor.

We have hoped to increase the number of scholarships up to six a year if the fund continues to grow.

I understand there is some opposition to the support of the cold drink, cigarette and candy program, and depending on how effective this is could even reduce the number of scholarships to less than four.

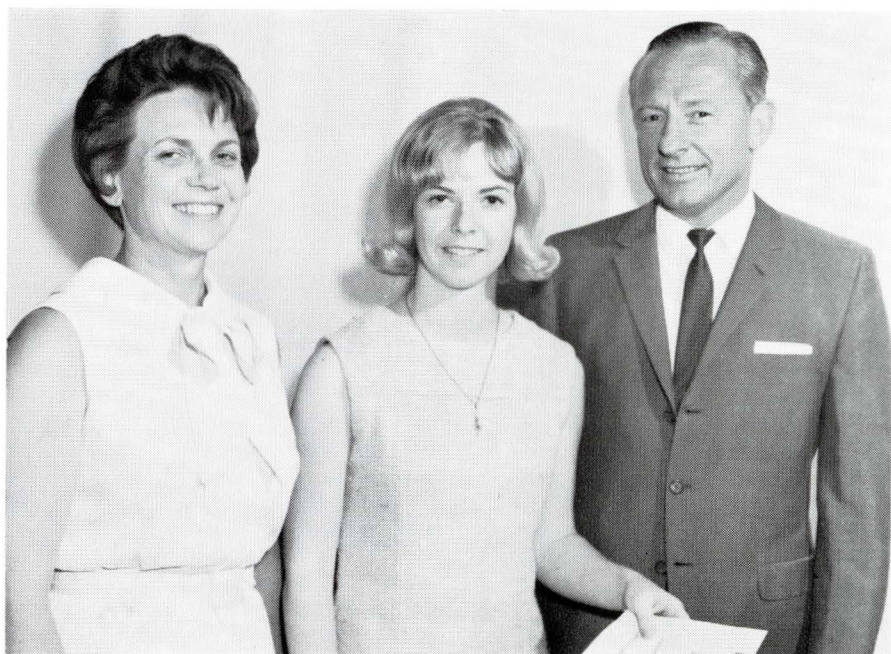
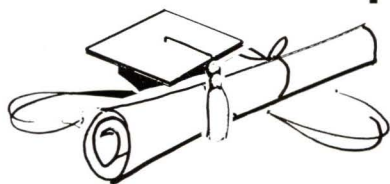
The Company has no financial interest in this whatsoever. The machines take up valuable space and cost money to operate.

THE Lufkin Foundry and Machine Company Charitable and Educational Foundation scholarships for the 1965-66 school year were awarded to: Mary Gayle Fenley, Annie Earle Steed, Margaret Elizabeth Griffin, and Leah Maurine Hambrick.

This is the second year that four scholarships have been awarded. Some 22 children of Lufkin Foundry & Machine Company employees throughout Angelina County applied this year. The children of officers of the Company were not eligible to apply.

The purpose of these scholarships,

according to W. W. Trout, president of Lufkin Foundry & Machine Company, is to express an interest in the families of Lufkin Foundry employees and to help create greater interest in higher education.

The winners were selected by a committee composed of outstanding citizens of the county who have long exhibited an active interest in education. No officer or employee of the Company is a member of the committee. In fact, only one member of the Trustees of the Foundation knows who composes the

award committee.

Each scholarship is valued at \$2000 with \$500 being paid each year for four years to the winner's college.

When the winners were announced Mr. Trout said, "We congratulate the winners of the four scholarships. Their scholastic efforts and activities during their high school years have been exemplary and the Foundation trusts that their education will be made a little easier by the scholarships they have won."

He also added, "The Foundation regrets that each applicant could not be granted a scholarship. The competition was keen and we are proud of the scholastic achievement of each applicant."

The winners are four young ladies who have set their goals for the future and are eager to attain them. Margaret Griffin is the 17-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Fred D. Griffin. Fred is employed in the Engineering Department. Margaret is a 1966 graduate of Lufkin High School where she was graduated Summa Cum Laude.

As a high school student she was a member of the National Honor Society. Much of her spare time was spent with Girl Scout work. Last summer her troop took a trip to New York City. She also studies piano.

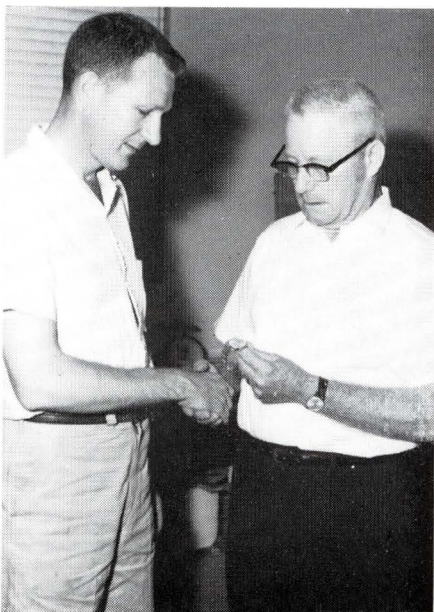

Cashie came to work for Lufkin Foundry on August 29, 1956, and she never missed a day of work.



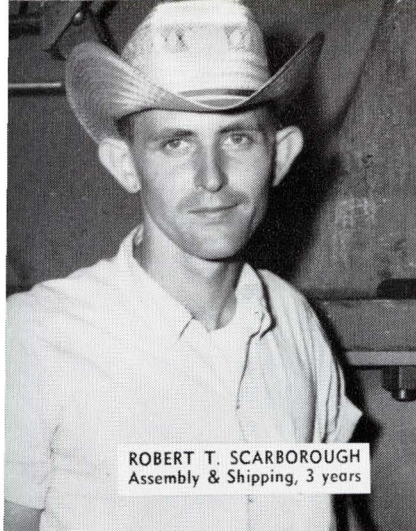
