The word has been passed around that A. A. (BID) FOSTER has a big patch of turnip greens growing. Bid works in the Trailer Division, first shift.

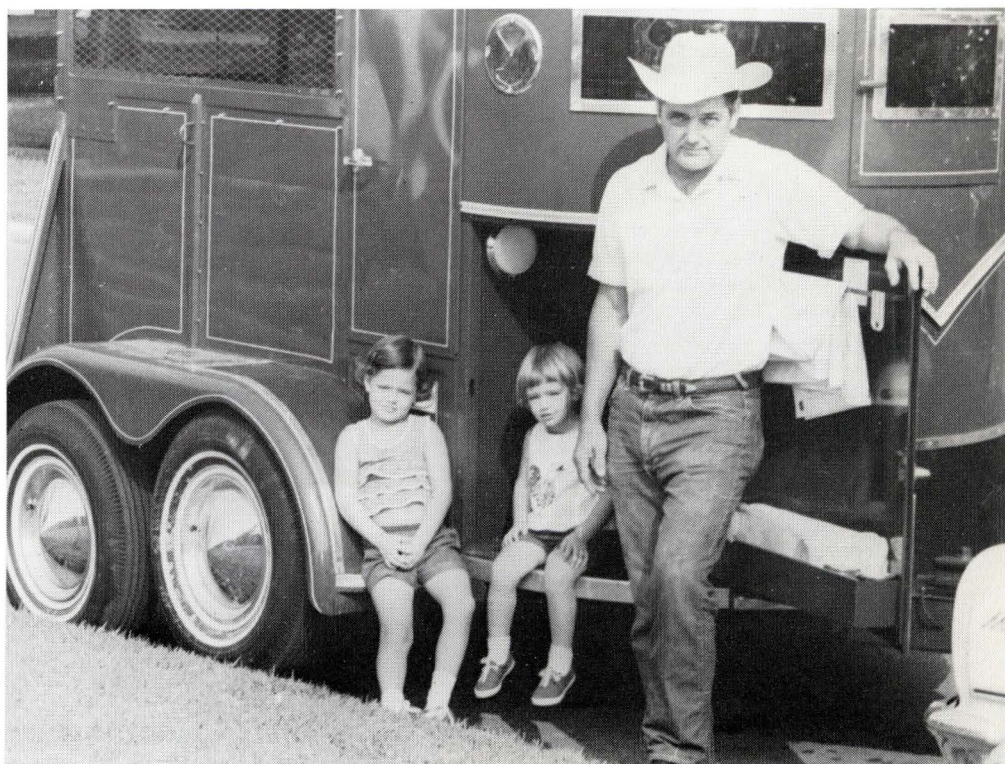
