The girls' father works in the Trailer division, second shift.

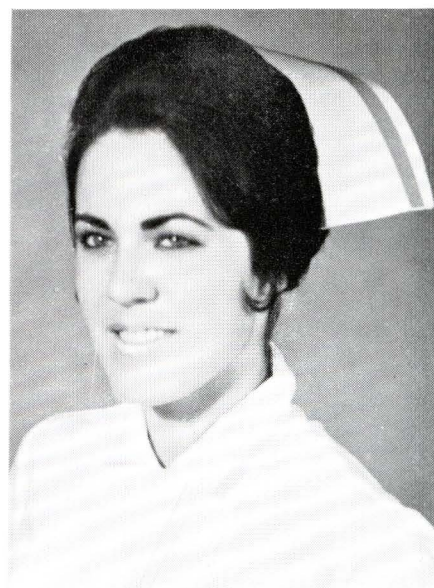

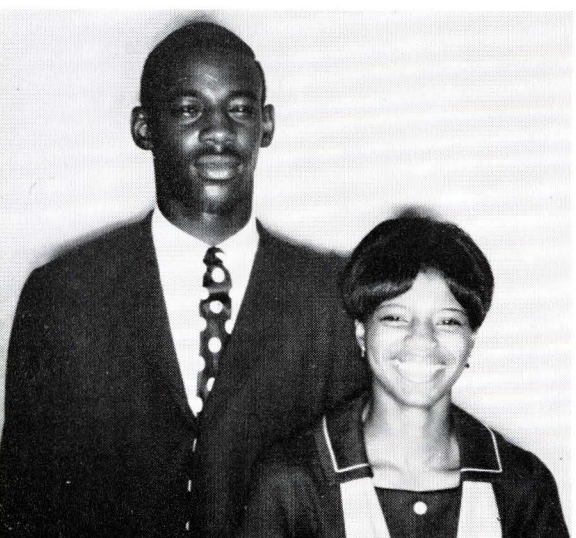

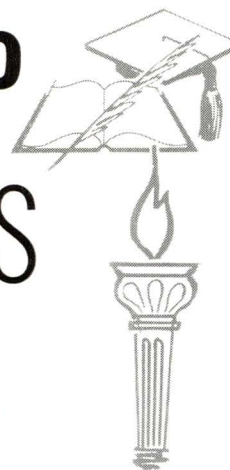

SCHOLARSHIP APPLICATIONS DUE NOW...



THE time is now. TODAY.

October 1 is the deadline for applications to be made for the scholarships awarded each spring by the Lufkin Foundry and Machine Company Education and Charitable Foundation.

Children of Lufkin Foundry employees who are in their senior year in high school should apply for these scholarships by completing the application form on the following page or one similar to it which is available from the student's principal or from the Angelina County School Superintendent.

The application must be filed with the Angelina County School Superintendent by October 1, following registration for the senior year in high school.

Not later than January 31, in the senior year, scholarship applicants must take the Scholastic aptitude Test of the College Board Entrance Examination. Then, not later than April 1, the applicants must file with the Angelina County School Superintendent a report of the results of the Scholastic Aptitude Test and a transcript of the first semester grades of the senior year in high school.

A high school student who has a parent who has been an employee of Lufkin Foundry and Machine Company in its Lufkin, Texas, Office or Plant for at least one year when the student registers for the senior year in high school, is eligible to apply for this scholarship.

A student whose employee-parent becomes totally incapacitated, retires, or deceases at any time during such

student's tenure in high school is eligible to apply provided the parent had been an employee of Lufkin Foundry for at least two years prior to such incapacity, retirement or decease. A student whose parent is an officer of the company at the time such student registers for the senior year in high school is not eligible.

To be eligible to be considered for a scholarship, a student must graduate from an accredited high school, and the student's grades for the four high school years must average at least 80.

Each scholarship is for a total of \$2,000, payable \$500 per year for four years, provided the student remains eligible.

Each year the Foundation will appoint a Scholarship Committee which will evaluate the qualifications of the applicants and select the winners. The Angelina County School Superintendent will not be a member of the committee, and no officer or employee of Lufkin Foundry will be a member of the committee.

The purpose of this scholarship is to express an interest in the families of Lufkin Foundry employees and to help create greater interest in higher education.

Complete details of the qualifications which will be judged by the Scholarship Committee and the announcement of awards have been published in THE FOUNDRY ROUNDUP the past two years. However, if an employee-parent does not have the complete list of qualifications, he may see a copy in THE ROUNDUP office located in the Trailer Parts department building.

Conner also does a lot of gardening and has a 100-acre farm with several head of cattle. He likes to keep his pasture improved.

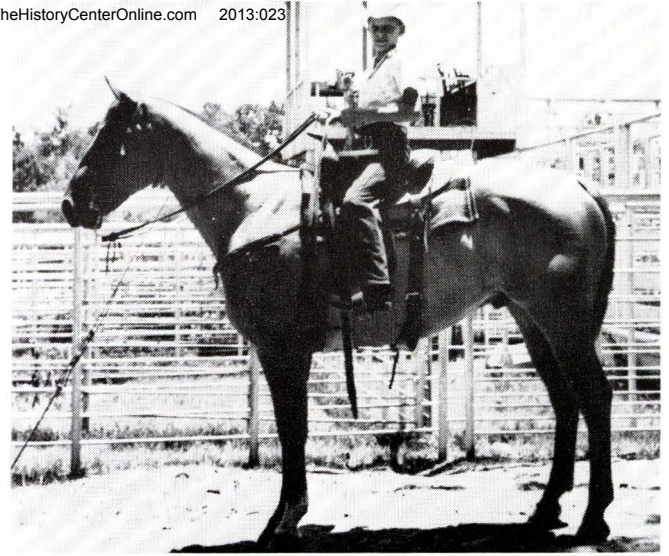
"I guess I'll get a day or two off now and then to go fishing," he says with a grin when asked if he has a lot of time on his hands now that he has retired.

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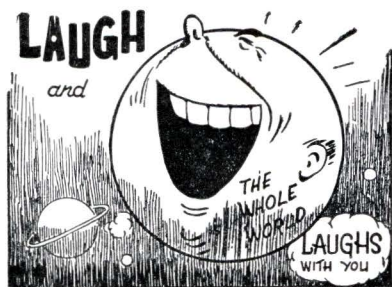
