FROM THE PRESIDENT'S DESK ...

FELLOW EMPLOYEES:

Patriotism expresses the love and loyalty that we, as Americans, have for this great country in which we live and work. No other country in the world has this type of dedication from its citizens.

When we celebrate July Fourth, we think of the Declaration of Independence of our country and the proud spirit of the American people. We marvel at how fortunate we are to have it, and wonder if we can preserve it as we have inherited it.

The signers of the Declaration of Independence, and later the Constitution, were men of integrity who believed in equal rights for all men, and the free enterprise system. There were fifty-six of these new Americans who risked "their lives, their fortunes and their sacred honor" for their name to appear on this honored document.

In leaving Constitutional Hall, Benjamin Franklin has been quoted as saying "a Republic, if you can keep it." He also advised the delegates at the time of signing, "that surely we must all stand together or surely we will all hang separately."

The women do, but the men know it's useless...

ARGUING WITH A "LADY UMPIRE"

Safe! Ball four; take your base! Yurrrr out! Play ball!

This is a common sound around many of Lufkin's parks during the summer months. Softball leagues, men's and women's slow pitch and men's intermediate softball, keep Winston Park and Kit McConnico Park bustling with activity during the summer months as more and more people play softball to stay in shape as well as provide fun and recreation for both husband and wife.

This year, however, there are some high-pitched voices calling those close plays, since roughly 50 per cent of the league's American Softball Association certified umpires are women. One of these "lady

umpires" is Martha Calcote, secretary, Trailer Division.

This is Martha's second year to work as an A.S.A. certified umpire, but her first year to call in the men's intermediate pitch league, where the action can be fast and arguments heated since the men's intermediate players are usually better skilled and under more pressure to win.

"We had some doubts about calling for the men's leagues, but so far I've had more problems calling women's games than men's," Martha says.

"It seems to work out that way for everybody else. The men umpires don't have the problems with the women that we women do and we don't

have the problems with the men that they do. Maybe everyone is trying to make this work."

Since Martha not only umpires a couple of nights a week but also plays, her weekly schedule can really fill up. "One week I called games three nights, played one night and then went to Dallas Friday night for a weekend tournament."

Being both a player and an umpire, Martha sees the game from a unique standpoint, whether she's playing or calling. "Being an umpire really helps me as a player and being a player helps me be a better umpire.

"I can see both sides of the issue when I'm umpiring.

Because I know how the player feels, I usually try to overlook mouthing to a certain extent," she says.

"Being an umpire helps me be a better player because I'm more aware of what a player can or can't do on the field.

"Many people don't understand that it is as important for the coaches and players to know the rules as it is for the umpires. Knowing the rules probably won't give anyone any particular advantage, but not knowing the rules definitely puts you at a disadvantage."

Learning the rules isn't as simple as reading the rule book for an umpire. To be certified by the A.S.A., Martha, along with LUFKIN employees Bobby Jarrell, material control, and Karen Watson, public relations, who are also umpires,

attended eight hours of classroom instruction as well as at least one hour of actual on-the-field work under the examining eye of the instructor.

Certification by the A.S.A. makes an umpire eligible to call A.S.A. sanctioned games anywhere in the United States. Last summer Martha was chosen by the district director to call a district slow pitch tournament in Huntsville, Texas.

As Martha's experience grows, so do her memories of past games. She remembers a home run during the Huntsville slow pitch tournament that hit a Continental Trailways bus on the highway just over the outfield fence.

"You could hear the ball hit that bus all over the field, but the bus never slowed down,"

she recalls.

"I really enjoy being an umpire, but to be a good umpire you have to learn to control your own temper. I've never thrown anyone out of a game; I've warned people and I've wanted to throw people out, but I haven't yet. You have to be a bigger person than that man or woman yelling and arguing."

Even at the standard pay of \$7 for an hour game, umpiring is often thankless work and many ex-umps say it's too much hassle for the money. It can also be hazardous to your health, says Martha, rubbing a bruised shin, the result of a thrown bat.

But Martha obviously enjoys her hours in the sun and wind, regardless of the hassles or hazards.

Warning: The University of Hawaii Has Determined That Dark Tans Can Be Hazardous To Your Health.



Whether you spend your summer days swimming, skiing, fishing, biking or just working in the yard, summertime activities involve prolonged exposure to the sun. And, however healthy or good those sunbeams may feel after months of cold, rainy weather, the sun's rays are by far the most dangerous environmental enemies.

Unfortunately most Americans do not believe it. There are some 300,000 cases of skin cancer in America every year and most of them are due to repeated overexposure to the sun. Millions of Americans are discovering every year that their skin is wrinkling and sagging prematurely, a result of years of roasting to a dark tan around the pool.

Recent studies by the Skin Cancer Research Council of Hawaii and the University of Hawaii have released some new facts about safe fun in the sun.

Moderate tans, built slowly over a period of days, will not damage the skin. Getting sunburned will not hasten the tanning process. In fact, anytime your skin becomes red, you have gotten too much sun and already damaged skin tissues to some extent. Don't stay in the sun until you start turning pink; by then you have gotten a good start on a painful sunburn.

If you do get a painful sunburn, splash the body with ice cold water and follow with vinegar, which can reduce peeling. You may use a moisture lotion on the sunburn to relieve that taut feeling of burned skin. If your sunburn itches, take aspirin or try Aveeno, an oatmeal preparation available from a pharmacy.

With the indisputable evidence linking overexposure to premature aging skin and skin cancer, only the foolish would continue to toast their bodies to a golden tan. The good news is that no matter how much time you spend in the sun, you can prevent harmful overexposure.

If you enjoy water sports and spend hours in the sun, use an approved sunscreen product containing PABA (para-amino-benzoic acid) in a 55% alcohol base. Apply sunscreen one or two hours before exposure to the sun.

PABA penetrates to inner layers of skin tissue and blocks virtually all of the sun's harmful rays up to six or eight hours. Most products are odorless, invisible to the skin, non-greasy and do not wash off in water.

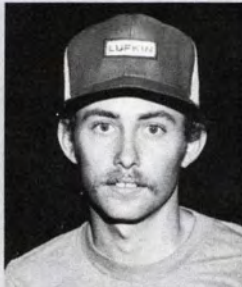
Sunscreen products will allow you to get a moderate tan without burning. A slow moderate tan can actually protect you from further sun exposure.
