The Directors of Southern Pine Lumber Company at their regular semi-annual meeting on December 15 declared the equivalent of one week's pay as a bonus to all employees who have been on the payroll since January 1.

In order to make the bonus apply strictly according to

time and to work performed, the Board of Directors specified that the bonus would be paid in the following manner:

Two per cent of gross earnings during the first 11 months of 1958, payable to all employees on the Southern Pine Lumber Company payroll on the last payday before Christmas.

"I consider the Board of Directors extremely generous in granting this bonus request this year in light of our earnings," remarked Arthur Temple, Jr., president. "However, we have had a marvelous display of team spirit and individual effort during the second year of our expansion program which has come during a time of very difficult economic conditions. This team spirit and effort deserves to be recognized with a bonus, in my opinion, because it has made the future of our great organization more secure. The Board of Directors shares this view."

Those employees who have worked 95 per cent of the time made available to them will be eligible.

The probable date of payment will be December 24, according to Aubrey Connon, Assistant Secretary.

Arthur Temple Jr, Finds Creative Outlet in Work

DIBOLL — Some people satisfy their creative urge by writing books, painting pictures or composing music. Arthur Temple, Jr. has forged a business empire and led in the modernization of the timber industry.

The young East Texas industrialist is chief administrator of a complex manufacturing and business enterprises that form an important segment of this region's economy.

"I like to create real wealth, to build. I like to start things and then leave them for somebody else to run, come back later and see how they've grown," says Temple.

"I'm introspective enough to wonder about this motivation. Its not the desire for money. Sure, I like to make enough to pay my bills, but I can eat only so many beans. I don't want a lot of material things."

"I feel that when you start a new business or build a new business or build a building it's an extension of yourself."

At 38, Temple is president of the Southern Pine Lumber Company, the largest lumber manufacturer in the South, chairman of the board of Temple Associates, general contractors specializing in heavy construction, and an officer or director of more than a score of other firms.

"I'm about ready for a 20-year pin," quips the young executive, recalling that he began his business career back in 1938 when he went to work as a bookkeeper for a lumber yard in his hometown of Texarkana.

LEAVES TEXARKANA AFTER A YEAR

He attended the University of Texas a year when he decided he wanted to get married, he dropped out of school and took a bookkeeping job.

The lumber yard was a family enterprise, a retail outlet for the Southern Pine Lumber

Company established by his grandfather, Thomas L. L. Temple, in 1895. But young Arthur wasn't coddled on the job.

"I did a little bit of everything," he says. "I think my main duty as bookkeeper was loading gravel."

When, the next year, a bookkeeping job opened at the company's Lufkin yard 10 miles north of the firm headquarters at Diboll, Temple applied for a transfer. With it went a raise from \$70 to \$100 a month, enough for a young couple to live on. Arthur then 19, promptly married the object of his affections, Miss Mary MacQuiston of Dallas.

Temple soon became assistant manager of the Lufkin yard, a post he held until 1941, when he asked for a leave of absence to organize Temple Associates, the first of several firms he has formed in the past decade and a half.

The new construction firm built what was probably the first Federal Housing Administration Title 6 housing project in the state of Texarkana. BUILDING, REAL ESTATE CONTINUED

In 1942, Temple returned to Lufkin from Texarkana, took over as manager of the company's Lufkin yard and continued to branch out into the construction and real estate fields.

It was not until 1948, when he became manager of the Diboll plant after a year's service in the Navy that the energetic young businessman was able to affect his revolution - or evolution - in the lumber industry.

"When I took over here at Diboll this was a typical large ramshackled sawmill. It was a good sawmill as mills then existed," he said. "But my thinking was that a sawmill should be built with the same high class engineering concept as a paper mill or an automobile factory. It should be flexible in production and economical

in maintenance.

"Don't misunderstand me. The people ahead of me weren't doing a bad job. They realized that changes would have to be made if the lumber industry was going to pay wages and offer the benefits of other progressive industries. When I became manager, the time was right to do those things."

Today, Southern Pine Lumber Company has the most completely integrated wood products plant in the nation. Its highly mechanized design has served as a model for the rest of the industry.

New Processes and machinery have turned what used to be waste materials into dollars.

FIRM HAS MERIT RATING SYSTEM

Southern Pine employees receive top pay for their work and have a pension plan and other benefits. The company also has a job evaluation and merit rating system, comparatively new features in timber industry.

"We're just one big family here," said Temple. "I know that sounds trite and hackneyed, but it's true. We don't have any big shots. We won't tolerate them. The men cuss me out when they feel like it and I speak my mind."

Seeing Temple, dressed in slacks and sports shirt, his feet propped on the top of his massive desk, carrying on a phone conversation with a plant superintendent, adds weight to his words.

Temple looks on himself as a representative of both labor and management.

"If I cease to represent either of them properly, they'll do something about it," he smiled.

As a business executive, Temple heads or has an interest in 27 firms, some of which are unrelated to wood product industry. Among these are a dairy, two investment companies, four banks, a newspaper, and a radio sta-

tion.

In addition to these are a complex of companies that complement each other such as wood products plants at Diboll in Angelina County and Pineland 40 miles to the east in Sabine County, building materials and light manufacturing plants at Lufkin, Diboll, Dallas and Longview, and a chain of 40 lumber yards, stretching from the Red River to the Rio Grande.

The lumber yards still bear the name of the Temple Lumber Company though Temple effected the merger of the Temple Lumber and Southern Pine Companies after he became president of the latter firm following his father's death in 1951.

Most of the Temple enterprises are family-owned or firms in which family money is invested, but seven, including the contracting firm, Temple Associates, are products of Temple's own business acumen.

Key industry in the Temple empire is Southern Pine Lumber, which produces 80 million board feet of lumber a year, making it the largest lumber manufacturer in the South.

In addition, there is a large flooring plant which turns out 15 million feet of flooring and a fiberboard plant that manufactures 100 million feet of fiberboard a year. This latter product was formerly waste material.

Temple Industries also make 10 per cent of the world's mop and broom handles and 70 per cent of the beverage cases used in the Southwest. The beverage cases are made at the Temple Manufacturing Company in Dallas.

Another Temple product is wood flour used in the manufacture of such products as drilling mud, phonograph records and plastics.

This wide range of materials is a direct outgrowth of plant integration which Temple says a lumber firm

must have in order to survive today.

"A small mill owner hasn't got a prayer if he can't integrate his facilities," says the young industrialist. "You can't operate unless you can milk every bit of the squeal out of your raw material."

There is understandable pride in Arthur Temple's voice when he says that three generations of his family have recognized the value of sound forestry practices.

"We've never abused an acre of our land," he says. "The timber we are producing today is better than the virgin timber that was cut off this land."

Temple timber holdings now embrace 425,000 acres (600 square miles) of East Texas pine and hardwood. Thirty-six million board feet of Southern Pine's total production is hardwood, 70 per cent oak, 20 per cent gum and the remainder assorted hardwoods.

"This is the only business I know of where you have to think 100 years ahead. It will be 60 years before the trees we plant now will be marketable timber," Temple says.

"We think of ourselves primarily as tree farmers. The equipment is simply a means of marketing our product."

"Most people don't realize that we are getting 10 per cent less for lumber today than we were in 1947," he says. "That's one reason lumber is such a popular building material."

Temple says the industry is preparing for a terrific housing boom in the early 1960s.

"We've plowed most of our profits for the past 10 years back into the business in anticipation of this boom," he says. "Every report on the economy has predicted it. We anticipate a 2 million-home residential market."

Arthur Temple, Jr. is a tall rangy man with fast-thinning hair and a deep voice reson-

ant with a dynamic energy that compliments his direct, informal manner.

His tastes are simple, he doesn't drink and dislikes social functions. He enjoys hunting and fishing, though he says he does not have much time for the latter sport any more, and he's sold on East Texas.

"Its good, live country," he says. "We've got everything we need to grow — many natural resources, the most important of which is timber, abundant water, everything."

Temple's faith in the piney woods country helps explain his broad activity in civic affairs and his generosity in assisting towns seeking new industry.

Though the Southern Pine president believes that "people owe a loyalty and responsibility to the area in which they live," he doesn't confine his interest in public affairs to East Texas. He is director of the Texas Good Roads Association and the Texas Tourist Foundation and a former member of the State Board of Education. He is also an active Episcopal layman.

While his business is conducted from Diboll, the Temples' home is at Lufkin. They have two children, Charlotte Ann, a freshman at Duke University and Arthur Temple III, 16, a sophomore at Lawrenceville School in New Jersey.

Perhaps Temple's most distinguishing characteristic is an infectious zest for his work. Behind this is a genuine enthusiasm that usually keeps him on the job 12 hours at a stretch, including weekends. "This job is fun," he says. "You're in everything—game management, commercial development, real estate, construction, oil. When you get up in the morning, you never know what the day will bring."

Local Chairman Urges Support in Polio Drive

Clint Hines, Community Chairman in the National Foundation's March of Dimes Program, urges support of everyone in this invaluable work.

This year, for the first time, Mr. Hines states, the March of Dimes supports The National Foundation, which has expanded from financial aid for polio patients and polio research to the same treatment and research for virus diseases, birth defects, and arthritis.

The success of the Salk vaccine has meant victory over paralytic polio, Mr. Hines points out, leaving money now derived from the March of Dimes for the attack of other virus diseases with studies growing out of polio work directed toward the problem of virus diseases in their entirety, including the question of dozens of newly discovered viruses and their threat to the nation's health.

From March of Dimes benefits, according to information from Mr. Hines, a broad-scale research program will seek the causes of arthritis, its prevention or cure. Patient aid will be made available for children with arthritis through 18 group age, with the aim of bringing them

to maturity able to live, productive lives. It is believed that such a program of patient aid, though limited for the time being as indicated, will also be of benefit to adult victims of arthritis.

Another benefit of the enlarged program will be patient aid offered to children through 18 who suffer from certain birth defects of the central nervous system. The dimes will finance research aimed at finding the causes, means of prevention, and improved methods of treatment of birth defects, the large unmet child health problem our country has at present, causing thousands of deaths and untold misery and crippling.

Contributions to the March of Dimes offers new hope for greater victories over crippling diseases, Mr. Hines states.

Contribution containers will be placed in various business establishments over town, as well as school buildings, and all are urged to give and give again during this drive. Official kickoff will be January 5.
