Market News from Southern Pine

Temple Seat sales this week were under our regular production for the same period. We anticipate sales will pick up, however, now that the year end has passed. Prices are still low.

Don H. Burnley There has been very little business activity in the sale of SPB 77 products during the holidays so there is actually very little to report. We are pleased to advise that our market is slightly stronger than it was at this same time last year and we should expect considerable activity during January.

We have almost exactly the same picture in the sale of SP Supreme Oak Flooring. The Market is very quiet and there are very few sales being made. However, our prices are slightly higher than they were at this time last year and it is our hope that the demand will begin to increase promptly.

Bob Burns Templeseat sales during the week were good. Orders were off slightly due to the holidays. Even so shipments remain good. There were numerous inquiries for our Templeseat products and the outlook for the immediate future is good.

Hardwood orders were slow which is not unusual at this time of the year. The furniture shows start in Chicago and Dallas around the middle of January and it will be late January or early February before there is any great amount of activity in hardwoods. Shipments of hardwood from Pineland remain good and we see no reason why they should not remain high for the next thirty days as we have a substantial order file.

March of Dimes Kicks Off Monday

Kick-off for the annual National Foundation, March of Dimes, under the local chairmanship of Clint Hines was Monday, January 5.

Mr. Hines spoke before the PTA Monday night urging that this March of Dimes drive be the greatest Pineland has ever had because so many extra virus and nerve disorders are included this time. The Salk vaccine, Mr. Hines stated, has to a certain point, made the polio menace mild. The March of Dimes this year aids victims of arthritis, birth defects, and other central nervous disorders and virus diseases as well as polio victims.

Aliens to Report Addresses Now

John H. Owens, Officer in Charge of the Immigration and Naturalization Service, estimated today that more than 23,000 aliens will report their address in the thirty Texas counties under the jurisdiction of the Houston Office during January under the Federal Alien Address Report Program.

The Immigration official said that more than 21,000 aliens reported their address during January 1958, in the Houston area and 23,870 in the whole State of Texas.

Mr. Owens said that all non-citizens, except those in diplomatic status, foreign representatives of certain international organizations and those admitted temporarily as agricultural laborers, are required to file the address report.

He added that any alien who willfully violates the address requirement may be fined up to \$200, imprisoned for 30 days, and deported.

In addition, aliens who are not in the United States during January must report their address to the Service within 10 days after their return.

The Officer in Charge said that address report cards will be available at the Immigration Service Offices in the Federal Office Building, Houston, Texas; the United States Post Office and Custom-

house, Texas; the Post Office Building, Galveston, Texas; and the local United States Post Offices beginning January 2, 1959.

Pig Production Up in 1958

The Texas 1958 pig crop totaled 1,777,000 head the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service advised Postmaster Agnes Sanford. This is based on livestock surveys cooperatively made by the Post Office and Agriculture Department. A pig crop of this size will boost potential pork production on Texas farms and ranches 24 percent above last year, but is still below the 10-year annual average of 1,867,000 pigs. Fall farrowing, estimated at 127,000 sows were 27 percent above farrowing a year earlier. Fall litters averaged 7.0 pigs, which is a new record. Bulk of these fall pigs will reach slaughter weight during the spring of 1959.

FURTHER EXPANSION PLANNED FOR SPRING 1959 FARROWINGS

Breeding intentions for 1959 spring farrowings in Texas point to a 40 percent increase above the 1958 spring season. An unusually favorable ratio between grain costs and finished hog prices stimulate renewed interest in hog production. Bulk of this sharply increased farrowed pig crop will reach market weights during the fall of 1959.

Postmaster Agnes Sanford pointed out this information on prospective pork supplies was made possible by voluntary reports from farmers and ranchmen along mail routes served by the Bronson, Rt. 1, combined with other reports from all parts of Texas and the Nation.

The Nation's 1958 pig crop totaled 94.8 million head—3 percent larger than the 1957 crop of 88.0 million. Reports on breeding intentions indicate 8.3 million sows to farrow in the spring of 1959. This will be 12 percent more than the number farrowed last spring, but only slightly larger than the 1947-56 average.

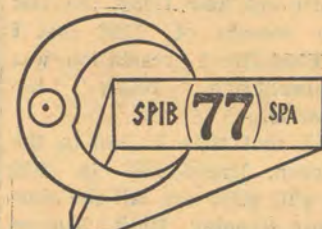

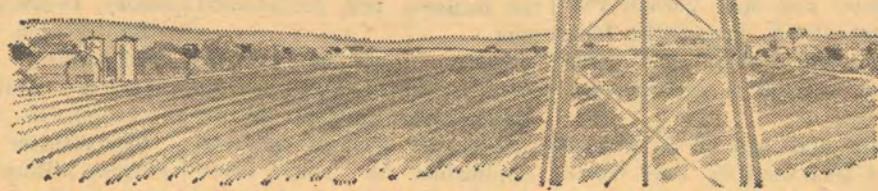

As I retire from the office of State Senator, I do so with deep gratitude for your support.

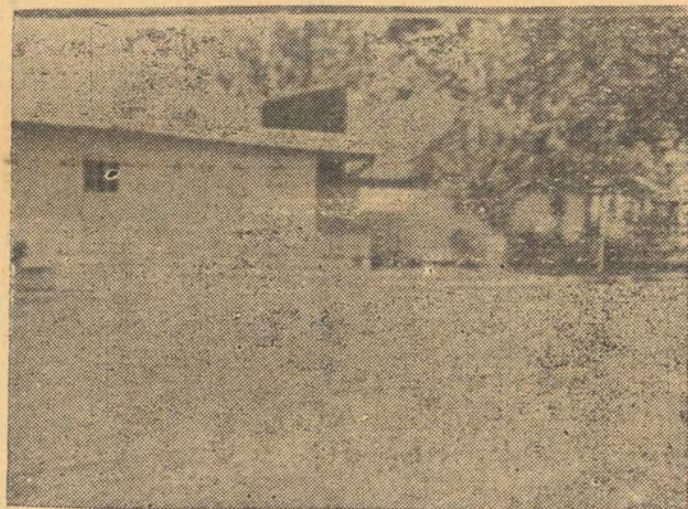
