Hardwood lumber sales have been slow and again it is due to our low inventory of dry stock. The hardwood market generally is good and prices are firm.

The sales have been pretty spotty, that is to say one area will develop several orders while another territory might be quite slow. The sale of SP Supreme Oak Flooring has been satisfactory. We have been able to put into effect some increases on items on which we are oversold and slower moving items have begun to move. The near future market looks fairly good and certainly better than we had predicted it might be during January and February.

Star Gazing

An article last week in the ENTERPRISE datelined Austin, and from the ENTERPRISE AUSTIN BUREAU was headlined "San Augustine Fire Rate Cut".

Fire rates in our state, the amount paid per \$100 of fire insurance, are determined by the State Board of Insurance on the strength of on-the-spot examinations by board examiners who try to weigh a town's fire hazards against its various fire preventive measures.

San Augustine was charged for each of the following: having no reserve pumper, inadequate reserve supply of hose, no reserve truck, no fire alarm system, unenforced building laws, substandard power for pumping units, water supply storage basins 70 per cent deficient in capacity, water mains in mercantile district deficient in size, number of fire hydrants in mercantile district 12 per cent deficient.

And there were many more things listed as deficient, which totalled 41 per cent to the debit. On the credit side, the town earned enough points to bring its fire rate down from 37 to 35 - two cents.

They had a 100-gallon booster truck, maintained night watch service, taught fire prevention methods in all public schools, maintained arson rewards, and satisfactorily completed firemen's and fire marshal's training schools.

All of which leads up to US - Pineland and Pineland's fire department.

Since 1937 Pineland has had a Volunteer Fire Department. Chiefs through the years have included, according to Cecil Lindsey, oldest member in length of continuous service, Gene Lindsey, Rufus Causey, Claude Solly, Orvil Crocker, Alton Smith, Son Sheffield and Ferris Lewis.

H. H. Newton has served as fire marshal through the years.

Trophies encased in glass in the Pineland Community Hall attest to the Fire Department's efficiency through the years. Fires prevented, fires put out, lives and property saved speak for both the loyalty and efficiency of the department.

A volunteer fire department is limited in membership. Twenty-five men is the maximum. These men do not work for money. They sacrifice their time, their talents, and their energy toward protecting our homes, and for that matter protecting our jobs for which of us would have a job if Southern Pine Lumber Company were to go up in flames?

They keep Pineland's fire rate low - in comparison with that of town's that maintain no fire department.

"The first fire truck we bought," Mr. H. H. Newton stated, "cost \$300 and was purchased second hand from the Beaumont Fire Department. When the Company presented the department with a new truck, we had to build six more feet onto the fire station to get all the truck inside it was so much longer than the old one."

"We used to have fire drills on the plant," Mr. Newton continued. "Every Monday at 11:55 a.m. the plant would blow off for the drill. And of

course at the beginning none of the firemen had had experience in fire fighting tactics. We had to learn."

"Organization and training are necessary," Cecil Lindsey stated, "if we are to maintain an efficient fire fighting department. There is not a person in Pineland who would not answer the fire alarm call and do his dead level best to put out a fire, but to accomplish any real good - an organized, trained group of firemen is essential."

It is true that a fire department cuts the fire insurance rate, but far above this fact, a Volunteer Fire Department, reflects the love of men for their families and their community. They deserve the support, the praise and the cooperation of every soul in this town."

"Southern Pine will give its full cooperation to any program designed to strengthen the volunteer fire department," Arthur Temple, states. "It is one of the most important phases of our community and business life in Pineland, and we cannot afford to let it go by default."

Fire Dept. to Be Reorganized

The City Planning Committee, with J. W. Bertrand as chairman, has been appointed by Mayor Carl H. Sanders to reorganize the local fire department. The committee met with several members of the department this week and made and investigation. Their report and recommendations were then submitted to Mayor Sanders and the City Council for further study. After a meeting with the City Council at their weekly meeting Tuesday, February 3rd, the City Planning Committee will then be requested to proceed with the reorganization.

"While the City of Pineland is going to assume full responsibility for the functions of the fire department, we certainly need the support of all the citizens of Pineland," Mayor Sanders said. "We want to have the best volunteer Fire Department in East Texas and, although we may limit the membership to not over twenty-five, we want the best firemen obtainable. We also expect to organize a Woman's Auxiliary Fire Department to help take care of the social activities. After the Planning Committee completes their reorganizing, a full report will be published outlining the program for this year. We urge every citizen to take part in this program."

Martin Dies' Bill Would Create Industrial Board

Martin Dies, Jr., State Senator from the Third Senatorial District, introduced today a Joint Resolution calling for an amendment to the Constitution of Texas, to create an Industrial Development Board. The plan would enable cities and towns of 30,000 population or less to form themselves into Industrial Districts. The Districts then, together with any proposed new industry for the district would be eligible to apply before the Industrial Development Board for a loan, not to exceed \$250,000.00, for the installation of the new industry. The local industry would be eligible to borrow up to 70 per cent of the total cost of installation. Cities and towns of less than 30,000 population could form themselves into Industrial Districts only after a popular vote.

Dies emphasized that the amendment would not raise taxes, and that the money would be provided from private sources by selling bonds, guaranteed by the State of Texas, much the same as in the present Veterans Land program.

Dies declared that much of his Senatorial District, and other parts of Texas, has been losing population and has not kept abreast with some other sections of Texas in economic development. "This measure, said Dies, should stimulate economic development in our section of East Texas, provide more jobs and prosperity, without cost to the taxpayers."

Sabine County Has Two Forest Fires Recently

Kirbyville, Texas, Jan. 26 — The past ten days the Texas Forest Service has fought and controlled 17 fires.

Ten fires in Jasper County burned 169 acres. Three of these fires were caused by debris burning and four were classed as incendiary.

Two fires in Newton County burned an estimated 3 acres.

Two fires in Sabine County burned an estimated 65 acres.

Five fires in Orange County burned an estimated 157 acres.

Medical Briefs

The next time you hear the rich full voice of your favorite singer, don't envy him. Pity him instead. He probably has extra large sinuses, and when they stop up . . .

Some racial groups are apparently immune to specific maladies which beset the rest of humanity. Eskimos rarely if ever get cancer. And tooth ache is practically unknown among natives in remote parts of the globe.

But apparently the rule concerning sinus trouble is this. If you're human you're susceptible. Thus, if you suffer from a sinus condition either chronically or occasionally, you are in excellent company.

A nasal sinus is a lined cavity in the face bone which opens into the nose. There are two important ones on each side of the face: one in each cheek bone, and one over each eye.

Cheekbone sinuses are triangle shaped, large enough to hold half an ounce of fluid. Oversized ones can hold up to a full ounce. Eyebrow sinuses are smaller, the average having a fluid capacity of one-fifth ounce.

Sinuses are lined with mu-

cous membrane, a continuation of the membrane lining the nasal cavity. When a sinus lining becomes inflamed enough to interfere with drainage, someone is in for trouble.

You can get all sorts of answers as to what good purpose sinuses serve. Some specialists believe they warm and moisten air as it is inhaled. Others believe that sinuses, like appendix, are evolutionary remnants which are sometimes more harmful than useful.

Sinus sufferers subscribe unanimously to this latter theory. But the truth probably is that sinus cavities serve as resonating chambers for the voice. Whether a person has a high or low pitched voice, according to this reasoning, is dependent on the size of his sinuses.

There are as many different causes of sinus inflammation as there are people suffering from it. Infection-producing agents such as viruses, and irritants such as pollens and dust are most often the cause. But facial injuries, infected teeth, and other conditions can also bring on flare ups.

What to do about it? Make sinuses drain, which is a little like telling the winter to go away. Still it can be done, if you can identify and eliminate cause of irritation.

Temporary relief can sometimes be obtained with dilating drugs or inhalers, but the basic cause should be determined and treated by a physician.

Area Cattlemen To Hear Report On Bangs Disease

Sabine County cattlemen are invited to attend a meeting at the Odd Fellows Hall on Hwy. 96 in San Augustine, Tuesday night, February 10, at 7:00 p.m. at which Bangs disease control will be discussed. Dr. Henderson, State Veterinarian for the Texas Livestock Sanitary Commission will be the principal speaker. The meeting is sponsored by the San Augustine County Farm Bureau.

Dr. Henderson will discuss the different control programs that will be available to cattlemen as contained in the proposed bill before the present legislature, which is being supported by The Texas Animal Health Institute and livestock organizations throughout the state. It provides for State and Federal cooperation in Bangs disease control as is now provided in every state except Texas.

On a national basis Bangs disease or brucellosis is moving at a rapid rate. Fifteen states are now modified brucellosis free areas. 53 per cent of the counties in the U.S. are now either certified modified brucellosis free or on area control programs.

County Agent O. W. Thompson urges Sabine Cattlemen to attend this meeting and learn how they can work together to control this costly disease.

1 1/2 cups hot water

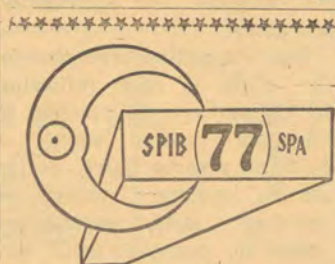
1/2 cup chopped nuts

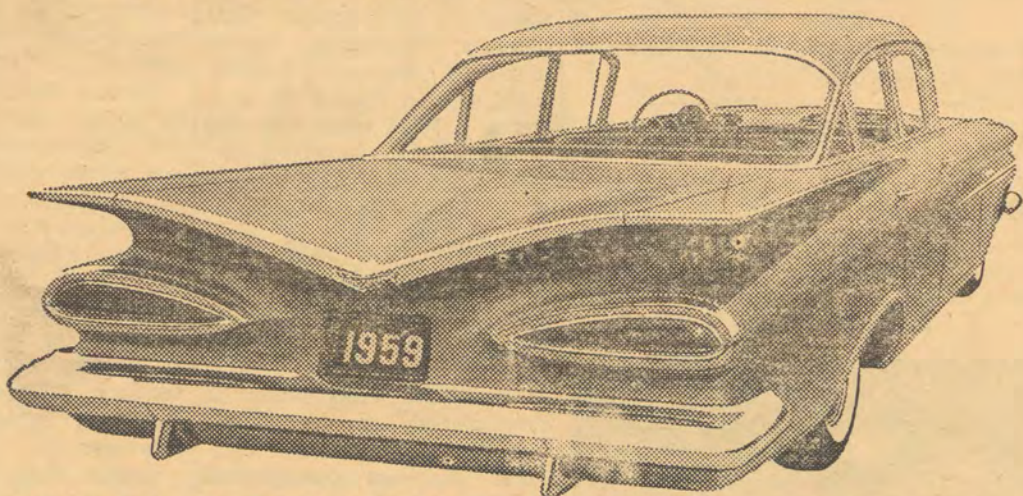

As interesting facets appeared, changes were made by the coordinator and chairmen to include these in the study and presentation. Donald Hicks, Bobby Amason, and John Landon Fults did the art work asked for by each side. On display in the Typing room are sketches of Lincoln, Davis, Lee and Grant; two posters showing the uniform worn by each army; a poster showing a graphic portrayal of the strength of each side in men, population, dollars and railroads, and another of a circle graph showing the division of the South according to numbers of white, slaves, and free Negroes in 1860.

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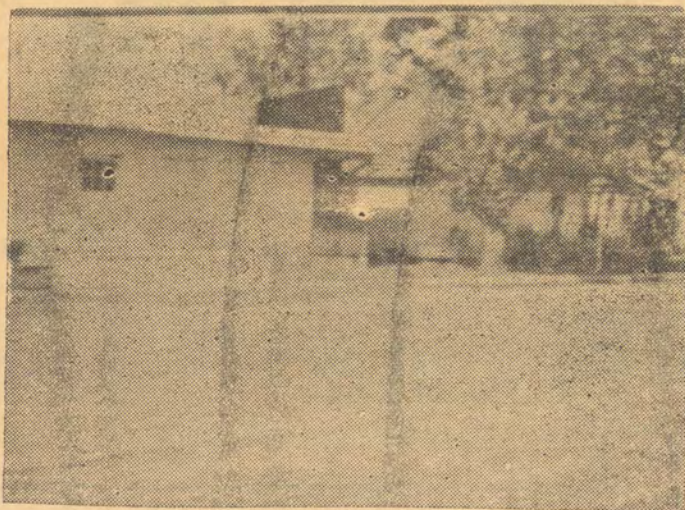
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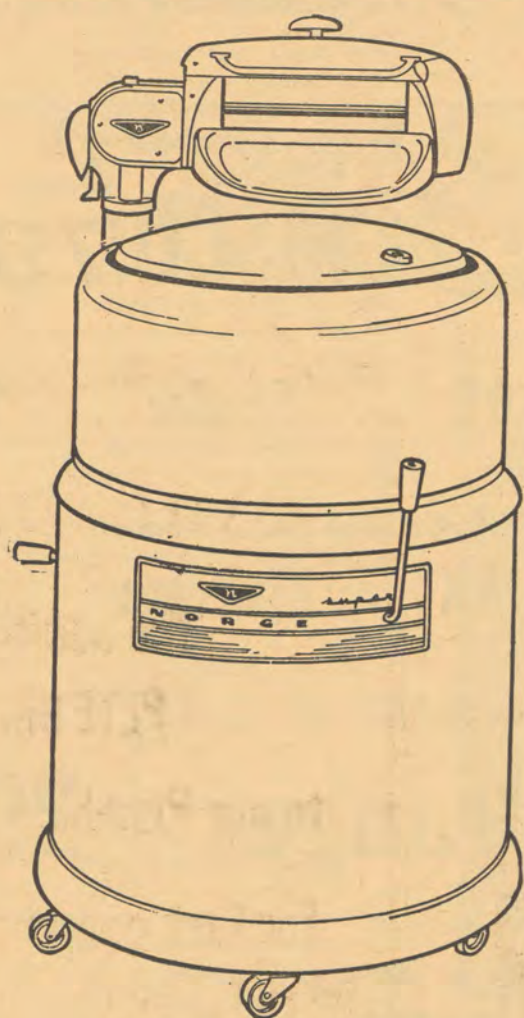
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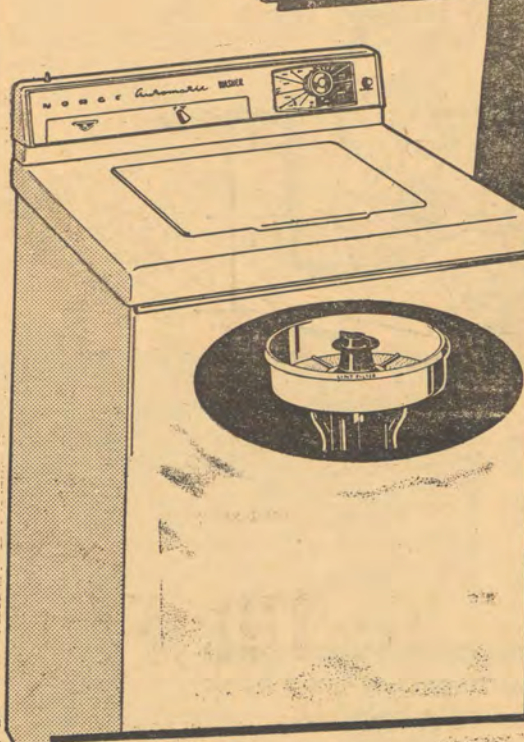
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Anyone who hasn't stopped by to see the Pentecostal tabernacle building at the United Pentecostal district assembly area between Diboll and Lufkin should do so.

When the tabernacle is finished, it will offer acoustical properties innate in wood which would have to be expensively engineered into buildings of substitute materials.

This new tabernacle offered an opportunity to demonstrate the spirit of faith in this church, according to Reverend V. A. Guidroz, District Superintendent from Baytown, Texas for the structure is so simple that Pentecostal preachers are doing all the work except what was necessary to grade the earth and to raise the giant arches. Machines were hired to do these two tasks.

A Diboll contracting firm was hired to bid the job and quoted it in steel.

The wooden structure was decided upon when it was learned how much money they could save using this native product in one of its wonderful new forms. Using their own members to build it offers further savings.

It is interesting to note that the great southern pine arches will offer more fire safety than steel would and more strength as additional benefits.

Other churches with a living, growing spirit would do well to emulate the vision and imagination of this sect when they go to build churches.

In addition to all the other advantages this church offers the worshippers will be able to worship in the presence of one of God's great gifts for which we all here in East Texas can be grateful.

On Friday night, February 5, Willis Jordan and I will go to Austin to shine in the reflected light of Jesse Carr who is being honored over all other truck drivers for being an outstanding example of courtesy and consideration on Texas highways.
