Market News from Southern Pine

Templetreas sales for the week of February 2nd were good. Our back-log orders are substantial and, of course, is increasing slowly. Prices are very competitive and we were unsuccessful on any number of orders due to the low prices being quoted by other treating plants.

The cost of raw poles has not decreased, all costs are high and in some instances poles and piling are moving at prices considerably less than our cost of producing and treating them.

The volume of business we are handling at our plant has been and is very satisfactory.

Hardwood lumber orders were very good this week. We booked 12 car loads as well as several truck loads. Prices remain firm and inquiries are numerous.

Ed Price Temple Seat sales this week were approximately 25 per cent below our normal production.

Prices at this time are disappointing, however, it is hoped that in the near future the seat market will have a better tone.

Don H. Burnley Although SPIB lumber sales have not been exceptionally active in the past few days, the outlook is very good for this early in the year. As soon as the weather begins to clear up throughout the state, our volume should pick up considerably.

Our present picture for SP Supreme Oak Flooring sales is very good piecewise. Part of this is due to a better market than we had anticipated during January, but we also must realize that the lack of production during the week of February 2 is a contributing factor. We are slightly oversold on most items and have no real surplus to offer in any item. This gives us the opportunity to see that all sales made are to our best advantage and we can look forward to very good shipments as our production returns to normal.

Star Gazing

Seven rosebushes nodded a majestic greeting to me when I walked into my front yard from school Thursday afternoon.

"Where?" I asked wonderingly of the five year old who had come to meet and walk home with me, "did they come from?"

"Pa Bramlett did it," he said, "Me and Pa Bramlett. He dug the holes and I told him where to dig holes."

Until then I hadn't known 72 year old Pa Bramlett and the five year old were friends and gardening partners. Their thoughtfulness that day was to me a real pleasure with gratefulness.

KITE TIME. Necessitates money, string, all the old rags in the house, proper wind velocity, plenty of air space unhindered by wires, and human beings, any age.

The history of kites is such a long one no one really knows exactly who first invented them. But historians think the kite was invented between 400 and 300 B.C. by Archytas of the Greek City of Tarentum.

On the other hand, the Chinese claim that one of their generals, Han Sin, invented the kite in 206 B.C. for use in war. And for hundreds of years Japanese, Koreans, Moors, and Malays have made interesting kites: bird kites with movable eyes, dragon kites with shiny scales, kites with whistles.

In China on the ninth day of the ninth month, Kites Day is celebrated. Thousands of kites shaped like dragons, fishes, birds, and butterflies, float overhead - each supposed to float away evils which might attack its owner.

In Japan on May 5 the Boys' Festival is held and a Carp kite is flown for every boy in the household, the strong brave carp fish being the Japanese symbol for courage.

In 1749 Alexander Wilson and Thomas Melvill of Glasgow, Scotland, fastened thermometers to kites and recorded the temperature of clouds. In 1752 Benjamin Franklin brought electricity out of the sky with a kite, a string, and key, to prove lightning and electricity are the same.

Douglas Archibald, in England in 1883, measured wind velocity with a kite. During the early 1900's the kite helped the U.S. Weather Bureau in its forecasts.

Kites have been used for signaling in wartime, in the building of bridges, for ground-to-air gunnery practice. In the Boer War, man-lifting observation kites were used.

In the Spanish - American War kite-photography was used.

Many years ago, the people of Siam and other Far East countries developed kites without tails.

There are box kites, too. Tailless kites can fly higher and steeper angles than other kites, so I read.

Many years ago I gave up as hopeless ever getting any kite over two feet off the ground to fly at any angle.

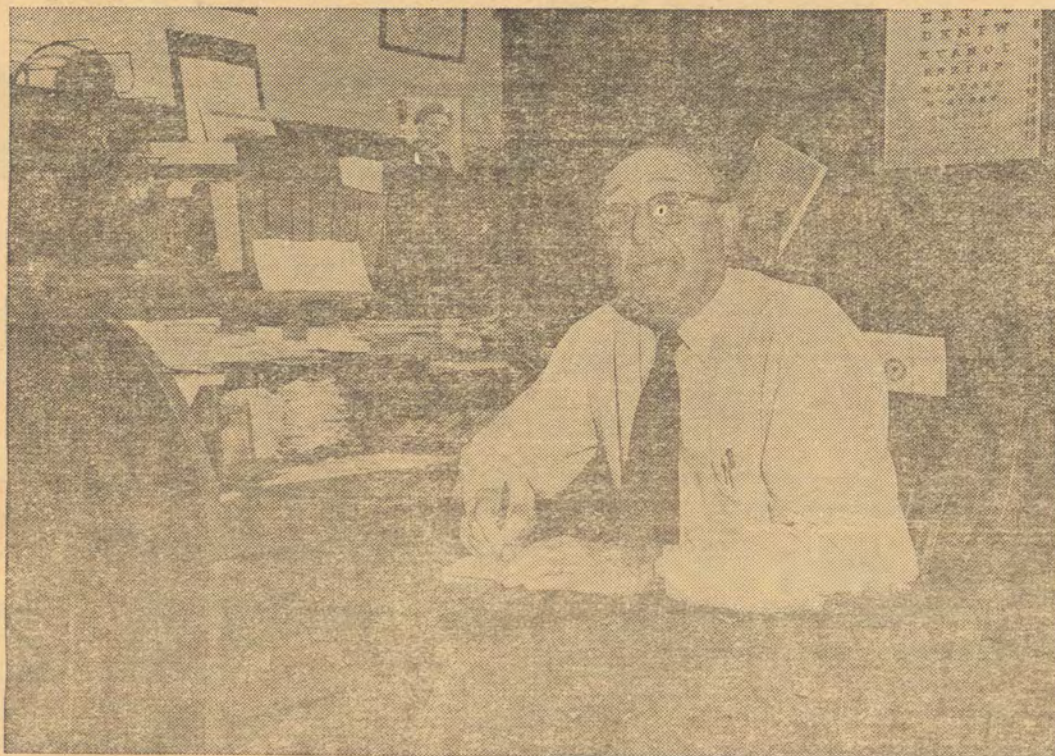
Mrs. Blanche James has returned from Houston where she has been visiting her daughter, Mrs. Euline Weatherspoon.

'Women Better Patients,' Says Family Doctor of Year



Dr. Lonnie A. Coffin, 68, of Farmington, Iowa, back at work after being named General Practitioner of the Year by the American Medical Association.

"Women are better patients than men," according to Dr. Lonnie A. Coffin, Family Doctor of the Year. "They'll do what you tell them, but men won't."

At 68, Dr. Coffin is a warm and happy man, busy with the health needs of more than 3,000 people in and around rural Farmington, Iowa. Enriched by 46 years of country doctoring, he is also a man who speaks his mind, a philosopher with concise and witty views on life. Here are a few of them:

On smoking: "It's undoubtedly bad for you, gave it up after my coronary, and—he stopped to light one of his six daily cigars—I've given it up several times since then."

On health: "The work of the voluntary health agencies makes me confident about the future. The National Foundation, for instance, which helped us eight years ago when a polio epidemic hit Farmington [three of Dr. Coffin's four grandchildren were stricken], is now applying its March of Dimes funds to problems like arthritis and birth defects. That's good news, and good health."

On sickness: "If you're sick, do what you can to get well, but try not to worry about it. If you worry, you'll feel worse and so will everybody around you."

On being sick at night: "We all get sicker at night. That's

because we have more time to think about ourselves."

On drinking: "There are only certain people who should drink. Those who can both control it and afford it."

On fishing: "You can fish sitting down and I like that. If you catch something, fine. If you don't, exaggerate."

On being a doctor: "I try to take care of people no matter what the hour, no matter where they live, no matter who they are. Where or when they get sick is not their fault."

On being a doctor named "Coffin": "Well, it's true that's what they carry you off in, but the fact is my name hasn't scared off too many patients."

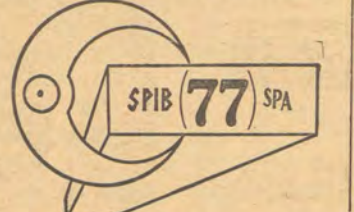

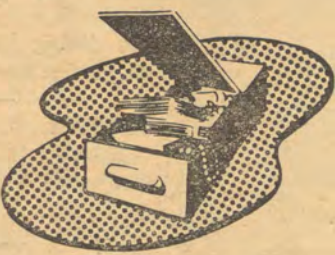

Maybe we just ought to say that any place you go in the world you will find somebody from East Texas.

My mother lives in Los Angeles and is from Texarkana and has had her home at one time or another in Pineland and in Nacogdoches. She is forever running into someone from this part of the country. Here is what she says in a letter I have just received:

"I have just had something happen that took me back to 1925 when we lived for a while in St. Louis while you and your sister went to school there. I was expecting my regular cleaning woman today but instead a tall older woman rang the bell. Said my other one had sent her. Made me so mad, then I asked her where she was from. She said, 'Shreveport'. I said I was from Texarkana. She said, 'A Mr. Temple had a mill at Diboll where my brothers worked and another brother worked on a farm in Pine Bluff for a Mr. John Temple. I almost kissed her. When she left I gave her everything

I could plus her pay.

"She said a friend of hers had worked for a Mrs. Temple in Diboll. Must have been Lucy (Mrs. Henry G. Temple). Small world."

This friend was undoubtedly Crystobel Foster, for she spoke of her as having had a mental illness before she died.

The letter continues:

"This reminds me that once in St. Louis a colored woman rang the door bell and asked if I needed a cook. You may recall her, she ate only melted lard and bread the whole time she worked for us. But when I mentioned Texas she said that her brother was one of the oldest employees of a lumber company at Diboll. I believe his name was Tom Foster. Anyway, Mr. Temple left a pension for him."

These two incidents, more than thirty years apart, do indeed illustrate again that it is a "small world."

Its mighty hard sometimes, however, in the face of the kind of provocation we have.

Southern Pine Lumber, the species that puts bread and butter on our tables here in East Texas, is leading the field so far in 1959 just as it did in 1958.

According to the trade barometer from National Lumber Manufacturers Association, we are producing at 8 per cent above our 1958 rate, shipping 9 per cent above our 1958 rate and have orders which are above our 1958 rate.

No other species can make a claim this favorable.

As a matter of fact, both of the principal competing species are actually producing below their 1958 rate so far. This could, of course, change rapidly. We hope it does, for we all want more and more wood used. Properly seasoned and manufactured wood has unlimited future.

Anyway, it's good to see optimistic trends continue. There is no doubt in our minds that the emphasis in the southern pine industry on proper standards for our product is responsible for this continuing leadership in the market place.

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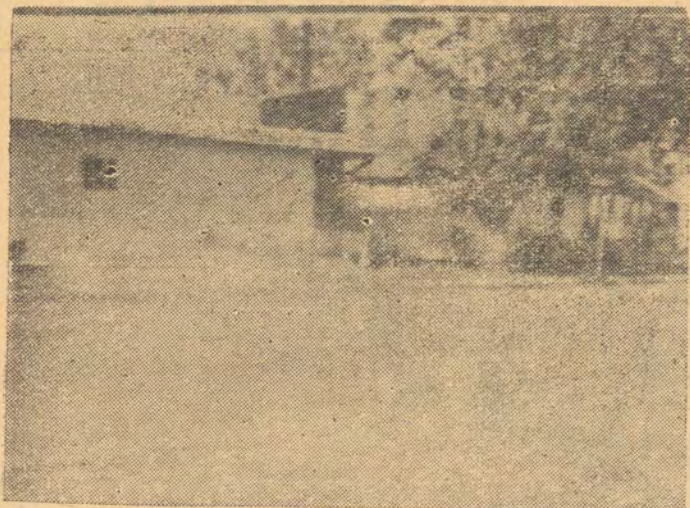
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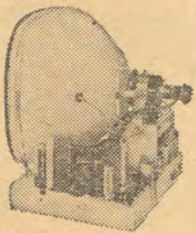
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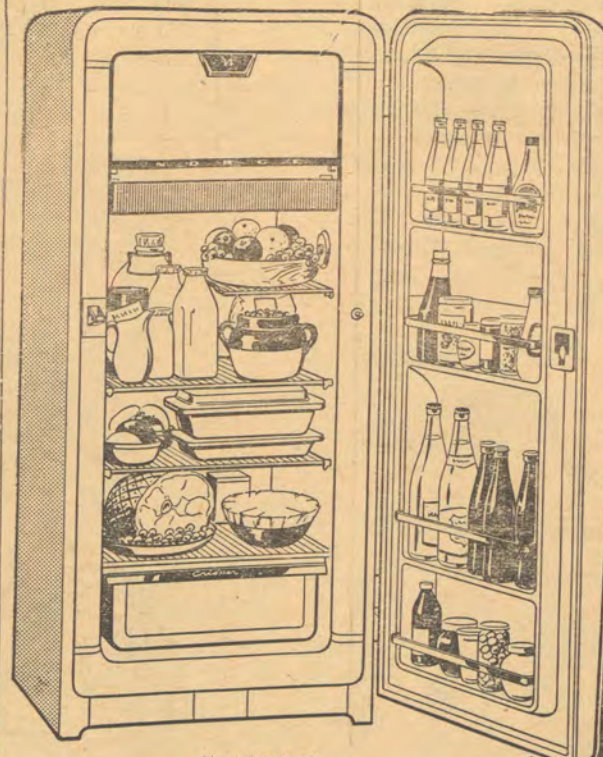
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Sunday Mass

Everyone over 7 years of age is bound to observe the law of abstinence. Complete abstinence is observed on Fridays, and Ash Wednesday. Meat or soup and gravy made from meat are not allowed. Partial abstinence is observed on all week days of Lent.

Mass Sunday will be at 10:30 and Rev. E. F. McKenna will offer the Holy Sacrifice. Gospel will be read from Matthew 4:1-11. Epistle will be taken from 2 Corinthians 6:1-10.

Pine Seedlings Available Now

Nearly 15,000,000 slash pine seedlings are available for planting on private forest lands in East Texas right away, according to Don Young, head, Forest Management Department of the Texas Forest Service.

"Seedlings are distributed for reforestation purposes only. None are available for shade or ornamental plantings," Young reported.

Forms for ordering the little trees can be obtained at Texas Forest Service district headquarters at Linden, Henderson, Lufkin, Woodville and Conroe; the Indian Mound Nursery near Alto; the Magnolia Springs Nursery near Kirbyville; or from the Texas Forest Service at College Station.

The pines are sold to landowners at \$5.59 per thousand trees f.o.b. either nursery. No orders less than 500 trees will be accepted. For orders

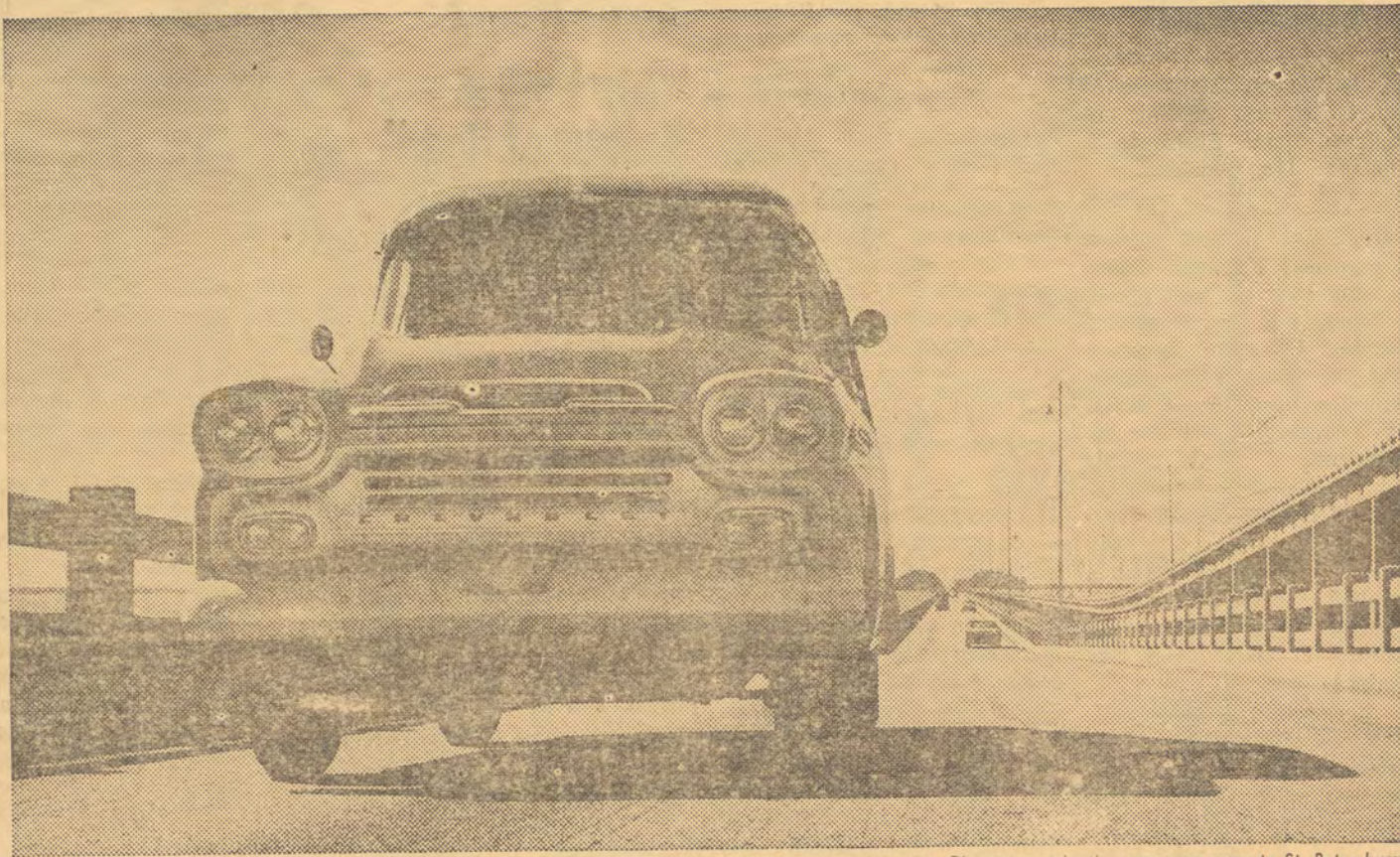
between 500 and 1000 trees, the rate of payment is \$.75 per hundred. Delivery of the trees will continue through February.

"In addition to slash seedlings, about 750,000 shortleaf pines are also available," Mr. Young stated.

Landowners wishing further information may write to the Director, Texas Forest Service at College Station.

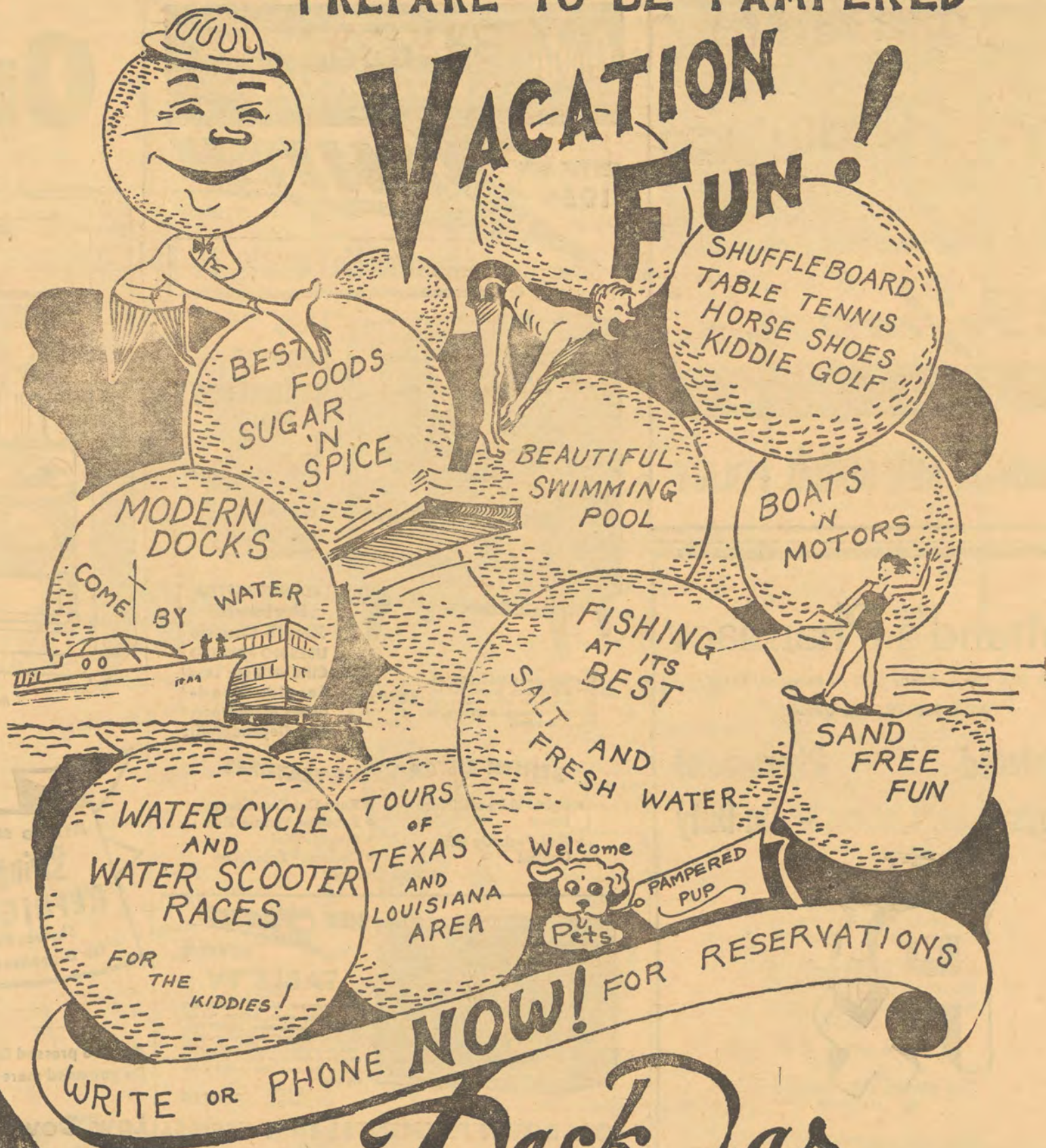
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
