Not to exceed \$30.00, the money was available to any person who did not have adequate take home pay as a result of the shutdown. The money will be paid back in thirty equal payroll deductions, without interest over the next thirty weeks.

The Credit Union, as a result of the shutdown, will skip one week in its payroll deduction, that payment being carried over, according to Credit Union officers.

"We are doing the best we can to overcome the difficulties which have caused this work interruption," Management stated. "Everybody concerned has been working night and day to get your job back in operation. Your cooperation and understanding of the difficulties involved will do much to help us settle down again."

"It should be understood that the Company's desire to help its employees in this instance is neither a commitment nor an implied promise to do so at any time in the future," Management continued.

It was stated that no advances could be made to those who did not have adequate take home pay as a result of their own failure to show up for work that was made available to them.

"I was pretty lucky . . . I missed the short ones and I made the long ones", said Sam Snead as he collected his check bringing his total earnings on All-Star Golf to \$10,500. Only the great can be so sincerely modest—as Sam Snead's comment hardly describes the brilliant, breath-taking match which he won with a record breaking 63, on the Sea Island Georgia Golf Course.

Sam wasted no time . . . on the very first hole he laid his 8-iron shot 3 feet from the pin and then rapped in his putt for a birdie 3. On the par 3 No. 3, he birdied again with an 18 footer. Sam took it easy until the 6th, par 4, 420 yard hole when his 8-iron placed the ball 8 feet from the pin, and his magical putter sank it for his third birdie.

On the 7th and 8th, Harney kept pace with "Slamming Sam"—both of them scoring birdies back to back. On the 9th, Snead made his only error, taking a bogey 5 . . . while Harney parred, giving him a 34 against Snead's 32 on the first nine.

Harney, running into trouble, after 12 holes was 5 strokes down and it looked like the excitement was over for the afternoon; but Sam suddenly got hot again. On the 15th, par 5, 460 yard hole, he just missed a 48 foot putt for an eagle, to take a birdie 4. On the 16th hole, par 4, he sank a 21 foot putt for a birdie 3. On the 17th, par 3, he sank a 17 footer for a birdie 2.

On the 18th, par 5, 464 yard hole, "Slamming Sam" Snead lived up to his nickname and put his 1-iron, 2nd shot, on the green, 16 feet from the pin . . . and then proceeded to calmly sink it for an eagle 3—and a \$500 cash award. Millions of TV fans must have upset their potato chip bowls in excitement over this one. This rocket-like finish of Snead's on the second nine gave him a 31 which, coupled with his first round 32, added up to a neat 63 for a brand new record at Sea Island. Harney finished with a 1 under par, 71, for 2nd place money.

There have been times when I felt that I came as a stranger to the Angelina County region back in January of 1953, but this is far from being true.

No day passes that some friend from my childhood, even, and I do not run into one another.

One old such friend is Byron McNeil who is owner of the Oaks store for men on the main drag in Lufkin.

Byron lives just a couple of blocks from me and one evening recently as my boys and I were wandering around the neighborhood I found him working on a very pretty vacant lot across from his house. The lot has a nice stand of small pine trees on it. He was over there thinning out the sapling trees to give the best trees an opportunity to grow freely. He was carefully racking the posts he was removing to take to the treating plant in Diboll where he exchanged the untreated posts for permanent pressure treated yellow pine posts.

The posts he is trading for he will use to build a fence around his attractive lot.

Pretty interesting having a tree farmer right in the middle of town, but it sort of demonstrates what a wonderful resources we have in our pine trees. They not only make property attractive but serve in the improvement of the property. People from West Texas always envy us in East Texas for having these trees to shade our houses and further protect them from the elements.

Byron's house across the street is, incidentally, built of sturdy southern pine on joists before builders learned they could cut the guts out of a house and put it on the

ground. This is fortunate for Byron because it makes it very inexpensive for him when he decides to move it over to his other lot. If he should decide to sell it, FHA has put a higher value on it than they have on most brand new construction even though his house has been there about ten years.

Another old acquaintance from my Nacogdoches boyhood is Buddy Moore. I was out at Huntington visiting with the Hollands last week and ran into him there. Some of the fellows that go back a long way that I think a lot of are Jack Tittle, Dan Melton, Wilson McKewen, and Puss Erwin.

Jack, Dan and I played football together at Texarkana College along with another Lufkinite, Goof Wright. One of the fellows we played against was Puss Erwin at Marshall. Another one was Gene Lawhorn with Paris who is now with TP&L at Tyler. These were all hardnose ball players and I am mighty proud to have been one of them. They have gone on to display the same spirit of hard playing sportsmanship in their lives.

While I was out at Huntington, where I ran into Buddy Moore, I had a nice visit with Mrs. Holland and Jake Holland. Tap was off fishing. I've always heard that a good fisherman is often a good businessman. This sure is the case with Tap.

There is no question about where Tap stands on our East Texas forest products. He is a citizen who believes in the source of our East Texas bread and butter and is highly respected all over our region. Jake is sort of a chip-off-the-old-block, seems like. We

talked a little bit about Huntington Homecoming when it comes around again this year and I told him that I thought Paul Durham and the Free Press would be worth a whole lot to Huntington in helping this day go over big again.

Every morning when I come to work I have to drop my kids off at one of the steel and concrete school houses across town from me. It's also across the railroad tracks.

It's an even toss whether or not there will be a mile long train on the crossing, which means a wait all the way from five minutes to fifteen minutes. This wait gives a lot of time to do a little figuring. I would guess that an average of 200 cars are held up at the five or six crossings in Lufkin four or five times a day. If the average time is ten minutes, and I would figure it probably more, this is about 133 hours of Lufkin people's time per day that is spent letting a train go through. If each car spends a fifth of a gallon waiting, this is 160 gallons of gas up in smoke.

Areas like the greater Angelina County area have many blessings which go unsung.

Usually we are quick to gripe as I have about trains blocking crossings.

Not much is said, though about blessings like our Kurth Memorial Library which is open to everybody hereabouts. As we worry about the course that world affairs are taking and the apparent impotence of our leaders to do anything other than rush us headlong into wars; when we worry about our schools closing in some regions without there being any calm and forceful moral leadership to show us how we can avoid schism and perhaps another disastrous civil war, we can remind ourselves that as long as we have the world's ideas at our fingertips and all the scholarship of mankind available to us free in our libraries, we can face forward optimistically.

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HIGHLIGHTS AND SIDELIGHTS FROM YOUR STATE CAPITOL

Austin, Texas - The season of the "hard luck story" is in full swing.

Legislative committees having to do with taxing and spending are in almost constant sessions. On the one hand they hear from the state agencies that want more money - of their dire needs, of the gloomy future that awaits the state if their programs are under-financed.

Equally mournful are the stories of those who would be target of new taxes. It would

be like putting up a "Keep Out of Texas" sign for new businesses and accompanying prosperity, say many business and civic leaders of the sharp new tax bites. Texas communities trying to build up their areas by bringing in money making enterprises would have the rug pulled out from under them, say the tax critics.

In this arena of clashing viewpoints, the legislators must serve as both judge and jury. Few lawmakers expect

to collect any nosegays for their efforts - no matter how sincere or well-considered. Some expect they may have to displease both groups - by cutting spending requests and raising taxes - all in one woeful session.

BANE TO BUSINESS - As expected, businesses, large and small, take a dim view of Governor Price Daniel's proposal to increase corporation franchise taxes.

Industry spokesmen told of probable increases of from 50 to 250 per cent in the amount they would have to pay. They complained, too, that they'd have to pay a tax

whether they were making money or not, since the tax would be on capital, rather than income.

Rep. J. E. Winfree of Houston, sponsor of the bill, told the business representatives, in effect, "It's this or something else."

UT PLEADS CASE - University of Texas "will sink back into mediocrity," declared exes and officials unless the school gets a better appropriation deal than that proposed by the Legislative Budget Board.

University officials asked for a two-year appropriation of about \$34,006,067. Budget

Board recommended \$27,920,624.

Dr. Logan Wilson told the House Appropriations Committee that people seemed willing to pay broad-based taxes for highways. Why not for higher education?

Herman Jones, Austin attorney and spokesman for alumni, emphasized the importance of improved education to this country's position in international affairs. "I don't want it put in the history books that this generation kept the budget low and let the nation die," said Jones.

UT officials also said they would be opposed to establishing a third medical branch - at San Antonio, Austin or elsewhere - until they have gotten enough money to make "first class" the existing Dallas and Galveston branches.

PRISON PROBLEMS - Even more impassioned are the pleas of those concerned with appropriations for the Department of Corrections. Texas Prison System is operated at about half the national average cost per inmate, says Supt. O. E. Ellis. For some years Board members have been warning of dangerously overcrowded conditions, and the need for more buildings.

A slash in funds and personnel, as proposed by the Legislative Budget Board, would bring sheer ruin to the bulging prisons, in Ellis' view.

Prison System has an even more immediate pinch in that it hasn't money to finish out this fiscal year. It had a crop failure last year, when floods wiped out cotton on the prison farms.

Since the Prison System is heavily dependent on its own production, it, like any hard-hit farmer, needs some "cash money" - about \$500,000 - to tide it over for this year. **SOMETHING'S GOTTA GO** - We can't continue our present services and take a budget cut too, Texas A&M Extension Service officials told legislators.

Budget Board recommended a slightly lower Extension Service appropriation for 1960 than it had for 1959. Service had asked for sizeable increase to help off-set extensive loss of county agents to better-salaried jobs in industry.

Spokesmen for the Farm Bureau and numerous other rural groups appeared before the House Appropriations Committee to plead the importance of Extension Service work.

DEADLINE EXTENDED - Senate General Investigating Committee, a creation of the last session, has until March 2 to complete its voluminous report.

After nearly 20 months of activity, the Committee had had 27 hearings, piled up 7,500 pages of testimony. All hearings were public, and

some brought unsettling repercussions in the fields of insurance regulation and tax collecting.

Sen. Charles Herring of Austin, chairman, is recommending such work be continued by a Joint House-Senate Committee. There must be some sort of "watch dog", Herring believes, for the state's billion-dollar a-year business.

SLOW DOWN! - Chronic speeders would soon find themselves getting around on shoe leather under a strict new measure proposed by Rep. Ben Lewis of Dallas.

Under the bill, the first speeding conviction would bring a 30-day license suspension; the second, a 60-day suspension; the third, six months, and all thereafter, one year. A record of each conviction would be carried on the driver's license.

Speeding, Lewis pointed out, is regarded as a leading cause of accidents.

ANTI-AIR-SPLITTING - "Harmless errors" would no longer be grounds for reversal of a criminal court conviction under a measure being sponsored by Rep. Tom James of Dallas.

Only "substantive errors" would require the throwing out of a trial court decision.

There has been some criticism in recent years of Court of Criminal Appeals decisions which nullified convictions because of such things as misspellings and typographical errors. James' bill was recommended by the Texas Law Enforcement Commission.

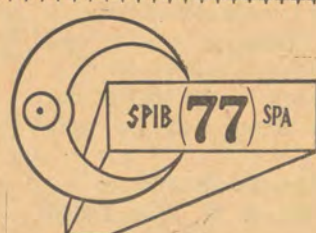

1958 BROILER

PRODUCTION UP 15%

Commercial broiler production hit a new high in 1958 with the average price almost a new low. Total production in the 22 important states covered by USDA weekly chick placement reports totaled 1,496,864,000 birds, 15 per cent more than in 1957. The average price per pound was 18.3 cents, one-half per pound less than in 1957. Gross income from the sales of broilers in the 22 states in 1958 was \$390,245,000, compared to \$784,099,000 in 1957. The average weight per bird sold was 3.2 pounds - the same as in 1957.

Georgia was again the leading broiler state, producing more than twice as many as second place North Carolina, which went ahead of Arkansas last year. Alabama remained in fourth place and Texas in fifth.

FERTILIZE PONDS FOR BETTER FISHING

A pond will support a certain amount of fish in ponds. This poundage can be thousands of fish too small to use or a smaller number of larger and more usable fish depending on how the pond is fertilized and managed. This statement of a noted fish and wildlife biologist sums up the research findings on fertilizing fish ponds. In nearly every case, a pond must be fertilized to provide good fishing, just as corn land must be fertilized to grow good corn.

From March 1 to June 1 is the best time to fertilize ponds in this section. Usually 300 to 800 pounds of mineral fertilizer of the same analysis recommended for cropland in the pond watershed is used. Ed Cooper, Extension Wildlife Specialist, favors putting one-half the fertilizer to be used at the first application. The increase in plankton, the microscopic plant food for small fish, will cause the water to appear "soupy" with a green or brown cast. Cooper advises dividing the remaining half of the fertilizer in 3 to 5 equal parts and checking the plankton "bloom" of the water to determine when to add more fertilizer. When the water is clear enough that the cupped hand can be seen when the arm is immersed to elbow depth another fertilizer application should be made.

If you are interested in better fishing in your pond and do not have a copy of Extension Bulletin B-213 "Improve Your Farm Fish Pond" call at your County Agent's office or drop him a card and request a copy.

SPREAD BROILER LITTER NOW

If you have or can get broiler litter for your corn land, or for cotton, pasture land or other crops, you should spread it on the land as soon as possible. Broiler litter spread and plowed under at least a month or six weeks before planting will have time to decompose and will be worth more.

Every bit of the broiler litter available should be utilized on Sabine County land. There is no better fertilizer. In addition to furnishing plant nutrients it supplies organic matter so badly needed by most of our soils. The manure from 1000 broilers raised to 9 weeks of age contains the equivalent nitrogen, phosphate and potash in one ton of 10-8-6 commercial fertilizer that would cost \$50.00 or more.

TEXAS 30 AGAIN TOP HYBRID IN EXPERIMENT STATION TESTS

Texas 30 made the highest average yield of the varieties tested at 19 locations by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station in 1958. Texas 28 and Asgrow 104 were the next two ranking varieties. Texas 30 showed up well in the tests in resistance to lodging, in shelling percent, in freedom from worm damage and in the small percentage of unsound ears.

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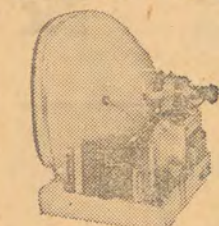

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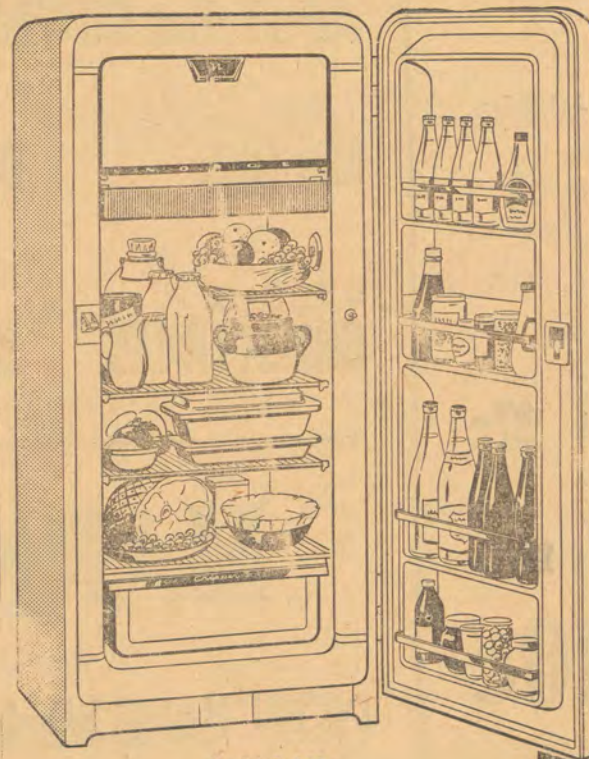
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
