A \$100,000 fire razed the debarking unit of Southern Pine Lumber Company's mill at Diboll early Saturday.

B. F. Hines, chief of the Diboll Volunteer Fire Department, said the fire apparently started from a oil heater left burning during the night.

The structure that houses the debarking department, and all equipment in it was destroyed.

A nightwatchman, Frank Riley, was the first to spot the pre-dawn fire. There was no one in the fire whistle room, where certain signals are used to alert the town, and he began pulling the cord for one whistle blast. Chief Hines said. As a result, many volunteer firemen thought that it was a train whistle. When it was ascertained that it was a fire, the volunteer firemen rushed to the scene, arriving at 6 a.m., but the building was too far gone to be saved. Nearby buildings were saved, however.

The debarking unit is the first stage of the milling process of logs, stripping the bark from the logs and readying them for cutting inside the mill.

Joe C. Denman, production manager for Southern Pine Lumber Company, said there will be no loss of production in other parts of the mill because of the fire.

The \$100,000 damage estimate was made by Arthur Temple, Jr., president of Southern Pine Lumber Company.

State Capital NEWS

Austin, Tex. -- If you can't beat it, don't knock it.

That sentiment, in varying forms, is being often expressed by legislators struggling to write tax bills to fill the yawning holes in the state's money supply.

People who come before the Legislature to oppose a money-raising proposal usually get a tart invitation to come up with a better one.

Opponents of a tobacco tax plan got short shrift before the House Committee. "If you come criticizing, don't you think you should come up with some solution to the tax problem?" asked Rep. H. J. Blanchard of Lubbock.

Similarly, anyone who comes to push a money-spending bill is challenged to produce a money-making bill to match it.

Rep. Don Gladden of Fort Worth drew cheers from fellow House members when he criticized the approach of a teachers' letter writing campaign. Gladden said the teachers had been instructed to ask for higher pay but make no statement on what taxes they would favor.

ROCKY ROAD -- Overall, the tax picture is still "all shook

up."

Rep. Jamie Clements' bill to remove the tax exemption on cigarettes sold on military bases was sent by the House Taxation Committee to Atty. General Wilson. Question to Wilson is whether the state can collect a tax from a federal agency.

A proposed liquor tax hike suddenly gained redoubled potency when the sponsor, Rep. Lavalley, took on an amendment that would legalize liquor-by-the-drink sales. Gov. Daniel, who had urged the original bill, promptly protested. Bill was sent to subcommittee for study.

House Appropriations Committee apparently is taking note of the Tax Committee's rocky road. It is reportedly doing some painful paring of spending requests.

WIDE OPEN FIELD -- Meanwhile, many more "little tax" ideas are swirling about. Most apparently are aimed at avoiding a bitter deadlock over a new "big tax."

Rep. Rufus Kilpatrick of Beaumont introduced a bill to tax gross receipts of scrap metal sales, and Rep. W. T. Olivar, Port Neches, a five per cent gross receipts tax on

advertising sold by newspapers, radio and TV stations and billboards. Oliver also is said to be considering taxes on phonograph records and parking lots.

Other possibilities being discussed are (1) a 1.5 per cent general sales tax, exempting food, feed and fertilizer, by Rep. Frates Seeligson of San Antonio, (2) an across-the-board increase in the omnibus tax system which includes almost all present levies, (3) a registration fee for airplanes, similar to auto licensing.

Rep. Homer Koliba of Columbus said he would prefer to raise money through legalized liquor-by-the-drink and horse racing heavily taxed than by a general sales tax. **HIGH-VOLTAGE ISSUE** -- House State Affairs Committee will take on a super-charged issue March 16 -- the long struggle between private utilities and REA co-ops.

REAs are seeking a law that would assure their being able to continue to operate in a once-rural area after it is annexed by a city. Under the measure sponsored by Rep. Alonzo Jamison of Denton, the co-ops could serve old customers and recruit new ones for a period of 10 years. After this, a municipal franchise would be required.

Private power companies, offering stiff opposition, say non-tax-paying co-ops want to spread through the cities,

centralize the power industry. Co-ops retort they are the ones being swallowed up -- by spreading cities.

RE-ORGANIZATION ASKED -- A bill has been introduced to reorganize the State Insurance Department, which was reorganized by the Legislature two years ago.

Rep. George Cook's measure would set up a part time board of nine members "familiar with the insurance field."

Cook indicated the proposal was in answer to complaints that the present three-member board (1) does not represent industry and (2) serves full-time, contrary to "legislative intent."

KEEPING THE SABBATH -- Sunday beer buying seems likely to continue, but not Sunday auto buying.

A bill to ban beer sales on Sunday and after 10 p.m. on weekdays has been sent to an unfriendly House subcommittee. A spokesman for "drys" irritated committee members from beer-drinking areas by implying use of beer "separated the saved from the unsaved."

Senate Transportation Committee approved the ban of Sunday auto sales, after dealers presented a solid front of support. Only opponents were representatives of Seventh Day Adventists, who observe Saturday as their day of worship.

COLLEGE EXPANSION OKAYED -- Elevation of two junior colleges -- Arlington State and John Tarleton -- to full four-year status has been approved by the House.

Economy advocates protested that "we have 16 fully supported state four-year colleges now -- more than any other

state." But supporters replied that no additional appropriation would be needed immediately. **"LITTLE HOOVER" BILL** -- Creation of a state commission to conduct an efficiency study -- similar to the Hoover Commission for federal government -- has gained House approval.

Rep. Dick Cory of Victoria sponsored, pointed out that the Hoover Commission resulted in a seven billion dollar savings in its first year.

Opponents protested the Cory commission would be just another money-spending state agency. Cory contended the \$100,000 it would cost would be regained many times.

Commission would be made up of one senator, one representative and ten persons from private life.

It is more concerned with the last year of his ministry, during which His enemies' hatred increased daily, revealing itself in more tangible form and culminating in the drama of Holy Week, when the church day by day follows the footsteps of her Lord.

Snead did it again. For the 8th
time in a row, he collected his
check for \$2,000 on All-Star
Golf. This time, the victim was
fighting Bob Rosburg, who shot
a commendable 2 under par 69.
This, however, was to no avail
against Snead's brilliant 6 under
par 65.

Snead's second eagle on All-
Star Golf, plus his last victory at
the DeSoto Lake Country Club
in Sarasota, Florida, brings his
total take to \$17,000 . . . and
that's a lot of money to collect
on TV, outside of an Isolation
Booth. Rosburg, at the outset,
looked like he might turn the
trick when he came up with a
birdie on the 2nd hole . . . but
on the 3rd his 5-iron went into
the trap and he was forced to
take a bogey to even up the
match.

Snead wasted no time going
ahead when he sank a 40 foot
putt for a birdie 2, on the par 3,
No. 5 hole. His magic putter
sank a 9 foot putt on the next
green for a birdie 3, and on the
8th, he just missed his eagle 3
... rimming his putt for a birdie
4. Rosburg matched his birdie
on the 8th, but he still was two
strokes down to Sam Snead
coming into the turn. On the
11th, a 472 yard, par 5 hole,
Sam hit a 1-iron 220 yards, 25
feet from the pin, and then sank
a beautiful putt for an eagle 3
and a bonus of \$500. Rosburg
shot a very handsome birdie on
this hole, but his achievement
was somewhat dulled by Snead's
heroics.

On the par 3, 12th hole, Snead
put his 5-iron 6 feet from the
pin for another birdie . . . and I
really felt for Bob Rosburg who
was shooting 2 under par golf,
but still found himself 4 down.

This was the margin at the end
of the match, with Snead shoot-
ing a 6 under par, 65, and Ros-
burg a 2 under par, 69.

Snead racked up 5 birdies and
an eagle . . . and this is the kind
of golf that is virtually unbeat-
able. His 65 brought Snead's
average on All-Star Golf down to
approximately 67 strokes per
round. If you had to single out
one phase of Snead's game
responsible for this achievement,
you must give credit to a con-
fident, sure putting stroke that
never seems to miss an opportu-
nity to break par.

Next week, as your Munsing-
wear Golf Reporter, I will cover
Snead's match against Billy
Maxwell. Who knows . . . per-
haps this will mark the end of
the Snead Dynasty on ABC-TV
All-Star Golf.

hole. It was quite a comedown,
but those six years turned him
into a saint with a contempt
for either softness or hardship.
He finally made his escape
from slavery, returned to his
parents, and the next we read
of him, he has finished his
priestly studies in France,
been consecrated a Bishop and
left for Ireland where from
461 and 31 years thereafter he
worked, and hard.

St. Patrick must have been a
genius for organization. By
the time of his death he had
covered all of Ireland with a
network of churches and mon-
asteries which were receiving
a constant flow of converts. A
native clergy was in charge.

His was not an easy task, and
at times Patrick felt the natu-
ral longing to go back and vis-
it his friends in France and
Wales, but he never left and
in the sort of diary he left be-
hind he said, "I fear to lose

the labor which I began . . .
Let it not happen to me from
my God that I should ever
part with His people which He
purchased in the ends of the
earth . . ."

The Irish have never forgot-
ten the complete self-sacrifice
of St. Patrick on their behalf.
Nor will St. Patrick ever
forget his beloved children.
There is a beautiful legend
that he himself will be their
judge at the end of the world,
and many a slack one will
scamper through the gates of
heaven on that day of fire and
wrath, thanks to the power-
ful intercession of St. Patrick.

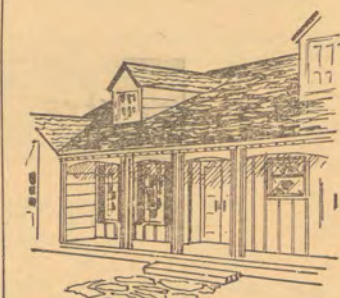
