These operate in the fields of lumber manufacturing, and distribution, plastics, construction materials, machinery manufacturing, radio and newspaper, real estate, and banking.

A director of both the Texas Lumber Manufacturers Association and the National Lumber Manufacturers Association, Temple is past president, director, and member of the executive committee of the Southern Pine Association of Texas.

Temple is extremely active in many Texas civic, educational and research activities.

Southern Pine Lumber Co., longtime producers of yellow pine and hardwood, is a foremost exponent of diversified processing of forest products, of automation, and of forest management for perpetual timber yield.

With headquarters in Phoenix Southwest Lumber operates mills in Flagstaff and McNary, Arizona, and Corrigan, Texas.

Back now from Eureka Springs in the Ozarks of Arkansas. Pleasant it is to go get away for a week, even though you work twice as hard cleaning up an old house and keeping house for a couple of restless boys. A unique feature about Eureka besides the ones already mentioned in this column last week is that it is a town which came into being full-grown, as it were.

Eureka was developed as a Nineteenth Century resort town. This means that all of its houses and business buildings were built at the same time and bear the stamp of one brief period.

The homes, clinging to steep hillsides, are southern yellow pine throughout. The builders very obviously reveled in the limitless possibilities of working in wood. Jigsaw gingerbread of every conceivable pattern; lacey embellishments of turned spools; gables and porches; turned columns and so on.

If people still built houses with the affection for wood that they did when Eureka was built, every man in East Texas could look into his pay envelope each week and see three times as much there as he now does.

One of the dangers to Eureka is that its residents may not properly appreciate and conserve the flavor that these houses, worked in the

concepts of the 1880's and 90's. Some folks are already siding over the beautiful old beveled exteriors with synthetic materials which speak cheapness. It's like covering the features of a beautiful old lady with some kind of cheap pancake makeup.

It is to be hoped the civic spirit of Eureka will somehow discourage his kind of detachment of its fine little old houses.

While we were in Eureka, Louis and Elsie Freund, artist friends of ours, took the boys and me on a hike up steep crags above the swift White River. We went to a point where there is a towering natural amphitheatre in the rocks from which we could look down on the ribboning stream and fertile rolling fields nestled among great blue hills. It was late in the afternoon and there had been thundershowers with others threatened.

This sight was something for three East Texas boys to soak up with delight.

When we got back down, my feet were itching and burning like fire and appeared to be covered with poison ivy.

The next day, the Freunds advised me that it was seed ticks. When they showed them to me it was hard for me to believe, because they were so small. They looked like finely ground pepper.

When I told them that seed ticks in East Texas were about half the size of the head of a pin and that you could see them with your naked eye, Louis said "Well, that's Texas for you. Everything is big in Texas."

The Freunds, by the way, are among the artists whose works have been exhibited at the Pine Bough Restaurant in Diboll.

Several weeks ago a very cultured lady came to our house with some fine etchings.

Seems if you ever buy a picture, folks will know it and seek you out. Actually, this makes it very agreeable if you like pictures, for you get to see more than you would otherwise. Trouble is, you spend the grocery money once you get the bug.

But the point of mentioning this lady is that she reminded me of one of the persistent misconceptions that affect us here in East Texas where our Bread and Butter comes from forest products.

When we were talking about the forest beauty of the region, we discussed the Big Thicket.

She said that she had heard that there was a movement afoot to make it a national forest so that the sawmills would not devastate it.

This made me want to "blow my top" but it gave me an opportunity to talk about the responsible conservation practices of tree farmers in East Texas and to tell her how good harvest practices actually preserve and perpetuate forests.

These folks whose sentimental views are based on misinformation are almost as severe a threat to our forest products economy as forest fires.

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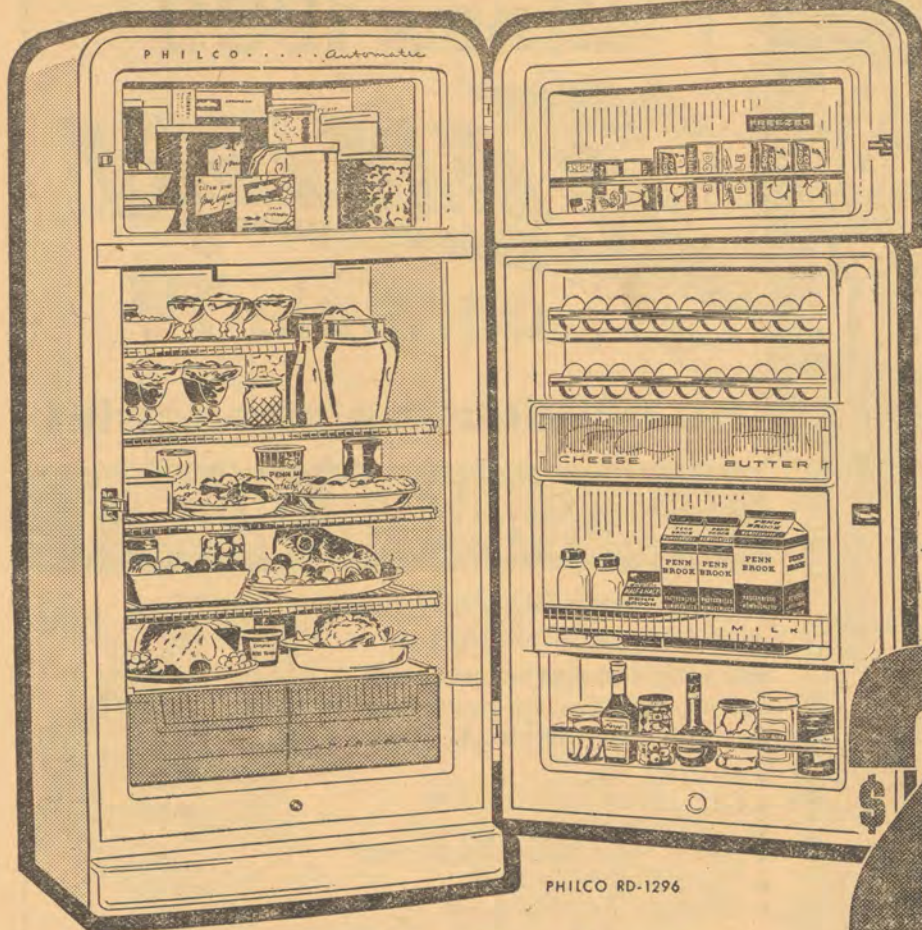

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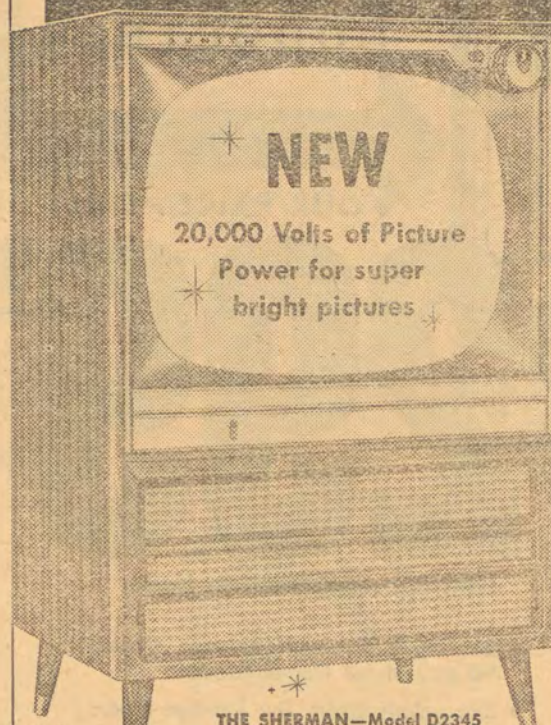


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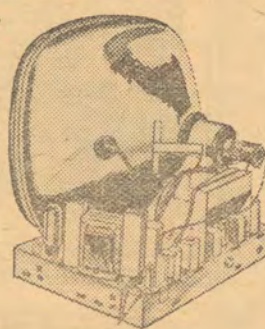
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
